Post City Council Votes to Continue Main Street Project

The City of Post's Main Street Project will continue and a new Main Street Manager will be hired, at least for another year, after the city council voted unanimously in its Monday, December 11 meeting to share the expense of the project by adding \$10,000 to the \$20,000 already committed to that purpose by funds from "the private sector."

The city's \$10,000, which will come from a Main Street contingency fund which was included in this year's budget, along with the \$20,000 privately funded will total the \$30,000, needed to cover all project expenses for the year - salary, office, telephone, postage, etc.

However, immediate approval of the project was not given by members of the council and the unanimous vote was taken only after a lengthy discussion of the continuing Main Street program, both for and against, by council members Irene Fry, Dan Lamb, Larry Waldrip, Jack Alexander and Larry Mills; Sammie Pollard; Patty Kirkpatrick; Giles Dalby; Joe Harris; Kathy Floyd; Bob Turner; and Mayor Giles C. McCrary.

Mayor McCrary, who was one of a group that met with Main Street architect Dick Ryan earlier in the day, said that after Main Street's successful past three years and the substantial investment being made privately in the project, it seemed poor judgment to discourage continuation of the program.

After the vote for funding approval, McCrary said that the city should be in a position within 30 days to review resumes.

City Manager Bob Turner will run notices in area newspapers, including The Post Dispatch, listing the qualifications for the position of Main Street Manager. He will screen the applications and recommend three to five persons to be interviewed by the council.

Harris, Floyd and Bryan Williams were present at the meeting as representatives of the Post Chamber of Commerce to request a "fair share" of the city's hotel and motel tax receipts to pay for brochures the chamber had printed to promote tourism.

County Tax Will Continue on Planes, Boats

Notice was given of a 9 a.m. public hearing to be held when the Garza County Commissioners' Court met Monday, December 11, but as no one was present to protest the levying of an ad valorem tax on certain personal property, Garza County, as provided by Sec. 11.14 of the Texas Tax Code, will continue to levy and collect ad valorem taxes on personal property not held for the production of income. This includes such items as airplanes, recreational vehicles, boats, travel trailers, etc.

An ordinance outlining the rules and regulations pertaining to sewage facilities, both new and existing, for Garza County was unanimously approved by the commissioners.

A copy of the ordinance will be forwarded to the Texas Department of Health for that office's approval, after which the ordinance will be administered in Garza County by Constable Lonnie Gene Peel.

In other business the commissioners' court and the county clerk of Garza County entered into an agreement with the Garza County Sheriff's Department that gives the county clerk's office the authority to collect court costs, fines, restitution, attorney fees, transportation costs and other fees ordered by the court for the county clerk on behalf of the sheriff's department. The county clerk will issue a check monthly for the monies collected to the county treasurer's office.

The court entered into a similar agreement with the adult probation department that gives the 106th Judicial District Adult Probation Department the authority to collect court costs, fines, restitution, attorney fees, transportation costs and any other fees ordered by the court for the district and county clerk on behalf of the county. The probation department will issue a check monthly for the monies collected to the district and county clerk's office.

Present at Monday's meeting were County Judge E.A. Howard, Jr.; Commissioners Herbert Walls, John Valdez, Ted Aten and Sammy Ellis; Voda Beth Gradine; Dee Justice; and Sonny Gossett.

No decision was made on allocation of the hotel-motel tax, but it was the suggestion of Mayor McCrary, with the approval of the council, that a committee composed of two members of the council, two members of the chamber and one at-large member should meet to formulate a long-range plan and review ongoing relations between the city and the chamber.

Also pointed out by the mayor was the fact that this committee could look into the suggested possibility of the Chamber eventually taking over the duties of the Main Street office.

With the continuing demand for tickets exceeding seating capacity, the Garza Theatre board of director president Jack Alexander has announced that the 1990 theatre schedule will include two additional performances of each production, giving patrons six opportunities...Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday of the opening week and Friday and Saturday of the following weekend.

