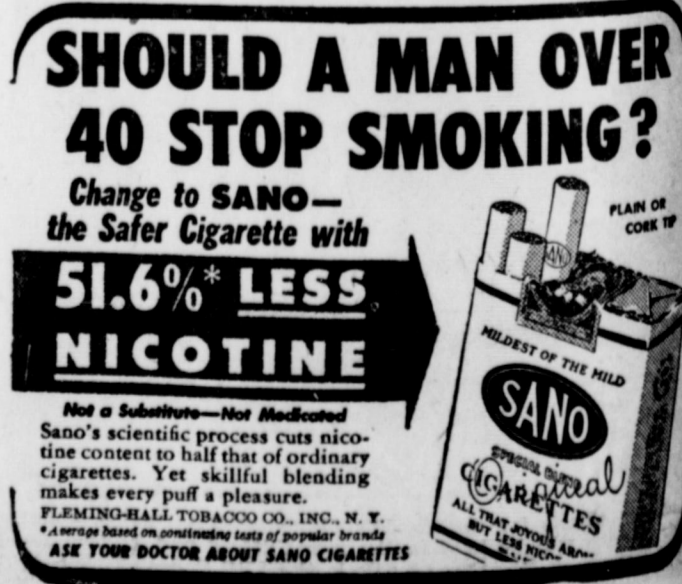
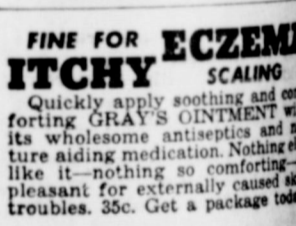
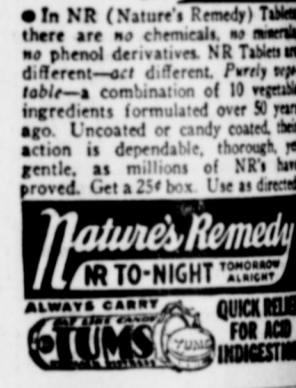
Battle of Coral Sea Topped First Big Defeat for Japan

In the battle of that island-studded ocean known as the Coral sea, which is near the Solomon islands and about 1,000 miles northeast of Australia, America's first real victory of the war with Japan was scored. The action occurred on May 4, 1942, and called for deeds of valor as thrilling as any in all American history.

The Coral sea battle was the first great naval defeat ever dealt the imperial Japanese fleets. And yet this battle was fought entirely in the air, by the planes of opposing aircraft carriers.

The ships engaged in this battle never got sight of each other. They slugged it out without firing a single gun at another ship—the first engagement of its kind in history. In this first great victory for the U. S. in this global war the Japs lost more than 15 ships sunk and at least 20 others severely damaged. The action perhaps saved Australia from invasion.

However, America paid a high price for her victory in the sultry Coral sea. In this engagement the aircraft carrier, Lexington, famed ship that laid the foundation of our modern navy's aircraft carrier operations, went to the bottom. This happened on May 7.

**Don't Neglect Lunch If You Want to Stay Full of Pep, Health**

**ARE YOU ALONE** at home for lunch so that you don't bother to prepare something for yourself? Or does the family come home, and you simply rummage around the refrigerator and don't know what to serve?

These are frequent situations in many homes throughout the country. Lunches of this type—or none at all for the homemaker alone at home—don't help pep, vitality and health. If you get a "lag" in the afternoon and wonder what's wrong with you, check your luncheon habits.

Physicians and nutritionists are of the opinion that if you skip a meal, it places too much of a load on another meal. Let's say you've skipped lunch and eat a very full and ample dinner. Do you feel like doing anything but flopping into bed and wasting the evening? And have

you ever thought of what it does to your digestive process to have it called upon suddenly to digest a big meal after having been lazy for many hours?

It's much better to try to distribute your calories evenly throughout three meals during the day. In between you won't feel an energy lag and you will keep your system in good working order.

Don't give the excuse that you think lunch unimportant and simply don't feel like bothering with it. Even if you're alone at noon, it doesn't take much effort to prepare a nice cottage cheese and fruit salad and a glass of milk with roll or toast. Or, if the youngsters are at home, it's simple enough to cream some leftover vegetables into a piecheese, serving it with fruit and cookies for dessert.

