Rites Read For H. L. Hohn, Pioneer Of Area

O'Donnell and the area Friday paid its sorrowful last respects to all that remains mortal to one of its most loved men, Henry Lee Hohn, a pioneer farmer of this area and a very local friend of the town.

Services were read at the First Baptist Church at 2 p. m. with the Rev. O. O. Holliday officiating. Mr. Hohn died at his home 2 miles south of town Wednesday morning at 9:55 after an illness of a few weeks. He celebrated his 80th birthday Christmas day.

Born Dec. 25th, 1873 in Bastrop County, Texas, the son of Mr and Mrs. L. Hohn, he was wed to Miss Tina Carson Dec. 25th, 1900 at Cheasapeake. His wife preceded him in death Jan. 14, 1950. Mr and Mrs. Hohn moved here Jan. 16, 1916 running the old hotel here for about 15 months. After that he moved to the home place south of town. (The hotel was a historic landmark here until being dismantled about 6 years ago)

Led A Busy Life
Always interested in his community, he was a school trustee of the former O. K. district, later an O'Donnell trustee. He was a Dawson county commissioner of Pct. 2 for two terms, 1929-1932. He was a charter member of the Farmer's Co-op here and a director for 10 years or so. He also was a charter member of the O'Donnell Masonic Lodge and was its first Junior Warden in 1922 and took a part in the erection of the present Masonic hall. As a youth he gave his heart to his Lord uniting with the Presbyterian church.

He is survived by two sons, V. B. Hohn of here and L. J. of Chama, N. M., a brother, Victor Hohn of Liberal, Kan., a sister Mrs. Anna Selfers of Louisville, Ky and two grandchildren, Harold Hohn of Ft. Bliss and Mrs. Elaine Pearson of here.

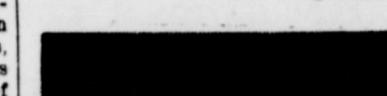

Vernon Townes Seeks District Att'y Post

Vernon Townes, Terry County Attorney, this week announced his candidacy for District Attorney of the 106 Judicial District.

from the University of Texas Law school. He was elected Terry County Attorney in 1950.

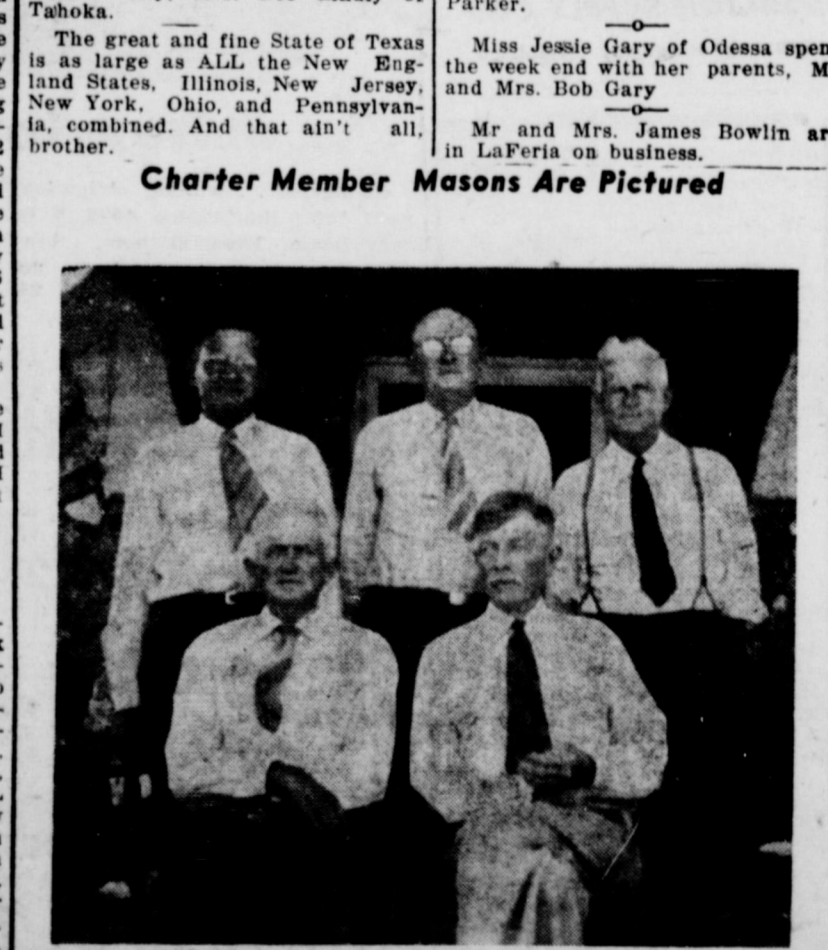
Tax Collector Coming

Judge W. M. Mathis Seeks Re-Election, Co. Judge

To Voters Of Lynn County:
In announcing for re-election to the office of County Judge of Lynn County, I first wish to thank you for giving me the opportunity of serving you in this capacity for the past 10 years. I am sure that I have made many mistakes but I have tried to conduct the office in a courteous, efficient and economical manner.

Although the finances of the county are not in as good condition as would like to see them, I believe you will agree that they have made substantial gain since on January 1st, 1951 this balance was \$72,251.91. I do not propose to claim all of the credit for this but I do feel that the lead of the county government plays a big part in the management of the county finances.

During my tenure of office we have been successful in getting some much needed paved roads constructed by the State Highway Department. This new construction being some 12 miles and there has been some 29 miles of the old pavement taken over by the Highway Department for maintenance. We are now in the process of obtaining right of way for the Highway Department to construct some 12 miles of new pavement and to take over about 4 1-2 miles of the old pavement for maintenance. The contract is to be let on this in March of this year. The Highway Department has also approved 6 additional miles of new construction and about 9 1-2 miles of old pavement to be taken over for maintenance. The contract on this job will be let this fall.

I thought I would give you some of the accomplishments since I have been your County Judge and in view of same, if you feel that I have made you a hand, I solicit your continued support.
