Arlin Everett Windham

Memorial services were held June 15, 1985 for Arlin Everett "Hootus" Windham, who died June 13 in the Tucson Medical Center after a lengthy illness.

Services were held in the Justice-Mason Funeral Home Chapel.

Windham was born April 2, 1916 in Rains County, Tex. and moved to Garza County in 1925 with his family.

OSHA Decision Welcomed by PCG

A recent decision by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) constitutes one of the rare pieces of good news finding its way into farm circles of late, "and we are delighted to see it," says Ed Dean, Field Service Director for Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

Unexpectedly, Dean reports, OSHA on April 12 announced it will not issue final rules requiring agricultural employers to provide toilets, hand washing facilities, and drinking water for field laborers.

The decision by OSHA Administrator Robert Rowland apparently ignored the recommendations of mid-level OSHA officials who had spent years studying the need for a federal rule and had recommended its adoption.

Under a 1982 consent agreement, OSHA was required to publish a final field sanitation standard or justify why one is not necessary.

And it had been widely assumed by all concerned that OSHA would, in fact, finalize a standard.

On March 1, 1984 OSHA had issued a proposed rule which would have required employers of 11 or more field laborers on any given day to provide one toilet for each 20 employees and hand washing facilities (soap and water) within one-quarter mile of the work place.

Portable drinking water at "suitably cool" tempera-

tures would also have been required under the proposal.

The National Council of Agricultural Employers (NCAE) was the only national association to testify on behalf of employers during OSHA's public hearings on the proposed standard.

PCG is a charter member of the NCAE and Dean is a former director and executive committee member of the organization.

NCAE argued, in part, that because of the substantial existing state regulations a federal standard was unnecessary.

Thirteen states, including Texas, have farm worker field sanitation standards.

In addition OSHA had over 100 compliance offers in the State enforcing the Occupational Safety and Health act which covers industry in general, including agriculture but not dealing specifically with

farm workers. In its April 12 announcement, OSHA acknowledged that most farm workers are now protected by state standards.

OSHA also emphasized that enforcement of a federal standard would "reduce scare resources available to enforce higher priority standards."

The OSHA announcement said the agency has assigned low priority to the enforcement of sanitation

standards for industry in general and that its decision not to finalize standards for farm workers is consistent with that "de-emphasis."

The Migrant Legal Action Program (MLAP), as well as other farm worker advocate groups strongly protested the OSHA decision.

And further litigation by MLAP, Dean says, which began its crusade for a federal standard in 1972, is to be expected.

\$79,737, compared to 1984's payments of the same period of \$72,657.83.

One of the primary reasons for the increase is the addition of oil-field services to the tax category.

Several oil-field service companies are paying tax this year on services that were previously exempt from the state sales tax.

Other area cities on the report show Slaton with a rebate of \$11,365.44, compared to \$10,369.45 last year and a year-to-date increase of .56 percent.

Tahoka's check was down from last year at \$3,492.53, compared to \$5,015.21 in 1984 and a year-to-date increase of 6.43 percent.

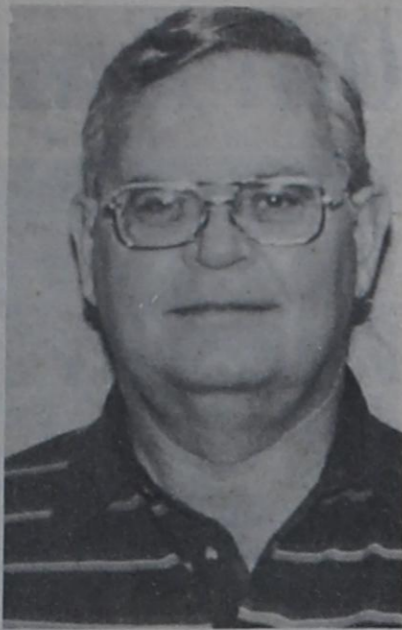

One aspect of alcoholism and drug addiction very important to recovery is that of emotional, mental and spiritual sobriety.

Too often, once a person is "dry" or drug free, it is assumed by family, friends and employers that all he or she has to do is just not drink or take drugs and everything will be ok.

Such is seldom the case, as any recovering alcoholic-addict will tell you, "just not drinking-drugging is not the whole ball of wax."

Studies show that a person stops emotional growth at the age addiction began.

It is not uncommon for a 30 to 40 year-old alcoholic or addict to show signs following abstaining to be 12 or 14 years of age

emotionally.

Hence the inability to cope or adolescent behavior of many recovering from addictions.

If the emotional growth is not treated along with the physical, relapse is likely to occur.

The 28 to 45 day treatment programs focus, not only on the physical but provides counseling and group therapy to help in the emotional, mental and spiritual growth necessary for long-time recovery.

Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous and Alanon offer continuing programs for anyone seeking help to recover and grow in sobriety.

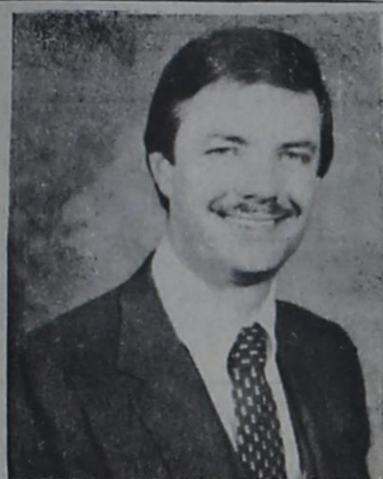

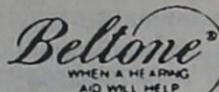

Rich, premium ice creams with sophisticated names are making their way into supermarkets to compete with familiar store brands and local dairy products. Premium ice creams cost more so consumers can justifiably wonder what they're getting for the higher price.

The taste and texture of the premium ice creams are usually judged to be superior. And this smooth, rich taste is achieved with increased butterfat and less air in the product.

According to the Food and Drug Administration Standards of Identity, the butterfat content must be greater than 10 percent to qualify as ice cream. Supermarket brands are around 10.5 percent fat by weight. But many gourmet ice creams are more than 16 percent fat.

The extra butter fat gives premium ice cream its creamy texture and additional calories. Calories are also more concentrated in premium ice creams because of the amount of air in the product. Regular ice cream has about 50 percent air, while the premium brands drop the air content to as little as 25 percent.

Some people claim that because of its richness, they eat only small portions of premium ice creams. But others say that the taste is so good they wind up eating more than they would of the lower-calorie supermarket varieties.

Most ice creams, including many of the premium brands, contain stabilizers and emulsifiers. These prevent ice crystallization

which makes for a gritty-tasting product. Most stabilizers are derived from natural sources, are safe and long-tested. But some premium ice creams do not contain them, and may claim to be a more natural product.

Whether you buy premium or regular ice cream may depend on how you feel about the taste, calories and cost of one product versus another. Luckily, any type of ice cream is a taste treat.