Planning will give you plenty of the right foods on hand from which to choose a nutritious and well-balanced lunch. And if you value your health and well-being, you'll certainly not count half an hour at noon much to give up to it.

**HERE ARE SOME HOT DISHES**

- Corn Scramble (Serves 6)**
  - 1 cup cubed leftover ham
  - 2 tablespoons fat
  - 2 beaten eggs
  - Salt and pepper
  - 1 No. 2 can cream style corn
  - 1/4 cup green pepper, cubed
- Brown ham in fat and then mix with other ingredients. Mix thoroughly. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until the eggs are set.
- Creamed Meat in Potato Nests (Serves 4 to 6)**
  - Combine one 10½-ounce can of condensed cream of mushroom soup with ½ cup milk. Blend and heat. Add 1½ cups of diced, cooked turkey, chicken, roast veal or pork, ham, or fish and ½ cup of diced pimiento. Add some of this hot sauce to 1 egg yolk and stir into remaining sauce. Heat thoroughly and serve in nests of reheated, mashed potato.
- Beef Rice Croquettes (Makes 12)**
  - Combine 1 cup seasoned white sauce with 1 cup ground leftover roast beef, 1 cup cooked rice and

**\*Cheese Vegetable Pie (Serves 6)**  
Pastry for 1 crust  
1 cup freshly grated American cheese  
1 cup milk, scalded  
2 eggs  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
1/8 teaspoon paprika  
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
2 1/2 cups mixed, cooked vegetables  
2 fresh tomatoes

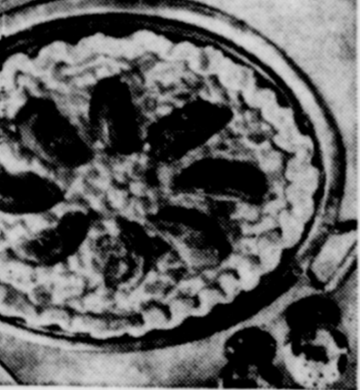
Blend ½ cup of cheese with dry ingredients when making the pastry. Roll out and place in pastry tin. Bake in a hot oven for 10 minutes. Meanwhile, add milk to beaten eggs; add seasonings and vegetables, except the tomatoes. Pour into pie shell. Cut tomatoes into eighths and arrange on top. Sprinkle with remaining ½ cup of cheese. Bake in a moderate (350 degree) oven for about 30 minutes or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean.

**Salmon Macaroni Salad**  
1 8-ounce can of salmon  
2 cups canned peas, drained  
1 cup shell macaroni, cooked  
1/3 cup mayonnaise

Drain salmon, removing bones and skin. Combine with remaining ingredients and season to taste. Serve on crisp lettuce. Garnish with slices of hard-cooked eggs.

**Asparagus-Ham Luncheon (Serves 6 to 8)**  
20 stalks of canned or cooked asparagus  
6 slices of cooked cold ham  
1 can of mushroom soup  
1/2 cup cream  
6 slices buttered toast

Mix mushroom soup with cream. Heat thoroughly. Place ham slices over toast, top with a few stalks of asparagus. Pour soup over all and run under the broiler for a few minutes.



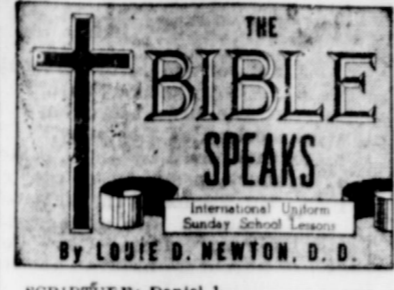
If the family is home for lunch, it doesn't take long to prepare delicious and nutritious cheese, vegetable pie and serve it along with fresh fruit and berries for a vitamin-rich lunch.

**Stuffed Onions (Serves 6)**  
Cook 6 large Bermuda onions in boiling salted water for 30 minutes. Remove center and stuff with following: Combine 1 can of pork and beans with ½ teaspoon dry mustard, ½ teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons chopped onion centers. Stuff onions. Sprinkle each with 1 teaspoon brown sugar and heat through.

