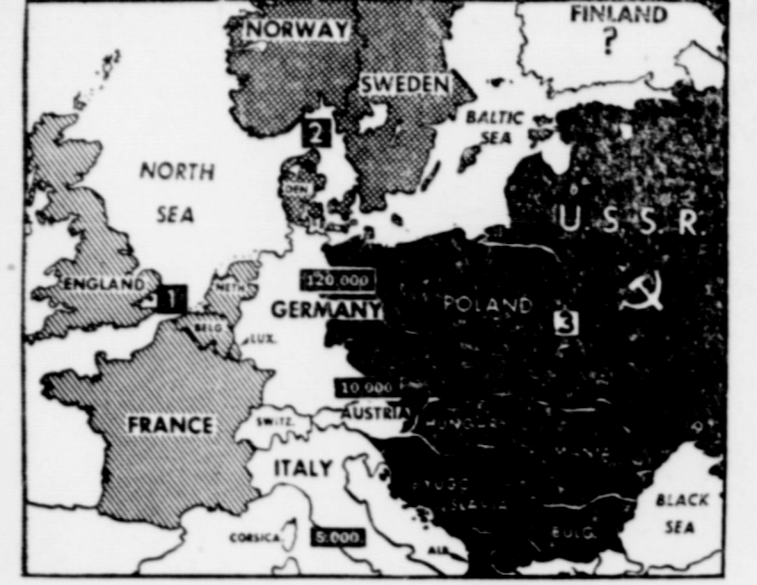

**THE PRICE
 Peace and War**

"We must be prepared to pay the price of peace or assuredly we shall pay the price of war."

Those words, spoken by President Harry Truman to the U. S. congress, could be the seeds of the first genuine, effective foreign policy this nation has had for half a century.

Disregarding any political overtones there might have been in the President's speech, his address to the joint session of congress reflected the realization at the top level of government that any successful foreign policy must be based on the fundamental concept of striking a balance between commitments abroad and the national security or strength at home available to back up those commitments.

By definition, the term "foreign policy" implies that any nation expressing such a policy possesses the strength—in military forces and alliances—to follow it consistently at all times and to defend it just as consistently in case of war.

In that connection Mr. Truman specifically asked congress for power to draft men to build armed strength against the ruthless aggression of Soviet communism.

He asked also for "prompt enactment of universal training legislation," indicating that the draft should be only temporary until universal military training is giving the country the trained men it needs.

Finally, he sought swift passage of the \$3-billion-dollar European recovery program—the Marshall plan for economic recovery of western European nations which is setting the Kremlin's teeth on edge.

Bluntly the President upbraided Russia for making a travesty of peace:

"One nation has not only refused to cooperate in the establishment of a just and honorable peace, but— even worse—has actively sought to prevent it."

CONVINCING

Closed for 50 minutes with Secretary of State Marshall, Secretaries of Defense Forrestal and Secretary of the Army Royall, the senate armed services committee emerged from the conference to throw its weight behind President Truman's plea for quick action to build up America's military forces.

Sen. Chan Gurney (Rep., S.D.), chairman of the committee, reported that 10 of the group's 13 members were convinced that both a limited draft and universal military training have become an "absolute necessity."

Just what the three secretaries told the armed services committee was not disclosed, but it was undeniably powerful information.

out of hand suddenly, despite the efforts of Russia or any other nation to prevent such a development.

Best opinion holds that, while Russia is not now seeking war, the Communists have created a kind of Frankenstein monster in Europe that at any moment could plunge out of control and involve the world in another conflict. Secretary of State Marshall is said to feel this way:

The Soviets are motivated by a sense of urgency to act before the European recovery program begins to function and before the union of western European nations is firmly established. Driven by this feeling of urgency, the Soviets may not be able to avert an incident which would lead to a shooting war.

Western Pact

Lending force to Mr. Truman's scattering of the seeds of foreign policy was the fact that an hour before he delivered his pronouncement, the just-completed five-nation western European pact for common defense against attack had been announced officially.

Under the treaty, Britain, France, Belgium, Luxembourg and the Netherlands pledged one another military aid in the event that any one of them should be attacked.

According to the new "Truman doctrine," the United States would be the principal guarantor of this five-power union. Without such a guarantee of U.S. backing, the western European treaty would be meaningless.

By his declaration in support of the western European pact Mr. Truman seemed to be guiding the U.S. to a point of departure from its historic adherence to the diplomatic enmity of refusing to engage in "entangling alliances" even at the price of its own welfare.

