We have been told that the Clyde Bank which has for the past two years furnished cans to the people in that section at cost, have sold more than 100,000, cans.

The canning and preserving season will last for some weeks yet.

With so much food stuff put away and an abundance of feed stuff for live stock, wheat and corn for bread and the general up trend of the prices of cotton, grain and live stock, we begin to think that surely times are getting better and that we will soon see the end of the depression, when our people will again be able to get work and be able to not only supply the actual necessities of life, but be able to enjoy a few of the luxuries.

Mr. and Mrs. Bales parents of the boys were summoned and after a brief stay at the undertakers in Clyde they went on to the bedside of their injured son in Abilene.

The Bales boys are grandsons of R. E. Mackey, one of the early settlers of the Clyde section. Muril is a twin his brother being Burl who also lives with the parents on the farm.

Wilbourne B. Collie Opens Campaign in Run-off Campaign

Wilbourne B. Collie, of Eastland, opened his campaign in the run-off for State Senator from the 24th district before a large crowd in Snyder Saturday afternoon. He discussed the record of Senator Oliver Cunningham of Abilene his opponent, and outlined measures which he advocates. Following is Mr. Collie's speech he delivered at Snyder:

"Senator Cunningham states to you that he has saved you money, but the records disclose the fact that appropriations and expenditures have continued to increase since he has been in the Senate. Expenses of State government have increased 209 per cent in ten years and some of the departments have been allowed increases for next year. Your Senator voted for some of these appropriations and was absent when others were voted.

"Your Senator asserts that he is against bond issues but the records disclose the fact that he introduced two resolutions himself calling for gigantic bond issues. One of them was Senate Resolution No. 11, in which he tried to put over a \$50,000,000 state bond issue and create a State farm board or commission modeled after the one that has cost you people four hundred millions of dollars under Hoover's administration. In his bill, Cunningham provided that this board could tax the farmers \$1 for every bale of cotton they grew to pay the interest and LOSS.

"But that is not all—he introduced another resolution No. 14, calling for a state bond issue to buy all the electric light plants in Texas. This would amount to half a billion dollars which isn't much to the Senator, but it is enough to mean bankruptcy and penance to the people. This thing would add thousands to the State payroll and would create a gigantic political machine, and pay these interests large sums for their properties. Do the farmers and ranch people want such a thing passed when they do not enjoy the privileges of electricity?"

"There was passed in the last session House Bill No. 312, which prohibits city councils and commissioners courts issuing time warrants and creating debts in any substantial amount without a vote of the people. This practice has been used in the past for building courthouses, city halls, jails etc. after the people had refused to vote bonds for such purpose. House Bill 312 makes this practice impossible, and protests the people against these debts, but Senator Cunningham was one of only three members who did their best to defeat it. He, therefore, can claim the distinction of fighting the only law passed in 25 years which is now really protecting the people, because it keeps commissioners courts and city councils from putting a debt on you without your consent.

"Mr. Cunningham tells you about the State being in such fine shape; for this reason it should be generous with its employes—but he overlooks the fact that while Texas may be keeping out of the red—which I say it isn't—it has put the taxpayers so far in the hole he cannot get out in his life time. It gives us small comfort to brag about Texas not owing any money and paying as it goes, when it takes more than we can get out of these farms to keep Texas in that wonderful condition he tells you about.

"Mr. Cunningham has quit talking about his bill which dictates to the farmers of Texas what they can or can not do with the land they bought and paid for with the sweat of their own brow. Yet, in his first announcement for reelection he stated that he would again introduce the bill. More than \$100,000 was wasted by the Legislature which passed this unconstitutional bill, so held by the courts. It provides that a farmer could be fined \$10,000 (and if it was not paid he could be imprisoned for 30 years) for planting one row of cotton more than your Senator said he thought you ought to.

"I am advocating and will support drastic reductions in expenditures of our government. I will oppose the is-

suance of bonds. I will support any measure for the benefit of the people, and will be present and working against those measures which are not conducive to good government."

Collie advocates retiring county road bonds by the State out of the gasoline tax, placing tuition fee on students in the State universities and colleges, abolishing boards and bureaus and consolidating others to avoid duplication in services, reduction of State salaries to be in line with those who pay the taxes, the regulation of public utilities and he favors some plan to protest depositors in banks,

THE COMMERCIAL USE OF TEXAS HIGHWAYS IS A PRIVILEGE, NOT A RIGHT

The highways of Texas are the property of its citizens. They constitute a system of nearly 200,000 miles of road of which 20,000 miles are designated as State highways and the remainder are county roads. All types of road are represented in this system, less than 5% have so-called "permanent" surface.

The total cost of these highways is unknown but it amounts to many hundred million dollars. From 1917 to 1930, inclusive, counties and road districts of the State issued \$243,592,834 in bonds for the construction and improvement of roads and bridges. In the two-year period ending August 31, 1930, the State Highway Commission expended \$89,922,825, of which \$22,488,426 was for maintenance of the State highways.

In view of these tremendous costs the preservation of our highways from rapid wear and destruction is a matter of very vital interest to their owners, viz., the public. It is especially important that they be made to outlast the life of the bonds, which run from 20 to 30 years.

The use of the public highways for commercial purposes is not a right but a privilege which may be withheld or granted subject to such restrictions, regulations and charges as the Legislature may see fit to impose. Such regulations are intended to promote safety, preserve the highways and safeguard the interests of the public.

Texas Railroads, which pay the entire cost of construction and maintenance of their own roadbeds and, in addition, make substantial contributions to the cost of Texas highways, are thoroughly regulated with respect to their services, rates, methods and practices. There is no good reason why commercial users of the highways, built and maintained at the expense of the public, should not likewise be regulated to such extent as the public interest requires and pay such charges as will represent proper compensation for the privileges granted them.

The statutes governing highway transportation as enacted by the Forty-second Legislature represent the wishes of the citizens of this State and express their desire to give equal rights to all and special privileges to none. These statutes should be given a fair trial and their value ascertained. Unless this is done, a chaotic condition in transportation as a whole will surely ensue.

PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 3a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 3a. When an election is held by any county, or any number of counties, or any political sub-division of the State, or any political sub-division of a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations, or any city, town or village, for the purpose of issuing bonds or otherwise lending credit, or expending money or assuming any debt, only qualified electors who own taxable property in the State, county, political sub-division, district, city town or village where such election is held, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 14 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 14. There shall be elected by the qualified electors of each county at the same time and under the same law regulating the election of State and County officers, in an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, who shall hold his office, for two (2) years and until his successor is elected and qualified; and such Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and of collecting taxes as may be prescribed by the Legislature."

Sec. 2. That Section 16, of Article 8, of the Constitution of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. The sheriff of each county in addition to his other duties shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes therefor; but, in counties having ten thousand (10,000) or more inhabitants to be determined by the last preceding census of the United States, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall be elected to hold office for two (2) years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON DECEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to-wit:

First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

Second: Idiots and Lunatics.

Third: All paupers supported by any county."

Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exceptions as the Legislature may make.

Fifth: All soldiers, marines and seamen, employed in the service of the Army or Navy of the United States. Provided that this restriction shall not apply to officers of the National Guard Reserve, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States Army, Navy and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy and Marine Corps."

Sec. 2. That Section 33 of Article 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps."

Sec. 3. That Section 40 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster. Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be

construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States; or retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, from holding conjunction with such officer any other office or position of honor, trust or

profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any Election, General, Special or Primary, in this State when otherwise qualified."

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.
