AUSTIN COLLECTION PRESENTED TO CALLAHAN COUNTY MUSEUM

BAIRD — Callahan County Museum, located in the basement of the Courthouse, and sponsored by The Wednesday Club of Baird, recently has received an unusually interesting collection of articles which belonged to two pioneer settlers at Old Belle Plain - the late Rev. and Mrs. Thomas Jordan

Austin. The gifts was made by courtesy of their four grandchildren: Mrs. Bess Austin Denton of Rotan, Harold, Frank and Howard Austin of Abilene, who also presented a large display case for the articles.

Included in the collection are two coverlets for which the thread was carded, dyed, spun and woven by Mrs. Austin. Also there are cotton cards for carding raw cotton and wool preliminary to spinning thread; pictures of early day settlers; programs of events held at Belle Plain and Baird; personal belongings of Rev. Austin; and also a booklet authored by him called "A Key To The Book of Revelations."

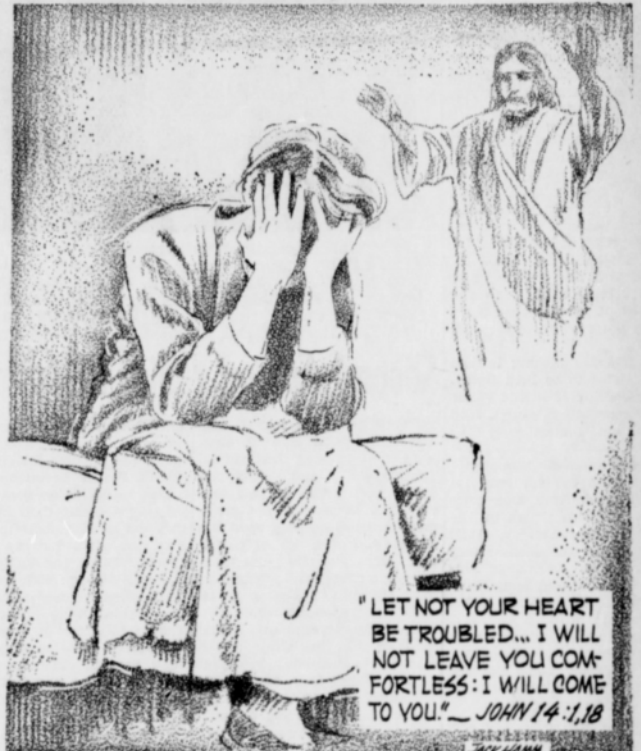

Callahan County ASCS Office Says To Certify Crop Acreage Early

BAIRD — Certify Crop Acreage Early - The final date to certify peanut, cotton, feed grain and diverted acreage is August 1, 1970. When you have made the final adjustment of your crop acreage and are sure of the correct acreage, then certify at once.

By earlier certification you can expect program payments to be received at an earlier date.

If you are not sure of the correct crop acreage, then have it measured before certifying. The cost of measuring a crop is \$5.00 per plot plus \$3.00 for each additional plot, but not less than \$10.00 per farm.

Remember you can not adjust certified acreage but you can adjust measured acreage prior to certification. Request to measure crops must be filed by not

later than July 10, 1970.

Request for Acreage Credit - If you are a cotton producer and was prevented from planting your crop due to excessive rain that was received during the regular planting season, then you are eligible to file a request for acreage credit. For prevented planting credit to be approved, the acreage must have been cared for in a workmanlike manner. There is no need applying when the area is grown up in weeds. A fee of \$5.00 per farm will be charged to inspect the acreage for which credit is requested.

Program Payments - It is expected that program payments for straight wheat farms will be made by July 15. Wheat farms with no feed grain and/or cotton to be planted can expect payment about the same time.

Other combinations of crops to be planted and diverted can expect payments at a later date. Of course payment data cannot be submitted to Kansas City for checks to be prepared until certification is made. Also, the crop acreage on selected farms must be spot checked before payment is made.

Designated Acreage - Long Term Agreement - It is possible for acreage designated under the long term agreements (CAP) to become infested with mesquite or other undesirable species of brush. You are reminded that under the terms of the agreement an approved practice must be maintained on the designated acreage. Failure to maintain the designated area could cause a loss of payments.