**BACHELORS:
 Declining**

Evidence of an innate desire for family life among adult Americans is revealed in a study by the U. S. bureau of the census showing a long-term decline in the proportion of bachelors of both sexes.

On a numerical basis, census bureau figures disclose, the number of single men and women has dropped to the lowest level since 1920, despite a third increase in population since then.

**TRIESTE:
 Surprise**

In a move that surprised everyone from the Russians to American congressmen, the U.S. proposed jointly with France and Britain that the free territory of Trieste be returned to Italy.

Trieste, long a storm center coveted by both Italians and Yugoslavs, had been made a free state under United Nations guidance in the six-month-old Italian peace treaty.

The proposal was, apparently, a shrewd and calculated move to try to help the anti-Communist forces in Italy win the April 18 election.

It literally put the Russians on the spot, leaving them with little choice of reaction. If they support the western powers' proposal to return Trieste to Italy they will be, in effect, turning their backs on their previous arguments for a Yugoslav Trieste, thereby kicking their Yugoslav cohorts in the face.

On the other hand, if Russia were to side with Yugoslavia it would amount to a rebuff for the Italian Communists. Possession of Trieste is a great political issue in Italy, and it will may turn out now to be a deciding factor in the elections coming up there.

Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito, however, lost little time in answering the proposal of the U.S., Britain and France. He simply rejected the demand and proposed instead that a plebiscite be held in the free state of Trieste to decide whether it should be Italian or Yugoslav.

Moscow diplomats were calling the action "another move toward war." Said one: "The beginnings of international order which emerged after the war are being destroyed."

But to those who were working tooth and nail against the spread of communism it looked like a master stroke, one which might keep Italy and all of western Europe out of reach of the Kremlin.

**FOOD WASTE:
 Rats, Insects**

Although the world is crying for food, hundreds of thousands of tons of American foodstuffs are spoiled each year by the depredations of rats, mice and insects—and often by the carelessness of some producers.

Food and drug administration officials say the amount of so-called "filthy food" they destroy every year is enough to contribute "very substantially" to the hungry areas of the world.

"Filthy food" is the legal term for food spoiled by "contamination of rats, mice, insects or other repulsive foreign bodies." It is the job of the food and drug administration to find and condemn filthy food in the channels of interstate commerce and to prosecute those responsible.

Since FDA's power to condemn filthy foods at their destination was taken away a year ago, officials estimate that, as a result, 20 tons of such food appears in retail outlets every day.

**RABBITS:
 Meat Supply**

There is one vast source of meat—maybe an inexhaustible one—that the U.S. public might have to consider seriously if beef and pork become as scarce and expensive as it is predicted they will: Rabbits.

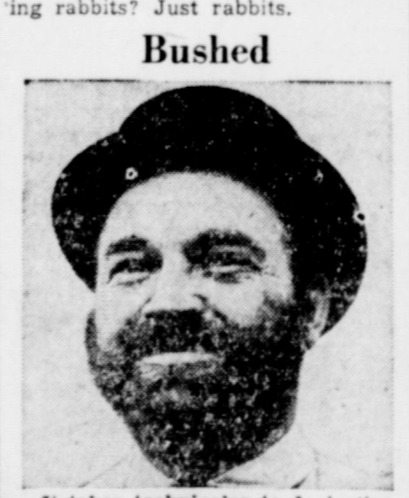
That is a department of agriculture idea. The department suggested that the American people take up the raising of rabbits as a supplementary source of meat to eke out the usual protein fare, destined to become more scarce and costly.

National rabbit week, which was observed during the week following Easter, would be "a good time" for families to plan to produce a "year round supply of this white, delicately flavored, nutritious meat, comparable to breast of chicken," the department hinted.

What does one need to begin raising rabbits? Just rabbits.

**Jan Masaryk Took His Life
 In Protest Against 'Robots'**

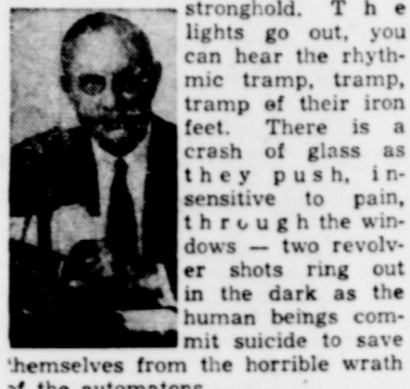
WASHINGTON.—For some time after I heard the tragic news of Jan Masaryk's suicide, a strange memory haunted me . . . I saw — a man and woman alone in a darkened room. They are two of the last three human beings on earth. The rest have been destroyed by an army of automatons—man-created robots. Creatures who have all other human attributes, but no sensitivities, no souls. Mechanically-made, the robots are the triumph of the productivity of the machine.

