"The control of the water and sewage disposal, against smallpox, immunization against diphtheria, cough, food inspection, and many other measures have been spectacularly successful in reducing the killing power of a number of maladies that formerly took a terrible toll."

"Responsibility for success and advancement of a public health program lies not only with the health department, but also with the support and encouragement of the community effort to apply in their own individual lives the knowledge which they have acquired."

"The individual citizen, to reap the benefits of good health must be more concerned about his own well-being than he is today. His program should involve a conscientious effort to abide by the simple rules of a faithful and rational living."

"In short, the private citizen fully appreciates the importance of good health practice on his part, he will greatly enhance the efforts of medicine, surgery, and public health in his behalf."

Drilling Permits In City Total 27

The City of Baird has issued permits for the drilling of 27 oil wells since the discovery well was brought in several months ago.

Of the 27 permits, 17 wells drilled are producers. Only a few "dry holes" have developed. Some of the wells have potentials estimated at between 150 and 300 barrels a day.

The City charges \$110 for permit and drilling. Several more tests are now in the process of being negotiated. The extra money the City has collected has been used in betterments, including a 1,500 feet extension of sewer mains, according to James Asbury, City Secretary.

Mission La Bahia, a few miles from Goliad, will ever remain a shrine of all Texans. It was built in 1749, and formed the nucleus of the settlement of Goliad, one of the three Spanish outposts in Texas, the other two being Nacogdoches and Bexar, now San Antonio. Here in 1812 Magee gave Salcedo, Mexican General, his first taste of Anglo-Saxon war tactics and here Col. J. W. Fannin and his men surrendered honorably to Urrea only to be slaughtered like dogs within sight of this mission. The massacre took place on Palm Sunday 1836, and of 357 Texans in that doomed band, only 27 escaped.
