Syd Conner Honored with Reception on Retirement

A retirement and appreciation reception honoring R. Syd Conner was held Sunday afternoon at the Post Community Center with approximately 175 guests registering from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Conner is retiring August 31 as Garza County Extension Agent-Agriculture after 33 years in the Extension service, 27 of those years in Garza County. He had worked in Dickens County before coming to Post in 1962.

The guests were registered by Mrs. Nona Lusk and were greeted by Conner and his wife, Lil; new Garza County Extension Agent-Home Economics, Katie Wolf; and Extension office secretary, Mrs. Diane Graves.

A special presentation at 3 p.m. was narrated by Tom Middleton, president of the Garza County Adult Leaders' Association. Middleton introduced several guests who made presentations of appreciation to Conner. They included: former County Judge Giles W. Dalby, who presented Conner with a Texas plaque from Garza County; Lubbock County Extension Agent Stanley Young, who thanked Conner with a picture from the South Plains Fair; District II Extension Director Bob Robinson and former District Director Bill Gunter also expressed their thanks to Conner.

Former Garza County 4-H members and 4-H scholarship winners Conner had worked with also made presentations.

Ron and Angela Graves presented Conner with a Wayne Baize print entitled "Winter Arrival," a picture of Hereford cattle, which he raises. The print was presented on behalf of friends and associates who had sent in monetary donations.

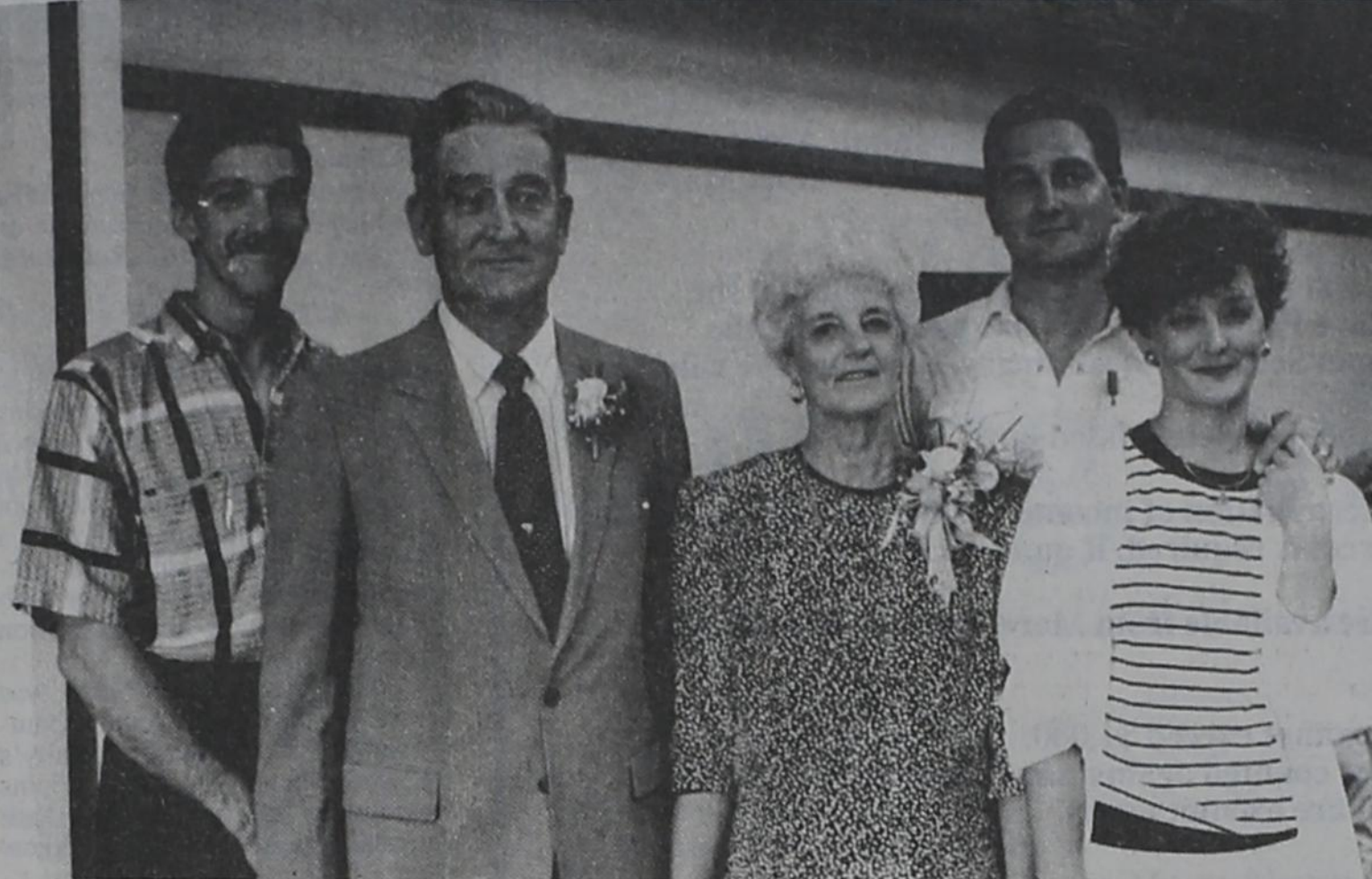

City Sales Tax Rebate Shows Slight Increase

The City of Post's sales tax rebate for August 1989 showed a slight increase of 1.37 percent over the comparable period in 1988. The recent check from the office of State Comptroller Bob Bullock to-

dated \$22,161.13, compared to 1988's total of \$21,862.07.