**Stuffed Baked Tomatoes (Serves 6)**  
Scoop out center of six large tomatoes. Brown 1 tablespoon of chopped onion, 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper in 2 tablespoons of butter. Add 1 1/2 cups corn cut off the cob, 2 beaten eggs and ½ cup bread crumbs and season to taste. Stuff tomatoes and sprinkle with grated American cheese. Bake in a moderate oven for 25 minutes. Chopped leftover ham or crumbled bacon or cubed sausage may be added to the corn if so desired.

Another good stuffing is canned macaroni or spaghetti. Stuff the tomato and bake until the tomato is done.

Fillings for dainty sandwiches can be prepared ahead of time and the sandwiches made finger or triangle style at a minute's notice. These will keep well: Deviled ham and cream cheese; peanut butter moistened with honey and orange juice; cream cheese and chopped nuts; liver sausage with chili sauce; dried fruits, honey and nuts.

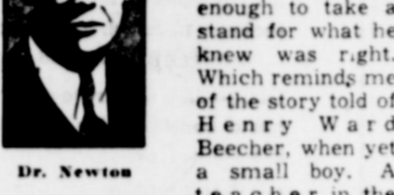
**Daniel Stands By His Convictions**  
Lesson for May 30, 1948

"A packet frozen on duty—  
A mother started for her brood—  
Socrates drinking the hemlock—  
And Jesus on the road."

SUCH a picture we have before us in Sunday's lesson. All you need to do to get this dramatic picture is read the first chapter of Daniel. You will then feel anew the meaning of that cherished statement, "Tis conviction that convinceth."

**BRAVE TO DO UGHT**

**WE GET** the first draught of this tonic in verses 8-9, 14-15 and 17. "But Daniel purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself with the portion of the king's meat, nor with the wine which he drank..."

He was brave enough to take a stand for what he knew was right. Which reminds me of the story told of Henry Ward Beecher, when yet a small boy. A teacher in the school he attended asked a boy a question which he promptly answered. The teacher appeared displeased, and told the boy to sit down. He asked several other boys the same question, and got the same answer. Finally he asked Beecher, and Beecher gave the same answer, but refused to sit down when the teacher frowned at him. Seeing that Beecher was going to defend the answer, the teacher said, "Boys, you were all correct, but only Beecher was sure enough to stand his ground. I was simply trying to teach you the lesson that you must stand by what you know is right."

**DARE TO STAND ALONE**

**DANIEL** knew that he was taking an unpopular position, but he was willing to be alone so long as he knew he was right. He knew that the consequences would take care of themselves. That is the quality of character which America needs today in her youth.  
It is easy enough to be popular, if you run with the gang; but remember this—the gang is always heading downhill. Daniel stood by his convictions when it was costly. In the final windup, he was the head man.

**ENDURING INVESTMENTS**

**DANIEL**, winning his point, made every hour count toward victory. He not only abstained from strong drink, but used his superior strength to serve the king in such way that his talents were sought out and brought into larger fields of opportunity.

Standing by his convictions, he had won over those who at first were disposed to poke fun at him. By superb performance, due to clear thinking and high purpose, Daniel made enduring investments that paid off in big dividends. He did not do right for reward, but because he did right, the reward was inevitable. And so it will be with every young man and woman who purposes in his or her heart to do right.

**GOD'S FAVOR**

**I WANT** you to look carefully at verse 17. "God gave them knowledge and skill in all learning and wisdom; and Daniel had understanding in all visions and dreams."  
It is impossible to account for Daniel's fortitude apart from his implicit trust in God. Remember the incident of Daniel opening his window toward Jerusalem in prayer?

God never fails those who stake their all on Him. He will not—cannot let them fail. It was because of God's favor that Daniel and his companions proved themselves ten times better than the young men who defiled themselves.

"Who sides with God must always win."

### GAS CO. ON TWO NEW SUPPLY SOURCES

An announcement of personal interest to every user of natural gas throughout the area served by the West Texas Gas Company, was made this week by R. F. Hinchey of Lubbock, president of the company. He disclosed that his company has entered into an agreement with El Paso Natural Gas Company to purchase natural gas from that company at two points in West Texas. This new supply of gas, he said should be available before next winter and will enable West Texas Gas Company to meet winter peak day needs of its customers throughout the area.

