WRECK NEAR PUTNAM WED. LEAVES 1 DEAD, 1 INJURED

An eastbound pickup truck overturned two miles east of Putnam on U. S. 80 at 12:50 a. m. Wednesday, killing one man and injuring another.

The dead man was identified from a billfold found in the pickup as John Albert Knight, 25, who lived in the Fort Worth area.

The injured occupant was identified as William Haskell Reed, 40, of Arlington, who is in fair condition with a head injury in Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

According to Patrolman Jack Therwanger of Eastland, the truck overturned after going out of control on a four-lane section of the highway.

The Baird Bears really showed their ability to play heads-up football at Maverick Stadium in Eastland Friday night. Eastland capitalized on a two point conversion and a nullified Baird touchdown to edge the Bears with a final score of 14-13.

The Bears started strong, scoring the game's first two touchdowns. The first one however, a 7-yard run by J. D. Faircloth, was nullified by a 15-yard clipping penalty, and the first quarter ended 0-0.

Then in the second quarter, the Bears took a 7-0 lead on a short plunge by fullback Franklin Alexander. Faircloth's kick was good for the extra point.

Maverick Gene Wilson then narrowed the count to 7-6 when he went around left end and over the goal for six points. His pass attempt to James McKenzie failed.

Eastland took the lead in the fourth when halfback James Whitehead scored from the three and Wilson passed to Tony Lowrance for the double conversion.

In the fourth, with 45 seconds to play, the Bears were in control as Faircloth completed a 12-yard TD pass to Bryan Reese. Quarterback Tommy Townsend attempted to force over the 2-point clincher, but his try was stopped short of the goal. The game ended 14-13.

Baird had 14 first downs, 80 yards rushing, 74 yards passing, 5 of 11 pass completions, and four penalties for 54 yards.

This Friday, the Bears will go to Cross Plains for their fourth game of the season. Game time is 8:00 p. m.

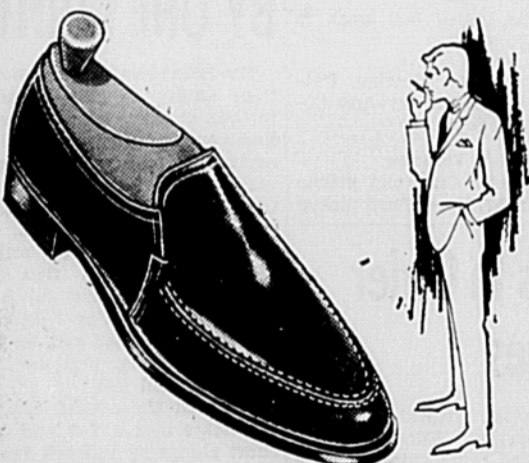

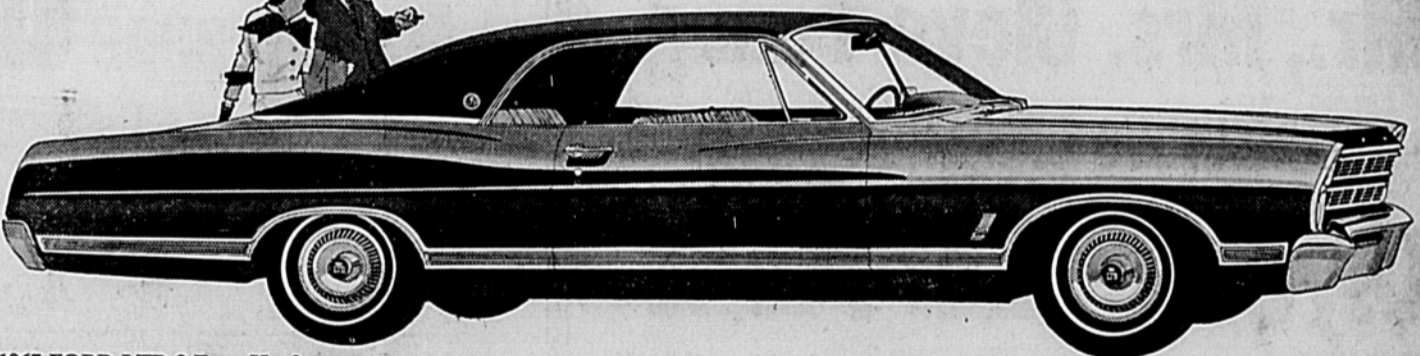

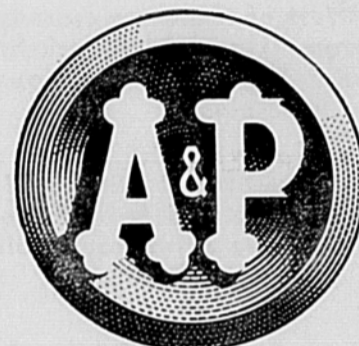

Baird Residents Offered Chance To ZIP Code Mailing List In Oct.

