FALL BUSINESS IS GOOD

1.15 In. Rain Slows Harvest

Fall rains last week slowed the rapid harvest with farm work reaching a stand-still Wednesday thru Friday. Rains were general and in places over the area, falls were as high as 2 1-2 inches. Here the moisture was measured at 1.15 inches by Ben Moore.

Locally 5201 bales of cotton have been ginned and much of the top crop of the area has been pulled with the second pulling coming up soon. It is expected that much of the later maturing lint will be machine harvested after a killing frost expected in mid-November.

Business was very good thru most of last week but Saturday was below par as much of the shopping was done prior to Saturday.

As is usual in this area the cotton is showing a higher production per acre than at first expected. Grain is also surprising in production.

The cotton harvest is estimated at being 40 percent completed.

Farmers Featured In State Farm Paper

Ed. note: the following was taken from the Paymaster Farm Paper published at Houston.)

Ralph Gary's 540 Paymaster-fed cage layers are housed in one of the finest laying houses in the country. Eventually the house will take care of 900 layers.

The house, a specially constructed Quonset, has big doors at each end and evelids on each side for ventilation. In the roof there are pieces of transparent plastic to let in the light. The roof was widened by adding a straight cross-piece at the top.

Last fall, Ralph, who lives near O'Donnell, decided to further diversify his farming operation. He looked around for various other farming operations to get into. Then he saw a cage laying operation.

"The positive way of taking care of them appealed to me, but I still wasn't sure. That's why I built such an elaborate laying house. I knew I could use it for something else in case the cage-layers didn't work out."

Mr. Gary has a different type cage from many operations. His cages are the same size as other double cages, but they have a recessed section in the shape of a "V" in the back where the water trough runs. "This gives me a little more room when I want to clean the trough," he says, "and still it does no harm to the chickens."

Strangely enough, one of the easiest things Ralph had to do was to put the hens into the cages. "I just slipped in one nite, picked them up, opened the cage doors and put them in," he says.

Besides the caged layers, the Gary's have a floor operation taken care of by his wife and mother. Ralph's little boy, Steve, aids with the cage operation.

Ralph, who is a pilot and owns his plane, also has several hundred acres of cotton and feed.

Glen Clark of O'Donnell, Texas is a happy Paymaster customer. "Last January I had some extra money and wanted to invest it. After a lot of study I decided that I could probably get the best return on a cage laying operation," Glen says.

Colds Come With Fall

With the advent of fall, and colds becoming prevalent, Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, makes the following suggestions as to ways by which these seasonal illnesses may be warded off, or at least may be gotten under control before they do any serious damage.

Keep as fit as possible. Dress according to the weather, indoors and out of doors. Put on a heavier suit when a cold snap comes. Use a raincoat, overshoes, and umbrella on rainy days. Change as quickly as possible into dry clothes if you are caught in a drenching down-pour.

Look up your supply of sweaters and have them ready for use on these first chilly days. Get out some other heavy clothing and warm bed coverings at the same time.

Eat simple nourishing food. Drink plenty of water. Take some exercise out of doors, every day. Get the necessary amount of rest.

If you are caught in the clutches of a cold, unawares, don't treat it lightly. It may turn into something very serious, if neglected. The quickest way to get over a cold or, to bring it under control is to go to bed, keep warm, eat lightly, drink plenty of water and fruit juices and at the slightest sign of fever, send for your doctor and stay in bed until he feels that it is safe for you to get up and get out again.

And remember colds are very contagious. Cold-producing germs are scattered far and wide whenever the victim of a cold coughs or sneezes. They are likely to be found on anything the victim touches. If you are the victim, keep your germs to yourself. Have your own towels and wash cloths, your own drinking glass and dishes - and be sure that they are adequately sterilized with hot - very hot - water and soap after you have used them.

Keep all supplied with paper handkerchiefs, dispose of them properly after they have been used.




