Friday nite the greatly improved, spirited Eagles will tangle with the New Home Leopards in what promises to be a high scoring game. Last Friday nite the Eagles edged away from Cooper 19 to 13. The score favored Cooper 13 to 12 until the last three minutes of play when O'Donnell pulled the game out of the fire.

The scoring drive was a 50 yard march by the victors, climaxed by a two yard plunge by sophomore back Jerald Barton. Ben Richburg added the extra point.

O'Donnell scored first with a 55 yard run by Half Back Leo Bairrington on the second play of the game. Cooper pulled even later in the opening session, springing wing back Donald Crooks loose on a 25 yard triple reverse from their spread formation. O'Donnell's Barton returned the ensuing kick-off 82 yards to the one yard line and Half Back Ben Richberg scored on the next play.

Road Bond Election Is Saturday

Judge W. M. Mathis said this week that the Lynn Co. Commissioners Court has a plan whereby the \$200,000 bond issue for purchase of right of way for making U. S. 87 a four lane divided pavement may be voted without raising the county's tax rate. Property owning taxpayers of the county will vote on the proposed bond issue this Saturday, Sept. 24th at the school building.

As there is a surplus building up in 1946 Road Bond Sinking Fund, he says the Commissioners Court

can next year reduce the tax rate from the present 75c per \$100 valuation to 55c or a reduction of 20 cents. The proposed new issue will require a tax of 20 cents per \$100 valuation. The saving on the old issue would be sufficient to take care of the proposed new issue of \$200,000 to acquire right of way thru Lynn Co and the over-all county tax rate could be maintained at the present \$1.55 rate.

Folks are urged to keep in mind that the voting is this Saturday.

Rites Read For Jim Stokes

Funeral services for James Henry Stokes, 50, long time farmer who lived 3 miles west of here, who was found dead of a gunshot wound about 11:30 a. m. Wednesday of last week were read Thursday afternoon at 4 p. m. at Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel in Lamesa. The Rev. Ernest D. Stewart, Jr., pastor of the local First Baptist Church, officiated and burial was in O'Donnell Cemetery.

Mr. Stokes was found dead in his car on a farm road 12 miles northwest of Seminole shortly before noon Wednesday. L. H. Sims, a county employe who was grading the road, found the body. A 12-gauge shotgun was in the car and his hands rested on the gun, said Justice of Peace, R. P. Kelly, who conducted an inquest.

Mr. Stokes was born March 3, 1895 at Athens. He had spent almost all of his life here and in this vicinity. He never married. He was a member of the local First Baptist Church and was a Mason.

