### Streets Iced After Water Line Breaks

If you were driving on the Tahoka Highway or South Broadway Monday morning, you probably assumed from the ice piled on the sides of these major roads, waist-high in some places, that you had missed an ice-storm during the night.

You didn't miss an ice-storm, but you did sleep through a break in one of the city's eight-inch water lines in the north-west section of town.

With the temperature at 5 degrees and the wind-chill factor at 25 degrees below zero, the flooded streets were soon iced over.

Thanks to city employees Mike Sanchez, Derrick Walls, James Wise, Owen Gilbert, Frank Flores and Pablo Perez, who worked through the night to repair the break in the line, clear the ice from the roads and spread gravel over the icy spots, driving in Post early Monday morning wasn't as hazardous as it could've been.

## Council Snubbed by WRMWD

Although a copy of the letter has not been received at city hall, the Post City Council has been notified verbally that the White River Municipal Water District (WRMWD) has refused to provide answers to a list of questions concerning the sale of water to third parties and the recently imposed rate increase.

City attorney Harvey Harwood presented the questions in writing as requested by WRMWD attorney Harry Jung.

"We will be glad to answer these questions if you will put them in writing," Jung told Morton at the December 20, 1988 meeting with the WRMWD board of directors.

The refusal to answer the questions was presented in a letter to Morton and explains that the records are available for inspection, but WRMWD would not provide research time to answer the questions.

"Obviously, it appears their position is that since we might have to go to court on this matter, it is not in their best interests to provide information to us that we

might use to support our case," Mayor McCrary explained during the regular city council meeting Monday night.

In other action, the council accepted the bid from Yellowhouse Machinery of Lubbock for the purchase of a back-hoe for \$29,500 plus \$270 for a seven month extended warranty.

A bid from West Texas Equipment was for \$35,469 and the bid from Case Power Equipment was rejected for failure to meet bid specifications.

The council also approved the low bid of \$10,741 from Modern Chevrolet of Lubbock for a pickup truck. McGinnis Chevrolet of Slaton presented the other bid at \$11,750.71.

Garza County Sheriff Freddy Cockrell presented a request to the council to share in the cost of purchasing two vehicles for the sheriff's department.

After a lengthy discussion, the council agreed to share in the cost provided that Vyas Motors of Post was provided an opportunity to deliver the vehicles promptly to meet the emergency situation.

Cockrell explained that the Commissioners' Court had awarded the bid for a police package vehicle to Vyas on December 12, and the local dealer promised delivery by January 26.

"But General Motors now says they will not even build the car until February 20, and delivery may

be as late as the first week of April," Cockrell explained.

The sheriff also pointed out that the department has three vehicles with more than 100,000 miles and only one is reliable enough to use for transferring prisoners to Huntsville.

"When we leave town for that trip, we put the citizens here at a real disadvantage, because we are stuck with worn out vehicles," the sheriff added.