The 1990 season schedule begins February 1 with "The Cradle Song" and includes "Barefoot In The Park" in March, April's "The Happy Time," June's "The Matchmaker," a July "Harley Sadler Salute," Shakespeare Festival's "Romeo and Juliet," August's "Oh Dad, Poor Dad...," and repeated by popular demand in October will be "The Silver Whistle," the first production offered by the local theatre organization in April 1986. The 1990 season will conclude with December's "Lion In Winter."

January 20, 1990 the Garza Theatre will celebrate the annual "Willy Awards" with special presentations to actors and theatre patrons, with the traditional banquet, entertainment and dance.

The Garza County political arena is beginning to fill up as three more candidates, all Democrats, have filed with their party headquarters to join the six candidates who filed last week.

Announcing their candidacy this week are: County Clerk Sonny Gossett who will seek another four-year term in that office; Jerry Windham, candidate for the office of County Commissioner, Precinct 2; and A.J. McAlister, also a candidate for the office of County Commissioner, Precinct 2.

Previous filers as Democratic candidates include: Incumbent E.A. Howard, Jr., for County Judge; Shelia Melton, incumbent, for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1; Dee Justice, incumbent, for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 4; Voda Beth Gradine, incumbent, for County Treasurer; Herbert Walls, incumbent, County Commissioner, Precinct 4; and Bill Aten, candidate for the office of County Commissioner, Precinct 2.

No Republican candidates had filed as of Tuesday, December 12.

Candidates may file with either the Democratic party chairman, Johnny or Billie Cross at 495-2848 or the Republican party chairman, Giles McCrary at 495-2051. Prior to filing with a party chairman, candidates should file a campaign treasurer designation in the county clerk's office.

January 2, 1990 is the filing deadline for the March 13, 1990 primary elections.

were present at Monday's meeting to discuss water bills of \$166.50 and \$156.50 received by their Chadco business, instead of their usual monthly bills of around \$30.

In other business conducted the council:

Agreed to exercise its local op-

tion on the Freeport exemption which was passed in the recent constitutional amendment election. At the present time the City of Post would not lose any taxes because of this exemption, but exercising this option could prevent in losses in the future;

Approved the request of Arnold Fry, on the recommendation of the park board, for a radio controlled cart track at David Nichols Park;

Approved the annual contract between the city and the firm of Parkhill, Smith & Cooper;

Approved Monday and Tuesday, December 25 and 26 as the city's Christmas holiday.

Post-Montgomery estate has made possible the hiring of an assistant, which provides full time support on preparing for productions and caring for the theatre. Among the highlights of the past year has been the exposure the Garza Theatre has received throughout West Texas with more than 1,000 people seeing the 1989 touring productions of "I'm Herbert" with Zoe Kirkpatrick and McCrary; "Vanities", Act I with Mandy Swafford, Michelle Smith and Kim Gindorf and "A Little Something For The Ducks" with Linda Ellis and McCrary.

