Early Voting In Callahan County Underway

Three sites: the Callahan County Courthouse in Baird, the Justices' of the Peace Offices in Clyde and Cross Plains are the sites for the early voting for the Democratic and Republican Primary Elections, which will begin on Tuesday, Feb. 21. Both Republican and Democratic Primary elections will take place this year, at the above locations, according to Callahan County Clerk Jeanie Bohannon who also said that early balloting at any of the three early voting polls will be accepted for any voters in all of the seven county voting precincts.

Early voting at the Callahan County Courthouse in Baird will take place in Room #107 from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Fridays, including 12:00 noon until 1:00 p.m.

In Clyde voting will be at 208 Oak St., from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 weekdays at the Clyde J.P. Office, but closed for noon.

The Cross Plains' office of the Justice of the Peace (425 S. Main St.) will be the site for early voting, which will be closed for noon.

In Callahan County, Early voting will be from Feb. 21, until Friday, March 3.

The Republican and Democratic main Primary Election in Callahan County will be on Tuesday, March 7, at the six precinct locations listed but excluding Pct. 5, which will cast ballots at the Baird light Plant on the March 7th date. Polling will open at 7:00 a.m. and continue until 7:00 p.m. on that Tuesday.

The E-Slate electronic voting machines including the

10 new ones, approved for purchase by the County Commissioners in January, with the 17 original E-Slate machines are used as distributed among the six voting locations in Callahan County, with the majority placed at Clyde, Baird, and Cross Plains.

Republicans will be voting for three nominees for the primary on the ballot, including an open unopposed Justice of the Peace Precinct #1 slot which is held by Incumbent Clyde resident Roy Lee Chapman.

Those running on the Republican ballot for contested races are: Rodger Hart, Burlie Taylor and Robert Hill, all running for nomination for the Cross Plains Justice of the Peace office, and those running for the contested Cross Plains Pct. #4 Commissioner race

are Larry Tension, Reggie Pillans and Cliff Kirkham.

In addition to the already seated office-holders below those announcing their candidacy for the General Election's races are Donna Bell for County Clerk and Elvan Goode for Commissioner Pct. 4.

The Democratic Primary election voters will see seven various candidates seeking votes in seven separate nominations for candidacy in the county's general election, including: County Judge, Incumbent Roger Corn, unopposed; incumbent Prct. #2 Commissioner Bryan Farmer, unopposed; incumbent District Clerk Sharon Owens, unopposed; incumbent County Treasurer Dianne Alexander, unopposed and incumbent #3 Justice of the Peace Steve Odom-unopposed.

The minutes of January 23, 2006, Jan 23 hearing and February 6, 2006 read and approved as presented, with no public comment.

The purchase of a vehicle for Constable Bill Young and to be put in the county of Callahan's name was discussed, but the Commissioner Holland made a motion to not approve the purchase to be put in the County's name, the motion carried 5-0, with Commissioner Farmer seconding.

Constable Bill Young submitted a bill to the Court for mileage and medicine that he incurred during the Cross Plains fire for smoke inhalation. Commissioner Grider made a motion to pay the bill for medicine and mileage. The motion died for lack of a second. But Commissioner Grider made a motion to pay the approved bills. Commissioner Farmer seconded and the motion carried 5-0.

State Regulates Placement Of Campaign Signs Along Highways

Texans take pride in their beautiful state, especially during the spring when everyone can enjoy the beautiful wildflowers that grow along the highway rights of way. However, during campaign season, the landscape blooms with a special kind of flower - the political sign.

Texas Department of Transportation officials want to make sure citizens and candidates are aware of the laws regulating their placement on state highway right of way.

Under Texas law, it is a class C misdemeanor to place any sign on state highway right of way. The penalty for violating this law is a fine of up to \$500 per sign.

It is legal to place a campaign sign on private property adjacent to state highways with landowners permission.

Restrictions require that signs be constructed of lightweight material and limited to 50 square feet in size. Signs may be placed as early as 90 days prior to an election and must be removed within 10 days after an election.

TxDOT officials say the laws are intended to reduce clutter along highways so that official traffic control signs and vehicles approaching intersections are clearly visible for the safety

of all the traveling public. According to Mary Beth Kilgore, Abilene District public information officer, signs in the public right of way include posting signs on trees, telephone poles, traffic signs, and other objects on the right of way.

"TxDOT's regulatory authority allows the immediate removal of a sign placed on state highway right of way without prior notice, if the sign is not authorized by state law or approved by the department. Signs posing potential safety hazards will be removed as soon as possible by TxDOT employees, a county sheriff or a constable, depending on jurisdiction," Kilgore said.