On advice from the Commissioners' Court, Cockrell

## 'Increasing Your Sales' Seminar Friday, Feb 10

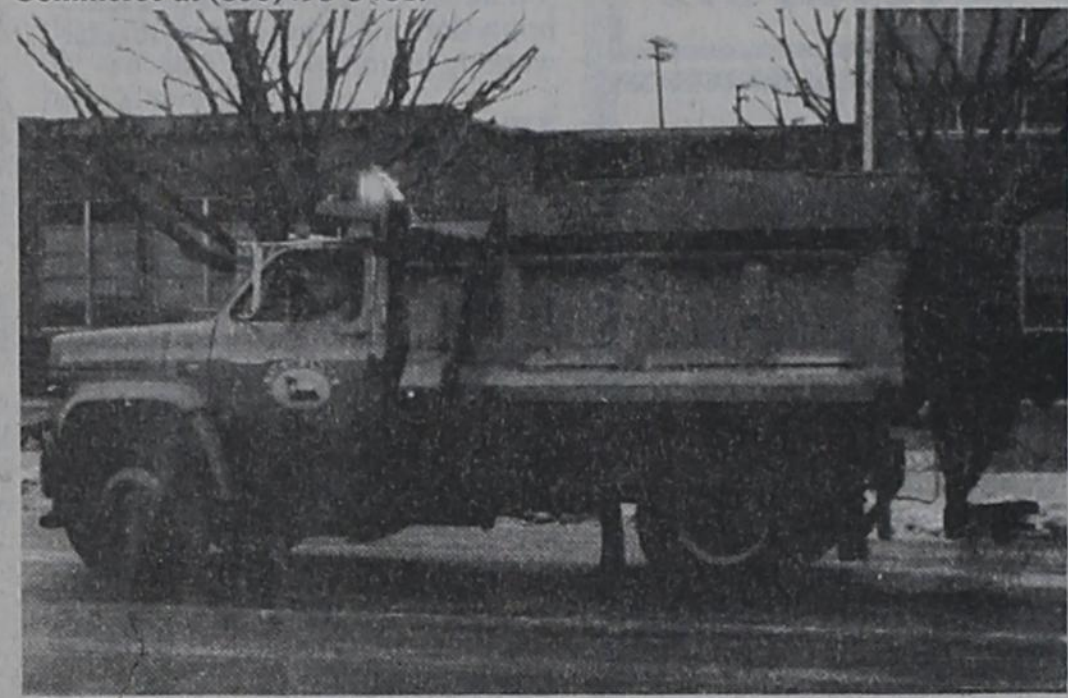

## Post Notes

Every once in a while I get my facts wrong...and when I do I like to set things straight.

In his letter to the editor in the January 25, 1989 issue of The Post Dispatch, Pat Walker referred to the annexation of the Postex plant in the late 1950s.

In my publisher's note following his letter, I said that as far as we could tell the Postex plant had been a part of the city from the beginning.

A little research proved that statement incorrect.

The March 19, 1959 issue of The Post Dispatch reported the annexation election of March 14, 1959 when the vote carried 63-26 in favor.

The annexation extended the city limits one-half mile in all directions, and included the Postex plant.

However, Walker's point in his letter was that Postex wanted to be included in the annexation in order to get cheaper water rates.

A September 4, 1958 editorial in The Post Dispatch specifically pointed out that Postex already enjoyed a long-term water contract below normal city water rates and annexation of the plant would not be particularly beneficial to the industry.

The real issue about the annexa-

said he had contacted the second lowest bidder on the police package vehicle, McGinnis Chevrolet, and had arranged for the purchase of two vehicles currently on their lot.

City council member Larry Waldrip pointed out that the vehicles on the lot were not police package units, and requested the sheriff to contact the local dealer to see if he could provide the same vehicles at a similar price.

McGinnis had offered the two vehicles for \$27,212.

The council also approved a two year contract with the First National Bank as the city's bank depository.

Terms of office for Mayor McCrary and council members Jan Crawford and Larry Mills are to expire.

The earliest filing day is February 20 and the latest day to file is March 22.

**The People Win One**

I was just about ready to sit down and blast the congressional leadership again on the ridiculous pay raise, when I heard that Rep. Jim Wright had knuckled under to the avalanche of criticism and would allow a vote on the issue Tuesday.

I am writing this Tuesday morning with the belief that surely common sense will prevail and our representatives will respect their constituents and repeal the 50 percent pay raise.

I really enjoyed watching the little bits of debate on PBS yesterday evening.

When one congressman called for adjournment, the chairman asked for a voice vote, the "ayes" sounded, then the "nays" roared.

The chairman declared the "ayes have it," whereupon a thunder of voices demanded a roll call vote.

The vote to adjourn was soundly defeated...and a few minutes later speaker Wright appeared and announced that a vote would be held Tuesday on the pay raise issue.

**Close 'Em Down**

Now, about this business of "bailing out" the bad savings and loans.

I like the idea my friend Charles Hardin suggested during a conversation we had last week...close down the bad ones, and pay the insured depositors as soon as enough money is available.

Why should the American taxpayer have to come up with \$90 billion?

That's right, \$90 billion, because no matter what those guys in Washington tell you it will cost, you can count on it ending up costing us taxpayers at least \$90

billion. The interest alone will run \$1 billion a year for 30 years.

That's a lot of money folks! The greed that caused this mess should not be rewarded by those of us who did not go for the quick buck schemes.

The real problem that President Bush and the government faces is the simple fact that the FSLIC, that institution which is supposed to guarantee savings and loans depositors, is insolvent.

The government guarantee to refund depositors' money is worthless, because the FSLIC is broke.

What irritates me is the blatant attempt by government officials to sweep this little fact under the rug.

Faith in the government itself is at stake...and the whole thing is about to unravel.

Those people who stuck their money in shakey savings and loan institutions, with promises of big interest payments on their deposits, were simply following the competitive urge to get more for less.

What they got was a promise of more with a lot of risk.

