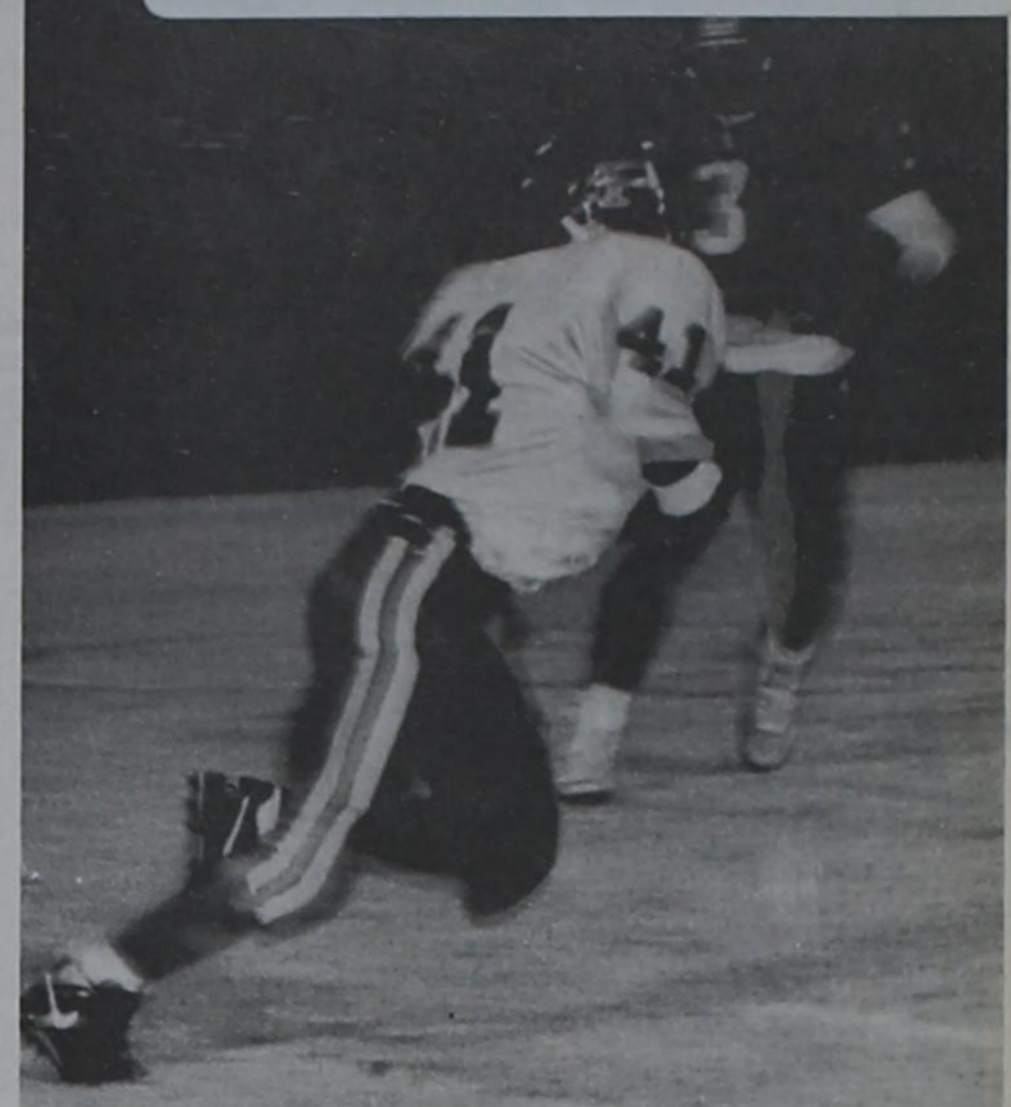


'Lopes Aim for Area Title

"We're trying to put last week behind us, and get ready for the biggest game of the year this Friday at Plainview," Post Antelope head coach Dewayne Osborne comments following the Bi-District Championship game at Seminole. "Canyon is big and they have really quality running backs," the coach adds, "it'll be a test of whether our players can overcome their size."
The Eagles advance to the Area Championship following a 17-14 upset of Floydada in the Bi-District contest. Canyon entered the playoffs as runner-up in District 1-AAA, behind Childress. (See season record at end of this story).
"They play great defense," Osborne continues, "they swarm to the ball and they've got a really top notch middle linebacker and two strong defensive ends."
Middle linebacker Jim Ed Farrow, a 200 pound senior, has good speed and reacts well to the ball. Defensive ends Daniel Robinson, a 195 pound junior and

