Drilling Contract Let For 3rd Lynn Well

Contract was closed Wednesday for the drilling of another wildcat oil well in Lynn county. The new well is to be made at a location five miles west and one mile south of New Home, according to Deen Nowlin, who has assembled a block of leases in that locality.

Mr. Nowlin entered into a contract Wednesday with the H. F. Wilcox Oil & Gas Co. of Tulsa, Oklahoma, for the drilling of a hole 5,500 feet deep at this location, which is 990 feet north and 330 feet east of the southwest corner of section 134, block 12, E. L. & R. R. R. Co. survey, work to begin not later than March 1. The weather permitting the drillers will begin moving material to the location this week.

The H. F. Wilcox Company is a strong one, and there can be but little doubt but that the work will proceed with all due dispatch and that a thorough test will be made.

Mr. Nowlin is of the opinion that there is going to be quite a bit of activity in the matter of exploring for oil in this county this year.

As stated in these columns two weeks ago, the Honolulu Oil Corporation recently farmed out to R. H. Gill of Midland half of its block of 12,000 acres lying east and southeast of Wilson for a deep test. Mr. Gill has announced that he will begin a test well within a few weeks on the Walter May farm in this block.

Jack Leedy and others interested in the shallow test which is being drilled by Nordyke & Nordyke on a location eight miles north of town express great confidence in the existence of a shallow pool in that locality.

Lloyd Shoemaker will leave Sunday for Abilene, where he will enroll at McMurry college for the spring term.

Gas Company Announces Rate Reductions

West Texas Gas Company announced another reduction in gas rates effective with January gas bills. The reduction in rates will benefit all Domestic and Commercial users of gas.

Under the new rate schedule, the minimum bill of \$1.25 per month including two thousand cubic feet remains the same, and the next 48 thousand cubic feet is reduced from 50 cents to 45 cents per thousand. Each Domestic and Commercial user of gas, using over the minimum bill of \$1.25 per month, will save five cents per thousand cubic feet on the next 48 thousand cubic feet.

The present reduction in rates is the third such reduction made by the West Texas Gas Company to Domestic and Commercial consumers of gas in the past four years. The company commenced the general distribution of gas on its system in the fall of 1927, and just eight years later, in December, 1935 made its first rate reduction. A second rate reduction was made in January, 1937. These reductions have resulted in reducing the minimum bill (which includes the first two thousand cubic feet) from \$1.50 to \$1.25, and in reducing the cost of the next 48 thousand cubic feet from 67½ cents per thousand to 45 cents per thousand. These three reductions represent a total saving to the company's consumers of approximately \$400,000 annually.

The rate reduction now going into effect will mean a saving to gas users each year of approximately \$100,000. This rate reduction is in accord with the policy of West Texas Gas Company to lower the cost of gas to its consumers as often as its earnings will permit, consistent with present high standards of customer service.

The new rate schedule is as follows:
General service rate:
First 2,000 cubic feet per month, \$1.25 (minimum bill).

Next 48,000 cubic feet per month, 45 cents per M cubic feet.

Next 5,000 cubic feet per month, 30 cents per M cubic feet.

Next 400,000 cubic feet per month, 25 cents per M cubic feet, and all over 500,000 cubic feet per month, 20 cents per M cubic feet.

Additional charge, one-ninth of bill will be added if not paid within ten days after date rendered.

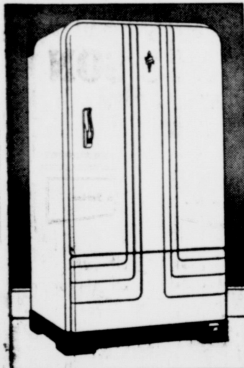

The two big reasons why the diets of our Texas farm families are poor are that many of them have not enough money to spend for food to buy a good diet, and that many lack the ability to choose a good diet no matter how much money is available," stated Miss Maurine McNatt, Home Demonstration Agent at the meeting of the T-Bar Club in the home of Mrs. C. 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West Texas Gas Company announced another reduction in gas rates effective with January gas bills. The reduction in rates will benefit all Domestic and Commercial users of gas.

Under the new rate schedule, the minimum bill of \$1.25 per month including two thousand cubic feet remains the same, and the next 48 thousand cubic feet is reduced from 50 cents to 45 cents per thousand. Each Domestic and Commercial user of gas, using over the minimum bill of \$1.25 per month, will save five cents per thousand cubic feet on the next 48 thousand cubic feet.

The present reduction in rates is the third such reduction made by the West Texas Gas Company to Domestic and Commercial consumers of gas in the past four years. The company commenced the general distribution of gas on its system in the fall of 1927, and just eight years later, in December, 1933 made its first rate reduction. A second rate reduction was made in January, 1937. These reductions have resulted in reducing the minimum bill (which includes the first two thousand cubic feet) from \$1.50 to \$1.25, and in reducing the cost of the next 48 thousand cubic feet from 67½ cents per thousand to 45 cents per thousand. These three reductions represent a total saving to the company's consumers of approximately \$400,000 annually.

The rate reduction now going into effect will mean a saving to gas users each year of approximately \$100,000. This rate reduction is in accord with the policy of West Texas Gas Company to lower the cost of gas to its consumers as often as its earnings will permit, consistent with present high standards of customer service.

The new rate schedule is as follows:
General service rate:
First 2,000 cubic feet per month, \$1.25 (minimum bill)

Next 48,000 cubic feet per month, 45 cents per M cubic feet.

Next 5,000 cubic feet per month, 30 cents per M cubic feet.

Next 400,000 cubic feet per month, 25 cents per M cubic feet, and all over 500,000 cubic feet per month, 20 cents per M cubic feet.

Additional charge, one-ninth of bill will be added if not paid within ten days after date rendered.

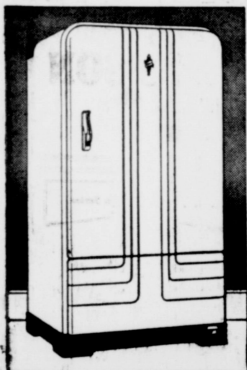
