Extension entomologists suggest to cotton producers that they proceed with stalk destruction such programs as soon as possible after the harvest is completed. Shredding the stalks and plowing the residue under to a depth of five to six inches is one of the best control measures for pink bollworm and for cutting off the food supply for over-wintering boll weevils.

A new chemical finishing process developed by scientists of the U S Department of Agriculture to give cotton improved wash-wear characteristics, is undergoing evaluation tests by the textile finishing industry.

Recent research done at Texas A. M. College indicates that only about three housewives out of each 100 think of the nutritional qualities of eggs when making egg purchases, says Marshall Miller, extension poultry marketing specialist.

**IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS**

**THE SHOPPING CART**

Babysitters were hard to find, so Mary Jane decided to take her year old son Billy with her to the supermarket. She placed him in one of the many shopping carts provided by the supermarket which have a seat for young children, and began shopping for groceries. A few minutes later, while Mary Jane was still shopping with Billy in the cart, the seat in which he was sitting came apart, letting him fall to the floor.

Mary Jane brought a legal action against the supermarket for the medical expenses she and her husband had incurred as a result of Billy's fall and resulting injuries. The store manager claimed that the mothers, not the supermarket, were liable for the safety and well-being of children brought into the store and that any injury to Billy was not their fault.

Can the supermarket be held liable? Yes, said the court. The proprietor of business furnishing his customers or invitees with shopping carts or baby strollers must exercise reasonable care in the selection and maintenance of such devices. The storekeeper who invites mothers and children to his establishment for the purpose of selling them his goods is duty bound not to injure them thru the lack of care. The very nature of a device such as a baby stroller or shopping cart calls for particular care in examining them at such intervals as would assure their users of their safety and reliability.

**SCREW-WORM CONTROL PROGRAM SET FOR TEXAS**

A 100-million dollar problem is the immediate threat of an arboviral group of Texans who recently banded together to form the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation. Though its long range goal is the study of all animal health problems, the Foundation's first campaign will be launched against the screwworm, generally considered Public Enemy No. 1 by livestock producers throuth the southwest.

Incorporated as a non-profit organization by the State of Texas, the Foundation will be supported by voluntary contributions and governed by a 15-man board of trustees. Foundation spokesmen said they would employ the sterile fly technique so successfully used in Florida and the Southeast where screwworm control is now almost complete.

**V. A. QUIZ**

Q — Can a veteran be advised as to his general non-medical benefits while he is a patient at a VA hospital?

Q — Are veterans now returning to or entering the service given an opportunity to take out GI life insurance?

A. — No. GI insurance policies are no longer being issued.

Q — I understand patients in VA hospitals must provide their own personal comfort items. What are "comfort items"?

A. — Comfort items are articles an individual normally requires in his everyday needs as shaving cream, tooth brushes, razor blades, hair tonic, etc.

**POISON CONTROL CENTERS OF MUCH BENEFIT**

Austin. — Establishment of a poison control center in Beaumont brings Texas within two of the recommended number for a state of this size and population density. Eighty percent of the state's population is now covered. The Beaumont center, operating in the emergency room of the Baptist hospital there, brings to 29 the number of such centers now in existence in Texas. Twenty two are said to be needed to cover the state adequately.

State Health officials would like to see an additional center established in the Panhandle and one in the far northeastern section of the state. All major population areas would then be within economical telephone calls of the life saving services available thru them.

The centers, operating under local physician's guidance, are kept open around the clock for seven days a week. They are designed to answer inquiries direct from the physician attending the patient, rather than from patients themselves.

A center works like this — A curious child eats some shoe polish. His mother calls her family physician but he has no way of knowing the chemical content of the polish. He immediately calls the nearest Poison Control Center and reports the shoe polish by brand name. A center personnell quickly check an index card file and advise the physician of its toxic ingredients and the antidote.