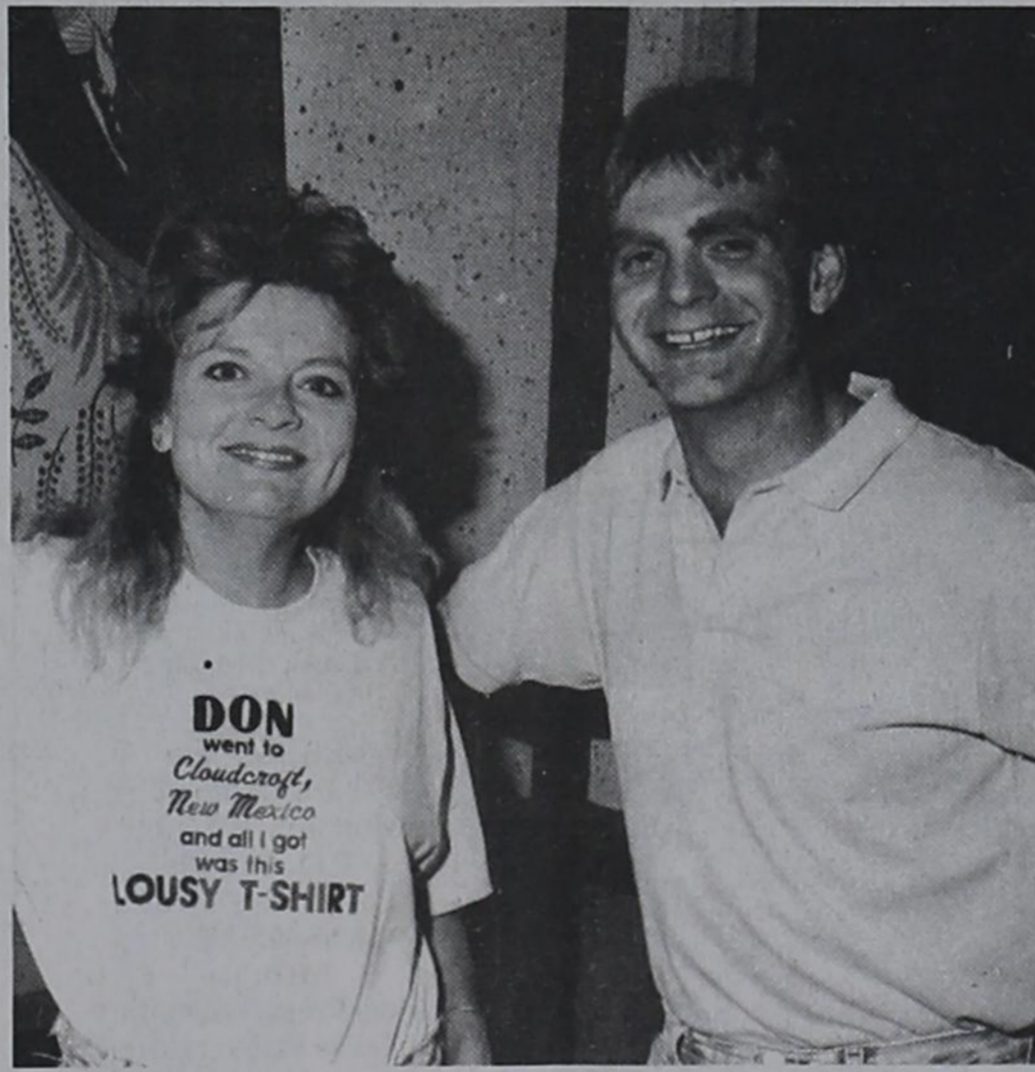

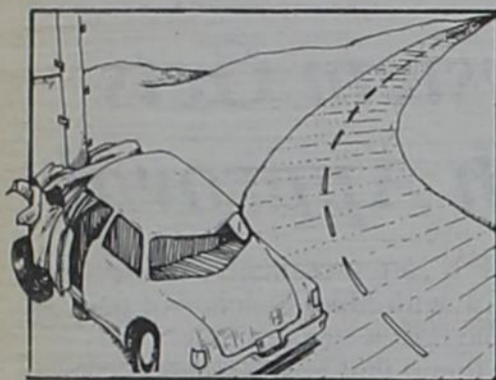
Burial was in Terrace Cemetery under the direction of Hudman Funeral Home.