But they have revolted and turned against their creators. They now are marching on the last human stronghold. The lights go out, you can hear the rhythmic tramp, tramp, tramp of their iron feet. There is a crash of glass as they push, insensitive to pain, through the windows — two revolver shots ring out in the dark as the human beings commit suicide to save themselves from the horrible wrath of the automatons.

That, you may remember, was the climax of the play *RUR*—"Rossums Universal Robots"—written by Karel Capek.

I was reminded of it because of one of the first deeds of Jan Masaryk in 1946 when he returned to his native country after the exile imposed on him when Hitler's robots crushed the first Czech republic. When Masaryk returned, he laid flowers on the grave of Karel Capek, the great Czech author who wrote that prophetic play, giving us the word "robot" and the warning behind it. The word comes down from the old Slavic "robota," servitude.

We have accepted the word. We have not heeded the warning.



The robots, like the Golem of the Hebrew myth, and the Adam of the Psalms "yet being imperfect" before a soul was breathed into his substance offer a grim warning to us now. Unhuman beings released today, may re-enact Capek's play on a stage, wide as civilization.

Day after day come the frightened echoes from Europe of the fear of war. And yet no people wants it. If you were to write down all the material demands of the diplomats and the rulers of each nation, and put them in the hands of the peoples of the world and tell them: If you want these you must have war, who would pay the price of war? None. None but a robot, without sensitivity, without soul.

The martyrdom of Jan Masaryk seems to have hurt rather than helped the Communist cause. I spent some time with the former Czechoslovak ambassador to the United States, Juric Slavik, on the evening of the day when Masaryk's suicide was announced.

Slavik believes that Masaryk felt he could serve his country better dead than as a living prisoner, for the ambassador says he was a prisoner. Masaryk, alive, but with every word and gesture filtered through the censorship of the Communist screen, would become a symbol of the spirit of Czechoslovakia surrendered, enchained, a noble and historic name and all it has stood for, besmirched and obliterated. Dead, the name, the spirit, live.

The ambassador recalled an episode in that epic odyssey which has gone down in military history as

Slovak brothers, I am with you." This may have been an indication of his true purpose; to direct the underground. He was a master at subtlety.

One must take into consideration the attitude toward self-destruction in a country which had a long tradition of martyrdom and underground resistance, and no Catholic background. I do not know how much of a mystic Jan Masaryk may have been. But it has been emphasized that only a few hours before his death, he visited his father's grave with others, to venerate the honored memory. And he remained there, alone, long after the others had gone.

Perhaps he felt that he had received, in that lonely vigil, some mystic command, say as Hamlet did after a similar experience: ". . . and thy commandment all alone shall live within the book and volume of my brain, unmixed with baser matter: yes, by heaven!"

**Peace Depends
 On World's Children**

Recently I received a pamphlet from the General Brotherhood Board containing an article by Gordon Allport, department of social relations at Harvard, entitled: "Guide Lines for Research in International Cooperation."

Allport points out that most international conferences meet in the

glare of cameras, microphones and bald heads, and that it is time to concentrate our efforts on the children.

In teaching children about the peoples of the world, Allport says the tendency is to accentuate the DIFFERENCES.

He says: "The American child learns with horror about head-hunters, about infanticide; and he learns to laugh at the Dutch who clomp in wooden shoes, and at the quaint observances of Easter among adherents to the Orthodox faith. The implication of inferiority is a usual by-product of our present method of teaching cultural and national differences. Less dramatic, but far sadder, would be the teaching of the common considerations of justice and morality that are identical over vast areas of the earth. Practices that may SEEM to differ dramatically often indicate common aspirations and common values. The prayer wheels of Tibet and the silent Quaker meeting have virtually identical functional significance; so too the initiation rites of the Pawnee and the American high school commencement.

Allport thinks that a study of the common peoples of the world undoubtedly would reveal that more important to them than boundaries and national aspirations are matters of self-respect, pride, food, shelter, marriage and the welfare of their children.

Yes, as I said earlier, ask the peoples of the world to vote between capture of territory, acquisition of ports or oil fields at the price of war—and there would be no question of their choice.