However, total payments to date, \$110,004.42, show a decrease of 7.23 percent over 1988's \$118,573.56.

Receipts Tax on Bingo Earns \$1,098.23

The two-percent local gross receipts tax on bingo earned the City of Post \$1,098.23 for the second quarter of 1989 and brought the total 1989 payments to date to \$3,305.

For the second quarter of 1988, the city received \$1,032.43.

The Comptroller's office collects the two-percent local bingo gross receipts tax and the two-percent state bingo gross receipts tax on the game. The local tax is returned quarterly to communities where local voters have legalized bingo and where local governments have levied the tax on bingo.

ASCS Advises on Failed Acreage, Aerial Slides

Victor Ashley, executive director of the Garza County ASCS office, advises farmers that program crop acreages that fail due to natural causes must be reported to the ASCS office prior to mechanical destruction of the area.

If the acreage has already been certified as planted, then only an application for failed acreage credit (ASCS-574) must be filed.

If you have an outstanding measurement service request and you need to fail some acres, be prepared to cancel the measurement service and certify the acreage as planted before you file the ASCS-574.

With the prospect of a 1989 disaster program, farmers should be careful that all paperwork has been taken care of with ASCS and insurance agents before plowing under any failed program crops.

Acreages carried to harvest must be farmed in a workmanlike manner so that no reduction in program benefits will apply.

Ashley also reminds area farmers that, as soon as the sky clears, the plane which takes aerial compliance slides will begin flying the first couple of mile strips on the west side of Garza County.

If you applied for aerial measurement service, now is the time to clean up turnrows and plow strips between similar crops, such as cotton and peas.

Garza Memorial Hospital will use rules and procedures found in the County Indigent Health Care Program Handbook published by the Texas Department of Human Services. In summary, these are the rules:

1. Application forms must be completely filled out.
2. Verification of income, termination of income, residence, household composition, and resources is required, if questionable.
3. Net income guidelines are available from Maritta Reed, Administrator.
4. Liquid resources assets cannot exceed \$1,000. The equity value of a car greater than \$1,500 is counted against the \$1,000 limit. Personal property and homestead are exempt assets.
5. Eligible persons must be a resident of Garza County.
6. Applicants must provide all requested information and documentation requested or applications will be denied.
7. Applicants have the right to appeal adverse decisions.

Post ISD Policy for Free and Reduced Price Meals

Post Independent School District today announced its policy for free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program and Child Nutrition Programs. Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For the school officials to determine eligibility, the household must provide the following information listed on the application: Names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income or the household's food stamp case number if they currently receive food stamps; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy Principals in each school will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to the child's principal for a hearing on the decision.

Households are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for reduced price meals or for free meals if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for school meal benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for them, the household should contact the school for more information. The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

By law, both parents, whether married, separated, or divorced, have access to the records of a student who is a minor or a dependent for tax purposes, as do students who are 18 years of age or older. A parent whose rights have been legally terminated will be denied access to the records if the school is given a copy of the court order terminating these rights.

The principal is custodian of all records for currently enrolled students at the assigned school. The Superintendent is the custodian of all records for students who have withdrawn or graduated. Records may be reviewed during regular school hours. The records custodian or designee will respond to reasonable requests for explanation and interpretation of the records. Superintendent and Principals may be reached as follows:

Parents of a minor or of a student who is a dependent for tax purposes, the student (if 18 or older), and school officials with legitimate educational interests are the only persons who have general access to a student's records. "School officials with legitimate educational interests" include any employees, agents, or Trustees of the District or cooperatives of which the District is a member or facilities with which the District contracts for the placement of handicapped students, as well as their attorneys and consultants, who are:

- Working with the student;
- Considering disciplinary or academic actions, the student's case, or a handicapped student's Individual Education Plan (IEP);
- Investigating or evaluating programs.

Certain other officials from various governmental agencies may have limited access to the records. The District forwards a student's records without prior consent on request to a school in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. Parental consent is required to release the records to anyone else. When the student reaches 18 years of age, only the student has the right to consent to release of records.

The parent's or student's right of access to, and copies of, student records does not extend to all records. Materials that are not considered educational records, such as teachers' person notes on a student that are shared only with a substitute teacher and records pertaining to former students after they are no longer students in the District, do not have to be made available to the parents or students.