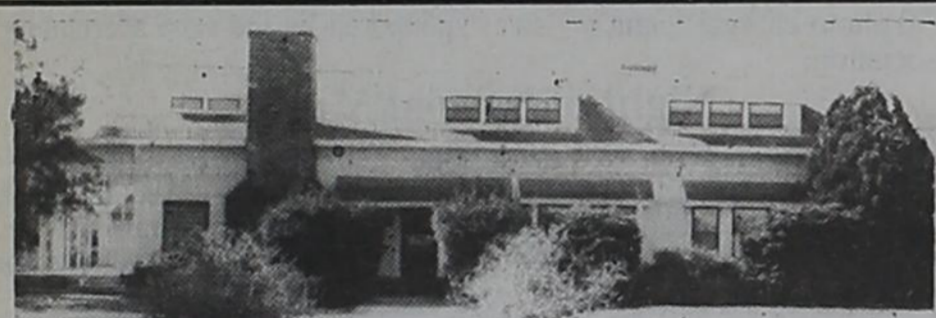

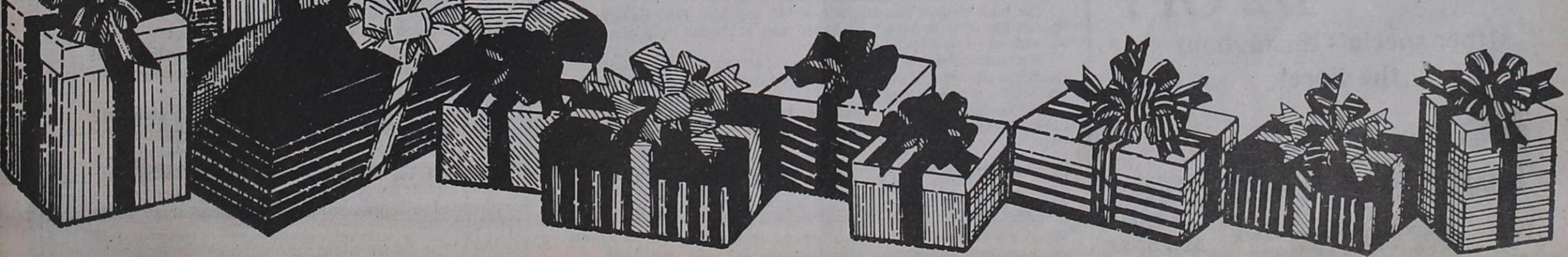

She also serves as secretary-treasurer of the 4-H Adult Leaders' Association and is a past president and current secretary of the Sandy Landers Country Treasurers' Association.

"I enjoy the work I do as county treasurer," Voda Beth said, "and I enjoy coming to the courthouse every day."

Recent FERC Decision is Favorable to SPS

A recent order from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) supports a court decision upholding Southwestern Public Service Company's (SPS) treatment of investment tax credits for its wholesale customers, including rural electric cooperatives.

"This order finally brings to a conclusion a case filed back in 1980 by SPS to adjust rates charged to some of its wholesale customers," said Gary Gibson, SPS vice president of marketing. "This decision will not change rates currently being billed. It acknowledges SPS's past proper treatment of these tax credits and will be reflected in two pending wholesale cases before the FERC."

Initially involved were those wholesale customers whose rates were directly affected. In 1982, SPS's rural electric cooperative customers intervened. Later during the case, Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, which now represents 11 of 16 cooperatives served by

SPS, continued to challenge SPS's treatment of these tax credits, prompting a long-running legal battle and regulatory process.

In March 1988, the U.S. 10th Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver, Colorado, upheld the company's treatment of the tax credits prior to 1983 and sent the case back to FERC for resolution.

Investment tax credits were created by Congress in 1971 to encourage creation of jobs and expansion by American industry and continued until the Tax Reform Act of 1986. The credits allowed companies like SPS to reduce their federal income tax payments by a percentage of their investment in new plants and equipment.