Texas is subject to the Federal Highway Beautification Act of 1965. Under the federal law, if the state fails to control signage visible from interstate and other federally-funded highways, Texas may be subject to sanctions of up to 10 percent of its federal transportation construction funds.

West Central Texas Counties Use New Voting Systems

Many Voters Will Get Their First Look During Primary Elections

Whether voting during early voting beginning February 21st or on Election Day, March 7th, Eastland County voters will discover a new voting system when they go to the polls. The Hart Voting System by Hart InterCivic will be used by Eastland County voters as well as voters in the surrounding counties of Coleman, Eastland, Runnels, Shackelford, and McCullough where the system will be used for the first time. Taylor and Callahan Counties launched the system successfully last November.

Whether voting on a paper ballot or on the accessible eSlate, voters will find the system simple, accurate, and secure.

For the voters using a paper ballot, not much has changed. They will use a blue or black pen to completely fill in a box next to their choice. Those ballots will be dropped into a ballot box.

People with disabilities or others who may prefer using the eSlate will find it easy to use. "The accessible eSlate is not that much different from operating your washing machine," said Kristi Allyn, Elections Administrator for Taylor County. "Voters will turn a dial until their candidate of choice is highlighted and then press an ENTER button to confirm their choice. The box beside your selection will turn red, and you will move to the next contest. That's all there is to it."

"Voters who have not yet used the system need to know that Callahan and Taylor County voters who came to the polls last November found the system very easy to use," said Jeanie Bohannon, Callahan County Clerk.

Voters who use the eSlate will see a Ballot Summary Page where they can review how they have voted. Voters are free to make any changes up until they press the red CAST BALLOT button, which will end the voting process.

"Coleman County voters can rest assured that plenty of help will be on hand should anyone have a question," said Ms. Jo Ann Hale, Coleman County Clerk. "Poll workers have been trained to answer questions and written instructions will also be readily available at all

polling places in Eastland County," added Ms. Cathy Jentho, Eastland County Clerk.

"Texas counties aren't the only ones who will begin using a new system this year," said Runnels County Clerk, Eles Ocker. "The Help America Vote Act of 2002 requires every polling place in the nation to have at least one voting machine that people with disabilities can use without assistance, thus ensuring the privacy of their vote, too."

The accessible eSlate has audio in English or Spanish for voters who are blind or visually impaired, large jelly switches for people with limited hand dexterity or upper-body mobility impairments, and it can accommodate a "sip n puff" device for those with quadriplegia. The booth is wheelchair accessible and the voting machine can easily be carried curbside if necessary since it weighs only 7 lbs.

Early voting for the Primary Election will run from February 21st through March 3rd. Election Day is March 7th. 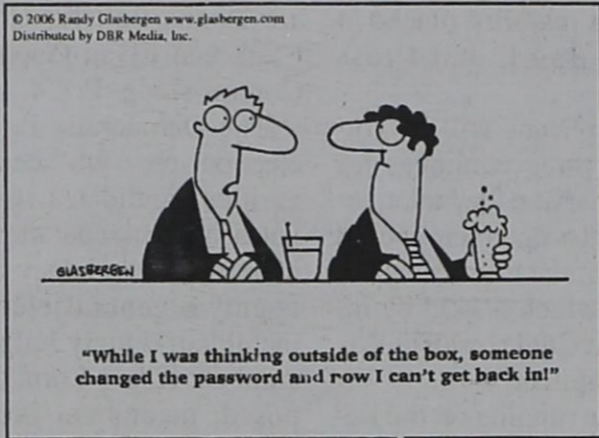
Mother Goose Day was founded in 1987 by Gloria T. Delamar in tandem with the publication of her book, "Mother Goose: From Nursery to Literature."

Apply By March 13 For Texas Wildfire Disaster Individual Assistance

AUSTIN, Texas - Federal and state disaster recovery officials advise Texans who suffered damages from the recent Texas wildfires that March 13 is the last day to apply for assistance. The presidential declaration makes Individual Assistance available to affected individuals and families in Callahan, Cooke, Eastland, Erath, Hood, Montague, Palo Pinto, Tarrant and Wise counties.

Those who suffered damage are encouraged to register online at www.fema.gov <<http://www.fema.gov>> or call 1-800-621-FEMA (3362) or TTY 1-800-462-7585 for the hearing-and speech-impaired. The toll-free numbers are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week until further notice. Applicants should be prepared to provide basic information about themselves (name, permanent address, phone number), insurance coverage and any other information to help substantiate losses.

