The show is being sponsored by the Callahan 4-H Council. Everyone is invited to attend. There will be both halter and performance classes. Classes include:

**Halter Classes**  
Class 1 — Registered Quarter Horse mare, 4 years of age and over.

Class 2 — Registered Quarter Horse mare, under 4 years of age.

Class 3 — Registered mare, any breed except Quarter Horses -- all ages.

Class 4 — Grade mare under 14-1 hands.

Class 5 — Grade mare 14-1 hands and over.

Class 6 — Registered gelding, any breed, four years of age and over.

Class 7 — Registered gelding, any breed, under 4 years of age.

Class 8 — Grade gelding under 14 hands.

Class 9 — Grade gelding 14, and 14-1 hands, but less than 14-2.

Class 10 — Grade gelding, 14-2 hands and over.

Class 11 — Showmanship.

**Performance Classes**

Class 12 — Western pleasure.

Class 13 — Reining.

Class 14 — Pole Bending.

Class 15 — Barrel race.

4-H members may enter their horses in the show by coming by the County Agent's office or may enter at the show.

All 4-H members should have their horses at the show area by 7 p. m. Tuesday. Minor's releases will be required on all boys and girls entering the show.

# First Callahan County Jail Gets Landmark Historical Designation

Callahan County's first jail building in Baird has been designated a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, according to John Ben Shepperd of Odessa, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

The award comes with the announcement of the award of an

interpretive plate to be placed by the Official Texas Historical Building Medallion which was awarded three years ago. It is sponsored by Callahan County.

Having completed the requirements for the landmarks award, this structure will be noted on a special certificate to be presented by B. C. Chrisman, chairman of the Callahan County Historical Survey Committee.

The plate says: "First Callahan Jail. Built 1878, Belle Plain. Baird citizens paid bill for removal here, 1883, after election contest." The Medallion and accompanying plate marker is part of the five-year program of the program of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee to Record, Appreciate, Mark, Preserve and Survey (RAMPS) history of Texas.

The marker is designed to recognize and interpret the historical, cultural or architectural significance of the homes and buildings of Texas and cite them as worthy of preservation.

