Lackland, candidate for congresman-at.large, was billed to speak here Tuesday morning, but made no effort to speak as it seemed impossible to get a crowd to stop long enough to listen, so he circulated around among the voters. Col. Lackland said the people were taking little interest in the campaign, and that if he was the only candidate that was speaking to small crowds, or failing to get crowds he would feet badly, but said none of the other candidates were faring any better. The people are less interested in this campaign than any we ave known for forty years.

PLAIN FACTS ABOL CHARBON OR ANTHRAX.

Anthrax or Charbon is an acute in fectious disease that attacks both man and animals.
The infected territory is found along'the lower Mississippt Valley and the Gulf States.
In Texas the disease was recog. nized along the Gulf Counties, and because of the manner of handling stock has
interior.
interior.
The cause of the disease is a rod. shaped bacill which multiplies in the blood of the animal and is thrown the blood of the animal and the body.
off in the disharge of the After death, the bacilli may be found in any portion of the body. The spores or seed of the bacill:
are formed as soon as the baccillus leaves the body. The spore retains its life tor many years and can only be destroyed by burning. Disinfectants as commonly used do not effect it. Anthrax, as a rule, effects only grown stock and occurs in three form but all forms infect the pastures with the spores and scatter the disease.
The acute form shows few symptoms. The animal dies suddenly toms. The animal dies suddenly
and in many cases itcops dead, and in many cases urups dead,
ing no particular symptoms.
ing no particular symptoms.
The sub-acute form produces hig fever, nervousness, sometimes con vulsions, bloody discharges and lasts from one to three days. In the milk cow, the fluw of milk is stopped at once. There is no single symptom that may not appear in some other disease or condition.

Other disesses are sometimes mistaken for Anthrax such as Texas Fever, Black Leg, Maligant Eodenia, Forago or Pasture Poisoning and Hydrophobia.
Texas Fever is caused by a germ ransmitted by the tick. As in Anthrax, there is rapid pulse and breathing, high fever, with nervousess, loss of appelite and constipsion or diarrhoea. The bloodis pale and watery in Texas Bever, while in Anthrax, the blog is dark, frequenty a tarry black.
Blàck leg also is caused by a germ and affects usually young cattle. Rapid pulse and breathing with high fever are generally present. As the ame suggests, there is a swelling of the leg. This swelling, when pressed or pinched, gives a peculiar eel or sound due to the small pockets of gas and fluid formed under the skin. If the skın over the swelling
be cut, these pockets along with the be cut, these pockets along with the
blackened spots may he plainly seen. blackened spots may he plainly seen.
In Anthrax the swelling usually oc. In Anthrax the swelling usually occurs under the the chin, neck or
belly, does not contain these pockets of gas, does not give this peculiar feel or sound or pressure, and is filled with a thick yellow fluid.
Malignant Oedenia in the animal is imilar to blood poisoting in man, and is caused by a gerin infecting a wound. It produces a swelling and ever and other symptoms similar to Black Leg and Anthrax. The swelling may appear at any point on the
body and on any aged animal, but body and on any aged animal, but
does not spread from one to the other.
The prevention of these three diseases is a very easy matter, if prompt and scientific methods are used. To prevent Texas Fever rid y pastures of tick and do not buy tick infected cattle. Ticks may be erad icated by dipping or spraying with a standard solution at regular inter-
vals during the season. vals during the season.
To prevent Anthrax vaccinate all grown stock in the latter part of the Spring or summer. Separate all sick stock from the well. When the animal is dead, burn the carcass, scatter straw or leaves on the place burn it. The burbing of pastures, the killing of buzzards, and stray doge and wolves, will lessen the spread of Anthrax. If the double dose system of vaccination is used do not mix them or use the No. 2 irst, This vaccine matter will produce a mild form of the disease and should be bandled by a scientific
veterinarian only. The container veterinarian only. The container burnt after the vaccination is over. To prevent Blackleg vaccinate all under 2 years of age in the spring. Vaccination for Blackleg is a very simple matter to an experienced vaccinator, but should be handled with care by the inexperienced.
Catulemen who are raising fine stuff will reduce the sickness among their tock by burning all dead stock without regard as te the cause of death. By burning off their pastures reguary, by cleaning up their watering places, and by reporting any deaths from uaknown causes in their communities.