In 1983, the FERC changed the way in which SPS could record the credits to its earnings. It also ordered the company to retroactively restate its financial results as if the FERC-preferred method had been in place since 1972. The appeals

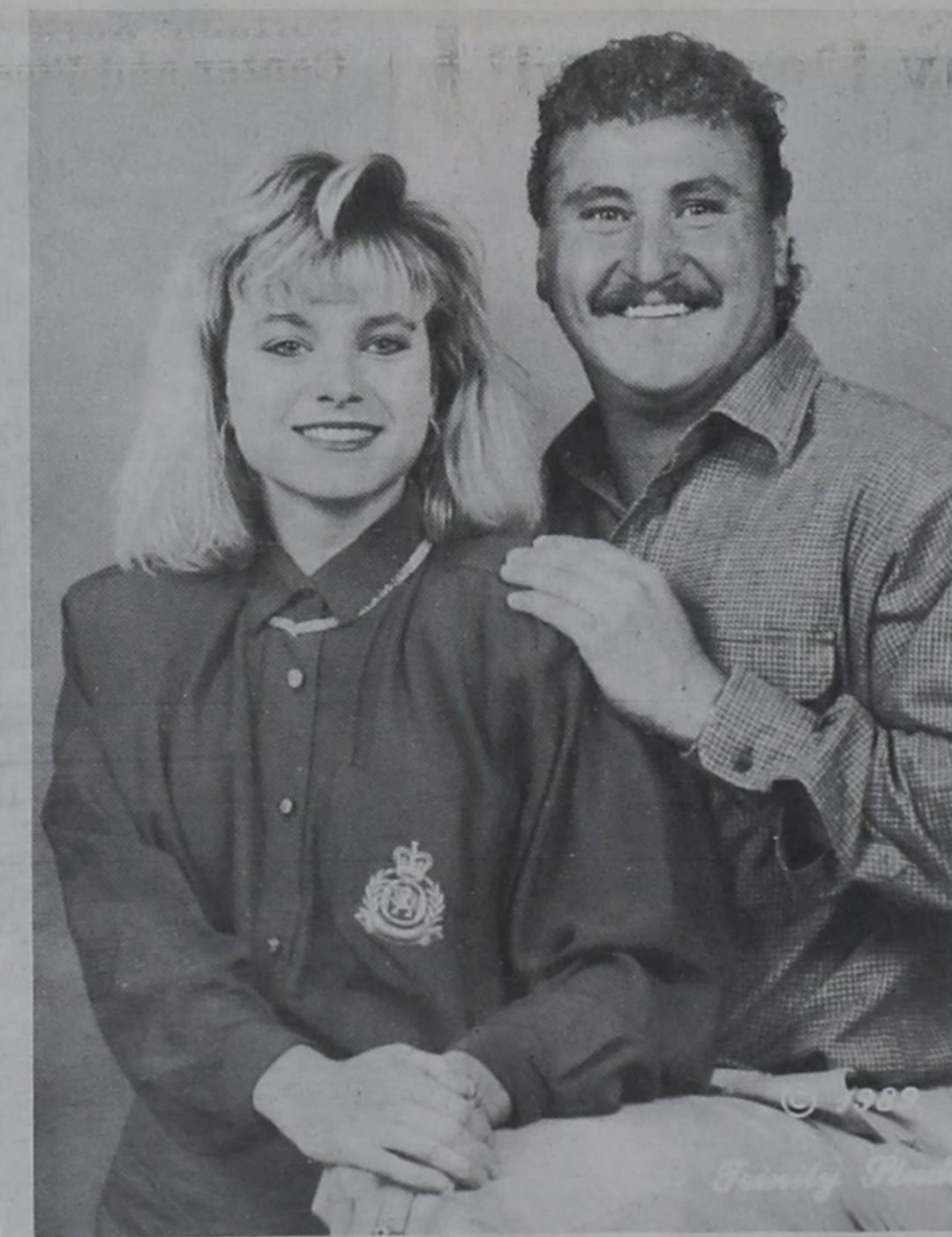

New TAC Regulations for Pesticides Coming Up

Almost all cotton producers will be affected by significant changes in the Texas Agricultural Code coming up for adoption in the new year. The new rules and regulations for pesticide application include new recertification requirements for private applicators, the category which covers over 160,000 Texas farmers.

