Baird City Council To Change Bonds To C. D.'s

The Baird City Council met at 7 p.m. on July 14 at the City Hall to discuss six items on the council's agenda for the evening.

The first act of business discussed was the city's general account fund. As the city is short of funds to meet its liabilities, the motion was carried to pay the outstanding bills as the cash is available. All of the council members present were in favor.

The Council then set a fee for the use of the landfill. The current fee for other landfills is \$25.00 for contractor type use and \$5.00 for truck use. The proposed charge by the City will be \$3.00 per dump truck load and \$5.00 for cattle trailer use and contractor use. All citizens are still authorized to dump free of charge.

The council also set an established charge for hauling brush off. The rate is \$5.00 per half load and \$10.00 for a full load, with the possibility that in the future, 2 days a month will be set aside to haul all brush off. This rate charge will help compensate for man power hours and truck use.

All of the council members were in favor of giving a refund of insurance premium money to two of the city workers. In August of 1978 the two employees

tried to join with a group policy agent, but the agent was unable to add them to the insurance, yet the premiums were deducted from their pay anyway. The amounts owed to the men were \$310.50 and \$312.50.

Mayor Brame discussed transferring the city's 3500 in series H Bonds which draw 6% interest, into C.D.'s which pay 9.5% interest. At this time the city has a total of 10 funds, 1 of which is the general account and only 1 of these accounts

is drawing interest. The motion was made to contact the Merchant Bank for permission to change the bonds into C.D.'s for the 9% interest and a suggestion was made to lump all the funds together into C.D.'s, yet carry the funds in the books singly. Also, quarterly reports will be asked for from the City secretary in the months of Jan., April, July and October.

The mayor of Clyde was unable to get the contract from their city attorney, who was out of town for the shared use of the landfill. The mayor of Clyde has promised that the contract will be available in time for our City attorney to look over it, before the next scheduled council meeting, which will be July 28, at 7 p.m. at City Hall.

New Phone Exchange Scheduled For August

Installation is complete and testing of Continental Telephone's new switching center in Baird is underway. Plans now call for the computer-like machine to begin switching calls in August. An exact date will be announced when initial testing is complete. At the same time the present electro-mechanical switching office will be retired from service.

Most customers within the city have individual line service. The new machine will automatically identify these numbers for billing purposes. An operator will come on the line briefly to obtain the billing number of party line users.

The new switching machine is actually a computer with stored program. Solid-state components have no moving parts

which reduces maintenance and improves reliability. The computer has an on-going test program which looks for faulty circuits within the switch. Should it find one, it automatically reroutes calls to other circuits and alerts technicians to the problem by printing a message on an electric typewriter which is a part of it.

Touch tone phones will be available to customers after the changeover, according to the Alan Armstrong, Customer Services Manager for Continental Telephone's mid-state area. Pushbutton calling is faster than dialing and most people find it more accurate. Armstrong advises telephone users to call the Baird Customer Service Center for details on the new service.

Callahan County has gained site for a proposed 1,800-foot wildcat in the area three miles west of Cross Plains.

It is Claudell Joy, Clyde, No. 1 Mark Adair, located on a 291-acre lease.

Drillsite is 137 feet from the south and 2,237 feet from the east lines of F.C. Catonet Survey 2, A-112.

Howard R. Jones, operating from Albany, filed applications to drill two

Callahan County Regular Field projects one mile southeast of Baird.

Each venture is located on a 480-acre lease and slated for 1,000 feet.

No. 1-J-C Hatchett will be drilled 656 feet from the south and 150 feet from the east lines of Section 19, D&DAL Survey.

Location for No. 2-J-C Hatchett is 2,490 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the west lines of Section 24, D&DAL Survey.

Hospital Joins Attack On Rising Costs

NOTICE OF CITY SALE ELECTION

An Ordinance by the City of Baird, Texas, calling an election for the purpose of voting upon the sale of the Baird Municipal Light Plant and its distribution system; enacting provisions incident and relating to the subject and purpose of this ordinance; and declaring an emergency.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Baird:

SECTION I. That it is in the best interest of the City of Baird to determine the wishes of the people whether to sell its municipal electric system and due to the energy situation, an emergency is created in order to promote the best interest of the people.

SECTION II. That an election is hereby ordered to be held on Saturday, the 9th day of August, 1980, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified voters who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, either during the regular period of rendition or prior to this date:

Resolved that the City of Baird, Pursuant To Current Negotiations, Sell Its Municipal Electric System to the West Texas Utilities Company for \$248,224.00 in Cash Payable on the Date of Sale, Which shall be after Approval by a Majority of the Qualified Voters of the City of Baird and Approval by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

SECTION III. That the election shall be held at the City Hall in Baird, in Callahan County, Texas, and D. Heldton is hereby appointed Presiding Judge with instructions and authorization that she shall appoint three necessary clerks to assist her.

SECTION IV. That said election shall be held under the provisions of an ordinance in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same during the conventional rendition period or prior to this date, whichever is later, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION V. That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A.T.S. Election Code and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"For The Sale of the Municipal Electric System to

the West Texas Utilities Company for \$248,224.00 in Cash Payable on the Date of Sale"

"Against The Sale of the Municipal Electric System to the West Texas Utilities Company for \$248,224.00 in Cash Payable on the Date of Sale"

As to the foregoing proposition, each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the proposition submitted.

SECTION VI. That notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this Ordinance, at the top of which shall appear the words, "Notice of City Sale Election". Said notice shall be posted at the City Hall not less than twenty days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and published on the same date in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in the City of Baird, the first of said publication to be made not less than twenty full days prior to the date set for said election.

SECTION VII. That the public importance of adequate electricity constitutes an emergency and an imperative public necessity that this Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force immediately upon its passage, all Ordinances and Charter Rules governing the effective date of any ordinances are hereby suspended and this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its final passage, and it is so ordained.

Adopted on First Reading this the 7th day of July, 1980.

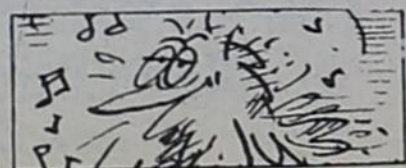
