Grazing Programs Deadline Past

Farmers were reminded today that acreage diverted under either the 1962 wheat or feed grain program may no longer be pastured.

Tommie Harris, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said today that May 1 was the deadline for pasturing such acreage. Acreage to be diverted under the programs is so designed by the program participant at the time a check is made of compliance.

Under the wheat and feed grain programs, farmers are seeking to bring production into line with needs through diverting to a conserving use acreage formerly planted to either wheat or corn, grain sorghum, or barley. Program payments are made under the programs to offset the loss of income which otherwise might have been returned from such crop production.

Farmers in Callahan County have signed up 305 farms for participation in the wheat stabilization program, and 233 under the feed grain program. Acreage signed up for diversion under the programs included 5-240 acres from wheat production, 5,136 acres from corn-grain sorghum production, and 221 acres from barley production.

County Freedom Bond Quota Set

Callahan County's goal in the 1962 Freedom Bond Drive will be \$109,200.00 in Series E and F bond sales, Howard Farmer, chairman of the volunteer bond committee for this county announced today. Sales from the first of the year through June will count toward the quota. The intensive drive will be centered in June.

But besides dollar sales, the participation of more families in a regular bond-buying program - with extra purchases during the drive period -- is urgently needed, Mr. Farmer said. And he added: "The question for of us is: 'What can I do to help the cause of peace and freedom?' world that our kind of economic system, under the four freedoms, still produces more benefits for more people than does the communist way. Propaganda won't prevail over positive proof."



FRIEND OF THE COURT

Since ancient Rome, an amicus curiae is a friend of the court. He plays a vital part in presenting a court with arguments which help it to reach a just decision. A pending case may affect many people beside the parties.

A court often welcomes outsiders into a lawsuit who cannot present evidence or question witnesses. Their main role is to inform the court, to write briefs, to tell the court of likely outcomes of its decision.

There are many types of friends of the court. 1. Court appointed Amici. The court may ask a professor of law or a public spirited group to help the court find facts, present the law, or supply other helpful information.

2. Special interest Amici are the largest group. Private commercial interest, trade and sim-


ilar groups have money at stake. They too might help the court -- but their main purpose is to have the court set a precedent favorable to them.

3. Government Amici. The district attorney, Attorney General or other lawyer for a public agency or the state or U. S. can present a public view of the case -- often without a special interest. Such agencies can often inform the court how the outcome of a particular case is likely to affect the public.

Sometimes a government agency can represent a state's special interest. For example, California may join Texas in a dispute between Texas and the N. S. over off-shore oil. California principle in a water dispute between two eastern states may affect Texas' stake in Rio Grande river water. Though in such a case Texas would speak in the public interest, it also has a special interest motive for Texas.

Callahan County has its first confirmed screwworm cases for the year, reports received from the Screwworm Identification Lab at Mission, confirms that four samples sent in from this county have been the true screwworm. These confirmed cases came from the Putnam area, Baird, Clyde and Eula. One sample of worms sent in from the Cross Plains area was identified as maggots -- these come from a dehorning wound.
As these cases came from all parts of the county, it is pretty well established that we will have screwworm cases in all areas of the county. The true screwworm cases came from the navel of baby calves and from the tail of a lamb that had been

Turman Favors Help For Aged

House Speaker James A. "Jimmy" Turman, candidate for lieutenant governor, said this week that the State government must shoulder its share of responsibility in giving adequate care for its aged citizens.

"During the past seven or eight years, the State has made some progress in easing the financial burden of our senior citizens through gradual increases

in grants," Turman said.

"The average assistance grant now has reached \$54.92, which, of course, is insufficient for many of our elderly people, with their limited income from other sources and little opportunity for any added revenue from employment."

Turman said the people of Texas would have a chance in November to raise old age grants when a vote is taken on raising the constitutional ceiling \$5,000,000. He said he favored the amendment and would work for

its passage.

Turman said the problems of the aged were not to be taken lightly or solved with the passing of time.

"The problems involves a million Texans, three-fourths of whom have passed 65, with the remaining one-fourth within one to five years of reaching 65," Turman pointed out.

ed. Last year more than 26,000 Texans were victims of this type of heart disease. How important a role the cigarette played is not fully understood, but the statistical evidence has been such as to move informed, objective, and deliberate bodies to call attention to the risk of cigarette smoking.

One survey after another has shown a sharp statistical association between lung cancer and cigarette smoking. Lung cancer death rates also mount steadily with the amount smoked.

Other official reports have stated that there is striking evidence that regular cigarette smokers are subject to increased risk of dying from bronchitis, pleurisy, emphysema, ulcers of the stomach and duodenum, and cirrhosis of the liver.

Realizing that effective education for adults would be expensive and relatively unsuccessful in changing long-standing habits, the State Health Department's Division of Cancer and Heart Diseases has begun an educational program on smoking hazards beamed toward junior and senior high school students.

The program is aimed at providing students with a full understanding of the health hazards which accompany the smoking habit -- so that they will stop some students before it's too late.

About Your Health . .

Forty years ago when a generation of Texans decided to smoke, there were no recognized health factors to consider.

There were aesthetic, moral and sometimes financial considerations, but the lay public never thought of tobacco as a deterrent to health.

Today the health factor holds the star role in the current and sometimes melodramatic struggle to evaluate and interpret the latest scientific data on cigarette smoking and its relationship to the health of the individual.

Observations recorded from this generation of smokers and extensive laboratory tests yield information daily that must be considered and weighed carefully by the thinking man.

According to the U. S. Public Health Service, the death rate from coronary heart disease among regular users of cigarettes is 63 percent higher than the rate of non-smokers. The number of deaths from coronary artery disease tends to rise with the number of cigarettes smoked.

Bullard continued that "The American Legion never has and never will subscribe to the doctrines of peace at any price, for the loss of human dignity and individual freedom would be too high a price to pay even for such a precious commodity as peace."

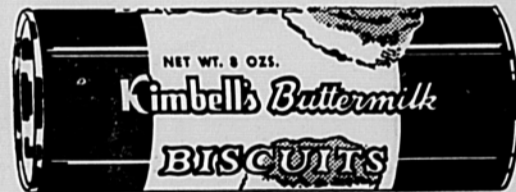