170 pound senior Chuck Tucker seal off the outside.
The defensive line is manned by 185 pound senior tackle Walt Medlock, 170 pound senior tackle Tony DeLeon, 185 pound junior linebacker Scotty Powers, Farrow, Tucker and 170 pound senior linebacker Jeff Perez.
Secondary defenders are classed as speedy and move to the ball...they are 155 pound senior corner Jon Shepard, 165 pound senior Derek Pirtle, safeties 145 pound senior Phets Sovilay and 180 pound senior John Eller.
Medlock, Tucker, Powers, Perez, Pirtle, Sovilay and Eller play both sides of the line.
Eller leads the Eagle offense as quarterback, and brings his 180 pounds to bear when he frequently keeps the ball for good yardage.
The Eagles are primarily a running team, but can throw the ball when necessary.
The offensive line is big and gets off the ball in a hurry. Anchoring the line is 220 pound junior tackle Jason Huddleston, with 215 pound junior tackle Jason Tiley, guard DeLeon, center Tucker, guard Medlock and ends 150 pound Skipper Tate and 175 pound Danny Paulson.
The backfield features Pirtle at fullback, Powers at wingback and Perez at

GMH Rooms Getting New Look

With many health care facilities in trouble statewide, there is a revival of interest locally in the care and maintenance of Post's own health care unit, Garza Memorial Hospital.

As a result of this renewed interest, rooms at Garza Memorial Hospital are receiving some much-needed renovation, according to hospital administrator Maritta Reed, and with work being done on a "one room at a time" basis, three rooms are now complete, with work in progress on a fourth.

Rooms are being patched and painted, carpet replaced where necessary, and bathrooms are being repaired and refurbished. For some of the rooms, this is the first work that has been done since the hospital was opened in the 1950s.

The completed rooms have new furniture, including beds, bedside tables and overbed tables, thanks to the generosity of the Women's Division of the Chamber of Commerce and Garza Memorial Hospital employees who have furnished rooms. Furniture has also been supplied for the third and fourth rooms, and the hospital has a commitment locally to furnish three more rooms.

New chairs will be added to the rooms, but the hospital is waiting for more information on the type chairs to buy because of specifications which have to be met.

Any individual, club or organization interested in furnishing a room at GMH should contact Maritta Reed at 495-2828.

"We'll let you pick your own room to furnish and will even put a plaque on the door with your name on it," Reed said.

Slight Decrease in City Sales Tax Rebate Check

Although the November sales tax rebate for the City of Post from the State Comptroller's office totaled \$18,931.31, this amount is still a 4.60 percent decrease from November 1988's total of \$19,843.82. Post's total rebates to date for 1989 are \$151,054.94, a decrease of 5.75 percent from 1988's \$160,269.11.

Slaton was the only area city with an increase in its November rebate, receiving \$23,438.67. This represents a 2.24 percent increase over 1988's \$22,925.14. However, Slaton is also down 3.61 percent in 1989 payments to date, \$191,620.07 as compared to 1988 payments of \$198,794.35.

Other area cities and rebates:
- Tahoka received \$7,492.90, a

12.36 percent decrease from 1988's \$8,549.68. Payments to date for 1989 total \$59,593.06, a decrease of 1.87 percent from 1988's \$60,731.07.

- Spur received \$4,036.68, a 33.89 percent decrease from 1988's \$6,105.56. Payments to date for 1989 total \$15,807.12, a decrease of 67.19 percent from 1988's \$48,182.81.

- Crosbyton received \$5,277.62, a 20.15 percent decrease from 1988's \$6,609.18. Payments to date for 1989 total \$49,019.95, a decrease of 8.13 percent from 1988's \$53,357.90.

- Ralls received \$5,672, a decrease of 14.83 percent from 1988's \$6,659.59. Payments to date for 1989 total \$50,712.12, a decrease of 3.06 percent from 1988's

\$52,310.59.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that sales tax payments statewide - \$125 million - are up more than five percent from last November's payments and over nine percent higher than last year's total at this time. Checks to counties were up seven percent over last November's payments, Bullock said.

Southland's George Ellis is Named to Top TDA Position

George Ellis, a South Plains native and former director of the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) district office at Lubbock, has been named as the agency's new associate deputy commissioner for programs by Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower.

Ellis will oversee TDA's Marketing and Agricultural Development Division, Producers and Consumer Protection Division, Agricultural Resources Protection Division and TDA's 14 district offices statewide.

