Facts For Farmer

Now that the crops are laid by many farmers are turning their attention toward Federl tax filing ime in January, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Aubbock Social Security Office.

Mr. Hutton explained that many farmers will be required to file

wo types of tax returns in January, 1956, for the 1955 calendar year: 1) the farmer who is self- emloyed will be required to file an income tax report and pay his social security tax if net earnings for 1955 are at least \$400 and the gross income is at least \$800 nd (2) the farmer who has paid eash wages of \$100 or more to any employee in agricultural labor in 1955 will be required to file a return on Form 943, listing the name nd social security account of each uch employee.

Mr. Hutton pointed out that employees of the Social Security Administration are not authorized to advise or aid any taxpayer in he preparation of a tax return. He mphasized that such assistance as seeded should be secured from the District Director of Internal Revnue or someone who specializes in iling tax returns. However, any question as to benefits payable under the Social Security law will be gladly answered by his office, Mr. Hutton concluded.

The mother of the New Year's baby will be better off too. Her counterpart of 1940 ran a death risk 7 times greater than today's mother runs during the birth process. Improvements in maternal care makes the difference.

And finally, it will be easier for the physician who attends the birth of the New Year's baby to keep up with the details than it was




