

Ricky Miller Undergoes Fourth Surgery Wednesday For Injuries

BAIRD — Richard (Ricky) Miller was scheduled for his 4th surgery Wednesday morning at Lackland AFB Hospital in San Antonio. Young Miller, son of Sheriff and Mrs. Grayson Miller, was seriously injured in a car-motorcycle accident Sept. 2, near the Cherry Lane underpass in Clyde. Wednesday afternoon reports were that his condition was good after surgery.

The 19-year old Baird youth was taken to Hendrick Memorial Hospital following the accident, and immediately underwent surgery for removal of his left foot. His condition became worse on Monday and a second amputation became necessary. Ricky was transferred to Lackland AFB Hospital in San Antonio Monday night, when the third, and Wednesday, Sept. 13th, his fourth surgery to his left leg.

Reports during the past week were that Ricky was responding to treatment, and hopes of his family and his many friends were lifted toward his continued improvement.

A total of \$1,240.43 has been deposited in a fund for Ricky Miller, by his many friends and

friends of the family. Citizens of this area are to be commended for the way they have shown concern toward this boy from our county. The fund at both the First National Bank in Baird, and Peoples State Bank of Clyde will remain open.

CLYDE — The Bulldogs lost a thriller 16-20 to Winters last Friday night at Blizzard Stadium.

Blizzard speed outside was the name of the game the first two quarters, as Winters rolled up a 20-3 lead. Tommy Bailey kicked a 25-yard field goal to put the Bulldogs on the board. The second half was all Bulldog as Ruben Ramos passed 23 yards to Jarrell Hurst for a touchdown to bring the score to 20-9.

During the 3rd period, Ramos kept, around left end, for a 24-yard TD. Bailey kicked the extra point to bring the Bulldogs within reach. The game ended with Clyde again camped near the Blizzard goal line. A Winters halfback deflected a Ramos to Hurst pass in the endzone to save the day for the Blizzard.

Clyde had 14 first downs and 248 yards total offense. Winters had 14 first downs and 287 yards rushing. Ramos completed 5 of 15 passes for 81 yards and had one intercepted. Winters attempted 3 passes and had 2 intercepted by linebacker Robbi Tucker. Johnny York recovered a fumble and blocked a Winters extra point try. David Dunn and Tucker picked up a fumble each. Iky Akers received the blocking award and York the tackling award for the game. Tailback Ricky Loper averaged 4 yards per carry, and Ramos and Gary Barr rushed for 3.5 averages. Hurst caught five passes for 81 yards and carried four times for 23 yards. Defensive standouts were York, Loper, Tucker, Dunn, Hurst, David Edwards and Timmy

Payne.

This Friday the Bulldogs entertained Hamlin at Clyde. The Pied Pipers feature the fastest attack probably in the state with 9.7 sprinter Bill Cork at split end. All Hamlin halfbacks have run the century in less than 10 seconds. The Bulldogs lack considerably in the speed department, but do not come short on courage and toughness. West Texas Telephone Files Rate Increase for Putnam Customers

PUTNAM — Local telephone rates were discussed here today in a city council meeting by Mr. Harvey Womack, Business Manager of the company, and other company representatives. More specifically, the topic focused on a new schedule of rates proposed by the telephone company.

New rate schedules are being filed by the Continental Telephone System in most cities of its West Texas Operation Area. The new rate would increase business and residence service \$1.00, and extension \$.50. Mr. Womack stressed that this modest increase is needed now, to improve the quality of our service, to make it more reliable and dependable. He also stated that the company tentatively plans to provide Direct Distance Dialing for Putnam customers by December, 1972.

Mr. Womack stated that all the proposed increased revenue would not come directly to the

telephone company. For federal income tax is expected to take a 46 percent bite of it, and another 7 percent bite would go to the state in franchise taxes.

Fine defense was turned in by Miller Scott, Greg Atkinson, David Roberts and George Ledbetter.

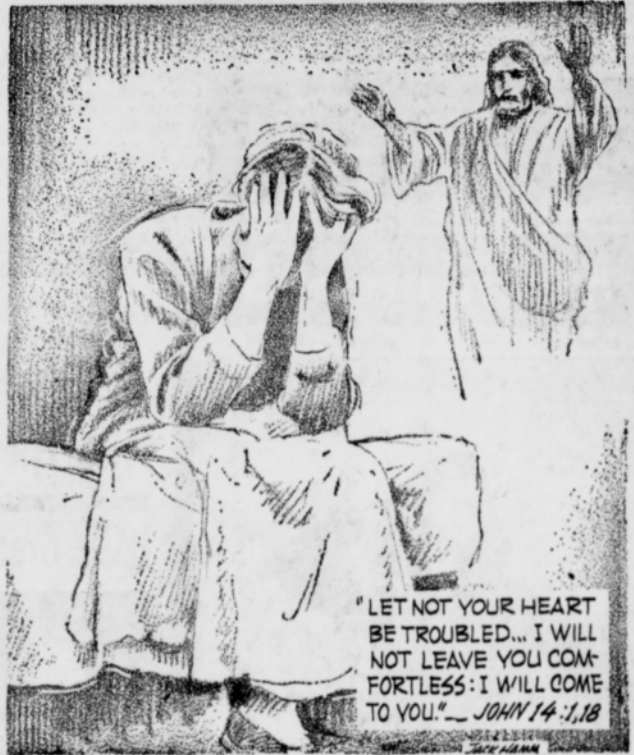

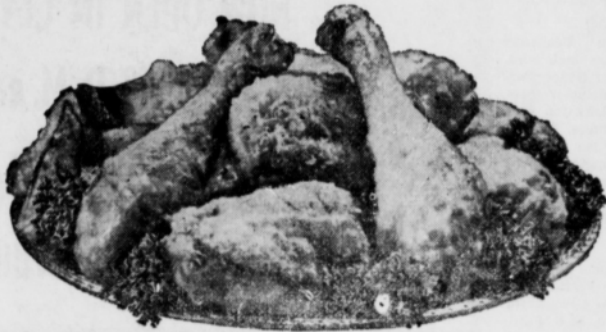