Ellis grew up in Garza County on a ranch near Southland, where his father's parents, G.D. and Ethel Ellis, settled after leaving Crosby County and homesteading a ranch in Mexico at the beginning of the century. His mother's parents, G.W. and Iva Basinger, established a farm implement dealership in Southland which, in 1929, sold more tractors and four-row equipment than any other dealer in Texas.

His parents, Sam and Ruby Ellis and his brother, Sam E., still run the ranch and the farm implement business, and George Ellis is an active partner in the family operation.

After graduating from Southland High School in 1956, Ellis attended McMurry College in Abilene and went on to study theology

at Drew University and literature at the University of Texas in Austin.

After teaching junior high school for two years, Ellis became congressional liaison for the U.S. Office of Economic Opportunity in the Johnson Administration, working under Sargent Shriver and Walter Richter.

Subsequently, Ellis became New Mexico state director of ACTION, working under national director John Lewis, now a member of Congress from Georgia.

In the early 1980s, Ellis was appointed executive director of the New Mexico State Agency on Aging by then-Governor Toney Anaya.

In 1986, Ellis returned to Southland and shortly thereafter signed on as director of TDA's 24-county district office at Lubbock. He moved to Austin last year where he served as chief of staff for Jim Hightower until his appointment to the deputy commissioner position.

Ellis and his wife, the former Barbara Alvarez, now make their home in Oak Hill, a few miles south of Austin. They have a daughter, Elyse, attending the University of Pennsylvania Law School in Philadelphia, and a son, Bret, studying agriculture economics at West Texas State University in Canyon.

10 Years Ago November 20, 1979

The Garza County Commissioners Court has abolished the position of dispatcher in Sheriff Jim Pippin's office and upgraded the employees from dispatchers to correctional officers at a substantial salary increase.

Another firm looking for uranium has spent about two months in Garza county shooting 800-foot test holes about 15 miles north of Post, but reported it "didn't find anything that indicates potential for further exploration."

Post will reap over \$100,000 in sales taxes for 1979 - the first year the return on the one percent sales tax has topped this mark.

Tailback Alonzo Luna set some kind of Post rushing record at Wolforth Friday night when he ran for 305 yards on 26 carries and scored three touchdowns as the Antelopes defeated Frenship 35-13.

Honored guests included the players, managers, coaches and their wives, and cheerleaders and their sponsors.

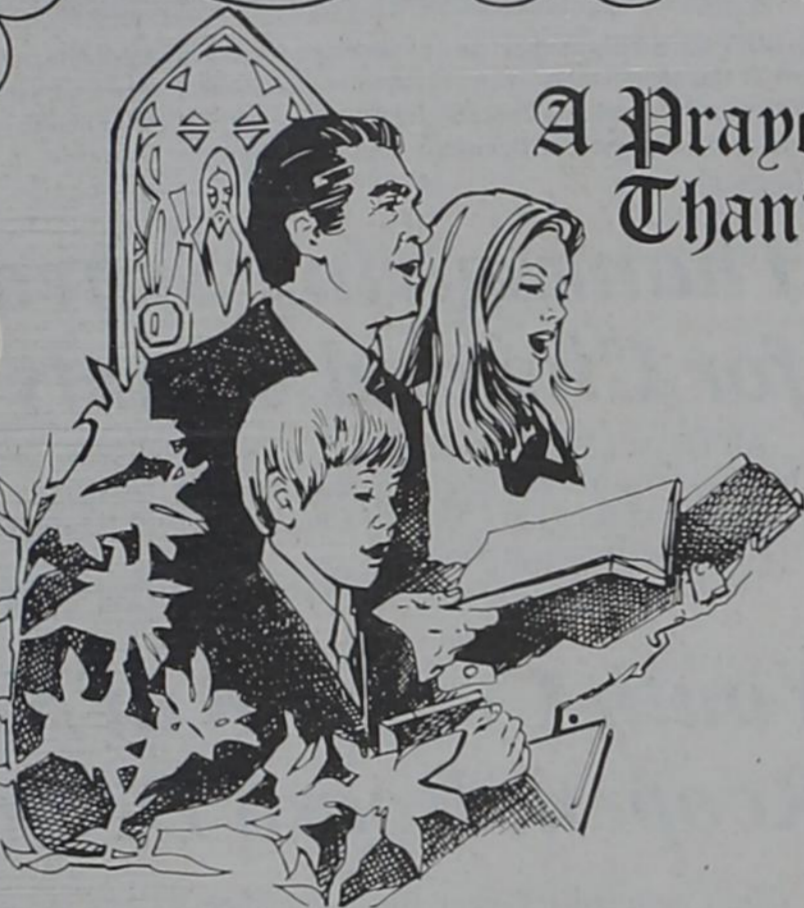
The Bold Gold theme was carried out in decorations by Pat Watson, Pixie Grisham and Syan Young.

