

Scriptwriter for upcoming Mule-Plex production visits, discusses plans

Even as the script is being written, the stage is already been set for the upcoming Mule-Plex romantic comedy which will incorporate Bailey County history and its natural setting. The production is scheduled to open for five, one-week runs in August. One run will be presented during Mule Days.

Paula Paul, a Bailey County native and current resident of Albuquerque, N.M., has been contracted by the Mule-Plex Production Co. to write the script. Paula paid a visit to Muleshoe on Thursday to "get a feel for the natural and historical setting" at the Muleshoe Heritage Complex, where the production will be presented. She also had an opportunity to visit with people she will be working with.

"This background (The Heritage Complex) will be exciting because we will use the whole scope of the grounds and its natural setting," Paula

said during her visit Thursday.

Paula began working on the script in January and hopes to have it completed by April. The buildings at the Heritage Complex will be used as the backdrop setting for the production, including the old Janes Ranch House and cook house. Although a stage will be erected, the natural settings will serve as the major focus.

Muleshoe resident Alan Finney wrote an original transcript for the play and will serve as the production director and music writer. Paula will write the song lyrics.

Cassidy Cleavinger, a student at Muleshoe Schools, will help Finney write the melodies and scores for the music and Laura Wood is also helping with music.

Finney has a degree in music performance from Texas Tech University.

Finney said that the play is being written with about five or six major characters and all local talent will be used. How-

ever he said there will be plenty of opportunities to use people as dancers, extras, in crowd scenes and in the chorus.

The play will be fictional and will be set in the early 1900s, around the time Muleshoe was established and Bailey County was being incorporated. Bailey County District Clerk Nelda Merriott is serving as a consultant for Paula, helping her with historical research.

"I came to Muleshoe because I also wanted to get an idea of the physical layout of the area so I know what the stage will look like," Paula said, "and so I will know how elaborate I need to be."

A name for the production has not been chosen yet, as Paula said she traditionally waits until a script is completed to title it.

The Mule-Plex Production Co. had been exploring possibilities of an outdoor production for several years and the

City discusses landfill concerns, annexing of airport

During a meeting on Thursday night of the Muleshoe City Council, a discussion was conducted on the current situation with the city's landfill. Muleshoe City Manager Dave Marr explained the landfill situation in an effort to bring the community up-to-date on what is going on.

The City of Muleshoe's

landfill license expires in several months and the council is currently discussing alternatives, including contracting with a company to transport the city's waste. No action has been taken on this item.

Marr said, "We have been talking about the landfill for a good while now and it has been in the newspaper, but we want

to explain some misconceptions some people may have."

Muleshoe Mayor Robert Montgomery said, "There are some people in the public who may not fully understand what we are doing with the landfill and why or what we plan to do. This is a timely way to inform the public."

According to a report given

at the city council meeting Thursday night, the story begins in 1976, when the federal government passed the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA).

In September of 1991, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued revised landfill criteria under Subtitle D of RCRA (The "Subtitle D

Rule").

The Subtitle D Rule made major changes in the way landfills can be operated, designed and permitted. In 1993, the Texas Natural Resource and Conservation Commission (TNRCC), under authority granted to it by the Texas Leg-

City council election set for May 6; 2 seats up for election

The Muleshoe City Council approved a resolution on Thursday night to conduct a city council election on May 6 to elect councilmen to Districts 1 and 2, the current district seats which are up for grabs.

Seats for city councilmen Juan Chavez of Precinct #1 and A.V. Wood of Precinct #2 will be up for election for three-year terms in the May 6 election. Wood resigned from his position last month and will not seek re-election to his

seat on the council.

Signup for a place on the ballot for this election began on Feb. 20 and will continue through March 22 at City Hall. Candidates do not have to live in the district they are seeking election to, but only people

who reside in the district they are running can vote. To be eligible to seek office, one must only be 18 years of age or older and be a registered voter and live in the city of Muleshoe.

The May 6 City Council

Election will be on the same day as local school and hospital board elections.

Also during a city council meeting on Thursday night, the council conducted a public hearing for a proposed annex-

islature, adopted a series of rules which basically implemented Subtitle D in the State of Texas.

