

County Youth Held In Slashing Of Abilene Boy's Throat

A charge of assault with intent to murder has been filed in Abilene against 20-year-old Tommy Samuel Windham of Oplin, already free on bonds totaling \$16,000 on charges of kidnaping, statutory rape and contempt of court.

Windham, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Windham, well known Callahan County ranch couple, was charged after Raymond Goza, 16, of 2311 South 23rd St., Abilene, had his throat cut in an affray Saturday night at a home on Buffalo Gap Rd. Goza is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Goza.

Goza, Monday evening, was in a "satisfactory" condition at Hendrick Memorial Hospital.

Windham was in Taylor County jail, not having yet made bond on the intent to murder charge. He was arrested at his parents' ranch home by Callahan County Sheriff Homer Price and a deputy, Lee Brown.

Deputy Sheriff Leroy A. Ar-

nold Monday gave the following account of the fracas in which Goza's throat was slashed:

Goza and his 15-year-old girl friend and three other couples were at the Buffalo Gap Rd. residence after returning from a ball game. The other three couples left.

Goza and his date heard a car drive up out front and a door slam. Goza, thinking it was the girl's parents returning home, started out the front door.

Goza was met on the porch by Windham.

Arnold quoted the girl as saying Windham told Goza: "Goza, get out your knife. You're gonna pay for this."

The girl, who had followed Goza to the door, ran back in the house to call police.

Following a scuffle, Goza came in the house by the back door with blood pouring from his neck and told the girl his throat had been cut.

Goza was taken to the hospital by the girl in Goza's car.

The slashing is alleged to have been caused by Goza's having dated the girl, whom Windham is accused of kidnaping. He is also charged with violating a court order forbidding him to see or molest her.

He was free on \$5,000 bond in connection with the kidnaping \$1,000 on the contempt of court charge and on \$10,000 cash bond at Lovington, N. M., where he is charged with statutory rape.

He is accused of kidnaping the girl on Feb. 24.

All the charges against Windham are returnable to the 104th District grand jury for investigation. The panel is slated to meet Monday.

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SAVED BY GRACE THROUGH FAITH

"For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works lest any man should boast." (Ephesians 2:8-9)

Salvation by grace is taught throughout the New Testament. Man does not merit in any sense the wonderful grace that provides salvation. But since God through His grace has provided salvation we are told that it is "through faith" on man's part. God's grace PLUS man's faith equals salvation. Salvation then is conditional, that is, there is something for man to do. We have observed in studying the Bible that only the obedient will be saved. (Hebrews 5:8-9) Obedience is faith at work.

But this does not mean we are earning our salvation. God's grace provided salvation, a thing that man could not possibly have provided by his own works of righteousness. (Titus 3:5). But providing salvation and accepting salvation are two different things. The fact that many will be lost in hell shows beyond doubt that they did not accept salvation. But what do we mean "they did not accept?" We simply mean they did not meet the conditions. Let no one say "There is not one thing we can do to be saved." Must we believe? Yes. If we must believe, faith becomes a condition of salvation, does it not?

In Act 2:37-38 we have an example of people being saved. To be saved they had to accept God's grace. How did they do it? "Now when they heard this, they were pricked in their heart, and said unto Peter and to the rest of the apostles, Men and brethren, what shall we do? Then Peter said unto

them, Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." These people were saved by grace but it took faith on their part, faith in God's plan. They would not have been saved if they had refused to repent and be baptized for the remission of their sins. This is being saved "by grace through faith."

