Rice-Beef Balls.
 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
 1/2 cup uncooked rice
 1 teaspoon salt
 1 tablespoon grated onion
 1 can tomato soup
 1/2 can water
 2 tablespoons chopped onion
 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper

Mix meat, rice and seasonings. Shape into small balls and drop them into tomato soup to which the water, onion and green pepper have been added. Cook very slowly for 40 minutes. Serve with tomato sauce poured over them.

Liver-Rice Cakes.
 (Makes 10 cakes)
 1 pound sliced pork liver
 1/2 cup shortening
 1/2 small onion
 1 1/2 cups cooked rice
 1 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 1 egg
 1 1/2 tablespoons milk
 1/4 cup milk

Economical Cuts Of Meat Are Tasty If Prepared Right



Leftover meats are easily creamed and served in patty shells on a platter generously heaped with vegetables—an economy note for your budget.

Budget-wise homemakers are taking a second look at their budgets this season, and most of them are keeping one eye on their purse strings, while the other eye is glued to prices. One item that is getting extra consideration is meat.

There's hardly such a thing as a budget cut of meat anymore, but naturally there are some that are less expensive than others. Breast of lamb is among those as well as some of the beef cuts including tongue; if you like pork, you'll have to be satisfied with a suggestion of the flavor.

A roast is good economy if it is beef or lamb because you can count on two or three meals as well as sliced meat for sandwiches. If you plan on one roast per week—carefully cooked so as to avoid expensive shrinkage—then it's easy to use the economy items I've already mentioned to fill up the other days nicely.

Barbecued Lamb Breast.
 (Serves 4)
 2 pounds breast of lamb
 1 medium onion
 1/2 cup chili sauce
 1 teaspoon salt
 Pepper
 1/4 teaspoon red pepper
 1 tablespoon vinegar
 1 cup water

Cut lamb into 5 pieces. Season with salt and pepper. Place in a hot skillet with the fatty sides of the meat on the bottom so they will brown easily. Mix chili sauce, red pepper, vinegar and water and pour over lamb. Slice onion and place over meat. Cover. Simmer for 1 1/2 hours, then remove lid and cook for about 20 minutes or until most of the barbecue sauce is absorbed.

A pot roast is very nice to have as the roast of the week, and then it's easy to use as sliced meat for supper, or ground and used for meat pies, stuffing for peppers, pinwheels with biscuit dough, etc. If you make it creole style, it will have plenty of flavor for other uses.

Creole Pot Roast.
 5 pounds chuck of beef
 1/4 cup salad oil
 Juice of 1 lemon
 2 bay leaves
 1 onion, minced
 2 teaspoons allspice
 5 teaspoons salt
 Pepper
 2 tablespoons flour
 2 tablespoons lard or drippings
 2 cups tomatoes

For cooked carrots, fleck them with chopped chives or parsley by adding the latter to the melted fat you use for seasoning.

Season chopped, freshly cooked spinach with crumbled bacon and a dash of nutmeg. Top with hard-cooked egg white and yolk, separated and put through a sieve.

Scalloped or stewed tomatoes take on added color and flavor if you add a dash of herbs to them and also a suggestion of finely minced onion and chopped green pepper.

General Assembly Gets Under Way

U. N. Delegates Convene At Town Hall of the World

WASHINGTON.—At the opening of the current session of the United Nations general assembly I made the usual rounds greeting friends from far corners of the earth whom these meetings bring together. Two converged upon me and one of them began to discourse on the fact that we three were becoming conference veterans.

He started to say "... let's see how many is it, there was the first Quebec, then the second Quebec. . . ." But the other man interrupted him and remarked gently: "Oh, no, it goes further back than that. This is my forty-fourth. Remember there was a League of Nations, too?"

The younger man stopped. Of course, his gray haired colleague was right. "And you still believe," the younger man asked earnestly, "that some day they'll work?"

"Certainly," was the reply. And it was made with such simple sincerity that the "youngsters" felt a little reproved.

The next day I walked to a railway station across the beautiful Flushing Meadows in the twilight, the scent of new-mown grass all about us, with one of those prodigies, an "instant translator."

