BAIRD COTTON RECEIPTS.

Cotton sold up to last night, Wednesday, 900 bales, price average about 11 1-4. Same day last year, 1365 bales; average price about 10 3-4. The tendency of the Market the past few days has been downward, notwithstanding a great deal of cotton is kept off the market. The farmers west of the Mississippi seem to be holding out for higher prices better than in eastern states. Note the large port receipts at Atlantic ports, especially Savannah, as compared with New Orleans and Galveston. Farmers should keep posted on the movement of cotton if they do not want to get the worst of the deal. Farmers in Texas in holding out for higher prices help farmers east of the Mississippi, but they may have to sell for lower prices later. This is a problem that every cotton raiser should study. THE STAR hopes the Texas farmers will get 15 cents for their cotton, but the outlook at this time is not favorable to say the least of it. THE STAR, as our readers know, has never advised farmers to hold or sell cotton, because it is supposed that they know their own interests better than anyone else. The course of the cotton market is rarely ever correctly forecasted, even by experts, who make it a study year after year, consequently every seller must depend largely on their own judgment.

AT MISSOURI STATE FAIR.

Baird was represented at the Missouri State Fair at Sedalia last week. W. F. (Butch) Wilson shipped two cars of Hereford calves and one car short horn calves, which were sold at public auction last Friday, 11th. This was the largest shipment of cattle at the Fair and attracted a great deal of attention. The calves were bought on the plains and shipped direct to Sedalia. Butch was the only Texan at the Fair with cattle. Campbell Bros. & Rawson and Butch Wilson have secured the auction right at the Sedalia Fair for five years and Butch says he will be there next year with a big herd. Butch also sold a solid train load of cows and calves at Fort Worth consisting of 664 calves and 321 cows. He is an allround hustler and operates over a large territory in trading and trafficking in cattle, and is the only cattleman in Texas that had the nerve to ship to the Fair which at best was an experiment, but says he came out all right, and will try it again next year. He was offered a good price at private sale for the calves before the auction, but refused to sell as they had been advertised to sell at auction and sold them as advertised.

Pet Coon Killed.

Last Sunday morning Deputy Sheriff Felix Rains' pet coon was killed at the residence of the editor but no one knew it was a pet until it was dead. For sometime possums and polecats have been raiding the chicken houses at this place and quite a number have been killed. So early Sunday morning when one of the girls gave the alarm that one of the biggest "possums" in Texas was in Master Haynie's pigeon house killing all the birds, there was a general commotion in the neighborhood. The possum turned out to be a coon and one of the largest any of the crowd had ever seen. A small pistol and a target rifle were brought into play and his coonship's career ended after an exciting battle. He was a whopper and weighed 29 pounds. Henry Lambert came over just about the time the last shot was fired that killed his coonship and he said he believed it was Felix Rains' pet coon. A phone message verified the suspicion, but too late, the coon was dead so were five pigeons and a fat rooster in a coop near the pigeon house. The coon had bitten the heads off each, and from the signs around had made a rough house generally. Felix informs us that he secured about twenty pounds of tallow and the largest coon hide in the county. John Clinton, of Abilene, had given the coon to Felix a few days before that at Abilene where it was raised a pet. The coon was three years old and supposed to weigh about fifty pounds, though some one weighed it and said it only weighed 29lbs. Of course no one