"We would encourage all producers to familiarize themselves with how these changes will affect them," commented Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Federal law requires the Environmental Protection Agency to classify each use of a pesticide as either restricted or general. The state may impose further restrictions classifying a pesticide as state-limited-use.

Anyone can purchase or apply a general-use pesticide. A certified applicator license is required for a person to purchase or apply a restricted-use or a state-limited-use pesticide. Examples of pesticides commonly used by producers that require the user to be licensed are Timek, Counter, Thimet, 2,4-D, arsenic acid, Paraquat to name but a few.

The old Texas pesticide laws allowed private applicators to be certified for life with no continuing

education requirements. However, the 1989 Legislature made several changes in the private applicator laws.

Proposed amendments to chapter 7 of the T.A.C. published in the Texas Register provides that private applicators, as well as commercial and noncommercial applicators, must meet certain recertification requirements including continuing education.

Initial tests for issuance of a private applicator's license include general pesticide application, laws and regulations, and license-use categories. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service runs a private applicator training program to help in preparing for these tests.

To recertify, a private applicator must obtain 20 continuing education credits including at least two credits in laws and regulations and one credit in integrated pest management. A minimum of four credits must be obtained in the last full calendar year of the recertification period.

How this applies to individual producers already holding certificates depends on whether that certificate was issued before or after January 10, 1989. In any event, anyone wishing to continue to use restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides will need to comply with the new rules and be prepared for a

In the Neighborhood

The expansive, dramatic canyons of the Texas Plains, including the Double Mountain Fork Canyon south of Post, may no longer be a regional secret after the recent release of "Canyon Visions," a collection of pastels and color photographs by photographer and historian Dan Flores of Lubbock and landscape artist Amy Gormley Winton of Amarillo.

The two have combined their talents to illustrate both the ruggedness and the romance of our area's unique geography and have added an accompanying text which defines the history of the landforms and the Plains region.

Flores, an assistant professor of history at Texas Tech, who homesteads on a 12-acre plot in Yellow House Canyon, feels that society has been cheated by not having access to local canyons. "I want more people to become aware of these beautiful landscapes and take pride in their conservation," he said.

"Lonesome Dove" author Larry McMurtry echoes the sentiment in the foreword of this coffee table book.

"People who have lived in West Texas all their lives...have no inkling that canyon visions possessing both delicacy and majesty are there to be seen and wondered at, often only a few miles from their long-familiar routes," McMurtry states. "This book may make many people canyon lookers."

In addition to Post's Double Mountain Fork Canyon, other points of interest include Yellow House Canyon southwest of Lubbock, Los Lingos Canyon south of Silverton, Blanco Canyon north of Lubbock, Ceta Canyon south of Amarillo and Palo Duro Canyon.

FmHA Emergency Loan Applications Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by rangefires which occurred between March 1, 1989 and September 30, 1989 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Tahoka, FmHA County Supervisor Curtis Barlow has announced.

Garza County is one of ten in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the rangefires.

Barlow said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent. "As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Barlow said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until July 17, 1990, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Barlow said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Tahoka is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Texas' 'Rainy Day Fund' Receives First Deposit

The Texas State Comptroller's office announced recently that \$18.5 million of state tax money has been transferred into the state's rainy day fund, the first deposit ever made to the emergency fund.

Formally named the Economic Stabilization Fund, the rainy day fund was created by a constitutional amendment approved by voters in 1988 to set aside a surplus for emergencies.

"This is another sign of our state's continuing economic expansion," Comptroller Bob Bullock said. "Growth in natural gas tax collections over the past two years has made it possible to put some money away in the state's savings account."

Gas production taxes during the state's 1989 fiscal year, which ended August 31, were \$24.7 million higher than 1987 collections. The law requires that three-fourths of that increase be deposited in the rainy day fund.

The fund was designed to set aside part of the oil and tax revenues that exceed the 1987 collections for those taxes as well as half of any surplus General Revenue Funds at the end of the state's two-year budget cycle.

