Ran Early Hotel Here Born Dec. 25th, 1873 in Bastrop County, Texas, the son of Mr and Mrs. L. Hohn, he was wed to Miss Tina Carson Dec. 25th, 1990 at Cheapside. His wife preceded him in death Jan. 14, 1950. Mr and Mrs. Hohn moved here Jan. 16, 1916 running the old hotel here for about 15 months. After that he moved to the home place south of town. Always interested in his community, he was a school trustee of for two terms, 1929-1932. He was a charter member of the Farmer's Co-op here and a director for 10 years or so. He also was a charter member of the O'Donneell Masonic Lodge and was its first Junior Warden in 1922 and took a part in the erection of the present Masonic hall.