That's what risk is all about, the riskier your investment, the higher the return...also the stronger possibility of failure.

And that is exactly what has happened and continues to happen.

Now those who stand to lose their money want the government to bail them out.

This idea of the government guaranteeing success to everyone is just a lot of pie in the sky.

It can't be done. And we're on the path to proving that.

Now, faith in the government is about to be shaken to its foundation.

To restore the faith, congress must stand up, and say no to this

proposal to using taxpayer money to save these bad lenders.

Congress must insist that the FSLIC go to work and do what it was originally intended to do...monitor the savings and loan industry, insure that good management practices are being used, and protect depositors from fraud.

Don't come crawling around my doorstep and the doorstep of well-managed banks and other good savings and loan institutions begging for a hand out.

Depositors who put their money in risky institutions should be guaranteed that they will get the money back as promised...but not from general revenue sources.

The money should come from the FSLIC and only when the fund has enough money to pay...depositors in failed institutions would get their money back in bits and pieces, as the FSLIC accumulates the resources.

That way the honest and good institutions would not be lumped into the basket with bad ones...people will know which ones could be trusted.

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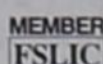

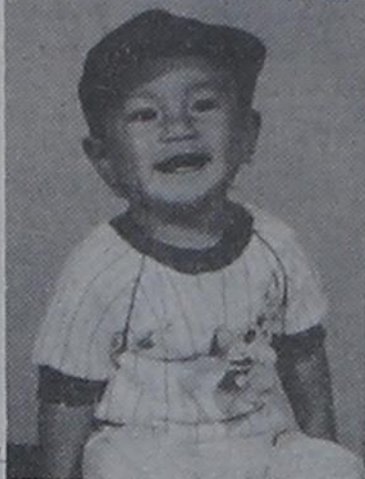

## 'Desperate Hours' Dramatic Success

Comedy gave way to drama at the Garza Theatre last week as the local acting company completed a well-attended four performance run of Joseph Haye's three-act thriller "The Desperate Hours" with a Sunday matinee.

"The Desperate Hours" is the story of three escaped convicts who take over an Indianapolis home and hold the family hostage while the criminals wait for the arrival of a friend with the money to finance their getaway. At the same time the convicts are holding the family hostage, the police are tracking down the escapees, clue by clue.

Using the theatre's side stages for the police action and the center stage for the drama unfolding in the Hilliard home, Director Will McCrary successfully blended the parallel story lines into a fast-paced production with a black-out on one stage leading immediately into a scene on another stage.

Outstanding performances by a large cast of theatre regulars and newcomers added to the excitement as the convicts "one-for-all" spirit disintegrated and was replaced with distrust and rebellion, while the family seemed to draw together, with each family member trying to protect the others.

The routine of the step-by-step police work as they track the convicts to the Hilliard home, and the uneasy atmosphere as the family faces death at the hands of criminals who are going "stir-crazy," even out of prison, leads to an exciting final scene filled with action.

Turning in excellent dramatic performances in the roles of the three escaped convicts were Rodney Marshall as Glenn Griffin; Tommy Loving of Brownfield as the younger brother, Hank Griffin; and Lino DeLeon as Robish.

This play marks Marshall's 11th appearance with the Garza Theatre and Loving's second appearance onstage. This production was DeLeon's introduction to the stage here.

Family member were played by Will McCrary as Dan Hilliard; Roxa Hutchins as Eleanor; Alison Crawford as Cindy; and Jeffrey Redman as Ralphie.

In her first appearance on the Garza stage, Roxa Hutchins of Southland is a welcome addition to the acting company with her performance as the distraught wife and mother.

Alison Crawford and Jeffrey Redman, both making third appearances on the local stage, are already seasoned performers and crowd pleasers. As the Hilliard children they were very good indeed, and added some light moments to the otherwise suspenseful play.

Appearing on the side stages, and turning in convincing performances as the policemen, were Ab Gutierrez, John McCullough, Charles Redman and Randall Laurence.

Redman and Gutierrez are both newcomers to the stage, although Gutierrez is an experienced backstage crew member. McCullough, who stepped in and took over his

role at the last minute with very little rehearsal, was making his second appearance and Laurence was appearing in his seventh role with the Garza.

Appearing in supporting roles were Jarett Dickson, Tonya Rudd and Pete Newby.

Stage manager for "The Desperate Hours" was Anne Leake, assisted by Mary Hutchins. Production manager was Mildred Stewart and technical assistant was Ab Gutierrez.