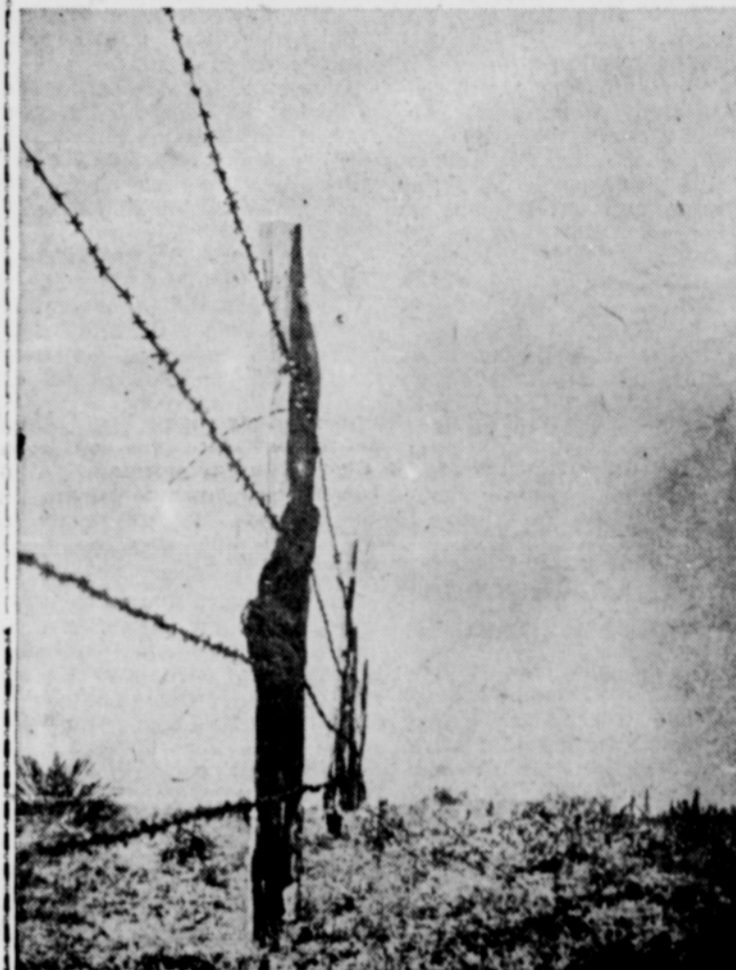

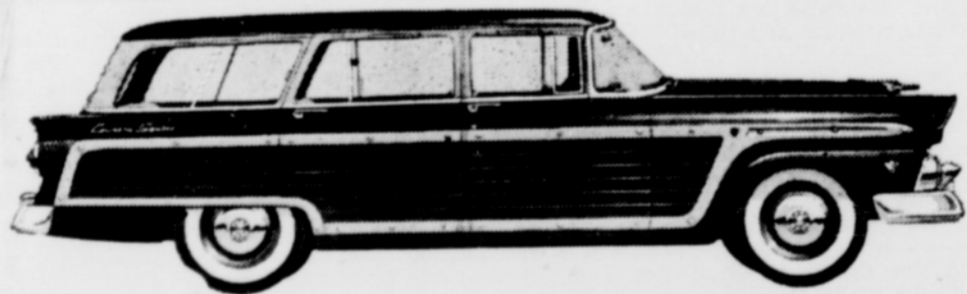
BARBED WIRE FENCE

In 1876, John W. Gates, a young drummer, sold barbed wire to the ranchers of Texas. In San Antonio the cattlemen laughed at him. In response to their jibes, Gates fenced in a city plaza and called for the "worst fence busters" of the herds. The cattle charged the wire as was expected but their hides were pierced by the barbs. They soon retired. Barbed wire came into use throughout the range area by 1885. Strife arose between cattlemen and fence-cutting became general. In some counties feeling ran so high that there was threat of civil warfare. An act of Legislature, together with the Texas Rangers, ended the strife.

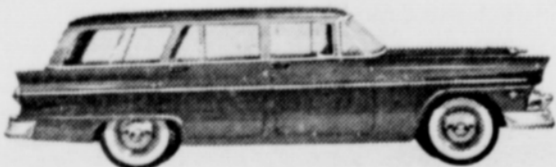

THERE ARE MANY FRONTIERS still in existence. There are not many territorial or land frontiers left, but as long as there is individual initiative for new ideas, there will be frontiers.

Some of them have barely been scanned and many are still unknown.

Suppose we were living in the year 1900 and were confronted with the problem of seeking a solution within 55 years to any one of the following problems:

1. To build and maintain roads adequate for use of conveyances which we have today.
2. To increase the average span of life by thirty years.
3. To convey instantly the sound of a voice speaking at one place to another point or any number of points around the world.
4. To convey instantly the visual replica of an action to men and women in their living-rooms all over America.
5. To develop a medical preventive against death from pneumonia.
6. To transport physically a person from New York to Los Angeles in less than four hours.
7. To build a horseless carriage of the qualities and capacities described in 1955 advertising folders by automobile manufacturers.