Students over 18 and parents of minor students may inspect the student's records and request a correction if the records are inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of

the student's privacy or other rights. If the District refuses the request to amend the records, the requestor has the right to a hearing. If the records are not amended as a result of the hearing, the requestor has 30 school days to exercise the right to place a statement commenting on the information in the student's record. Although improperly recorded grades may be challenged, parents and students are not allowed to contest a student's grade in a course through this process. Parents or students have the right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education if they feel that the District is not in compliance with the law regarding student records.

Copies of student records are available at no cost. Parents may be denied copies of a student's records (1) after the student reaches age 18 and is no longer a dependent for tax purposes; (2) when the student is attending an institution of post-secondary education; or (3) if the parent fails to follow proper procedures and pay the copying charge. If the student qualifies for free or reduced-price lunches and the parents are unable to view the records during regular school hours, upon written request of the parent, one copy of the record will be provided at no charge.

Certain information about District students is considered directory information and will be released to anyone who follows procedures for requesting it, unless the parent objects to the release of any or all directory information about the child. This objection must be made in writing to the principal within ten school days after the issuance of this handbook. Directory information includes: a student's name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, awards received in school, and most recent previous school attended.

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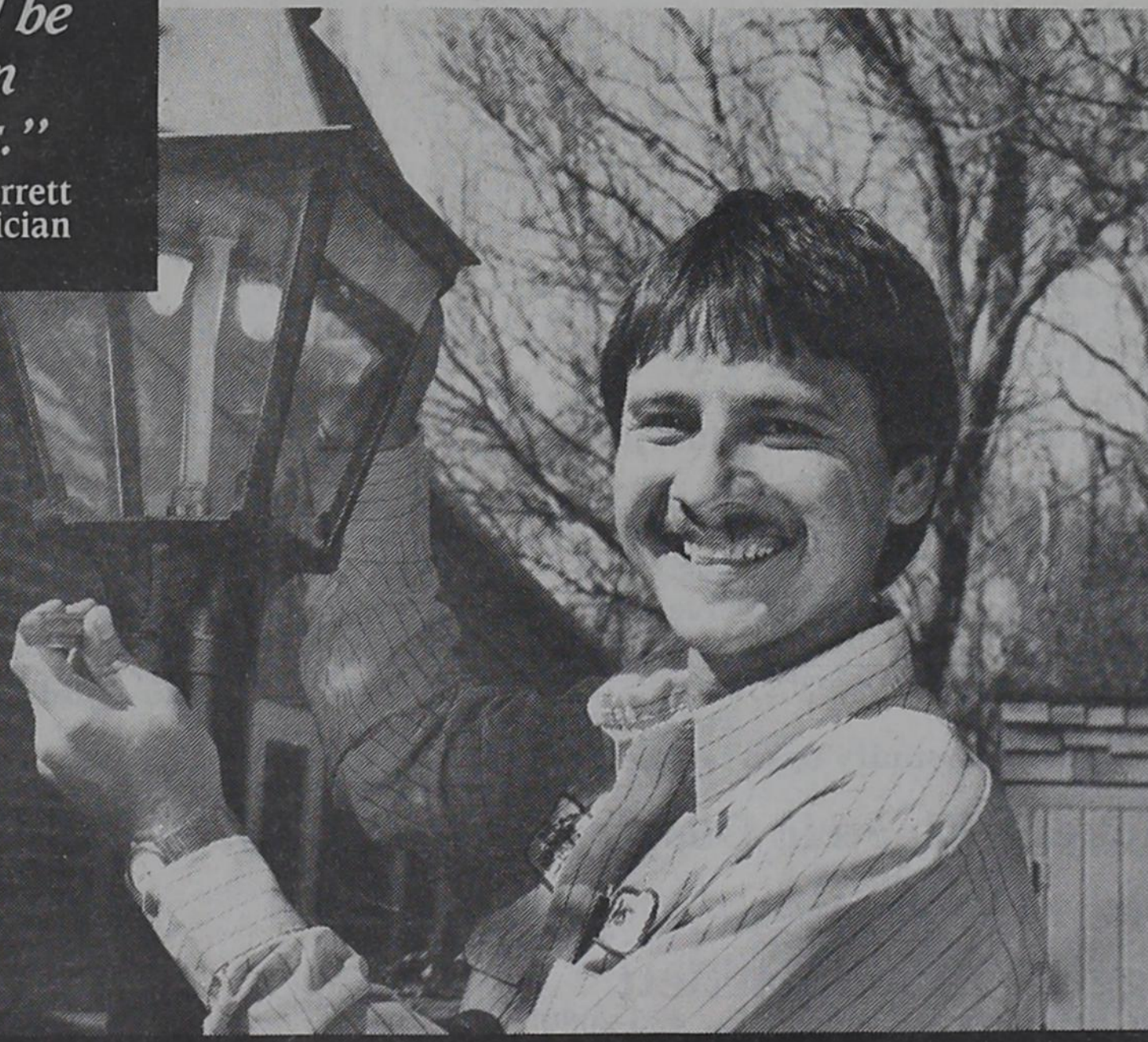