After these two connections are made, West Texas Gas Company will be drawing gas from five sources of supply. Multiple sources of course minimize the incidence of temporary gas shortages which may occur when pipe lines break or when there is mechanical failure of compressor station engines.

### There still remain some few local bottlenecks, the gas company president said, "because the towns have grown so rapidly that some sections of transmission lines have become too small to handle the greatly increased demands. We are intensifying our efforts to iron out these local deficiencies. We believe all will be taken care of one way or another before snow flies. If it's humanly possible, we will certainly do it, because we sincerely want to take care of the fuel needs of our territory."

The gas company is operating under a long range expansion program calling for the installation of added facilities year by year as needs are anticipated.

### Organic Matter Will Aid Work of Soil Bacteria

A single ounce of soil contains 50 million living bacteria, according to R. C. Thomas of the Ohio agricultural experiment station.

These bacteria can help or harm the crops, depending on the kind of bacteria. The good kind rot the organic matter, release plant nutrients and help build soil structure. The harmful kind cause plant diseases.

The good kind can be aided and the harmful kind eliminated by adding organic matter to the soil. To get this organic matter, according to Middle West Soil Improvement committee, return all possible animal manures to the soil; put back all crop residues and grow deep-rooted legumes regularly in the rotation and feed them generously with fertilizer carrying phosphate and potash.

### Early Growth Stressed In Raising Baby Pigs

While the average weight of eight-week-old pigs is probably less than 30 pounds, a lot of pigs weigh 40 pounds or more at this age. On the contrary, many weigh as low as 20 pounds. These variations in weaning weights have a marked effect on the growth-rate of pigs up to the time they are baconers. The bigger pigs at eight weeks old are the first to reach 200 pounds liveweight.

### Hog Self-Feeder



A portable hog feeder is a piece of labor saving equipment which has a place on every farm where hogs are being raised. The capacity of this feeder is 55 bushels, but it may be made of any size desired. If it is kept well painted it will remain water tight.