Vocational Agricultural Workshop Held At Lytle Shores In June

ABILENE — The "most enjoyable way to get an education" is to attend the West Texas Utilities annual Vocational Agricultural workshop. At least, that's the way Martin M. Shrank of Hamilton, puts it.

Thirty vocational agriculture teachers and representatives from twenty Texas towns attended the 2-day District 4 workshop at WTU Lytle Shores. Co-sponsored by the Texas Education Agency, the annual event is a mixture of hard study about uses of electrical equipment for farms and ranches, barbecue on the grounds, bull sessions and fiery domino games.

Teachers for the class sessions were some of the top men in the field in the state of Texas. W. E. McCune from the Engineering Department of Texas A&M University and Bob Jaska of A&M, both coordinators in the Agricultural Education, Adult Specialist Program, J. A. Marshall of Austin, Director of Vocational Agriculture, Texas Education Agency; and Ralph Moser of Stephenville, Area 4 Supervisor of TEA were the out of town workshop teachers, assisted by Bud Johnson of the WTU Service Training department.

The teachers, each a specialist in the field, admitted to learning from each other as well as teaching the area vo-ag teachers a new trick or two. Concentration of study was on the new solid state Silicon Control Rectifier for electric motor controls.

"Older devices don't operate fast enough," Bud Johnson told his class, and demonstrated the new approach to on and off switch. The device comes on the newer equipment and can be installed on the older equipment.

The purpose of the workshop is to keep the teachers abreast of new trends and inventions, teach them how to use them, and to take the knowledge back to their work stations and work.

June Marks 4th Anniversary of G. I. Bill Education, Training Program

WACO — June marks the 4th anniversary of the current GI Bill education and training program, and the Veterans Administration has examined its tally sheet.

According to Jack Coker, Director of the Waco Veterans Administration Regional Office, 1,652,537 veterans and 132,695 servicemen trained under this program between its starting date of June 1, 1966 and April 30, 1970.

In Texas, more than 50,952 veterans and 4,717 servicemen have trained under the GI bill.

Some 32,263 of these veterans and 725 of these servicemen received college-level training, the VA Regional Office Director observed.

In addition, 17,362 veterans and 3,822 servicemen in Texas entered schools below college level. Coker said 1,327 veterans have received one the job training since this benefit went into effect October 1, 1967. Servicemen are not eligible for this type of training.

This spring, enrollment reached the highest level in the history of the four-year old GI Bill. Coker said, with more than 22,420 Texas veterans and 1,924 servicemen enrolled.

The VA further revealed more

than 15,246 of these veterans and servicemen were studying in colleges in Texas, while 6,298 veterans and 1,732 servicemen pursued below college-level training.

In addition, a total of 876 veterans took on the job training in Texas this spring.

VIETNAM: THE COLOSSAL BLUNDER

By Sterling Tucker

As the debate over American policies in Southeast Asia has grown more and more vocal, the possibility of rational discussion of the issues has become more and more difficult. Even among scholars, arguments over the United States position often seem to degenerate into ideological points and personal attacks. In this kind of confrontation, the middle ground becomes constricted and increasingly unacceptable to both sides. The polarization of issues in these ideological contests forced the individual into one camp or another no matter how carefully he qualified his position and attempted to keep a foot in both camps. In time of ideological confrontation, one hundred percent commitment is not even a matter of individual choice, rather it becomes a product of the demands of society

back at his critics.

Although the history of our involvement in Vietnam is important, it is on one sense irrelevant to the question facing this country today. Historians may judge the story of our Vietnam commitment harshly or benevolently, but in my judgment, our Vietnam policy has been one colossal blunder. We are still no closer to a solution to the problem that we were 16 years ago. It is certainly not easy to extract ourself from a colossal blunder, and the adage, "Where there is a will, there is a way" does not seem to apply to our involvement in Southeast Asia. Our policy has been misguided from start to finish. We can not turn back the clock nor change any of the decisions that have already been made. But we can learn from this tragic experience. Perhaps in the future our National leaders will weigh the complexities of international politics more carefully, view the alternatives with greater caution and learn that sometimes ALL roads lead to hell.

The spectacle of this mighty nation, so full of promise, capable of so much good, bogged down in a wasting war in Southeast Asia is evidence that the tragedy is clear and present.
