Clyde Smashed Hamilton Bulldogs 45-0; To Meet Coleman Friday Night

CLYDE — The Clyde Bulldogs smashed the Hamilton Bulldogs 45-0 here Friday night to push their district record to 2-0, and set up a showdown with undefeated Coleman here this Friday night at 7:30 p. m.

Clyde gathered 24 first downs and 475 total yards while holding the visitors to 7 first downs and 88 total yards.

Gary Barr scored five touchdowns in the first 3 quarters and Ricky Loper swept right end for another. Jackie Fleming passed 21 yards to Ruben Ramos for the last tally. Tommy Bailey kicked 3 of 5 extra point attempts. Fleming completed 5 of 8 passes for 122 yards. Receptions were made by Ramos, Jarrell Hurst and Bobby Everett. Fleming and Ramos hand the slot-I and the Wishbone attacks with effectiveness. Johnny York led the defense

in tackles and recovered one fumble. Blocking awards went to York, Robbie Tucker and David Dunn. The Bulldog defense was stubborn as they kept Hamilton behind the 50-yard line all night.

The Bulldogs travel to Coleman this week for the 9AA showdown. Coleman is 7-0 and ranked 7th in the state. It should be a defensive battle as Coleman has allowed only 4.2 points per game, and Clyde has allowed only 5.4. The Bluecat attack features 210-lb. fullback Mike Marrs, who leads the district scoring with 78 points and his kicked field goals as far as 48 yards out. Split end Ricky McKee has blazing speed and is one of the top receivers in the district. The Bulldogs hope to contain these two and spoil Coleman's homecoming, and establish themselves at District 9AA leader.

DAN ELLIOTT ARRESTED FOR MURDER OF BAIRD RESIDENT

BAIRD — Murder charges were to be filed Thursday morning against Dan Elliott, 43, in connection with the death of Elicney (Bud) Jenkins, 71, who lived at 704 Eugenia Street. Elliott was reported in the area, Wednesday night, and was seen coming from the Jenkins home. Making the arrest were Callahan County Sheriff's officials Lake Taylor and Bill Wright.

Further investigation was made after Mr. Jenkins' billfold was found to be in the possession of the arrested man. The investigating officers returned to the Jenkins' home and found Mr. Jenkins lying face down on the floor of his home. Elliott was taken to Callahan County Jail and murder charges were to be filed Thursday morning in office of the District At-

torney in Abilene. It is unknown at press time just where Elliott is from or why he was in the Baird Area.

Mr. Jenkins is a uncle of Mrs. Wilburn Young of Baird. He had made his home here only a short time, and was formerly from Tatum, N. M. His wife had died a short time ago.

Special Investigator Frando Roacho of the Abilene District Attorneys' office, Texas Ranger Sid Merchant were called to the murder scene to assist Callahan County Sheriff Grayson Miller on the case. Others assisting were Constable Glen Curtis, and Clyde City Marshall Jewel Allan.

The dead man was taken to Godfrey Funeral Home where funeral arrangements are pending at this time.

Huge Turnout of Voters Expected For General Election, Nov. 7th

BAIRD — Tuesday, November 7th, the polls will open at 8 a. m. in Callahan County, for the casting of votes in the General Election by registered voters. Voting place for the Baird area will be at the American Legion, with Curtis Sutphen as presiding judge.

Other voting places and election judges are: Clyde Allan Johnson, Clyde Community Center; Eula, Reo Jolly, Eula School Cafeteria; Putnam, Mrs. John Doyle Isenhower, Cook Building; Oplin, Albert Betcher, Oplin Community Center; Denton Valley, J. Frank Carpenter, Baptist Church, and Cross Plains, Mrs. W. F. Kilgore, City Hall.

The ballot is rather large in size, with five columns showing nominees of four parties, and a write-in column. Also appearing on the ballot will be the 14 proposed amendments to the

Texas Constitution, which are appearing in this issue for study, to help you understand why you will or will not vote for these amendments. They appear at the bottom of your ballot.

Absentee voting will close at 5 p. m., Friday, November 3rd. Mailed ballots will be accepted if they have been postmarked prior to November 3rd.

The voting is expected to be heavy for federal and state offices since voters will be electing a President of the United States, as well as other important offices.

Remember to vote, early or late, but be sure your vote is counted. Read the directions on the ballot that will instruct you how to mark your ballot so it will be a legal ballot and will be counted.