Oil tax revenue declined from \$532 million in 1987 to \$500 million in 1989 and there was no General Revenue Fund surplus at the end of the fiscal year 1989. Natural gas collections rose from \$599.8 million in 1987 to \$625.5 million in 1989 providing the only money for

Texas Beef Industry Council Adopts New Plan

"Texas has had a tremendous record of compliance with the beef checkoff program since it began," he added. "The checkoff works when everybody pays, but the whole industry suffers because of those who do not comply. In 1989, of the 142,000-plus head and 1,400-plus collection sites in Texas, seven-tenths of one percent, or a little less than 1,000, have received certified letters concerning potential non-compliance. These random audits will hopefully convince those few non-compliance producers that the industry is serious about its program."

While TBIC has always had the authority to audit records, it has previously used this authority only when necessary. One of the first audits revealed that a significant portion of the checkoff funds had not been remitted by one company. The random audits authorized by the executive committee are designed to deter such violations. "Non-compliance breeds non-compliance," executive committee member Clark Willingham, representing the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, said. "It's a chain reaction because if one person doesn't pay and gets away with it, he tells his neighbor who decides to try to circumvent the law. This new collection and compliance procedure is an attempt to keep that from happening."

The audits conducted in 1990 will be for a minimum of two auction markets, two feedyards, two packers and four dealer-order buyers. These random audits will be in addition to those conducted where non-compliance of a particular site is evident. If audited, the collection site will be required to make all cattle transaction records available to the audit team.

"This audit system that we've adopted came about only after examining all components of the program," TBIC President Roy Wheeler of the Independent Cattlemen's Association said. "We felt this was the most accurate way of assuring our fellow beef producers

that we are doing all we can to guarantee everyone who stands to profit from beef contributes his or her fair share."

Ten Texas beef collection points will be audited in 1990 to monitor compliance with the beef checkoff program, the Texas Beef Industry Council (TBIC) has announced. The sites, chosen at random, will represent all segments of the beef industry.

The new procedure, recently approved by the TBIC executive committee, is in accordance with national Beef Board guidelines. The random audits will be conducted annually.

"The executive committee spent hours deliberating this action, S.M. True, an executive committee member who represents the Texas Farm Bureau on the board, said. "It was a difficult decision because this industry has operated on a basis of trust since its very beginnings. But beef producers also need assurances that everyone complies with the checkoff program."

The Beef Promotion and Research Act of 1985 that created the beef checkoff program charged state beef councils with the responsibility of assuring a reliable, accurate and efficient system of collecting payments made by producers to the checkoff program.

"For some types of collection points, the auditing procedure is the only means of achieving this," Calvin Buchanan, an executive committee member representing the Texas dairy industry, said.

court said the retroactive portion of the FERC's order was improper. On November 22, 1989, the FERC issued its final order, in compliance with the court's ruling, SPS last week completed its analysis of the FERC's order.

The FERC's decision preserves the rate-making treatment used by SPS prior to 1983. The decision also established the guidelines for future rate-making practices.

"Both SPS and the wholesale customers it serves have been involved in this legal entanglement for the past few years," Gibson said. "With this final decision by FERC, we hope to put this matter behind us and continue our efforts to provide competitive electric service to the cooperatives and other wholesale customers as we have for many years."

The community and county convention to select a member to the county committee from C-Community and to elect the 1990 county committee officers will be held at the ASCS office on Thursday, December 21.

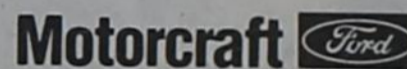

A CHRISTMAS SAFETY CHECK

- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree.

- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines.

Dormitories are located on the capitol grounds. Pages are supervised while in their quarters, which are guarded by the Capitol Police, 24-hours-a-day.