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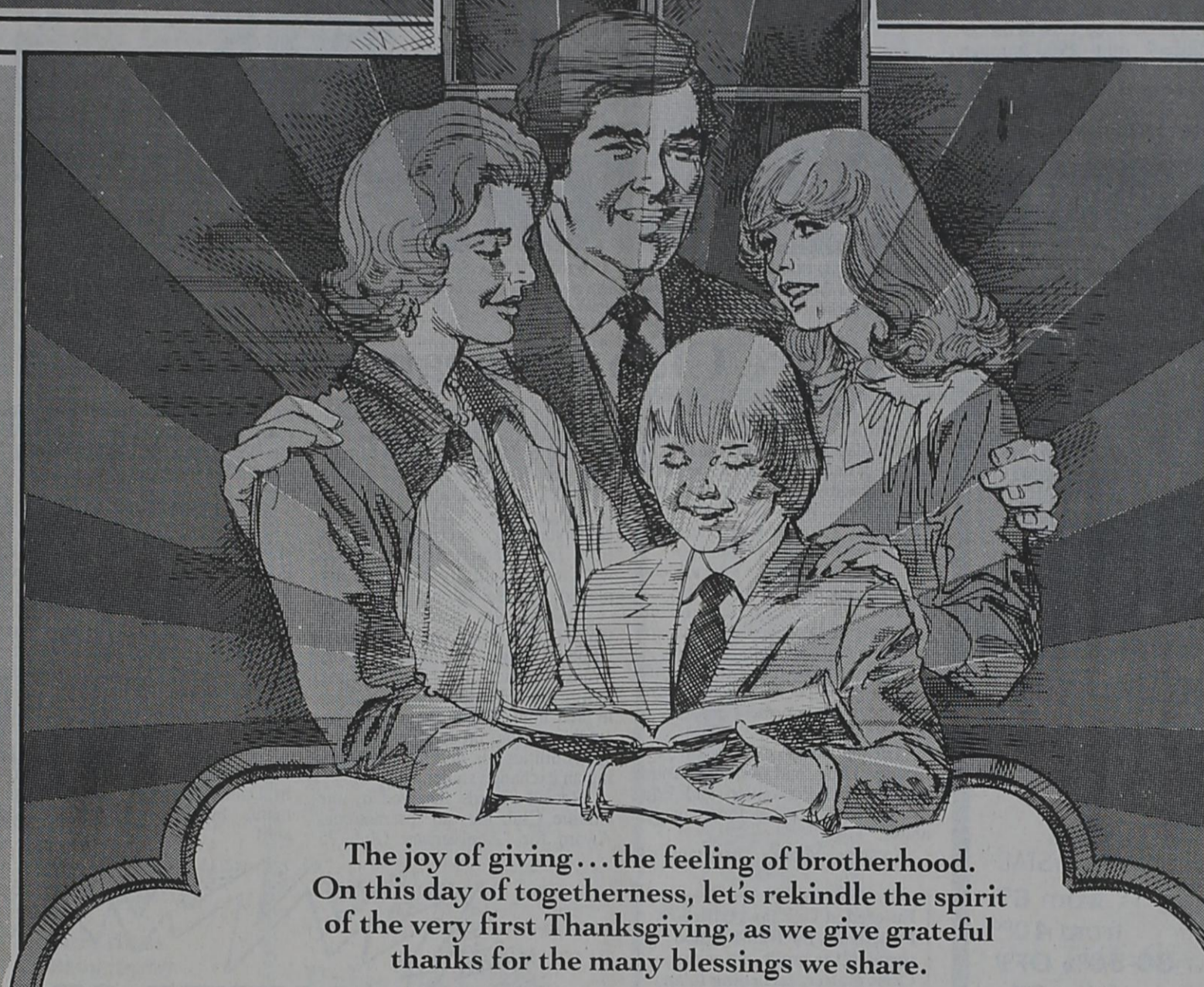

Gramm Urges Reform of Catastrophic Health Tax

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm has urged Congress to repeal or totally reform the Catastrophic Health Care surtax which will cost Texas senior citizens \$127 million next year and over \$2 billion by the end of the decade.

"Congress' extraordinary inability to admit its mistakes, coupled with its massive reluctance to correct them, occasionally leave the American people to suffer," Gramm said. "Such is the case with the catastrophic care law."

