CROSS PLAINS MAN FOUND DEAD, THOUGHT MURDERED

BAIRD — A 50-year old man, Victor McClure, was found last Thursday, apparently murdered in an isolated trailer house where he lived on a ranch north of Cross Plains.

Callahan County officers and other officers of the area are investigating the possibility of murder of a man who lived alone and had little contact with anyone.

The body was found about 2:30 p. m. Thursday by a first cousin, E. M. Curry of Cross Plains, on a ranch previously owned by his late father W. T. McClure, who died in 1968.

According to County Attorney James Paul Shanks, the fatal shot apparently went through a glass door. The bullet entered McClure's chest, came out his back and went on through the opposite side of the trailer house.

McClure was apparently standing beside his bed. When shot, he fell forward on the floor, face down. The assailant apparently did not enter the trailer house since the door had not been opened and McClure's billfold, containing some money, remained undisturbed on a shelf. Extreme cold weather and the effect it had on the body made it impossible to determine the exact time of the shooting.

AUSTIN — When the owners of Texas' seven million motor vehicles get their 1970 license plates, they will find that the Texas Highway Department has taken a lot of frustration out of registration.

Owners will receive motor vehicle registration applications by mail early in January.

This three-part form is the key to convenience.

In previous years, the vehicle owner had to hunt up his certificate of title and last year's license receipt and take them to the tax office or a substation. Often, he found himself at the end of a long, slow-moving line.

The lines should be much shorter this year. And there are provisions for license plates by mail.

All Aliens Must Report Addresses To Immigration, Naturalization Ser.

District Director, John W. Holland of San Antonio, of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, estimated that 103,000 aliens will report their addresses in the San Antonio area during January under the Federal Alien Address Report Program.

The Immigration official said that 102,517 aliens reported their address during January of 1969.

Mr. Holland said that all non-citizens, except those in diplomatic status and foreign representatives of certain international organizations are required to file the address report.

He added that any alien who willfully violates the address report requirement may be subject to serious penalties.

In addition, aliens who are not in the United States during January must report their addresses to the Service within 10 days after their return.

The District Director said that address report cards will be available at the Immigration and Naturalization Service office at San Antonio and local United States post offices beginning January 1, 1970.

Service throughout the country. The reports must be submitted to one of those offices.

Parents or guardians submit reports for alien children under 14 years of age.

Mr. Holland urges all aliens to report before the end of January, as willful failure to do so may lead to serious penalties.