What was the effect of these new rules and regulations on landfills in the South Plains of Texas?

In the late 1980s, there were 47 permitted landfills plus numerous casual dump grounds operated by communities, cities and counties in the area of the South Plains Association of Government (SPAG), including Bailey County.

By October of 1995, it appears that there will be only five landfills open in the SPAG region, excluding Bailey County.

This drastic decline in the number of landfills operated in the region was the direct result of the Subtitle D Rules referenced earlier and the implementing regulations and attitudes of the TNRCC. This phenomena of landfill closure has not only occurred in the South Plains but nationwide. Most of the above referenced landfill closures occurred prior to October of 1993. The City of Muleshoe is one of the last of the 43 to close.

What is the city going to do now?

The city is unsure what it is going to do next. The city is in the process of studying the question and hope to be making a decision sometime in the

spring. The city council has delayed making a final decision as long as possible in order to allow the rule-making authorities to finalize the rules concerning municipal waste. As of this point in time, the TNRCC is still developing rules and regulations concerning the composting of the organic content of the mixed solid waste stream.

According to the report at the city council meeting Thursday night, the city believes that composting verses landfilling the organic portion of the waste stream (paper, food waste, yard waste, wood products) offers an opportunity to greatly reduce the amount of landfill materials, but until the city has the opportunity to review the rules and regulations concerning this option, the city is uncomfortable with investing the community's resources in a process which may not work for the community.

The city does intend to provide solid waste services to the residents of Muleshoe in the most cost-efficient manner possible within the rules and regulations as promulgated by the EPA and the TNRCC.

During the discussion on Thursday night, the city council also talked about the purchase of the Crofoot Barrett Farm and annexing of the municipal airport to the city.

Why did the City of Muleshoe purchase the Crofoot Barrett Farm?

The City of Muleshoe purchased the Crofoot Barrett Farm in order to assure a longterm water supply for the City of Muleshoe. This was the primary reason.

It appears, from spot checking existing wells, that the static water table under this property is about 100 feet, leaving approximately 100 feet of saturated thickness in the Ogallala Aquifer at this location.

The water on this property is not strong by traditional standards but it is there and the city plans to develop this resource sometime in the future.

Another consideration in the purchase of these water rights was the fact that the city's big neighbor to the southeast is still acquiring water rights in Bailey County. The City of Muleshoe felt they did not want them to acquire a 5,300 acre tract that the city will need sometime in the future.

The water quality is good where the city has tested it.

Any further questions concerning the city's ongoing discussions of the local landfill and annexing of the airport can be directed to City Hall.

ation of the municipal airport and a strip of land from the existing city limits to the municipal airport. An additional public hearing was scheduled to be held on Friday night as well.

The area the city is seeking to annex is a strip of land one foot wide inside and along the

north right-of-way of U.S. 84 to connect the airport to the existing city limits.

Also on Thursday, the board approved the appointment of the local animal warden as the local health authority in situations involving suspected rabid animals and approved the appointment of Tom Bonds as the city's representative on the

board of directors of the Bailey County Appraisal District.

After some discussion Thursday night, the city council voted to table the electing of a mayor pro-tem to replace Wood. City councilmen Rex Harris and Juan Chavez have expressed interest in the mayor pro-tem position. The election was tabled due to the absence of Harris.

production is finally coming together.

Finney said, "The production will focus on entertaining people first, and then on history."

Paula said, "When I am writing a script, I always try to keep the audience in mind at all time, keeping in mind visual, sound effects, etc. I realize this is not opera or Broadway."

Paula graduated from Three Way High School in 1956 and received a degree in journalism from Eastern New Mexico University in Portales. Her mother was a correspondent for the *Muleshoe Journal* and wrote Three Way News for many years.

Since that time, she has written a number of children's

books, a mystery book, she has written several scripts for outdoor dramas and is also a freelance writer.

Many of her children's books and novels can be found at Muleshoe Public Library. One production Paula wrote was funded by the U.S. Bicentennial Commission and was done in Tome, N.M. She also wrote a historical drama in Spanish and English, which was presented with state funds in New Mexico and wrote a production for a church theater group. Paula also wrote a big outdoor production but never was able to get funding for it.