Under the law, the average, tax-paying citizen in Texas will owe

\$250 more when they file their income tax returns by April 15, a recent study by Gramm's legislative staff showed.

"By the year 2000, a full 50 percent of the projected 1.4 million taxpaying senior citizens in Texas will pay an average mandatory surtax of \$450 a year" to fund the government program, the study revealed. The total cost to Texas senior citizens from 1990 through 2000 will be \$2.4 billion.

"Congress owes seniors either outright, immediate repeal or top-to-bottom reform of this bad law," Gramm said.

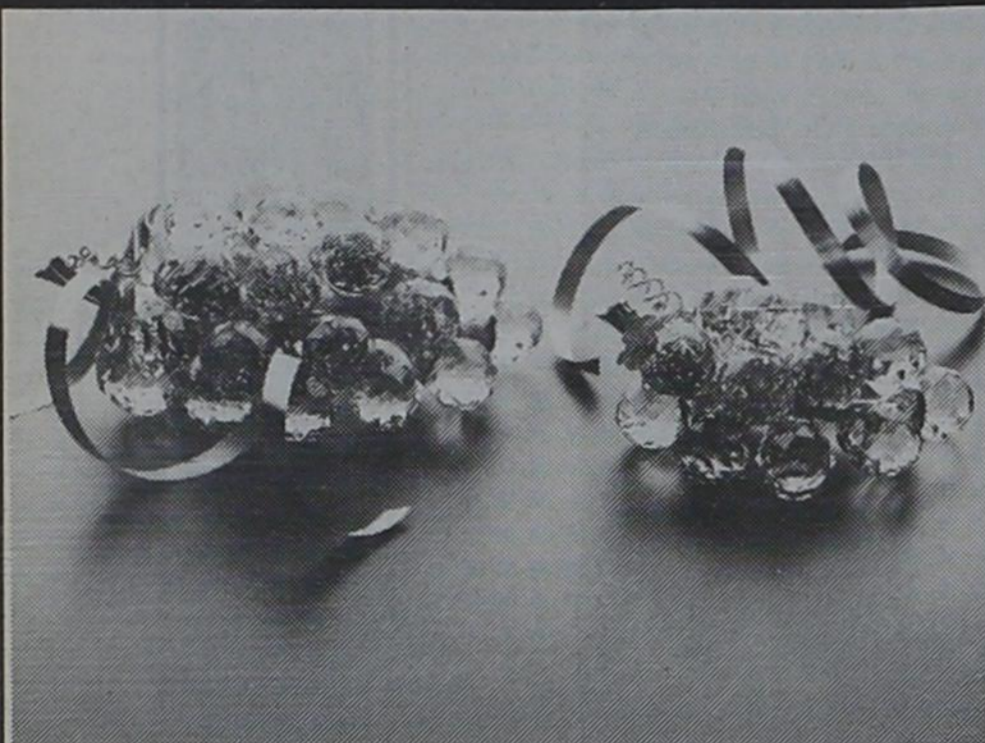

When not attending Pentagon briefings, the group saw the usual Washington attractions, and also visited Arlington Cemetery and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, where the Texas delegation left a

wreath.

Search for New Oil, Gas Encourages Industry

More than 320 drilling rigs have been punching holes across Texas recently searching for new oil and gas supplies, an encouraging sign for the state's beleaguered energy industry according to Railroad Commissioner Jim Nugent. Not since January 1988 have as many rigs been active in the Texas oilpatch, he said.

"After years of doom and gloom, we're finally hearing some news to smile about here and there," Nugent said.

Another barometer of oilpatch confidence is also on the rise, according to the Commission, 1,275 well drilling permits were issued in October, a 34 percent increase over the 839 permits issued in October 1988.

"The companies that are now seeking drilling permits will be looking for drilling rigs in the months ahead," Nugent said. "That should bolster the rig count and boost oil and gas employment. Studies indicate as many as 200 jobs are created for every drilling rig brought back into action."

Nugent said new rules for horizontal drilling issued by the Commission in the last two weeks may be igniting a mini-boom as companies scramble to line up prospects to test the effectiveness of the technique in fields across the state.

"We've issued over 150 permits for horizontal drain holes in 21 counties," Nugent said. "Some of the test results are startling. One recent test of a horizontally-drilled

well in the Austin Chalk formation in south Texas indicated a production rate of more than 3,200 barrels of oil a day. That's pretty remarkable when you consider the average oil well in Texas produces less than 10 barrels a day.

"We're not talking about a return to the oil boom days of the early 80's by any stretch of the imagination, but any trend that keeps the roughnecks and toolpushers busy and the cash registers ringing is welcome."