"This financial assistance is intended to ease the pain of serious disaster losses," said Sandy Coachman, federal coordinating officer for the Texas wildfire recovery effort. "The federal and state disaster assistance program is there to offer individuals a helping hand to recovery."

"Together with our partners in FEMA, we will make sure that the benefits of our collective assistance programs go to the people in our wildfire counties who are suffering losses," said State Coordinating Officer Frank Cantu, representing the Texas Governor's Division of Emergency Management (GDEM).

FEMA provides

assistance to wildfire victims who have necessary disaster-related expenses and serious needs that are not covered by insurance. Assistance for individuals and families who suffered damage can include:

Grants to rent a different place to live if the damaged house is unlivable. Initial temporary housing assistance may be provided for one month for homeowners and one month for renters. Assistance may be extended if requested based on a review of individual applicant requirements.

Grants for home repairs and replacement of essential household items not covered by insurance to make damaged dwellings safe, sanitary and functional.

Grants to replace personal property and help meet medical, dental, funeral, transportation and other serious disaster-related needs not covered by insurance or other federal, state and charitable aid programs. (Grants are not awarded to reimburse households for spoiled food or the loss of freezer and refrigerator contents due to lack of power.)

Low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration to cover residential losses not fully compensated by insurance. Loans up to \$200,000 are available to repair/replace real estate and \$40,000 to repair/replace personal property.

There are penalties for

falsely reporting disaster damages. FEMA and GDEM are coordinating a joint effort to uncover fraud attempts. People who encounter fraudulent scams should report them to their local law enforcement or the Attorney General's Office of Consumer Protection at 1-800-337-3928.

FEMA manages federal response and recovery efforts following any national incident. FEMA also initiates mitigation activities, works with state and local emergency managers, and manages the National Flood Insurance Program. FEMA became part of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security on March 1, 2003.

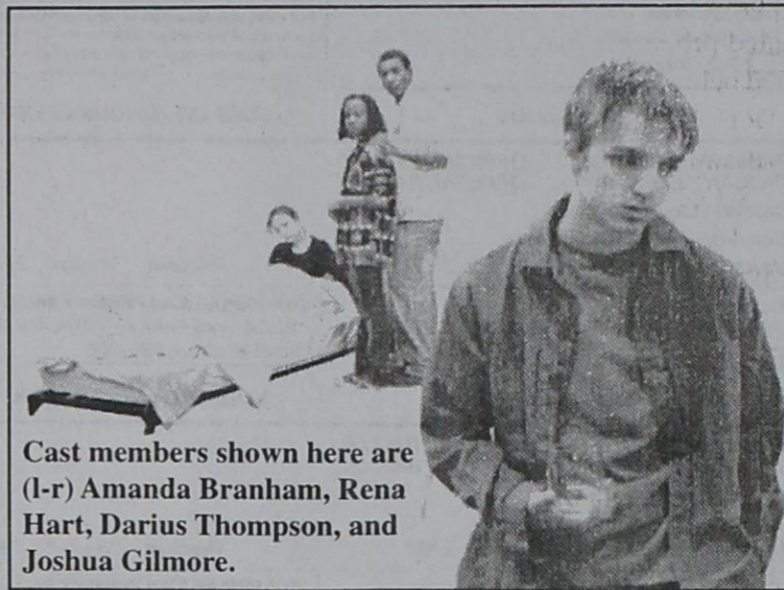

Instead of getting in the way of the seriousness of his point of view, the humor emphasizes it."