These are some of the frontiers developed and in the process of constant improvement.

As long as there is nothing in American life which can tell a man what he must think, where he must work, and what he must hope to accomplish, frontiers are as limitless as the day Christopher Columbus sighted the New World. Only our attitude limits frontiers.

THE LIBRARY OF CONGRESS is more than just a place for books. As Chairman of the Joint Committee on the Library composed of Congressmen and Senators, it is gratifying to report that publications sold by the Library for information and reference purposes in the last year amounted to \$1,063,000. The Copyright Office, which is a part of the Congressional Library, turned into the Treasurer of the

United States the sum of \$871,463.

These are not great amounts as measured by Government business, but it is at least one money-making institution of the Government.

THE GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE is also under the jurisdiction of my Committee. It is the largest printing establishment in the world.

An effort is being made to reduce the paper work of the Government.

Approximately 25 billion pieces of paper are handled by the Government each year, exclusive of the tons in printing technical manuals, pamphlets, periodicals, etc. To handle this paper work, it employs 750,000 people at a total cost in paper work of 4 billion dollars a year. This figure approximates the entire Federal Budget in 1933.

The cost of paper work today is five times the amount of the entire Federal Budget in 1912. All this reflects the enormous growth of the Federal Government.

This tremendous expense can be reduced, and my Committee has already taken action to cut the cost by \$34,170,000, and we have just gotten well started in bringing about some greatly needed reforms. We believe that a further annual saving of \$255,000,000 is possible. This would mean more than a 6% reduction in the cost to the taxpayers.