The polls will close at 7 p. m.

Last Friday, the Bears beat the Aspermont Hornets 14-6 to bring their district record to 4-0 and their season to 6-0-1. Aspermont has a 1-3 record in district play and a 2-4-1 record for the season. The game was played in Hornet Stadium.

14 Amendments To Be Voted On In General Election, November 7

The following 14 proposed amendments will be submitted to voters in the November 7th General Election:

AMENDMENT NO. 1
The proposed amendment to Article III, Section 24, increases the annual salary of members of the Texas Legislature from \$4,800 to \$8,400. No changes are made in mileage or per diem allowances.

AMENDMENT NO. 2
The proposed amendment to Article IX, Section 6, abolishes the Lamar County Hospital District and authorizes the commissioners court of Lamar County to provide for the transfer or the disposition of the assets of the Lamar County Hospital District.

AMENDMENT NO. 3
The proposed amendment to Article XVI, Section 61, requires that all justices of the peace in all counties of Texas be compensated by the commissioners court on a salary rather than a fee basis. Effective date for the new type of compensation would be January 1, 1973.

AMENDMENT NO. 4
This proposed amendment to Article XVII of the Texas Constitution would add a Section 2 to authorize the 63rd Legislature to establish a constitutional

revision commission. The commission would report its recommendations to the legislature not later than November 1, 1973. Members of the 63rd Legislature would then be convened in January 1974 for the purpose of drafting a new constitution or revising the current constitution for submission to the voters of Texas. The convention would be allowed to sit through May 31, 1974, and could extend its life for 60 days beyond that date. The only subject matter restriction on the convention as provided by the proposed amendment is that the present Bill of Rights of the Texas Constitution be retained in full.

AMENDMENT NO. 5
The proposed amendment to Article VIII, Section 2, would permit the legislature to grant property tax exemptions to disabled veterans and to their surviving spouses and surviving children. This proposal is permissive in that it does not itself grant a tax exemption but gives this authority to the legislature should it choose to do so. The tax exemption proposed would be available to veterans classified as disabled by the Veterans Administration or the branch of military service in which served on a scale cor-

responding to the degree of disability. Those with a disability rating of less than 10 percent, would not be entitled to an exemption. With a disability rating of 10 through 30 percent, veterans could be granted an exemption from taxation on property valued up to \$1,500. From 30 through 50 percent, they could be granted an exemption to cover property valued up to \$2,000; and for those with a disability rating of more than 50 percent but not more than 70 percent an exemption could be granted for property valued up to \$2,500. A veteran whose disability rating is more than 70 percent or who has a disability rating of at least 10 percent and has attained the age of 65, or many veteran, regardless of disability rating, whose disability consists of the loss of one or more limbs, total blindness in one or both eyes, and paraplegia, could be granted the maximum exemption for property valued up to \$3,000. Further, the surviving spouse or minor children of a person who lost his life while on active duty with the military could be granted an exemption on property valued up to \$2,500, while the surviving spouse or minor children of a

disabled veteran could be granted an exemption from taxation equal to the exemption to which the veteran was entitled when he died.

AMENDMENT NO. 6
The proposed Amendment No. 6 would add a new subsection to Article VIII, Section 1-b, to allow political subdivisions of the state to exempt not less than \$3,000 of the value of residence homesteads of all persons 65 years of age or older from all ad valorem taxes levied by the political subdivision.

AMENDMENT NO. 7
The proposed amendment adds a new section to the Bill of Rights in the Texas Constitution. The Texas Constitution does not expressly prohibit discrimination because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin. On adoption, the amendment increases the constitutional guaranty of equal rights to all persons by prohibiting this discrimination.

AMENDMENT NO. 8
This proposed amendment to Article IV, Sections 4, 22 and 23, would establish four-year terms for certain elected and appointed state officials whose term of office is now two years.

