A NEW BOOK which bears the unmistakable stamp of two Baird women has gone on sale at Six Flags Over Texas. Since copies were placed in the park's concession stands only last week, it's far too early to guess how sales will be.

The product is a coloring book, prepared by Atrelle Dill and Roberta Ross of Baird and is an outgrowth of their Visual Aids for Young Americans.

On the cover is a montage of six characters, each representing a segment of Texas history. On the back, also in full color, are female counterparts of the cover characters.

Inside are 12 pages to be colored. Each of the six areas in Texas history is represented by two cartoon characters, similar to those pictured on the book's front and back covers.

Also included are pictures of the six flags, with a capsule giving brief details about the respective periods.

Occupying a place of honor, just inside the back cover, is a drawing of the George Washington medal awarded Visual Aids for Young Americans by Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge.

We heartily suggest you get at least one copy of this unique coloring book when you visit Six Flags this summer. It will be especially attractive to residents of this area because of its creators.

A 58-YEAR SUBSCRIBER to the Baird Star took time last week to tell us about herself. She is Mrs. A. E. Yancy, now of Abilene.

She and A. E. Yancy were married Feb. 3, 1907 and took a subscription to The Star the following month. The 57th year of that continuous readership passed this past March.

Mrs. Yancy pointed out that she was born the same month that The Star was founded — December, 1887. This, she said, has given her an unusual interest in the newspaper during her years as a subscriber.

ANOTHER SUBSCRIBER with a long family connection to The Baird Star was kind enough to share her background with us last week. She is Miss Jennie Harris of Baird.

Although a subscriber "only" since 1935 herself, she has been reading the paper "ever since I have been old enough to read."

Her father, the late R. J. Harris, was a subscriber from the time the newspaper was established in 1887 until his death. He was also a subscriber to the old Callahan County Clarendon, forerunner of The Star which was published at Belle Plaine.

We are grateful to hear from these longtime friends of The Baird Star, and hope to hear from others who can equal or surpass their records.

First Junior Rodeo Friday, Saturday

First performances of what is scheduled to become an annual junior rodeo will be unveiled this weekend at the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse arena east of Baird.

The rodeo — which has drawn 62 entries for its first outing — will begin at 8 p.m. both Friday and Saturday nights. It is sponsored by the Baird FFA Chapter.

A parade at 5 p.m. will formally open festivities. The line of march will follow the same trail along Market St. in Baird that was used for the parade opening the Sheriff's Posse rodeo last month.

Trophies will be awarded to winner in all events, and to units judged best in the parade. All-around awards will be made

to both the top cowboy and cowgirl of the show.

Contestants have been divided into two divisions, junior and senior, according to age. Participating will be members of FFA chapters at Eula, Cross Plains, Moran, Clyde and Baird.

Schedule for both nights includes, in order, senior bull riding, junior pole bending, junior calf riding, junior goat sacking, junior barrel racing, senior barrel racing, open goat ribbon roping, senior pole bending, senior red wagon race, senior goat sacking, and senior bull riding.

A special feature both nights will be a boot race, open to youngsters 12 years of age or under. Competitors will remove one boot each, with the collection of

footgear being piled at the opposite end of the arena from the youngsters.

First five who run the length of the arena and find their missing boot Friday night will receive free tickets to the Saturday night performance. Winner of the event Saturday night will receive a trophy.

Admission to the home-produced rodeo — for which additional stock is still needed — will be 50 and 25 cents. Announcer will be Gary Christmas of Stamford and clowns will be Eric Lovell, Thomas Robbins and Gary Wilson.

Concession stand will be operated by mothers of the Baird FFA talent team, with proceeds going to finance the team's trip to the state contest. The talent

team will perform during events at both nights of the rodeo.

Members of Callahan Sheriff's Posse will assist FFA members in taking tickets and operating chutes. The posse will also participate in the Friday parade.

Leading the parade will be sweethearts of the competing chapters. They include Cinda Young of Clyde, Elaine Hass of Baird, Jane Ann Miller of Eula and Sandra Barr of Cross Plains. The girls will also be presented at the arena announcer's stand.

Rodeo directors announced that all contestants must meet for a rider check Friday between 6:30 and 7:30 p.m. The check will be conducted at the arena announcer's stand.

Heading the planning for the rodeo has been an executive committee composed of Billy Seelig, B. P. Stephenson, Mike Hart, Thomas Robbins and Gary Abernathy.

A gunshot wound suffered Sunday night took the life of Marvin Chester Weed, 25, of Baird about 5:40 p.m. Wednesday in Hendrick Memorial Hospital at Abilene.

Services will be at 10 a.m. Friday in Godfrey Funeral Home chapel with Dick Marcear, Baird Church of Christ minister, officiating. Burial will be in Ross Cemetery.

Mr. Weed was shot once in the head Sunday night as he sat in a car on the driveway of Payne Humble Station in Baird. The bullet came from a 7.65 mm German pistol.

A native of Putnam, he was born Dec. 6, 1938 and was a member of the Church of Christ. He was in the Navy from Jan. 12, 1956 until Oct. 1, 1962.