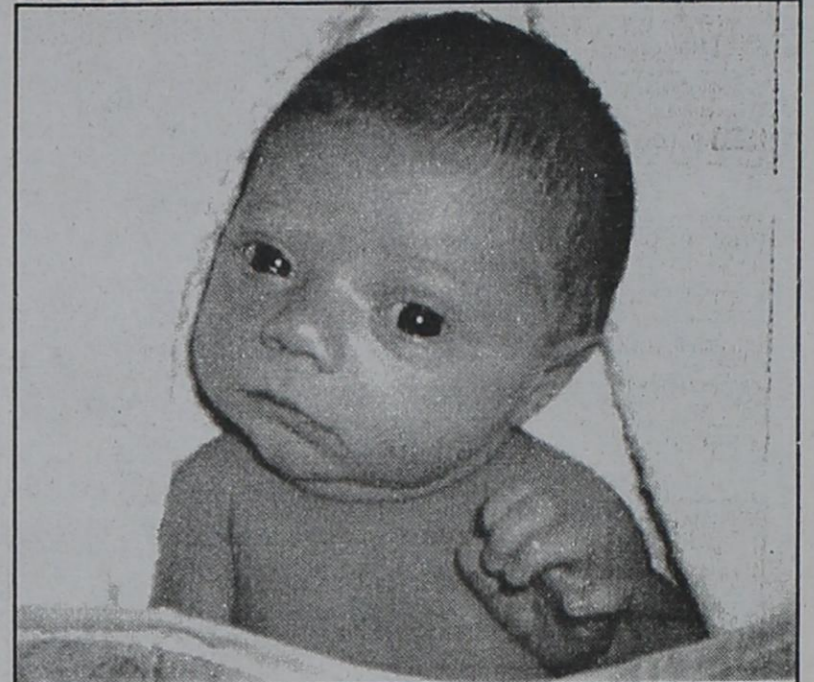

In the story, Don Haskins (Josh Lucas) is the new men's basketball coach at Texas Western in 1965, and he is out to win. So he goes out recruiting, and brings in seven promising black players to go with five white ones. At this time most Southern Colleges had few black players on their teams, so this line-up was a new thing. Haskins' new additions to the Miners had played mostly in the South Bronx, New York, where they had added fancy moves in hopes of joining the Harlem Globetrotters.

In El Paso they had to adjust to living in this Border City, along with integrating with white teammates. When they went out of the city to play games, they found considerable discrimination.

The story of how Haskins

was able to develop these talented underdogs into NCAA championship winners is a classic one. El Paso people enjoy hearing it forty years later, and you can be sure they'll be watching this movie to see if the details are right.

In a historic NCAA final game against Kentucky, the Miners won the 1966 National Championship. They came back to El Paso to an overwhelming welcome.

Hall of Famer Don Haskins still lives in El Paso, and has written a book about his experiences. Most will enjoy this movie, and it will bring back memories to many basketball fans in the Southwest.

The church at Rising Star had a very good Gospel Meeting. The preacher was Rich Popejoy of Wellington.

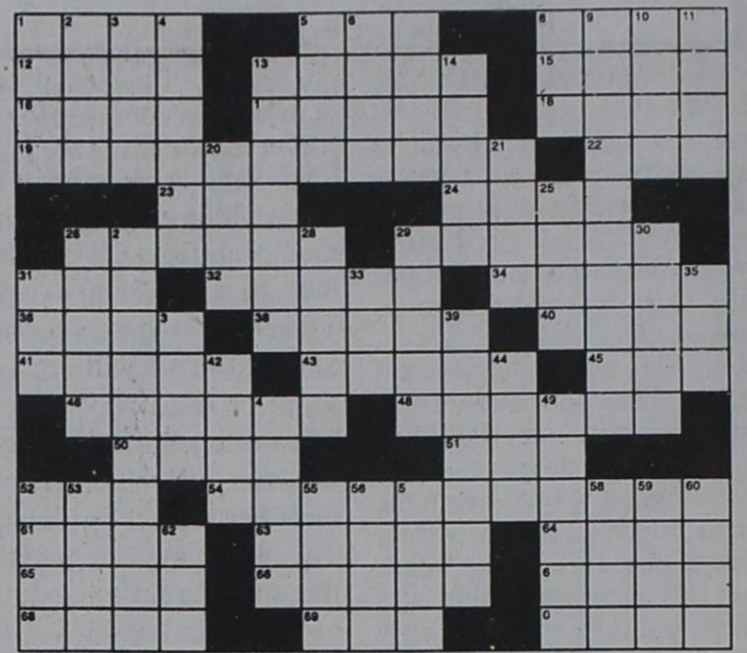
Lou Grider had her daughter, Patty Hefley, visit with her last week. They always have a good time together.

Public officials might do well to put aside hunting gear while in the glaring media spotlight.

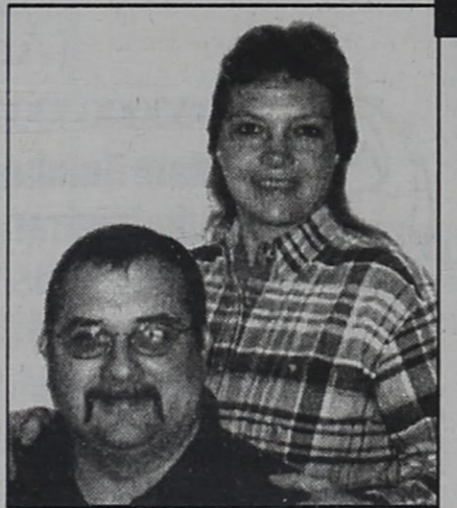

Tornado Safety Rules

If at home...
 If you have a tornado safe room or engineered shelter go there immediately.
 Go at once to a windowless, interior room; storm cellar; basement; or lowest level of the building.
 If there is no basement; interior room; storm cellar; basement; or lowest level of the building.
 Get away from the windows.
 Get under a piece of sturdy furniture such as a workbench or heavy table or desk and hold on to it.
 Use arms to protect head and neck.
 If in a mobile home, get out and find shelter elsewhere.