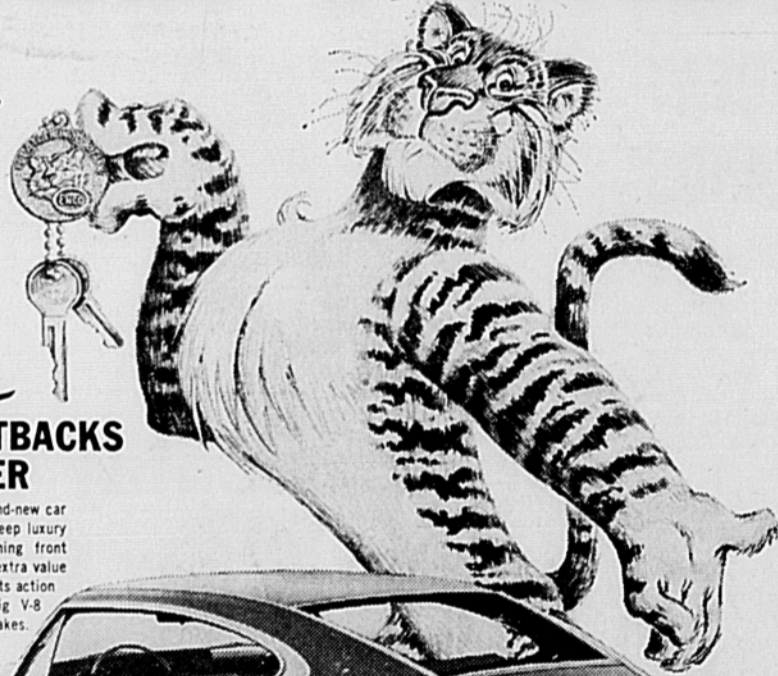

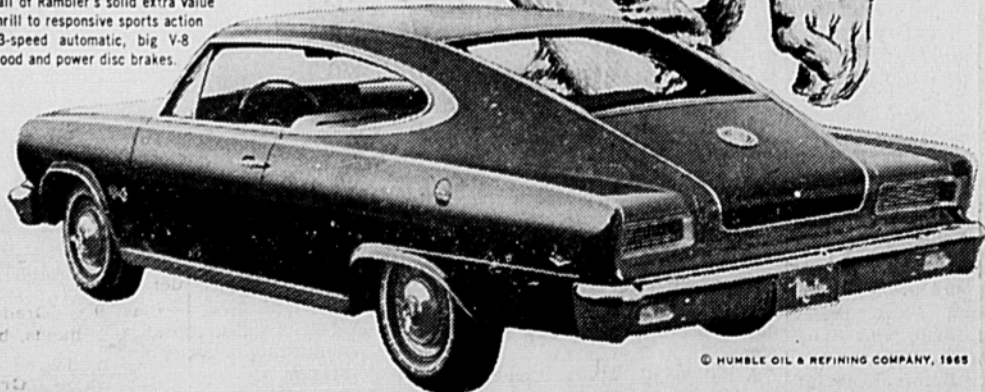

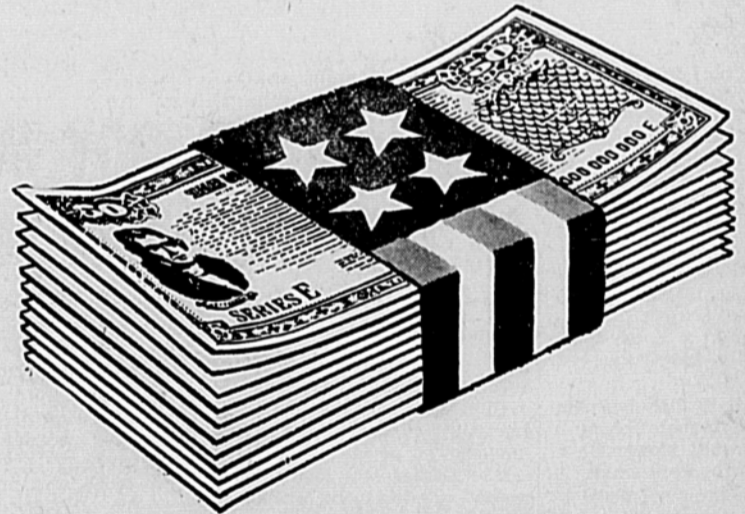

Jeanie Hughes Taylor is visiting her grandparents, Burette and Johnny May Ramsey here and Mrs. John Hughes in Baird.

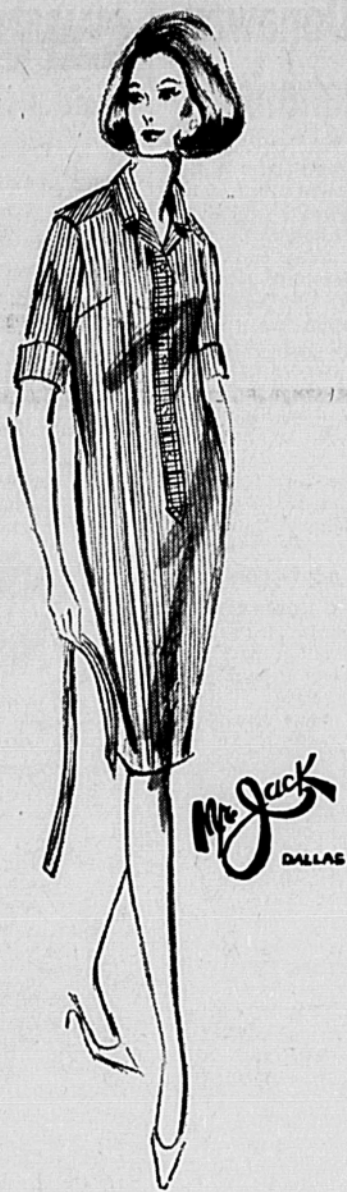

## FM Projects Set for County

This program covers 3.8 miles, with grading, structures and surfacing to cost an estimated \$18,000. Callahan projects are part of 911.2 miles of FM projects approved Tuesday by the highway commission for Texas in 1965.

# Pecan Casebearers Emerging; Now Is Proper Time for Spray

According to the latest reports from the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station at Stephenville, the pecan nut casebearers should be emerging from now until June 1.

Casebearers are small worms that penetrate the pecan nut and feed on the inside, causing the nutlet to fall off the tree. They can reduce the crop from one-third to three-fourths of normal production.

They can be controlled by spraying at the proper time. According to these reports, the proper time is now until the first of June.

