Bulldogs Nose Out Baird For District Track Honors

The Clyde Bulldogs and the Baird Bears dominated the District 10-A track meet in Ranger Saturday with the Bulldogs coming out the victor with a one point margin after the events were completed.

The Bulldogs had to put on the supreme effort in the final event of the meet for their squeaker. They had to have second place in the mile relay to nose out Baird, and they came from behind in the anchor lap to take the badly needed second. In the final and deciding event Baird did the expected and jumped to an early lead in the first lap, a lead they never relinquished. Ranger took second place in the first lap and held on until the anchor lap. Clyde trailed Ranger until Johnny Wells caught and passed the Ranger anchor runner with less than 100 yards to go. It had the usual Baird-Clyde finish — down to the wire.

Actually it was Brannan and Dennis for Clyde and Higgins

and Windham for Baird as the two teams dominated the meet. Alton Brannan was high point man of the meet with 31 points. He took first in the broad jump, second in the 100 and 220 and ran a leg on the winning 440 yard relay team. He nosed out Johnny Higgins of Baird who took first in the high jump, first in pole vault and second in broad jump for 28 points. Ricky Dennis made 25 points by taking both dash events and running a lap on Clydes sprint relay team.

Talley Windham probably put on the most outstanding performance of the meet. The Baird sophomore gave a tremendous 145-9 heave to the discus, and tossed the shot 48' 1/2".

Clyde and Baird qualified 19 individuals and three relay teams for the regional meet. Clyde had 11 individuals and two relay teams and Baird had eight individuals and the mile relay team to qualify. Ranger won the freshman division of the meet and Clyde won the eighth grade

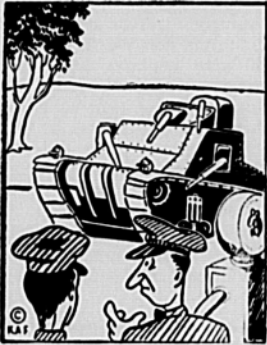

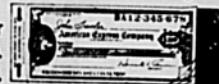

SMALL SCHOOLS PROJECT

At this time of year schools all over the state that are involved in the Texas Small Schools Project are in the process of conducting an evaluation of their school programs. Special emphasis is placed on the parts of their program that relate to the areas of experimen-

tion. The Putnam School, one of the 18 original pilot schools, is no exception.

R. W. Reynolds, Superintendent of the Putnam system and a veteran small school man, is an enthusiastic supporter of the project. He feels that the evaluation is one of the most important aspects of the program.

Since every teacher in the school along with representatives of the school board and the community work together as a committee in conducting the study, opportunity is afforded for the different segments that make up the community to share in determining the kind of work the school is doing and, also, gives them a chance to offer suggestions for improvement.

The committee has listed the following as some of the more important ways the school profits from participation in the project: 1. In workshops, and regional committee meetings, teachers have an opportunity to share ideas. 2. The use of new techniques, many of which are tailored for small schools, has made teaching more effective. 3. Through the employment of

multiple classes and the use of correspondence courses more specialized courses are available for students.

Reynolds stated that he believed the stronger factor contributing to the success of the small schools venture is due to the climate that the project provides for teachers to work in. It encourages teachers to use their imagination and even dream a little. In doing this they are able to break over many of their self imposed inhibitions.

What Is Pooling?

In spite of all the jokes about "oil-rich Texans," most Texans aren't rich. Relatively few of them have one oil well.

All Texans have a stake in the oil business however, because it makes jobs, puts money into circulation, and pays taxes.

Texas oil operators have to compete with those in other states and foreign countries. This competition is tough and growing tougher. Improvements in production methods for greater efficiency are necessary in Texas. It is a question as to whether Texans prefer to do this job themselves or let the federal government do it.

Many of the most responsible people in the oil industry believe the Texas Legislature can solve some of the most troublesome problems by passing House Bill 510, an oil and gas pooling bill. "Pooling" in oil field language simply means putting separately-owned pieces of acreage together, sharing costs of drilling a well and splitting any income proportionately.

A fair pooling law would create drilling blocks of uniform and proper size (according to spacing pattern of the field). It would help the industry to cut down on unnecessary development drilling and thus free capital for more "wildcat" drilling. It would provide a legal way for landowners to divide their minerals in proportion to their holdings.

An outcry has been raised against House Bill 510 by the professional "small-tract drillers," who for many years have enjoyed the legal sanction to produce oil and gas which rightfully belonged to someone else. Advocates of pooling House Bill 510 does NOT tie up large blocks of acreage with the "right" to take another man's property — or that free enterprise should cover the FREE CONFISCATION of another's oil and gas.

Contrary to claims of persons who, for reasons of their own, want to retain the outmoded methods of the past, House Bill 510 does NOT tie up large blocks of acreage with one well; it does not affect any wells already drilled or reservoirs already developed; it does not take away the landowner's bargaining power or change the terms of any lease except to the extent necessary to form a drilling block. House Bill 510 would merely give all landowners an opportunity to have their properties developed when some owners cannot be located or one owner seeks to obtain an unfair advantage. The rights of all would be EQUALLY protected.

Ask your Senator and Representative at Austin to support House Bill 510 — so Texas, too, will have a reasonable and legal way to assure each landowner his FAIR SHARE.