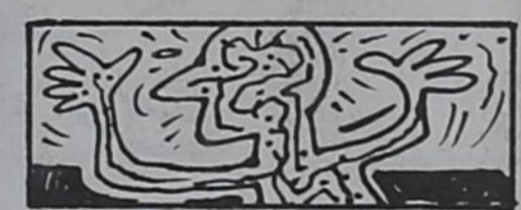

Post Office Tips for Your Holiday Parcels

Aerobics instructors regularly remind their students to keep their tummies "tight" and "tucked." The same advice applies to preparing holiday parcels for mailing, says Post Postmaster Johnny Kemp.

"All that's necessary is choosing sturdy cartons or boxes, and sealing them smoothly and tightly with the proper tape," Kemp says, adding that padded mailing bags work well for small items.

"Don't wrap cartons in bulky brown paper or tie them with string or twine," Kemp continues. "The paper can tear and the twine can get tangled in our mail processing equipment.

"Also, using paper and string isn't necessary if you're using proper boxes or cartons. If you feel a need to wrap and tie a box, that may be a signal that you don't think the box is sturdy enough to begin with. Get another one instead."

Parcels should be sealed with a type of tape designed for sealing packages; pressure sensitive, nylon-reinforced kraft paper or glass-fiber-reinforced pressure sensitive. Kemp advises against using cellophane or masking tapes, because they're not strong enough.

"Correct addressing is as important for parcels as for letters," Kemp says. "If the box has been used before, be sure to remove all old labels and addresses."

"The top of the package should show the name of the person to whom you're sending it, their house number and street, and the apartment number, if there is one. The last address line should contain the city, state and ZIP Code - please be sure to use the ZIP Code."

Your own return address and ZIP Code should be in the upper left corner. And use smudge-proof ink, Kemp adds.

Preparing the inside of the package or box is as important as preparing the outside. The contents should be cushioned carefully with crumpled paper, with foam shell or air-pocket padding that is commercially available. Don't leave any empty space in the box.

"Before you seal the package, it's also a good idea to enclose a slip of paper showing the name and address of the person to whom you're sending it," Kemp says. "Although it doesn't happen very often, parcels can get damaged so the outside address can't be read."

Finally, if a package contains irreplaceable valuables, send it by Registered Mail.

Pesticide Applicators Workshop December 19

Licensed commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators, who must receive training before December 31 for license renewal, can obtain that training at a workshop being conducted in Lubbock December 19 by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

There is no registration fee for the workshop which will be held from 8 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, on FM 1294, just east of I-27 at the Shallowater exit.

The workshop has been accredited by the Texas Department of Agriculture for five continuing education units (CEUs) which are required for renewal of commercial and noncommercial applicator licenses.

Participants may attend all or part of the workshop, depending upon their CEU needs, said Dr. W. Pat Morrison, Extension Service entomologist. Those requiring few CEUs can attend either the morning session, for three CEUs, or the afternoon session for two CEUs.

Speakers will include Bill Rogers, TDA; Charlie Rogers, Texas Water Commission; Dr. Wayne Keeling, Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations; and Extension Service specialists Dr. Jack Price, agricultural chemist; Dr. James Leser, entomologist; Morrison; and Dr. Harold Kaufman, plant pathologist.

tions will be given beginning at 8 a.m. each Tuesday and Thursday at the Lubbock office. Tests will take all day to complete.

Approximately 140 men and women will be selected to begin training in the exciting career of law enforcement. Beginning monthly salary is \$1,622 while attending the 22 week academy, \$1,865 a month upon graduation and \$2,362.50 a month after com-

pletion of twelve months' probation.

Applicants must be 20 to 35 years old, of good moral character, in excellent physical condition and a U.S. citizen. Sixty semester hours of college or equivalent military or police experience are required.

Graduates of the DPS Academy will be assigned either to the Highway Patrol or Drivers License Service. After two years of service,

DPS troopers are afforded the opportunity to advance in the Criminal Law Enforcement division, which includes Narcotics Service, Criminal Intelligence Service and Motor Vehicle Theft Service. After four years of service, they can compete for the position of Sergeant in the Traffic Law Enforcement division.