Paula was chosen to write the upcoming Mule-Plex production after being contacted by Mule-Plex member Pat Prater. Paula was initially asked to do an outline for the

production, but she said she only writes scripts, so she ended up writing the script.

Finney said Mule-Plex hopes to be able to seat an audience of about 200-300 at night.

"We don't want to overcrowd the place," he said.

Also, funds raised from the production will be given to the Muleshoe Heritage Foundation to make renovations on the complex and upkeep historical buildings.

A Man Called Moses and the Glow of Holiness

I always knew he was a saintly man! My friend laughed and pointed to the picture of a respected minister whose photo had appeared in a magazine following an article he had written. For some reason, most of the picture had come out much too dark, but

around the man's face there appeared to be a halo of bright light. There it is, we chuckled, absolute proof of holiness!

Moses probably wouldn't have laughed. No photographic illusion, the glow which emanated from his face when he came down off Mt. Sinai with the Ten Commandments was the real thing! A blessing? In a way. It was the by-product of being in the very presence of God. But the radiant aura beaming from the face of the old lawgiver was also something of a problem. It scared folks!

At first, the people wanted nothing to do with their irradiated leader. That glowing face scared them spitless! Moses

finally was forced to use a veil to cover the dazzling glow which so unnerved his people.

Paul tells us, though, that the real reason the people were so frightened of Moses was not an eye problem so much as a heart problem. The veil over the face of Moses, Paul says, was really a veil over the hard hearts of the people. They could not stand the glow of holiness because of the darkness of their own hearts. Paul writes sadly that for many people "that same veil remains unlifted" (2 Corinthians 3:14).

But Paul doesn't stop there. He reminds us that Moses lifted the veil from his face whenever he was in the presence of the Lord. Therein, Paul assures us, lies the power which will lift the veil of darkness from the hearts of men. "When a man turns to the Lord the veil is removed" and he "reflects as in a mirror the splendor of the Lord" as the Lord transforms him into "His likeness from one degree of glory to another" (2 Corinthians 3:16, 18).

Are we like Moses' frightened followers—cringing and unable to tolerate the glow of holiness? Or have we humbly invited the Lord in His mercy and grace to illumine our lives with the gift of His light?

finalists for the 1992 TNN/Music City News Comedy Award, are one of the first country acts to make it big in Manhattan. New Yorkers at the time didn't know they weren't supposed to like country music. They were accepted as comedians on CBS television and in such unlikely spots as the Latin Quarter, Basin Street East and the Bitter End. But their first out-of-town gig was headlining a show at the Edgewater Beach Hotel in Chicago, where they cut a live album for Columbia Records.

Since then, they have played in every state, from California (Hollywood Bowl, five appearances on the Tonight Show, Hollywood Palace) to New York (Carnegie Hall, the Ed Sullivan Show, the Jackie Gleason Show), plus Las Vegas, Lake Tahoe and Reno with Glen Campbell, Bobbie Gentry, Eddie Arnold, Herb Alpert and the Tijuana Brass, Buck

Owens and Jimmy Dean. They have toured Europe, Canada, Puerto Rico, Arabia and have played on every Willie Nelson Picnic.

In the early 1980's, the Geezinslaws opened for Merle Haggard at Harrah's in Reno and Lake Tahoe. They cut four albums for Capitol Records in Nashville, where they met Ralph Emery and did his all night radio show on WSM.

Ralph became a fan and friend and asked them to appear on his "Pop Goes the Country" television show. This led to their first appearance on Nashville Now in 1986.

In the summer of 1992, the Geezinslaws carved a niche in the field of country rap with their smash crossover hit, "Help, I'm White and I Can't Get Down." The single materialized after Step One Records (SOR) labelmate Clinton Gregory lamented his white boy blues one day in Nashville's SOR office. A video accompa-

nied the hit and the Geezinslaws began getting play on Top 40 stations, such as WAPW in Atlanta.

The Geezinslaws' show will immediately follow the chamber banquet and awards in the Muleshoe High School cafeteria and will be held in the adjacent high school auditorium. Just 300 tickets are available for the banquet and show.