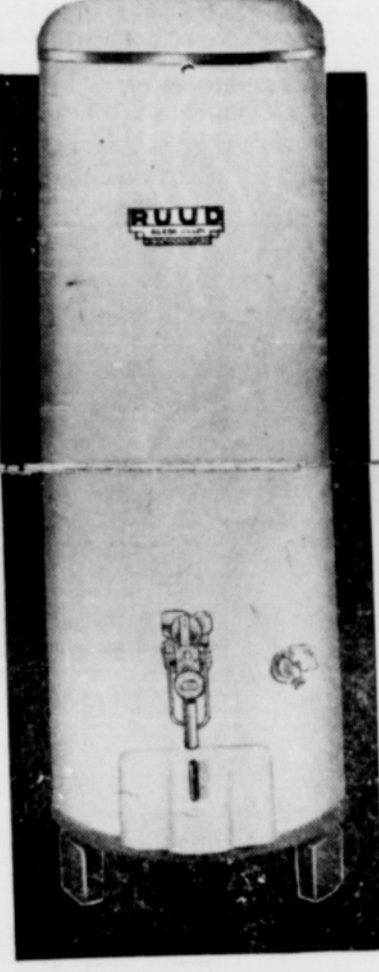

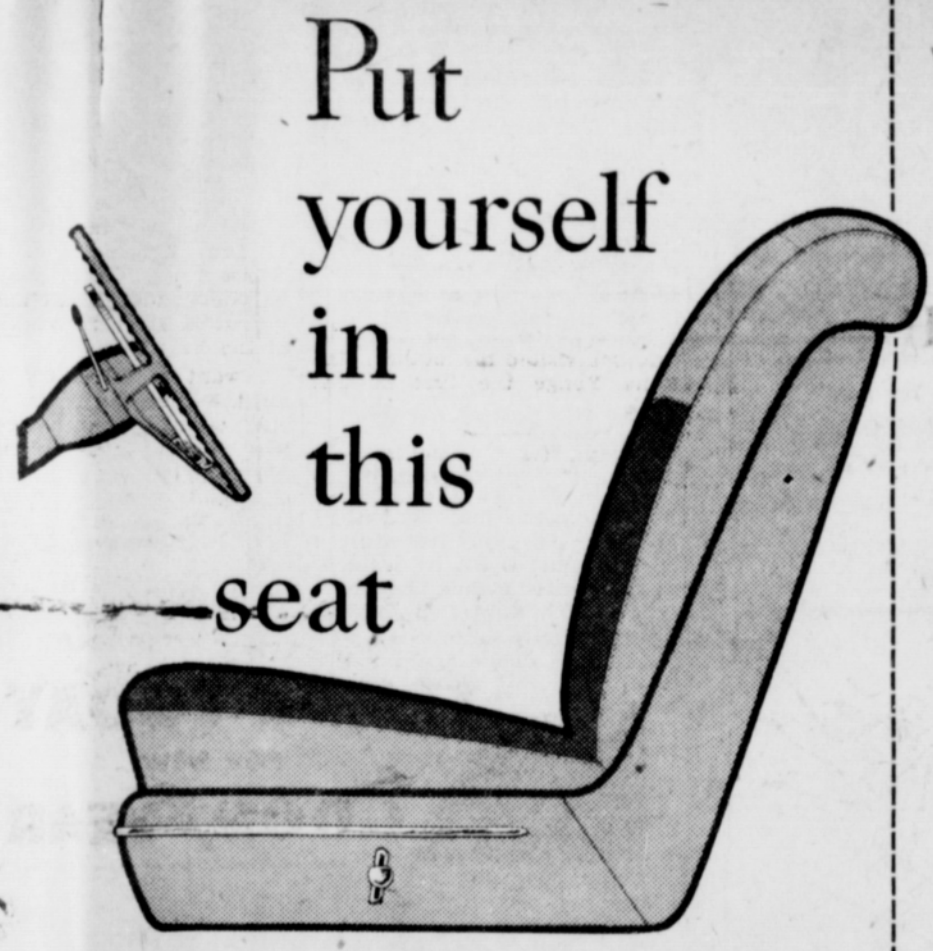

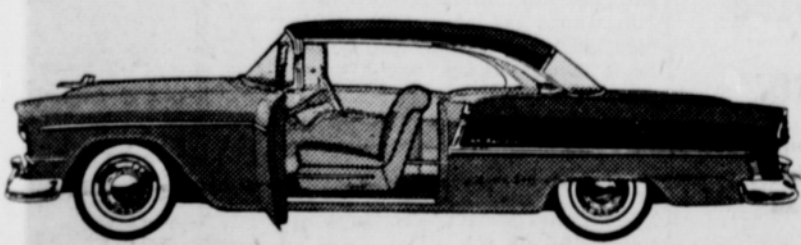

Mrs. Blackburn Hosts Wednesday Club For Program On Early Schools

Mrs. L. L. Blackburn was hostess to members of the Baird Wednesday Club and several guests for a program on "Our Education Heritage" in observance of Texas Public School Week.

Following the prayer by Mrs. J. R. Jackson, Mrs. M. D. Bell, club president, presented Mrs. Blackburn as leader of the discussion on Early Day Schools of Callahan County. Guest speakers were former pupils of these schools, Mrs. B. O. Jones of Big Spring, Mrs. Edna Yonge of Baird, Dan Clark of Abilene and John Morrison of Baird.

Mr. Morrison stated that in 1878 he attended one of the first

schools in the county, the Jim Hart School on Deep Creek. The eleven or twelve pupils were children of the four first settlers of that vicinity, the Hart, Heslep, Jackson and Dodd families. The school was housed in a one-room picket house with a roof of logs and sod, and a dirt floor. Punctures, or split log benches, were used. School lasted for three or four months; and pupils were graded according to their reading ability.

Mr. Morrison said that since there were no fences, Mr. Heslep plowed a furrow across the prairie to be used as a guide for the children on their long lonely walk to school.

In 1879 Mr. Morrison attended a school at Callahan City and shortly after that, a school at Putnam taught by the late R. D. Williams, Sr.

Mrs. Edna Yonge attended the first school in Baird in 1881, which was taught by three members of the Gould family. This school was a one room structure large enough to contain three groups of pupils with their teachers. It was located on the lot now occupied by Mrs. Ada Uzzell's home. Benches were arranged in separate rows for boys and girls.