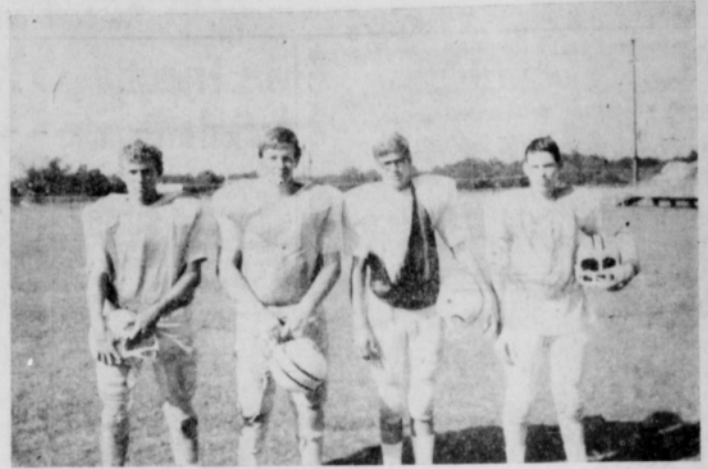

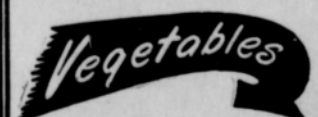

Amendments To Be Voted . . .

Section 22, setting forth the term of office and qualifications for the attorney general, and Section 23, establishing the term of office and other requirements for the comptroller of public accounts, the treasurer, and the commissioner of the General Land Office, would be amended by adoption of the proposal to change the terms of these officials from two to four years. The amendment of Section 23 would make the same change with respect to the term of office of any statutory state officer who is elected by the people at large and whose term is not fixed by the constitution. This would include the commissioner of agriculture. The amendment of Section 4 as proposed would change the term of the governor from two to four years. Also, since the constitution provides that the secretary of state Article IV, Section 21, who is appointed by the governor, and the lieutenant governor Article IV, Section 16, who is elected at the same time as the governor, shall continue in office during the term of service of the governor, the proposed amendment of Article IV, Section 4, would effect the same change to a four-year term for each of these officials without the necessity

of amending the specific sections cited as creating these offices.

Officials elected in or after the election of 1974 would be affected by the proposed amendment.

AMENDMENT NO. 9
The proposed amendment to Article XVI, Sections 33 and 40, exempts directors of soil and water conservation districts from constitutional prohibitions against holding more than one civil office of emolument and against payment of compensation to persons holding more than one office or position of honor, trust, or profit under their state or the United States. The amendment would prohibit a member of the legislature from holding the office of director of a soil and water conservation district. It is doubtful that this adds anything not already prohibited under the existing provisions.

AMENDMENT NO. 10
The proposed amendment of Article XVII, Section 1, which relates to the method of amending the constitution includes the provision that amendments are to be voted upon "by the qualified electors for statewide offices and propositions, as defined in the Constitution and statutes of this State," a change from the present language stating that proposed amendments are to be voted on "by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature." It also changes the provision on (1) the time at which the legislature may propose constitutional amendments, and (2) the time and method of publishing notice of proposed amendments.

AMENDMENT NO. 11
The proposed amendment deletes from the present Section 17 of Article IV the language which provides that the lieutenant governor shall, "while he acts as President of the Senate, receive for his services the same compensation and mileage which shall be allowed to the members of the Senate, and no more." The new Section 24a, which is added to Article III, provides that the "Lieutenant Governor, while he acts as President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the public treasury an annual salary of \$22,500."

AMENDMENT NO. 12
Amending Article XVI, Sections 33 and 40, of the Texas Constitution to allow state employees and certain other persons to serve on the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other governmental districts without forfeiting their state salary, and otherwise to revise generally the restrictions on dual office-holding and dual compensation.

AMENDMENT NO. 13
The proposed Amendment No. 13 would add a new Section 65 to Article III of the Texas Constitution. This new section would provide that agencies, instrumentalities, and subdivisions of the state that are authorized to issue bonds whose maximum interest rates are limited by the constitution could issue future bonds with maximum interest rates not to exceed a weighted average annual interest rate of 6 percent. The proposed Section 65 would be effective on adoption of Amendment No. 13 by the voters, and all constitutional provisions which set conflicting interest rates would be repealed.

AMENDMENT NO. 14
The proposed Amendment No. 14 would add a new Section 6b to Article VII of the Texas Constitution which would allow the commissioners court of a county to distribute a portion of the county permanent school fund to school districts in the county on the basis of scholastic population for the purpose of reducing bonded indebtedness or making permanent improvements. The commissioners are required by the proposal to retain a sufficient amount of the corpus of the county permanent school fund to pay ad valorem taxes on school lands or royalty interests owned at the time of the distribution.