The format of the banquet has changed for 1995 in that a limited number of tickets will be sold for \$50 each. The Chamber board made the decision to use the banquet as its major fund raiser each year to avoid continually seeking donations throughout the year each time a project comes up.

In addition to the Geezinslaws show, the banquet will feature an all-you-can-eat steak and shrimp meal.

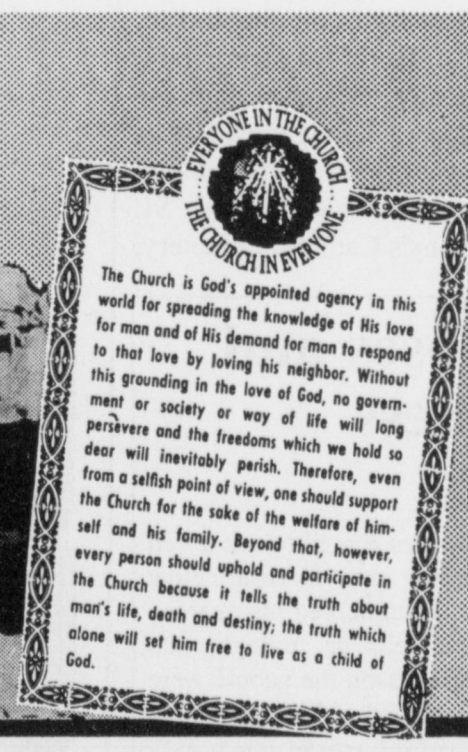

Door prizes were given at the morning meeting. All in attendance were eligible for the drawings. Mikki Bowen and Joe Flores were winners this week.

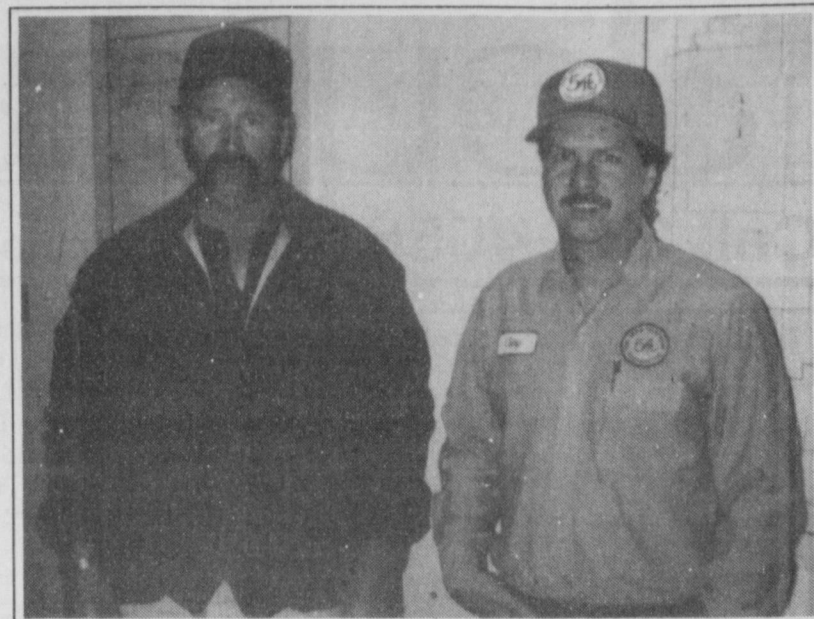

Applications for High Plains Writing Project being accepted

PORTALES - Applications are being accepted for the 1995 High Plains Writing Project, scheduled for June 26 to July 28 on the campus of Eastern New Mexico University.

The High Plains Writing Project was established in 1992 as an affiliate of the National Writing Project Network, and is designed to teach educators ways to improve the quality of their students' writing in all subject areas and at all grade levels.

Representing all levels and

areas of instruction, teachers are selected each year to participate as Fellows based on a written essay and a personal interview. Successful applicants receive partial stipends of \$500 to defray the cost of tuition, books, housing and meals.

Activities at the institute include Fellows presenting a successful technique used in their classrooms to teach writing. Participants also write extensively and share their writing with small groups.

In addition, participants develop a professional paper which they submit to educational journals for publication, using research on educational topics available through the HPWP.

Since its inception in 1992, the HPWP has sponsored nearly 60 fellows who have successfully completed the program.