She was one of the female of the species who are quite as efficient as the males. But it was not her feminine charm which attracted me, if such were to be discovered. I tried to ask her a little about her work, my first question being: "Isn't it interesting?"

"Interesting? Oh, for a while," she answered, "but one would like to get around a little more. I have been here since spring. I'd like to get back to the Orient and—other places."

I mentioned that we had had simultaneous translation at Nuernberg. "Oh, I was there," she said, "and always cold. One could never get warm, anywhere." I agreed. "And," she added, "I went there direct from India."

I tried to get some observation from her on the idea behind these conferences and their effort to bring about world understanding and world peace. "Do you think that they are worthwhile?" I asked. (We're always asking that, hopefully if a little wistfully.)

"Oh, yes," she replied quickly. "They are much better than none at all, much. But I feel that the men here do not really wish to make sacrifices to have peace. The men in their own governments do not wish them to make enough concessions to rob the officials in the different governments of their own power. And so the beautiful words they use are only rationalizations. They express idealistic thoughts, but when it comes to acting to implement them, they do not wish to go that far. They already have satisfied that feeling they know they should have, to do the right thing. Then they do not have to do it. Just as all of us rationalize our own misconduct."

That gave me a pause. It also gave me some hope for this session for I believe that the powers of the assembly will be strengthened so that they can enforce what the people want. The fine words and idealistic plans will have more force if the permanent committee of the assembly on peace and security, which Secretary of State Marshall proposed, is created. It will be in session all the time. Its voice, unopposed by the overuse of the stultifying veto, will be heard continuously; not merely when the assembly itself is in session.

Words Contain Great Significance

Words still are making trouble, as they always have. It isn't what we say so much as what people think we mean. For instance, there was a long discussion of the word "impinging," on the second day of the assembly meeting. This was just the English meaning, discussed among English-speaking reporters. Secretary Marshall had said this new permanent committee of the assembly would not "impinge" on the security council. The great argument about the committee has been that it was intended to by-pass the security council itself, and thus duck the veto.

If the English-speaking reporters weren't quite sure how far you go, or don't go, when you "impinge," it's no wonder there was confusion when it was translated into half a dozen other languages.

It was the translation of one word which nearly caused a revolution in Korea and made the work of the American commission there infinitely more difficult. It also has affected the whole course of action by the assembly on Korea. It was the word "trusteeship."

There is no word which properly translates "democracy" in Russian. When using the term the Russians merely give the English word its Russian form. But what a gulf between their meaning and ours. Liberty of the individual is not implied at all in the Russian concept.

Indeed, many people have said there is no real desire for liberty on the part of the modern Russian generation. And yet they constantly describe their country and their satellites as "democracies."

There was a good deal of electioneering before and during the close battle over the election for the presidency of the assembly. At first the American delegation had intended to vote for Oswaldo Aranha of Brazil. He is an old and staunch friend of the United States. But he felt that Brazil had had enough honors at the recent conference in Rio, that he had served one term before and that it would be best not to run. He said he didn't want the job. So our delegates pledged for Evatt of Australia, who was exceedingly anxious to be elected. But the Latin-Americans would have none of it. They demanded Aranha run. The contest narrowed to him and Evatt. This put Russia on the spot. Latin-America wants to liberalize the veto. Evatt would tear it to pieces. And the veto is the Russian pet. But the United States was for Evatt so Russia voted for Aranha and he won.

The Russian delegation went into a huddle on the floor. The Russian stooges had to be told just how to vote. And who should be the man who ran around, taking orders—or shall we say suggestions—from the Russian delegation to the various groups, Albania, Poland and the others under the Russian thumb?

It was Sarge M. Koudiatyev, a member of the staff of advisors to the Russian delegation. That name didn't mean much to me but I was reminded by Paul Ward of the Baltimore Sun, who always has a sharp eye out for such matters, that this active gentleman was the man named as the "architect" of the Russian spy system, in the report on the plot to obtain official secrets from the Canadian government.

Two women are exceedingly popular at the assembly meetings and their popularity seems to grow. One is Mrs. Pandit Nehru, wife of the Indian leader, and one is Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt. They are both active

and intelligent. Mrs. Pandit (last names come first in India, as in many other countries) has been named ambassador to Russia by her new government.