Residents in Baird will be offered an opportunity to ZIP code their mailing list during October. Postmaster John Towler, announced today.

Letter carriers will deliver "no postage needed" card to each of the city's 657 residential delivery stops beginning on October 10, the postmaster said. The cards will have blanks for addresses used most often, but for which individuals do not know the proper ZIP codes. Throughout the nation 95,000,000 of the cards will be delivered. In cities with more than one ZIP code, there will be two cards for each household; one for the local addresses, the other card for out of town.

In rural areas and cities with one ZIP code assigned (and this includes Baird), only an out of town card will be delivered since all local addresses will have the same ZIP code.

"This is a good time to get the ZIP codes missing from your lists," Postmaster Towler observed. "This Christmas, ZIP code will be as important as shopping and mailing early for efficient and one-time delivery of the record-breaking avalanche of mail expected in the pre-holiday weeks."

After filling in the street number, city and state, the cards are to be mailed back to the postmaster. Post Office personnel will add the proper ZIP codes and return cards to the sender.

President Johnson has proclaimed October 10-15 as "Nation ZIP Code Week" to promote greater usage of ZIP code.

Postmaster General O'Brien announced May 19 that steps were being taken to make ZIP codes more accessible to the

mailing public. The present program resulted from a search for the most effective method to get the codes in the hands of private mailers. A poll conducted by Elmo Roper and Associates earlier this year found that about half the population is using ZIP code. Of the remaining half who are not, 80 per cent said the reason was that they did not know the ZIP codes for the people to whom they write.

Previously, the Post Office Department has embarked upon an extensive effort to help volume mailers to convert their lists to ZIP code.

"The Roper poll strengthened our conviction that the public generally is ready and willing to cooperate with business mailers who will be presorting their second and third class mail after January 1, 1967," Mr. O'Brien said. "I am convinced that the ZIP-A-LIST project will go a long way toward accomplishing our goal of ready availability of the proper ZIP codes in the home."

All out of town cards delivered to Baird residents will be printed in red ink.

Addresses which cannot be ZIP coded because of insufficient or improper addresses will be forwarded to the city indicated on the card, if legible, and the codes will be added there.

Only addresses, not names of correspondents, should be listed on the cards, the postmaster reminded residents. ZIP codes represent delivery areas for the postal service.

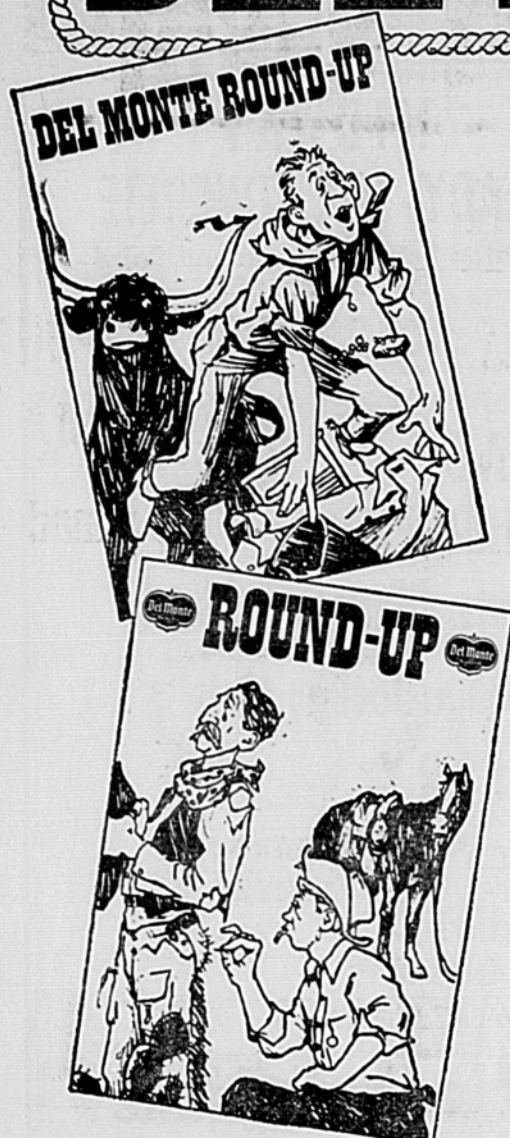