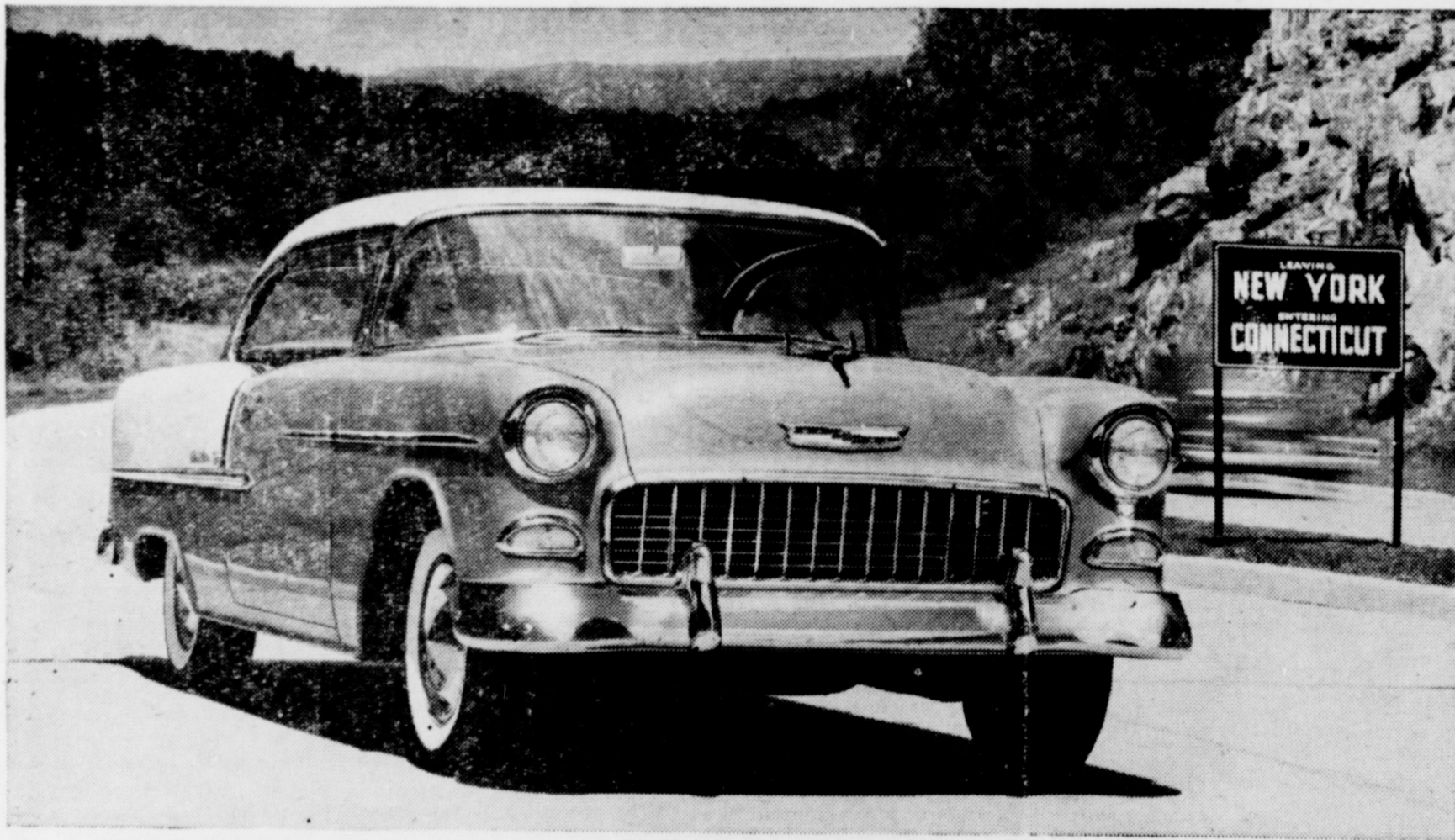

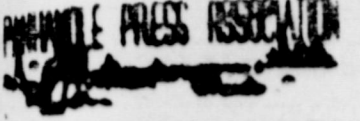

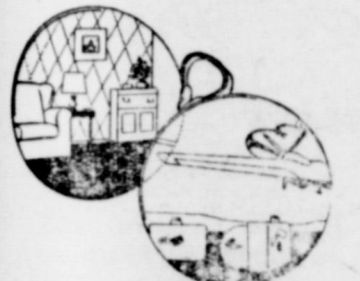

SEES NO VALUE IN URANIUM DIRT FOR HEALTH

Austin — The increasing number of uranium dirt and sitting houses in Texas are getting frowns of disapproval from the State Department of Health. Health Commissioner Henry A. Holle says the meaning value of dirt containing minute amounts of uranium "isn't worth the time it takes a man to cover his aching feet."
 For the past six months the so-called treatment centers have been cropping up at various points until there are now dozens of them. Somewhat the idea was started that the alleged radioactivity in the dirt was a cure-all for assorted aches and pains.
 "Our industrial hygiene engineers have thoroughly checked 16 samples of supposedly radioactive dirt, and in no case has the concentration been more than that of normal background radiation."
 Said Engineer Martin Wukasch: "The granite in the State Capital is more radioactive than any of the 16 samples. I've taken Gieger counter readings to prove it."