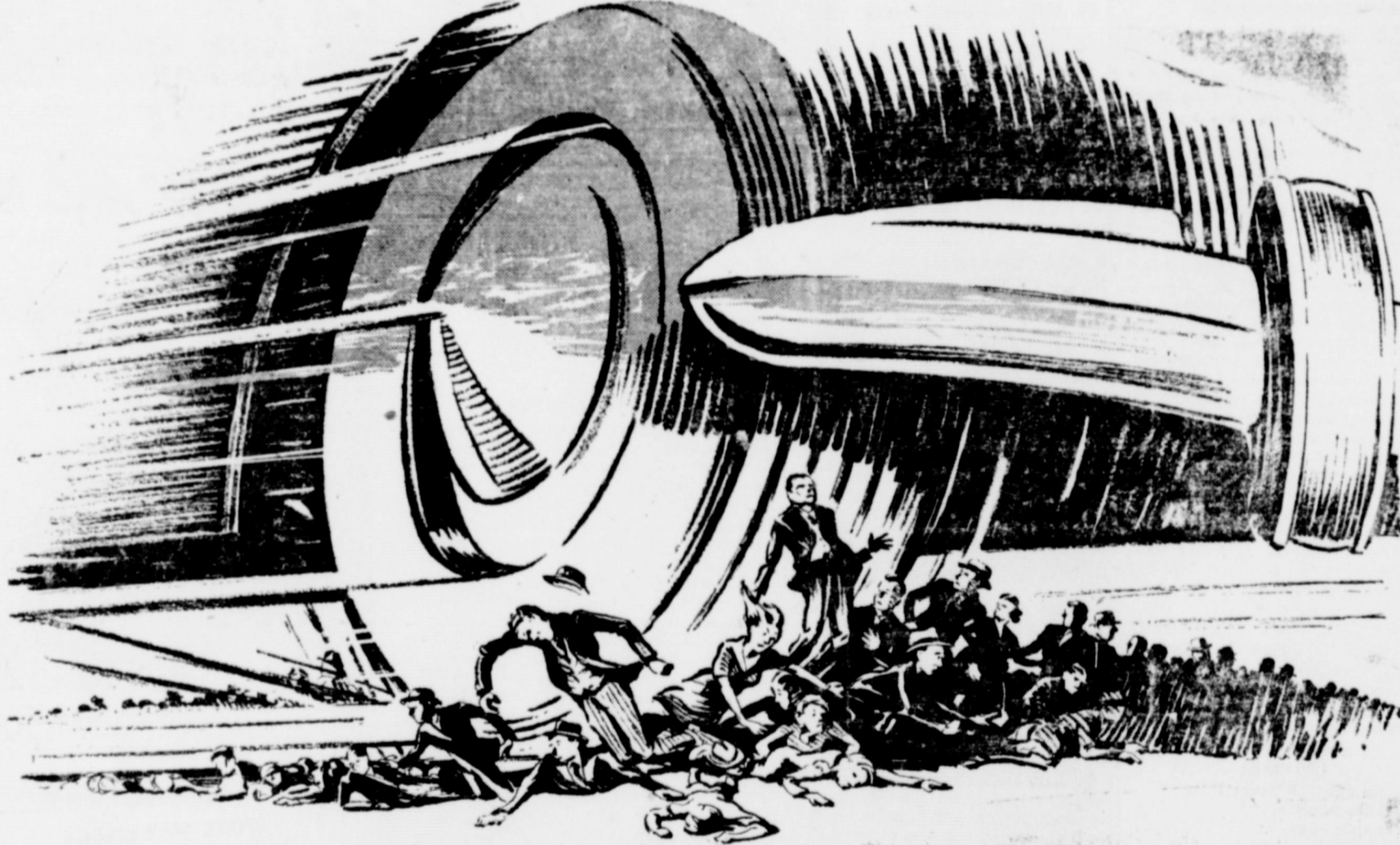

True or False?  
 "American business doesn't make enough profit." Do you think this statement is true or false? Most people haven't the vaguest idea. Some folks have been fed propaganda which seems to show every turn that the main purpose of industry is to exploit the poor. These persons are side-tracked to the wrong answer. Why should we ever forget that American business under our system of freedom of opportunity has itself done more for anything else to make the poor rich? That is industry's goal!

There is one group, however, that is well acquainted with the fact that business in general does not make the profit it ought to make to keep our system going ahead. This group is made up of communist and socialist agitators, as well as fellow-travelers. They know our system depends upon honest incentives. The communist program in this country is planned around the fact that the average American industry does not make enough profit. They are counting on that.

On Taking Over  
 There is no short range program. It is long range. The communists do not believe that our industrial enterprises, on their present profit margins, can survive a temporary depression. These would-be dictators are strict believers in depression. They always count on taking over after the next "boom" and bust. What we must not fail to see is that our American system, if not backed, has the ability to triumph over economic setbacks. We are come back stronger than before.

It is unfortunate that the general public sees industry as making an orbitant profit. Actually, most people do not know that industry's profit level is as low as it is. Take a specific industry for example. According to surveys, many think the industry takes for profit as much as 5 cents out of every dollar of sales. This is wrong as can be. During five recent "boom" years, just 3 cents out of each dollar taken in the steel industry was profit. Much of this 3.5 cents was "paid back under."

Profit Means Jobs  
 We look upon steel as being the leader of our manufacturing industries. Steel is basic. It supplies raw materials and semi-processed materials which are the chief of manufacturing plants today. Daily lives are conditioned by place of steel in modern civilization. This is one reason why we should be concerned about the decline of profits shown by the steel industry on a long term basis.

Why would the agitators like to see the government "take over" of our major industries? That would bring them a step nearer their goal: "taking over." How can we profit of steel and other industries despite big increases in sales, kept so low? The main reason is enormous operating costs and taxation. Only a very large and efficiently managed industry can operate successfully under these conditions.

Steel, like other industries, requires constant reinvestment of funds. Moreover, a large portion of profits have to be returned to the business. In 1946, when net income was about 5.5 cents per dollar of sales about 2.5 cents was put back in the steel business. This left 3 cents to be given to the owners and investors. It is easy to see that industry is not allowed to make profits, our business cannot continue to make goods we need and offer for all. Adequate profit is a thing, not a crime.