If at work or school:
 Go to the area designated in your tornado plan. The most interior room, on the lowest floor without windows.
 Avoid places with wide-san roofs such as auditoriums, cafeterias, large hallways, or shopping malls.
 Get under a piece of sturdy furniture such as a workbench or heavy table or desk and hold on to it.
 Get down low with your head against the wall and use your arms to protect head and neck.

If outdoors:
 If possible, get inside a building.
 If shelter is not available or there is no time to get indoors, lie in a ditch or low-lying area or crouch near a strong building. Be aware of the potential for flooding.

If in a car:
 Never try to out-drive a tornado in a car or truck.
 Get out of the car immediately and take shelter in a nearby building.
 If there is no time to get indoors, get out of the car and lie in a ditch or low-lying area away from the vehicle. Be aware of the potential for flooding.

Tarleton's Third Annual Science Olympiad set for February 25 in Stephenville

"Science rules" and the College of Science and Technology at Tarleton State University is out to prove it as they host their third annual Science Olympiad on Saturday, Feb. 25th.

High school and junior high students who are up for the challenge of contests in astronomy, robotics, computer science, tower and bridge building and rocket engineering are invited to step up and test their skills.

Teams from five area junior high schools and seven area high schools have already signed up to compete in any of 16 events planned. Competition is divided into two categories, grades 6-8 and grades 9-12. The events relate to biology, chemistry, math, engineering, physics, astronomy, technical writing and many more.

Cross Timbers Basin schools like Tolar and Comanche have become regular competitors in the event and they do well against the exclusive private schools that are also veteran competitors. The top three finishers in each of the categories will advance to the State Olympiad held each April at College Station.

"We attract a lot of private schools because they are not eligible for U.I.:L. contests,"

said Jason Jacks, one of the event coordinators. "We have representatives from Austin, Dallas, and Lubbock private school signed up for this year's event. They spend a lot of time during the year preparing for these Olympiads so it is always fun to see them match up against the smaller rural schools."

The contests topics continue to grown each year all aimed at sparking an interest in science and related fields. "CSP" fans will be interested in the forensics events. They use chemistry, biology and other sciences for problem-solving. Another contest "We've got You Number" promotes an interest in mathematics and draws off the popular detective series "Numbers."

"It's still too early to tell how well the Science Olympiad is working as a recruiting tool for Tarleton," said Jacks. "But we have noticed that some of the names of former competitors are showing up on class rosters. We hope that all...will go away with a very positive impression..."

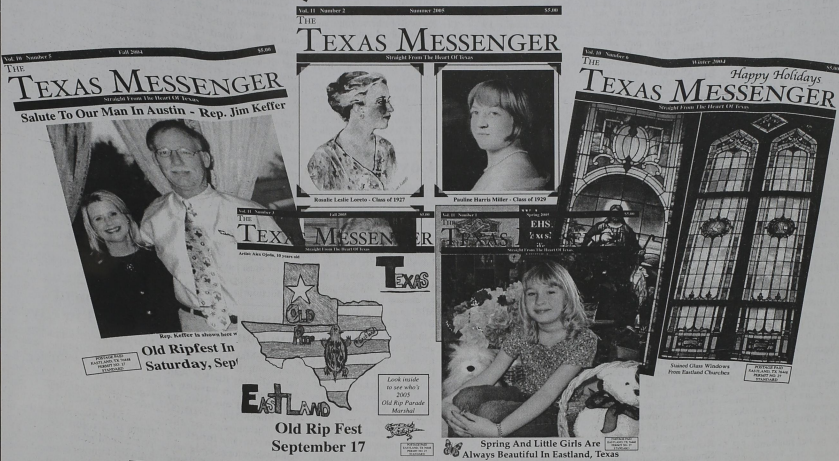

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans caused by extreme wildfire threat that occurred on December 1, 2005, and continuing, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Anson, Richard G. Young said.

"Callahan is one of 9 primary counties in Texas recently named by the President of the United States eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from extreme wildfire threat that occurred on December 1, 2005, and continuing."

Richard G. Young said, "Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent."

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible

for a FSA emergency loan," Richard G. Young said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have a figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under the emergency designation will be accepted until September 11, 2006 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Richard G. Young said.

FSA is a credit agency of the United States Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U.S. citizen requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by holding a majority interest.

The FSA office in Anson is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday - Friday.