Survivors in addition to the parents include two sisters, Mrs. Jimmy Smedley of Abilene and Mrs. Lynn Payne of Baird; one brother, Gerald Weed of Carlsbad, N. M.; maternal grandmother, Mrs. John Morrison of Merkel; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Weed of Putnam.

Proper Insecticides Can Control Ants in Either Homes or Lawns

BY PAT C. GARNER
Callahan County Agent

Ants are becoming a nuisance in homes and lawns in many sections of the county. These nests can be effectively controlled when recommended insecticides are used, advises Callahan County Agent Pat C. Garner.

Among the more popular and effective insecticides for ant control are chlordane and dieldrin.

These may be applied along window and door sills, foundation cracks, baseboards and other possible runways for the ants. Some nesting places for ants

are behind walls, in closets, in furniture and other dark undisturbed places.

When a nesting place is found, one of the following practices may be followed to destroy the nests.

Effective control, in most instances, depends upon locating and destroying nests and thoroughly treating the area with proper insecticides.

When ants are found in the house they may be controlled by applying 2/3 per cent chlordane or 0.5 per cent dieldrin household sprays. These materials may also be applied with a small brush. Repeat the application as needed to maintain control of the pests.

Outside the home, apply a band of insecticidal dust or spray around the foundation wall and treat all nests found in the yards. For outside control, 10 per cent chlordane, 2 per cent dieldrin or 5 per cent heptachlor dusts are effective. Granular formulations and sprays of these materials are also available and are convenient to use.

When using these or any other poisons for control of pests around the farm and home, always be sure to read and follow directions printed on the label of the container, says Garner.

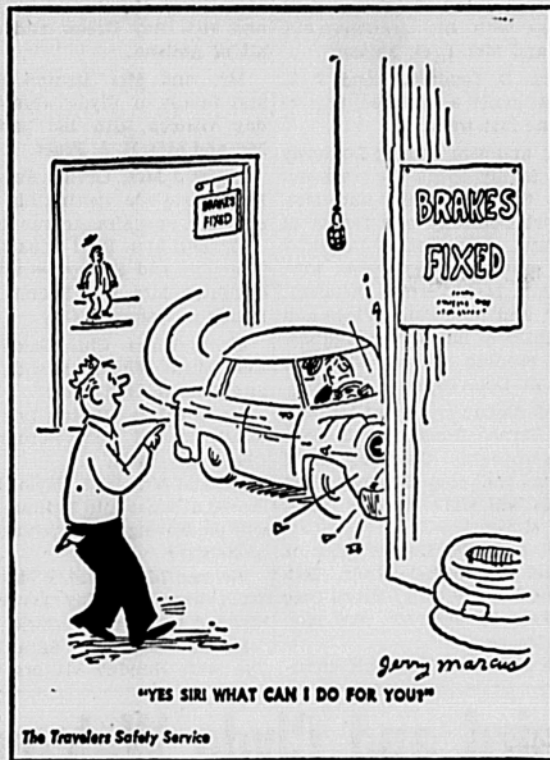

Good Temporary Pasture Requires Advance Planning for Top Results

Summer temporary pastures for good green-grazing in July and August requires planning in May and June, reminds Callahan County Agent Pat C. Garner.

The county agent said good temporary pastures can help maintain good production in dairy herds and increase weights of beef cattle even when permanent pastures mature and become less palatable and lower in nutrients.

To stretch the summer grazing season in Callahan County, Garner suggests the following five steps:

1. Plant a Sudan-sorghum hybrid. They give higher yield and are more disease resistant.
2. Fertilize for optimum yield and for greater disease resistance.
3. Make different plantings to spread the availability of good grazing.
4. Plant at least 30 pounds per acre if seed is broadcast.
5. Following each harvest, whether by grazing or by making hay, apply at least 40 pounds of nitrogen per acre for rapid regrowth.

"If you're just going to graze Sudan-sorghum hybrid, you might consider planting in rows," Garner said. "Cattle will walk down the middles, trampling less forage than when grazing a broadcast crop. However, if rains come and surplus forage is produced, the tick stand of a broadcast crop is best for making hay.

One half acre per cow is adequate when grazing is limited to one-to-two hours per day. Continuous grazing requires more land per cow for maximum results.

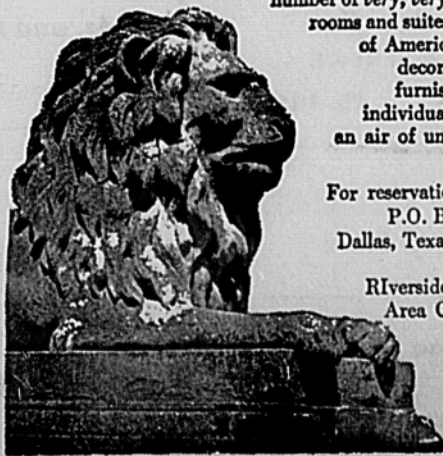

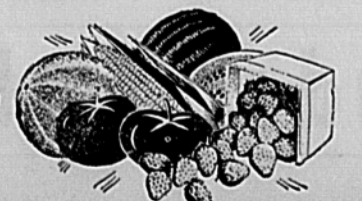