Little effort has been made, Allport claims, to search for the common ground of mankind—and he suggests that the United Nations prepare an encyclopedia of the uniformities and similarities in the beliefs, practices and aspirations of all peoples—an encyclopedia which would serve as a reference guide for innumerable aspects of world policy for years to come.

Religion in Schools

NOT in a generation has there been a more controversial ruling handed down by the supreme court than the 8 to 1 decision overruling the lower courts in the religious instruction case at Champaign, Ill.

Coming at a time when the nation is engaged in an all-out battle against the forces of atheistic communism and even war looms as a consequence, the court itself and newspapers throughout the country have been swamped with letters for and against the decision.

The court's ruling was based on use of tax-supported school property for religious instruction in various faiths provided by the Champaign council on religious education one period a week. An atheist brought suit because her son was "embarrassed." The court said she was right and the practice violated the first amendment to the Constitution which reads:

"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." No federal law was in question, merely the action of a school board which is under jurisdiction of the state, as are all public schools.

Justice Reed in his dissenting opinion held there was no more violation of the traditional separation of church and state than the practice of using chaplains in the army and navy or for congress itself.

So concerned was the National Education Association that it issued a statement holding the responsibility of the public schools to inculcate those moral and ethical principles which are the essence of the good life. One of the important objectives of public education has been, and always will be, to inspire in youth a deep appreciation for the basic spiritual and religious values which give meaning to existence, provide the foundations of good character and are guides to a higher order of human conduct."

About the only semblance to rest control remaining in the so-called rent control bill as it came from the house banking and currency committee is the name. As the measure passed the senate it was weak but the house committee merely enlarged these weaknesses and gave sole and autonomous power over rents to local boards. So it is now a "local option" law without any federal authority since right of review is taken away from the housing expediter and is, in the opinion of many, except perhaps the real estate moguls, a farce.

As was predicted in this column months ago, that section of the Taft-Hartley law which prohibited political activity by labor unions and expressions of political opinions by labor newspapers has been declared unconstitutional. The case which had president Phil Murray of the CIO under indictment will go to the supreme court.

Back to the Kitchen

The supercharged issue of whether or not federal taxes on oleomargarine should be repealed was supposed to develop into one of the most historic fights since the battle of Agincourt, but instead it dropped dead before it even got up to the line of scrimmage. The house agriculture committee administered the coup de grace by voting 16 to 10 to shelve all legislation to repeal federal taxes on oleo.

Said Rep. Clifford Hope (Rep.-Kas.): "This kills legislation to repeal these taxes at this session of congress."

Some diehards, however, want to get a bill to the house floor by a discharge petition, but that would require 218 signatures and it is doubtful they could be obtained. Meantime, housewives all over the nation continued to develop lame arms by mixing the color into the margarine themselves.

For no apparent reason except that he doesn't like to live in Washington and is not content with the way his party is running things in his home state, freshman Sen. William E. Jenner of Indiana whose term runs to 1953 plans to run for governor at the coming Republican state convention at Indianapolis. S. senate and urging him to stay in Washington and tend to his knittin'."

Preparedness Program

The crisis in world affairs concerning which the President spoke in his special message to congress almost certainly will embark the government on a huge preparedness program—a program designed not for war but for peace if possible. In debate over the Marshall plan, the senate virtually howled down further Russian appeasement. But several senators urged the government to seek an atmosphere of understanding with Russia.

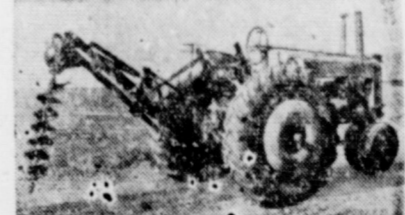

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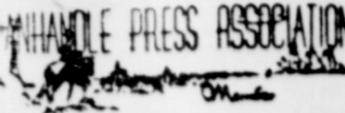

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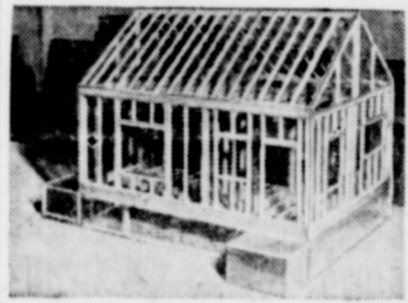
New Device Controls 'Cancer' of Buildings

Pipes Enable Chemical To Reach Termites

Termites, the "cancer" of buildings, now can be controlled. Through all the ages the tiny insect that feasts on wood in homes, farm buildings and other structures has been a constant destroyer. Annual property losses run far into the millions. Ordinary control measures could not get at the intricate tunnels hidden away in difficult and impossible to reach places.

