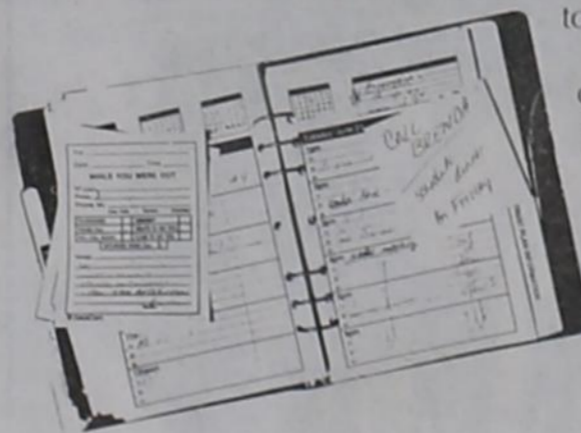
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Area students honored at colleges

"These students will all be back next year and they have great opportunities to reach state again," the band director added.



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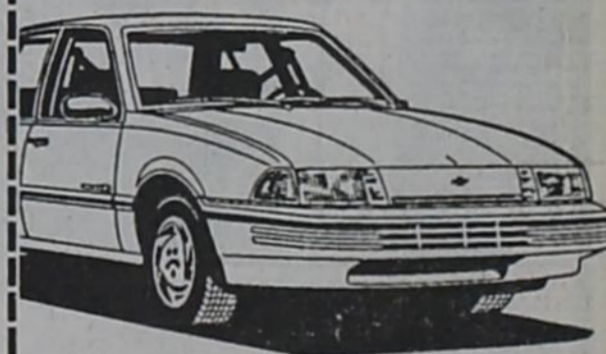

Funding is provided through a grant to Garza County, announced earlier by Judge Giles Dalby. "We are only one of approximately 100 counties in Texas to get this grant," Dalby emphasized.

Participating youth are also encouraged to take advantage of the free breakfast and lunch, offered at the Post ISD lunchroom from 8 to 9 a.m. and noon to 1 p.m.

The Summer Food Service program served breakfast to 20 youth per day and lunch to approximately 100 per day during the first week of operation June 1-5.

The program is designed to serve 150 youth and may be expanded to serve more if needed. There is no sign-up for the meal program, youth are encouraged to "come and eat." No adults are allowed to use the service.

Both summer programs are provided through the cooperation of Garza County, Post ISD and Texas Agricultural Extension Service with the Texas Department of Human Services and U.S. Department of Agriculture funding the summer food service program.

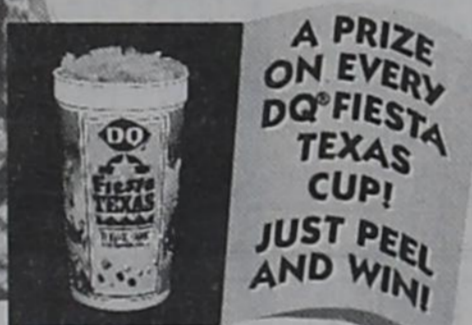

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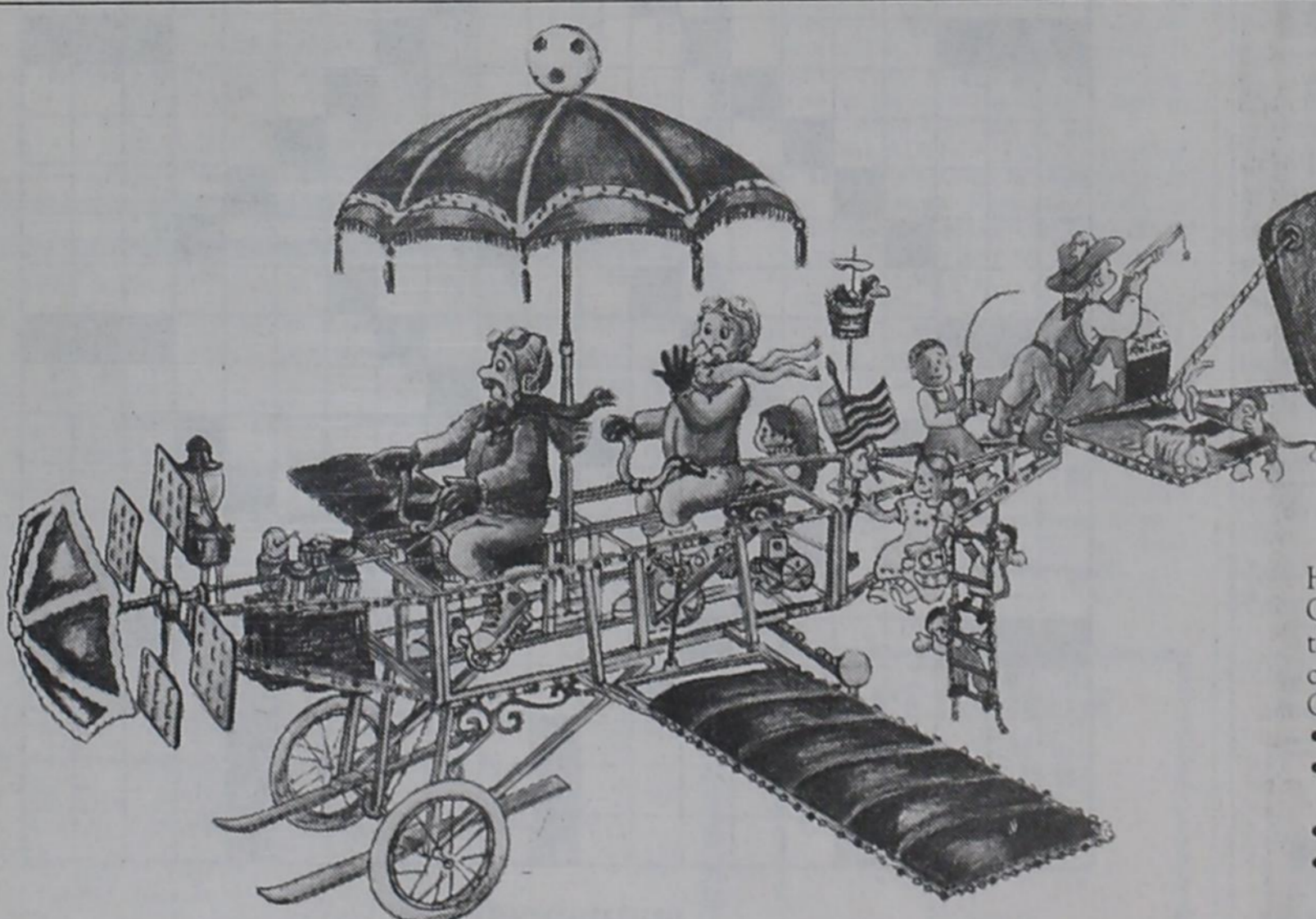