The nearest such center is the Odessa Poison Control Center in Medical Center Hospital, 600 West Fourth St., Phone FE7-7311

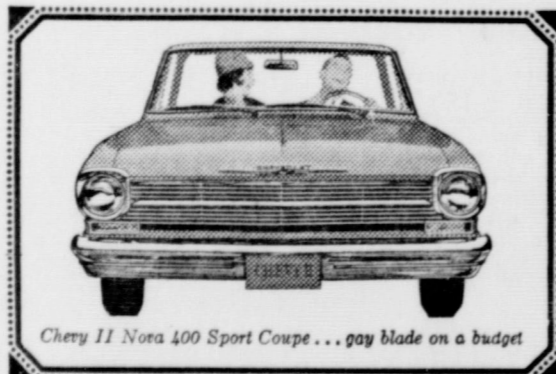

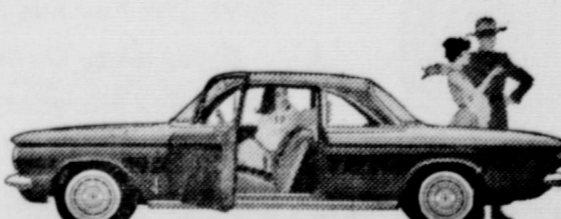

**PLAN TO REMOVE POSSIBLE RADIO ACTIVITY FROM MILK**

College Station — Agricultural researchers have developed a milk purification process they hope they will never have to use. This process would be used to remove the strontium 90 that would contaminate milk following a nuclear attack. The process was worked out jointly by the Agricultural Research Service, Atomic Energy Commission and U. S. Public Health Service. It is now being tested on a pilot plant basis at USDA's Beltsville Research Center, reports A. M. Meekma, extension dairy husbandman.

The pilot plant studies are based on laboratory studies which showed that ion-exchange resins are effective in removing radioactive strontium from milk containing an increased amount of acid. In these basic studies, scientists charged a resin with calcium, sodium, potassium and magnesium, the major metals in milk. Milk which had been experimentally contaminated with radioactive strontium was passed thru columns containing this resin. Free strontium moved from the milk and displaced the ionized metals on the resin. This ion exchange occurs because the resin attracts strontium more strongly than it attacks other metals.

Because only about 60 percent of strontium in milk occurs in free form, citric acid was added to the active element. This enabled the resin to attract and remove 98 percent of the strontium from the milk. After the strontium is removed, the milk is treated with dilute potassium hydroxide to neutralize the acid, then pasteurized and homogenized.

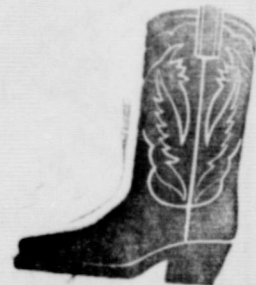

**DATES SET FOR HOLIDAY MAIL FOR OVERSEAS**

The period November 1 to 20 has been designated for mailing of Christmas parcels by surface transportation to members of our Armed Forces overseas. For Air mail the period is December 1 to 10. All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard or strong double faced corrugated fiberboard. All fiberboard boxes should be wrapped in heavy paper and tied with a strong cord. Sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent loosening of the articles within the package. A slip showing list of contents and addressee should be enclosed in the parcel. Addressee must be legible and complete and should be prepared by typewriter or pen and ink.

The expanded rural housing program, authorized by the Housing Act of 1961 became effective on October 15. To be eligible for a loan under the new law, an applicant must own a farm or a housing site in a rural area or in a small rural community of not more than 2,500 population. He must be without decent, safe and sanitary housing, be unable to obtain the needed credit from other sources and be without sufficient resources to provide the necessary housing on his own. And he must have or be able to obtain enough income to meet payments on all his debts and also take care of other expenses. Loans are available thru Farmers Home Administration county offices.

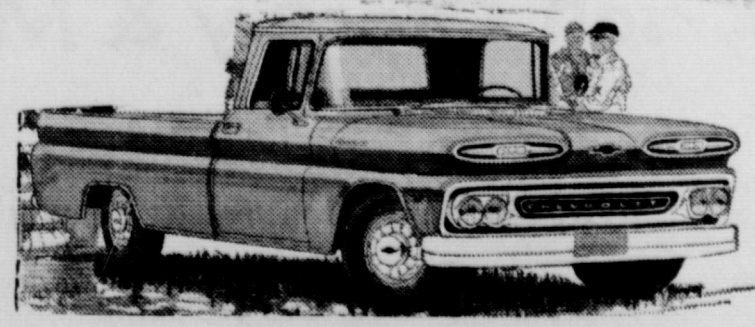
