A Clean Community

Every Texas family needs the assurance that it is living in a clean and healthy community, according to Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health. The family needs the assurance that when disease threatens, there will be a local health agency ready to combat it on a community-wide basis. Texas now has 47 full time city and county health units covering 57 counties. These 57 counties have 62 percent of the State's population.

An adequately staffed and financed local health department provides six basic services to the citizens of the town or county. It keeps public health statistics, controls communicable diseases, promotes maternal and child health, enforces environmental sanitation, operates a public health laboratory and works to educate the community for better health. Each local health department will of necessity differ from others and the most effective public health program must be "tailor made" to fit the particular health needs and problems of its own community.

At present 197 counties in Texas do not have full time health protection. Dr. Holle has as one of his goals complete health protection in every county of the state. Some counties now have a large enough population to provide this service but for counties having sparse population, two or more could pool their resources and have the advantage of up to date public health methods.

Dr. Holle points out that giving full time health service to the entire state will require a substantial increase in the expenditure of funds for public health purposes. In his opinion this is the best investment any community can make. Although great strides have been made in maternal and infant health and in disease prevention, Texans cannot be content with less than complete eradication of preventable deaths. A state in which local health services are available everywhere is an important step toward this goal.

Two Teachers Resign

Supt. Weldon Skinner said Monday that Mr and Mrs. Bill Gravitt, long-time teachers here, have resigned as of Nov. 11th. The Board of Trustees expressed their deep regret as did Mr. Skinner.

Mr and Mrs. Gravitt came to the local school after teaching a number of years in Oklahoma. They began here in fall of 1951 under Supt. John Morris. The following year the school promoted Mr. Gravitt to principal of the Junior High Division which position he has held since.

A Great Loss

Mrs. Gravitt is a 7th grade teacher and is an expert in remedial reading having assisted numerous failing students to become "A" students (including one of the ed.'s children). She is a teacher of such ability as not to be easily replaced.

Mr. Gravitt is a natural born leader of youth and under his direction his division has held to a high scholastic standard. He is an unusually efficient teacher who expects the best work from teachers and students alike.

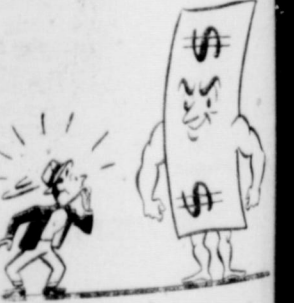

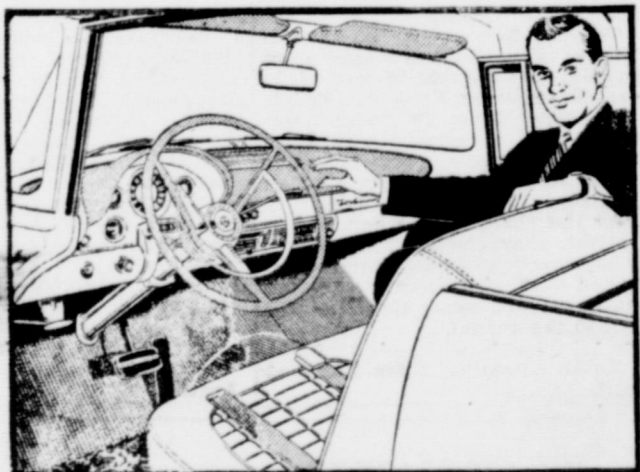

Some people react to the pressure of modern life like a stick of soft pine reacts to a wood rasp. You probably recall days when an unexpected event, an accident or a brush with the boss, tied your stomach in a knot. You were suffering, the State Health Department says, from one of the more common forms of indigestion: nervous tension and excitement. The stomach, the experts say, is largely controlled by the involuntary nervous system. You get keyed up, your stomach over-secrates, and you feel the pain. Actually, the Department points out, there are many directly traceable causes of indigestion. Lack of sleep or exercise, improper diet, and similar artificial conditions can bring it on.

You've heard the old saw about one man's meat being another man's poison. It's literally true. Even healthful and nutritious foods may rub you wrong. They contain organic acids which upset the balance of your particular stomach. Your favorite fruit may contain malic-acid, oxalic-acid, or citric acid. One or more of these may give you trouble, causing ungentlemanly or unlady-like belching. Or the degree of ripeness of a fruit or vegetable may cause fermentation in the stomach, bringing on unpleasant results. Condiments or strongly flavored foods are other causes of indigestion. They often cause the stomach to secrete too much hydrochloric acid. In normal people the stomach neutralizes what it over-secrates, but people with ulcers suffer painful "indigestion."

Greasy foods are particularly troublesome to people with malfunctioning gall bladders or liver diseases. Tannic-acid can be found in three of the most commonly used hot drinks. And here's the last straw: Even water, if you drink lots of it, may start your stomach churning and pouring out its digestive juices.

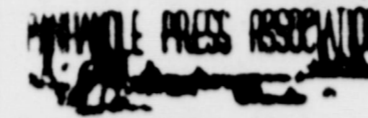
