## Ten Countians Called As Witnesses In Neeb Trial

Six Callahan County residents have been subpoenaed by Johnson County District Court, at Cleburne, to appear Oct. 31 as witness for the state in the trial of Paul Neeb, 38, formerly charged in the shooting death of Charles A. Ingram, 24, in Burleson, Sept. 19.

Subpoened witnesses are Callahan County Sheriff Homer Price, Callahan County Hospital nurse, Mrs. Raynell Brooks, Mr. and Mrs. Dean Strange, operators of Blondy's Drive In Cafe, County Judge Byron Richardson and Callahan County Constable, Glen Curtis.

Neeb, a former Baird and Cross Plains resident, turned himself in to Callahan County officers, and a warrant from Johnson County was issued on Sept. 21, for the arrest of Neeb. A \$5,000 bond was posted on the same day.

Neeb was charged in connection with the shooting death of Ingram on October 8, and he has been held in Johnson County since that time.

Defense witnesses were called

Wednesday afternoon from Callahan County and they are as follows: Jimmy Baum, Cross Plains; Garvin Jones and Vernon Weeks, Baird; and Bill Varner of Abilene and Baird.

Total of ten are being subpoenaed from this area.

## Beef Cattle Shortcourse To Be Held Here

There will be a Beef Cattle Shortcourse in the District Courtroom, Callahan County Courthouse on the nights of October 31, November 1 and 2. Each meeting is scheduled to begin at 7:30 p. m., according to Jerry L. Lackey, County Agricultural Agent.

On Monday night, Oct. 31, James Denton, Area Farm Management Specialist, will present the topic General Outlook and Marketing Trends in Today's Beef Industry.

Tuesday night, Nov. 1, L. A. Maddox, Extension Animal Husbandman, will present the topic Judging Cattle For Functional Efficiency. This is Dr. Bonama's "visual" method of fertility testing of cattle.

Then Wednesday night, Nov. 2, U. D. Thompson, Extension Animal Husbandman, will discuss the subject of nutrition. This topic will give ranchers assistance in selecting a supplement for feeding during the winter months on the basis of forages which they have, without a forage analysis.

All ranchers are encouraged to attend any or all of the three meetings.

## Chosen "Back of the Week" By Lone Star Conference Coaches

The never ending athletic ability of a former Baird Bear continued on this week as he was chosen as recipient of "back of the week" honors by Lone Star Conference football coaches. He is Baird's own Cotten Barnes, junior at Sul Ross College, Alpine.

This being the most competitive football season in the Lone Star Conference history, coaches find it very difficult to determine this honor each week. Barnes statistics were not as impressive as some of the others, considered for this honor, until the 170 pound Sul Ross Lobo carried the ball 75 yards in 64 seconds to pull out a 14-13 decision over Stephen F. Austin at Nacogdoches. In this football game he completed four passes, including a 45 yard pass to a split end team mate, which came with just a hair over one minute of playing time remaining.

Two weeks before, Barnes guided the Lobos 40 yards, with in field goal range and trimming Southwestern Texas State 16-13.

During the years he played the same quarterback possession for the Baird Bears, he was all district and all area for three years. In 1960 the Bears, coached by Vernon Townsend, reached the Regional finals in Class A.

Barnes is a 1963 graduate of BHS. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Barnes of Baird. His wife, the former Judy Morgan, also a graduate of Baird High School is a sophomore student at Sul Ross. The couple have one son, Blaine.

## "WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

**"The Pain of False Friendship"**  
Bible Thought: "A friend loveth at all times, and a brother is born for adversity." (Proverbs 17:17).

The name Judas symbolizes treachery and false friendship. He had been a close confidant of the Lord and carried the purse for Jesus and the twelve. Yet he betrayed the Lord to his assassins.

Real friendship has to be tested. Until it is, no one really knows the depth of his friendship for another. The testing for Judas was the lure of money. With other apostles, the testing was fear. In both cases those tested were insufficient for friends. They rejected the Lord and left him to stand alone in the greatest hour of trial. We often find that our friendship is just as "false."

Some of us find it very easy to be the friend of another as long as it pays, but when it becomes a sacrifice, then is the time of real testing. We may be a man's good friend until it is time for us to share public criticism with him. However, Jesus stated the qualifying marks for true friendship. He said, "Ye are my friends, if ye do whatsoever I command you." (John 15:14).

We often take a "false" attitude about Christ when He is spoken against in our presence. We betray him as did Judas or one of the fearful and we flee from His defense. In fact, one will respond more quickly in defense of the teachings of his Creed, Manual, or Catechism, than he will in defense of the Scriptures. He will respond more quickly in defense of what his Creed or Catechism teaches about the Scripture, than he will in what the Scriptures teach about his Creed or Catechism.

In so many ways we place our wisdom on equal with the wisdom of God. We often say, "Well, it doesn't make any difference." Yet, it is strikingly noticeable that nowhere in the Scriptures is this impression left when one considers God's plan for the eternal welfare for man. However, the contrary is quite noticeable. The prophet Isaiah wrote, "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, said the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts." (Isaiah 55:8-9). Of the scribes and Pharisees Jesus said, "... Thus have ye made the commandment of God of none effect by your tradition. Ye hypocrites, well did Esaias prophesy of you, saying, This people draweth nigh unto me with their mouth, and honoureth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me. But in vain they

do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men." (Matthew 15:6-9).

Jesus wants the people of the 20th century just as He did the ones in the 1st century, to fight for him with the integrity of friendship which calls upon us to present the truth (Word-John 17:17), in His behalf even though it may cost us money and social prestige.

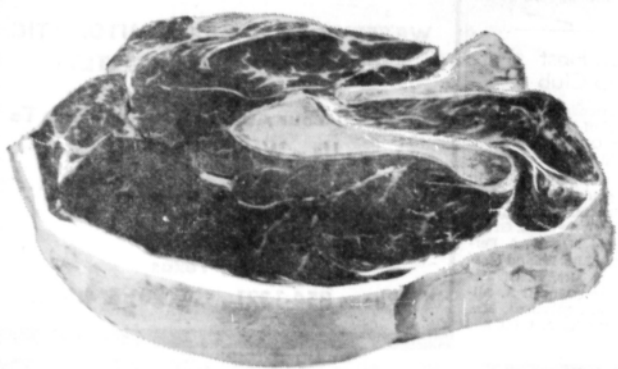

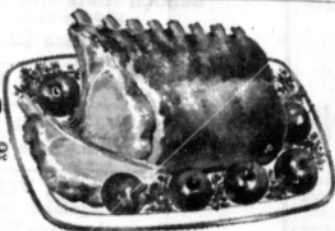
