Gail and Borden County's 50th anniversary celebration, rained out two weeks ago, was held Saturday as a pronounced success.

Forty-two hundred people turned through the gates at noon for the big free barbecue. Visitors came from Fort Worth, Dallas, Lubbock, Abilene, and from as far west as Roswell, New Mexico, and hundreds moved in from counties adjacent to Borden.

A gigantic parade Saturday morning, led by the 75-piece Lamesa high school band, included floats, carrying girls and women attired in costumes worn a half century ago.

Gerald Buchanan exhibited the grand champion calf of the livestock show, and Weldon Street the reserve champion.

Festivities continued far into the night, carrying the theme of tribute to Gail Borden, publisher of Texas' first newspaper, the Telegraph and Texas Register, and patriot and citizen for whom the city of Gail and county of Borden were named.

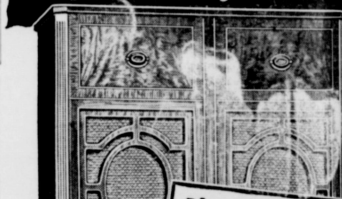

British Give Up All Gold

Request of Government
LONDON.—Answering the call of the government for foreign exchange, gold, coins and bullion, thousands of persons have entered the bank of England to give up articles ranging from \$50,000 in bar gold to American dollar gold piece. Even statuettes, metal paperweights and ashtrays are being taken through the impressive portals of the bank. Pink-coated bank messengers are directing all persons to such offerings to the foreign exchange department.

Some people, apparently guided by their conscience, have arrived with skeletons full of French centimes, ten lire and Scandinavian ore. Quinies have been received from persons who have coins attached to their watch-chains, necklaces and belts. All have been told to surrender such coins, no matter what sentimental value may be.

San Antonio Rico plans to grow all of quinine and much of the vanilla required in the United States. At present time this country must import its entire supply of both from foreign countries.

Entered as second class mail matter September 23, 1923 at the post office at O'Donnell, Texas, under the act of March 3, 1879.

Eighteen years ago the first issue of the Index appeared, in the midst of the fuss and stew incident to getting a complete newspaper plant installed. It looked very much like this week's Index, a little 5-column number.

This week another plant is being set up to print the Index at home again, so partly through sentiment and largely because the big press is not yet ready for work, we are publishing a small Index like the first one.

Next week, however, the plant will be all set up, and the Index will again be its usual size.

For some nine years the Index has been something of an orphan, being printed in out-of-town shops because your editor was not financially in a position to have a plant here. Through a fortunate series of incidents, we have been able to secure the use of such a plant, thus enabling us to realize a dream of many years' standing.

Under dire threats from the doctor that we must take things more easily for some time, we have secured the services of a competent printer who will look after the mechanical end of the business and do a lot of the running around for us.

The Index office is being moved from its old home in the bank building to the shop quarters on the east side of the square, and you are cordially invited to come in and visit us. In making the move, we wish to thank Mr. Shoemaker at the bank for the friendly advice and assistance he has always accorded us; without this backing on numerous occasions we would hardly have known what to do. We also wish to thank our readers and advertisers for their forbearance and kindness during our recent illness, and to assure you that we will make up for that apparent 'falling down on the job!'

To Canada's War Effort

VANCOUVER, B. C. — Canada's railways are well able to meet the stress of war and will help to make the war effort of Canada effective, both by movements of troops and military supplies and by supplying the transportation needs of what has been spoken of as the industrial front, S. W. Fairweather, chief of research and development of Canadian National railways, declared in an address before the Vancouver Board of Trade.

Canada is a splendid industrial base for the Allies and her railways form a vital link in the lines of communications, Fairweather said.

When the "going was tough" for four 50-ton, four 100-ton, and several 50 and 15-ton jacks, workmen speeded progress by rubbing the rails, along which the structure was being guided, with cakes of yellow soap.

'Doubly-Ironized' Iron

Is Sought in Atmosphere

MOUNT LOCKE, TEXAS.—Astronomers at the University of Texas as new McDonald observatory here are assisting in a two-month search of the heavens for a new "doubly-ironized" iron, sought by Professor F. Swings, of Belgium.

Dr. Otto Struve, director of McDonald observatory, said that Swings will use the university's equipment for further study of the new modification of iron, which may be widely distributed in the atmospheres of the stars.

"Professor Swings' study (at the University of Liege, Belgium) disclosed a special modification of the chemical element, iron, not previously known," said Dr. Struve. "It is designated as doubly-ironized iron, with a chemical symbol of FE II."

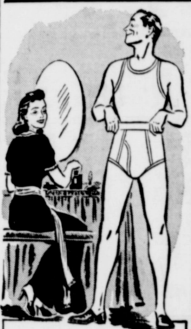
Old Harvard Building,

Landmark Is Modernized

CAMBRIDGE, MASS.—Massachusetts hall, the oldest college building in the United States, is being modernized for use of Harvard officials.

President James B. Conant and his aides will move into the ivy-covered building as soon as inter-office communicating systems and other modern equipment are installed.

Built in 1720, the structure has been used as a dormitory since the Revolution when American soldiers were billeted there. Despite the modern touch, the hall still retains some of its Colonial architectural atmosphere.

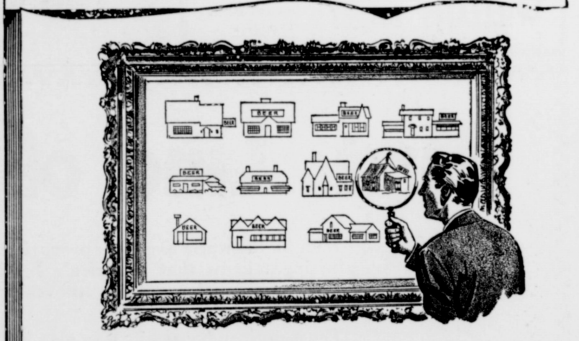

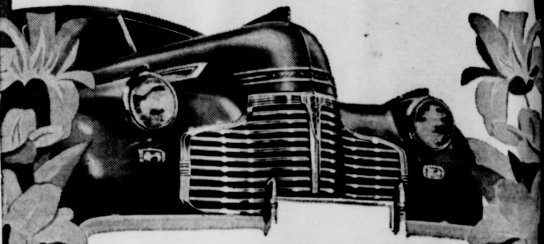