After this building was destroyed by fire, school was held for the remainder of the year in a rock building, the community church, the walls of which are still standing in West Baird. The next building to be erected was

also burned; and in 1910 the first brick structure was erected which today is in use as a part of the Cafeterium.

Mrs. B. O. Jones who attended the first school at Eagle Cove in 1881, said that her father, the late Captain John Trent, gave the settlement its name because of a large eagle's nest which he found when he came to select land for a home in 1875. Later the name was changed to Dudley.

The school was a one-room building with split-log furniture, and a cedar water bucket. The first teacher was Miss Mary Anderson, a cousin of the Trent family.

Dan Clark also attended the Eagle Cove School during its early years. He said that his teacher, a Mr. Solomon, who had

no timepiece, would dismiss school in the afternoon when the shadows reached a stake driven into the ground in front of the school.

Mrs. Blackburn described the Belle Plain College, said to have been the first college west of Weatherford, which was established in 1881 by the Southern Methodist Church.

Mrs. Blackburn exhibited a number of school books and other articles belonging to early day settlers. Mrs. V. E. Hill demonstrated the playing of an antique music box, a Concert Roller Type Hand Organ still in excellent condition, the property of Mrs. Yonge.

AN ORDINANCE

Entitled an Ordinance forbidding the distribution of electric current, telephone service, water, gas, or collection of sewerage, in the City of Baird, Texas without a franchise: providing that any violation thereof shall be considered a public and private nuisance: providing for this Ordinance to effect all franchises now in existence or to be granted hereafter, or extensions or renewals thereof on distribution of electric current, telephone service, water, gas, or collection of sewerage: containing a separation clause: providing penalties for violation: and declaring an emergency.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Baird, Texas:

SECTION 1: That from and after the passage hereof, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to distribute electric current, telephone service, water, gas, or collection of sewerage, within the corporate limits of said City of Baird, Texas, except upon and pursuant to a valid and subsisting license or franchise or renewal or extension thereof heretofore or hereafter granted by the governing body of the City of Baird, Texas.

SECTION 2: But upon failure of any such person, firm or corporation to cease and desist from the distribution of electric current, telephone service, water, gas, or collection or gathering of sewerage within the city limits of the City of Baird, Texas, except

as aforesaid and except in accordance with the provisions of SECTION 1 hereof, the same shall constitute and be considered to become both a public and private nuisance, which may be summarily abated by any of the officials or police officers of the City of Baird, Texas, or by any private person who may be inconvenienced or discommoded thereby.

SECTION 3: In addition to or in lieu of the other penalties provided by the foregoing sections of this ordinance, any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of any sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00). Each separate day such violation is maintained shall constitute a separate offense and shall be treated as such.

SECTION 4: All franchises now in operation in the City of Baird, Texas, or any extensions or renewals thereof, now in force and effect, or to be granted or placed in effect hereafter in all distribution of electric current, telephone service, water, gas, or collection or gathering of sewerage, within the city limits of the City of Baird, Texas shall be subject to the terms and all provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 5: If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this Ordinance, or the application thereof to any person, firm, or corporation, or circumstances, is held invalid or unconstitutional such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the Ordinance, and the City Council hereby declares that it would have passed such remaining portions despite such invalidity or unconstitutionality.

SECTION 6: That the fact that there is not now adequate regulation concerning distribution of electric current, telephone service, water, gas or collection or gathering of sewerage of the City, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the rule requiring the reading of ordinances at more than one session or meeting of the City Council be suspended, and such rule is hereby suspended by the emergency aforesaid, and it is accordingly ordered that this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force immediately after its adoption, approval and publication thereof.

Baked Lemon Pudding

2 eggs separated 1/2 cup water
1/2 cup sugar 2 teaspoons grated
2 Tablespoons flour lemon rind
1/2 teaspoon salt 2 Tablespoons lemon
1/2 cup Pet juice
Evaporated Milk

Beat egg yolks slightly in a 2-qt. bowl. Mix in sugar, flour and salt. Stir in gradually milk and water. Mix in lemon rind and juice. Beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry. Fold into milk mixture.