A new device, hailed as an effective means of combatting the destructive pest, was demonstrated at the annual convention of the National Association of Home Builders in Chicago by W. B. Hill of Memphis, Tenn., nationally known as a termite expert.

His method consists of installing a series of slotted pipes at the time of construction in all inaccessible areas, including dirt-filled porches, sun parlors, stoops, steps and fireplaces. Annually a perforated pipe is slipped into the allotted pipes and all hidden areas are treated with a powerful chemical toxic blown

through openings in the pipes.

Hill, who has spent 20 years figuring ways of waging war on the termite, also has devised a display showing live termites at work. Enclosed in glass, his small scale model home has an army of hungry termites actually at work constructing their intricate network of mud tunnels or shelter tubes. It shows the worker, the soldier on guard and the immature, young potential queen who swarms in the spring.

Mahon Says REA Prospects Bright

Farm families who have waited for months or years for the REA line to reach their homes can now take fresh hope, according to a report received from Congressman George Mahon. Last week the House of Representatives by a vote of 199 to 154 passed an Amendment providing for \$175 million in REA loan funds to become immediately available upon approval by the Senate and the President which is expected within three weeks.

The House has also approved an additional \$400 million in loans for the REA to become available on July 1st.

Mahon advises that this represents the most ambitious REA program ever undertaken in the history of the nation. Prospects are that abundant funds for the REA will be available for a period of at least one year. However, there still be delays brought about by the inability of the REA office in Washington to process applications with sufficient speed and the reason that abundant construction materials are not yet on the market. Fortunately in the recent weeks the material situation has definitely improved.

Mahon is a member of the Agriculture Committee and joined with other friends of the REA in Congress in the successful effort to provide additional funds. Such funds are provided in the form of loans to REA Co-ops which are repaid with interest to the Government.

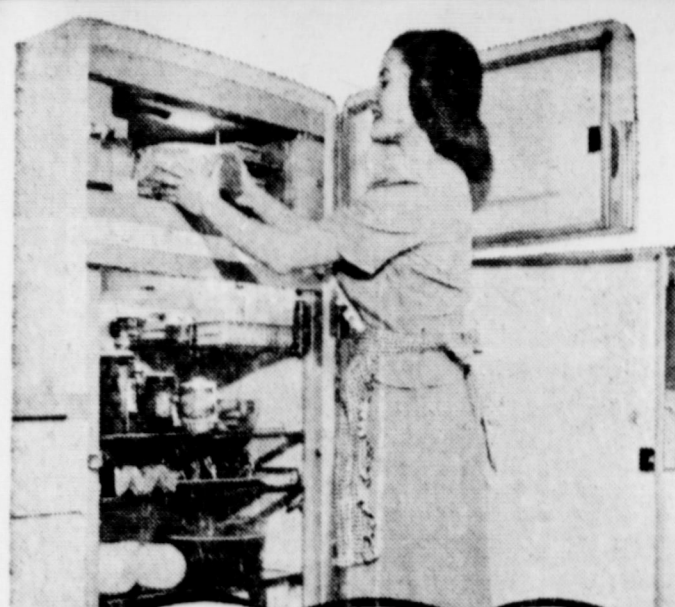

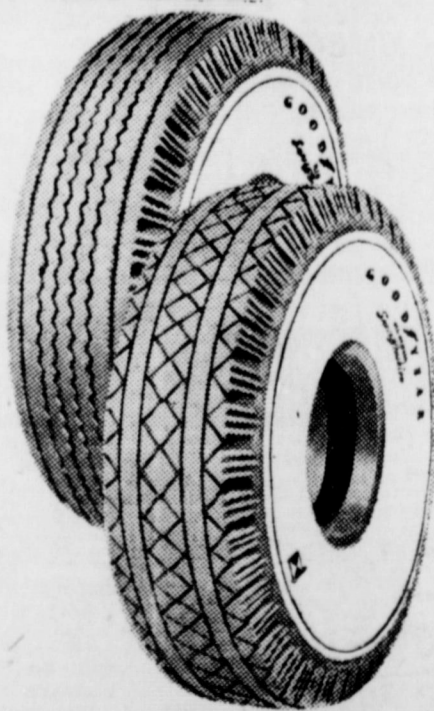