Adequate spraying equipment is essential to effectively control these insects. Sprayers which will deliver from 400 to 700 pounds of pressure per square inch are recommended for pecans. When only a few trees are to be effectively sprayed, smaller power or hand sprayers can be used if close attention is given to thoroughness to coverage.

Any of the following insecticides are recommended for control of the pecan nut casebearers:

Insecticide per 100 gallons of spray:

1. Thiodan - 1 lb. 50% wettable powder. — Do not graze livestock in treated groves. Do not apply after shuck split.

2. DDT - 3 lbs. 50% wettable powder — Addition of 6 lbs. wettable sulphur to DDT usually prevents mite infestation for the remainder of season. Do not apply after shuck split. Do not graze livestock in treated groves.

3. Parathion - 2 lbs. 15% wettable powder — Do not apply within 15 days of harvest or after shuck open. Do not allow animals to graze in treated groves until 15 days after application.

4. Malathion - 3 lbs. 25% wettable powder — Do not allow

animals to graze in treated groves until 5 days after application.

5. Toxaphene - 5 lbs. 40% wettable powder — Do not allow dairy animals being finish-

ed for slaughter to graze in treated groves. Remove all livestock for 3 days.

6. Nicotine sulfate - 1 pt. 40% plus 2 qt. summer oil — Remove cattle from groves during spraying operations. No other limitations.

8. Guthion - 1 1/2 lbs. 25% wettable powder — Do not apply after husks split. Do not graze livestock in treated groves within 21 days after treatment.

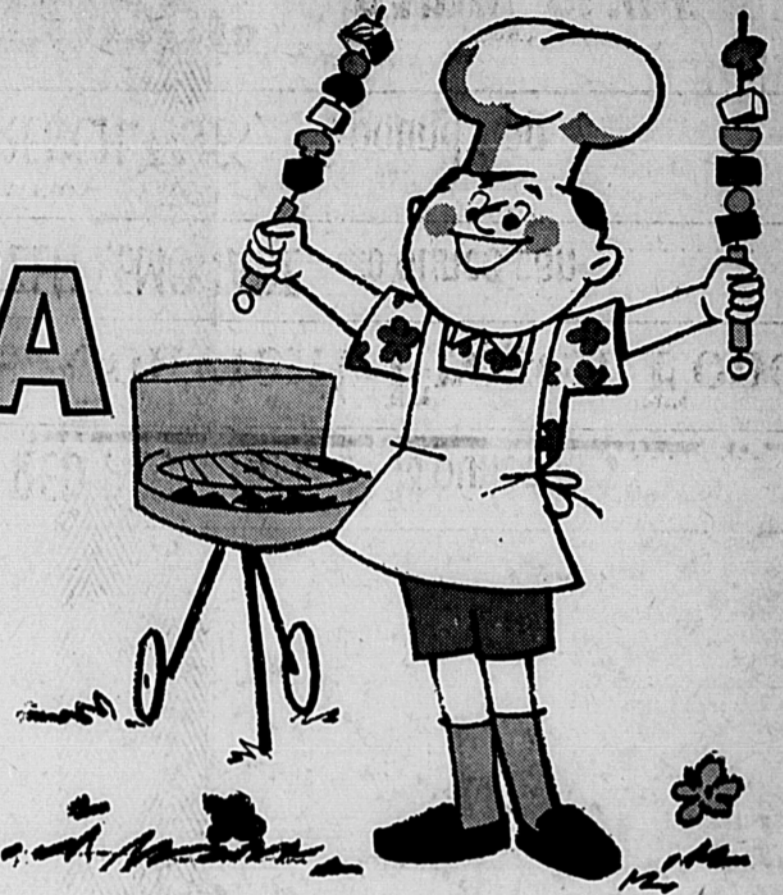
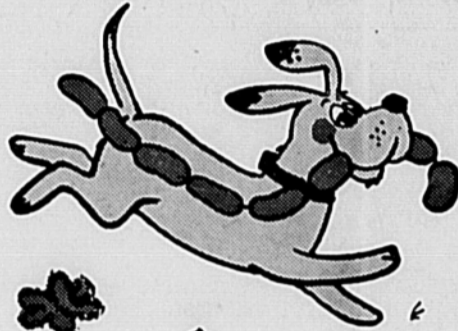