I couldn't help thinking, considering the recent emancipation of women in India that Mrs. Pandit was more like Mrs. Roosevelt, than Mrs. Roosevelt herself, when you consider the unconventionality of both judged by the standards of their respective older generations.

SIX BILLION A YEAR

Farm Co-ops Do Huge Trade

If volume of trade is any indication, America's farm cooperatives are establishing themselves ever more firmly as a significant force in the realm of agriculture.

In the 1945-46 marketing year, farm cooperatives, with more than five million individual farmers participating, did a record six billion dollar business, according to an estimate by the farm credit administration of the department of agriculture.

(The FCA report came at a time when a house small business subcommittee was investigating any possible advantages the co-ops might have over other business because of the fact that they are tax-exempt

Conserve Food: Truman; U.N. Adopts Agenda

FOOD PLANS: Conservation

It wasn't hard for President Truman to figure out: Europe is in desperate need of food from the U. S., but the U. S. will leave itself wide open for even greater price spiraling if it boosts its exports much higher.

The answer, he told a special press conference, is food conservation by all Americans. It is not a matter of eating any less, he said, but of wasting less.

In line with that, he announced the setting up of a citizens food committee to develop a food conservation program in the nation. Charles Luckman of Cambridge, Mass., president of Lever Brothers, was named president.

Regarding Europe, Mr. Truman said the food and fuel situation there is too critical to allow time for detailed study. Thus, apparently in an emergency frame of mind, the President called together congressional leaders to discuss possible steps that could be taken immediately to aid the starving continent.

If possible, he said, he would not call a special session of congress if stop-gap aid for Europe could be pushed through without resorting to that step.

Americans could start preparing for a heavy barrage of food conservation propaganda.

TOUGH AGENDA: No Dodging

United Nations general assembly proved at least one thing in the first week of its current session—it isn't going to dodge any issues.

After riotous preliminary sessions in which they heard the U. S. and Russia flay each other verbally and U. N. Secretary General Trygve Lie call for an end to feuding, the delegates voted doggedly to take on the entire list of tough, almost insoluble problems standing as a barrier to world accord.

Among the items admitted to the agenda were the partition of Palestine, peace in the Balkans, independence of Korea and Marshall's proposal to reorganize U. N. machinery to hold a tighter rein on the turbulent peace.

Soviet delegate Andrei Vishinsky's resolution calling on member nations to take criminal action against war-mongering propagandists was wholeheartedly admitted to debate, probably because it will provide a chance to nullify over the concept of freedom of the press.

ABSOLVED: Hirohito

Even while five high-ranking Japanese army and navy officers were being hanged by the neck in payment for their crimes of cannibalism, torture and murder of U. S. prisoners, Emperor Hirohito was being publicly absolved of any responsibility for the Pacific war by the chief U. S. war crimes prosecutor.

Joseph B. Keenan told the international war crimes tribunal that "The prosecution believes the people in the dock are really responsible for this war. If there had been anyone else, they would be in the dock too."

ELEANOR: An Old Note

"Dear Sumner—This Eisler case seems a hard nut to crack. What do you suggest? Sincerely, E. R."

That, Sumner Welles, former undersecretary of state, told the house committee on un-American activities, was a note he received from Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt in 1939 when the then first lady was interested in obtaining an open hearing on the passport application of one Hanns Eisler, Austrian refugee from Hitler.

The note, an almost forgotten memento of the prewar era, was hailed resoundingly in newspapers across the land because Hanns Eisler was

accused of being a Communist. He is the brother of Gerhart Eisler, No. 1 agent of the Kremlin in the U. S.

Eisler and his wife finally were issued visas in Mexico City to cover their entrance into this country. He has taken out naturalization papers and is a song writer in Hollywood.

In 1926, Eisler told the committee, he had applied for membership in the German Communist party, but had dropped out. A department of labor report made in 1938 said of him: "The evidence establishes preponderantly that Hanns Eisler is a Communist."

Mrs. Roosevelt's attitude toward the affair was lackadaisical. The note to Welles on behalf of Eisler was strictly routine, she said, adding that she neither knew Eisler nor remembered the note.

WHENEVER the cost of food, rent and clothing consumes all the income of the masses of the people, nothing can prevent a depression. That's solid logic because the people have nothing left to spend for anything else. The bureau of labor statistics says that at the present time these three items, food, clothing and rent, are taking more than two-thirds of the average family's income.

It makes no difference what the amount of the income is, whether it's \$20 or \$100 a week, the fact remains that the consumer's dollar is worth only 51 cents in a grocery and 55 cents in a clothing store and his total dollar for everything else is worth only 64 cents.

Our No. 1 Enemy—Rats

IT MAY sound hard to believe, but the huge shortage of this year's corn crop could be largely offset if the American people were able to eliminate one factor in their economy—rats.

Most people don't realize it, but one healthy rat eats or spoils around 100 pounds of grain per year. While it's impossible to count the rat population, interior department experts estimate that rats are almost double the human population—probably totaling 250 million in the U. S.

Entirely aside from the disease which rats spread from privy to pantry and the havoc they wreak upon the waterfronts of American seaports, their effect upon the food supply of the United States is almost beyond realization. Between the time a farmer stores his corn in the fall and cleans out his corncrib in the summer, rats may have eaten the difference between profit and loss for the year. In addition, they spoil as much corn as they eat.

If the food destroyed by rats could be shipped overseas, this alone would about save Europe from its current danger of starvation.

At present one government agency, the fish and wildlife service of the interior department, is working on rat eradication. Handicapped by lack of funds, government rat eradicators are able to do little beyond circulating anti-rat propaganda.

SCRIPTURE: Hebrews 3:1-8; 9-10. Matthew 4:1-11.
DEVOTIONAL READING: Philipiana 2:1-11.

Apostle of Better Things

Lesson for October 12, 1947

THIS lesson opens, Hebrews 3:1-8, with the explanation that Jesus Christ is the minister of better things in that he is the apostle and high priest of our profession, perfectly faithful to him that appointed him. The comparison is made with Moses, who was also faithful, but within a very small circle as contrasted with the Son of God.

Called to God an high priest after the order of Melchisedec, Christ, the author of eternal salvation, dealt no longer with symbols, but offered himself as the perfect lamb to take away our sins. "And for this cause he is the mediator of the new covenant (testament), that by means of death, for the redemptions of the transgressions that were under the first testament, they which are called might receive the promise of eternal inheritance," Hebrews 9:15.

Jesus and the Bible
JESUS is introduced in Matthew 4:1-4, as he quotes the Old Testament to Satan in the wilderness temptation. Having been reared by a God-fearing mother, Jesus was familiar with the Bible as a child.

What is the best thing any parent can do for his or her child? I would answer without hesitation: Teach them to hide God's words in their hearts in the impressionable years of youth. A Bible verse learned in youth will serve through all life's testing situations.

"I will not forget Thy Word," Psalms 119:16.

He Helps Us Use the Bible
THE better ministry of Jesus is reflected in the fact that, "We have a great high priest, that is passed into the heavens, Jesus the Son of God. . . . For we have not an high priest which cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need," Hebrews 4:14-16.

Today we have in mind not only Grandma York, but there is David Borwood, who for many years has

operated a drug store in the once bustling town of Gail. Dave's residence there goes back to 1892, so we figure that this highly educated, quiet spoken gentleman has had no less than eighteen thousand nine hundred and seventy five (possibly twice that amount) of squints at Gail mountain which lies to the west of the town and which served so well as a lookout for Indians up to within six years time of Dave's arrival. Why, he could almost smell 'em, so late had been their presence thereabouts. Our above mentioned wife came out on top of the Plains in 1901, her dad "taking up" four sections northeast of the present O'Donnell, an duffer sort of shooting the ante lopes away, began breaking up the sod, much to the chagrin of their neighbors down below the cap. Tahoka consisted of an alkali lake some miles from the present town town of that name.

For quite some time the new plausmen did their trading and letter mailing in Gail and we now dearly love o drop down for a breath of break's air and a visit with Dave our good friend who still "stands out" as do the original mesquites.