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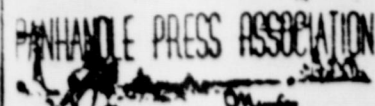

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### Cover Crops Reduce Soil Erosion Losses

#### Research Tests Show Four Main Advantages

How cover crops seeded in corn  
and other row crops could help  
farmers fight erosion, build up the  
soil's organic matter and add to the  
nitrogen supply, is indicated in  
studies by research men in Iowa  
agricultural experiment station.  
Four major advantages are cited:  
1. Cover crops protect the soil  
from August to May. One-  
fourth of the annual soil loss occurs  
during this period.  
2. Well-fertilized legumes and  
grasses add organic matter to  
the soil that helps resist erosion  
during the May and June period.  
This is the time when one-half of the  
annual soil losses occur.  
3. Cover crops add nitrogen to the  
soil, especially when legumes  
are a part of all the mixture.  
4. The yield of corn will be slightly  
increased in the year following  
the seeding of cover crops.  
Research workers have developed  
a plan that licks the problem of seed-  
ing the cover crops. Just before

### HOUSEHOLD HINTS

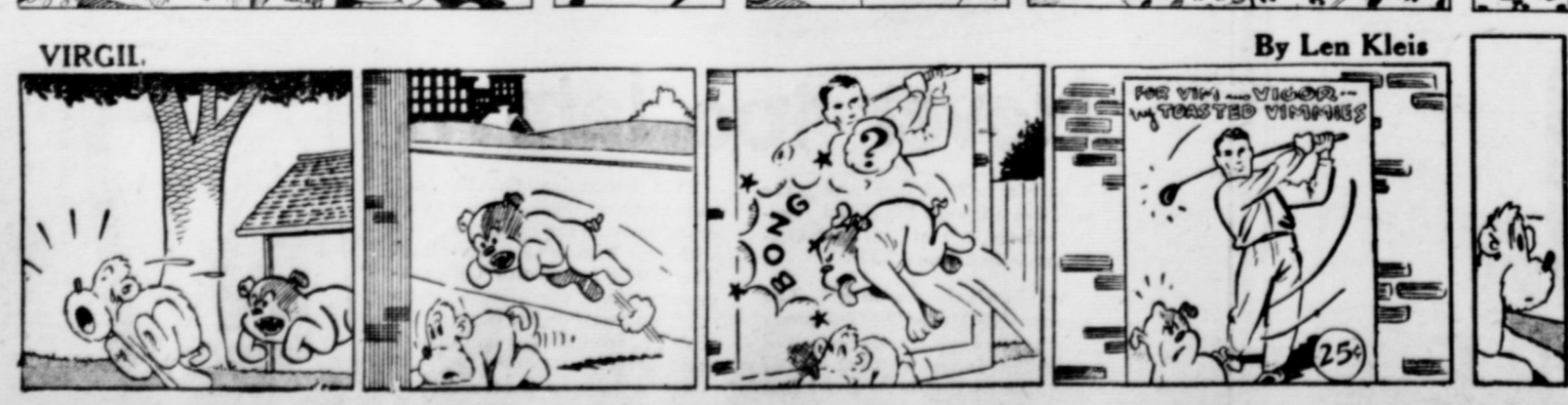

**New Strain of Corn Withstands Drouth Guatemala Crossbreed Also Resists Root Rot**

Possibility of producing corn that would withstand root rot and other diseases as well as prolonged dry spells appealed to Earl E. May and Iowa State college officials. Knowing that Guatemala had been producing corn for more than 2,000 years in an isolated region, which had resulted in a highly inbred strain which could withstand dry spells as well as certain diseases and pests, Iowa research workers collected

1,200 varieties of corn from Central America. New Guatemala - U. S. crossbred corn has been tested at Ames, Iowa. The new corn outyielded three commonly used U.S. hybrids as much as 25 bushels to the acre. While the Midwest varieties withered and died during hot weather, the Guatemala-U.S. crossbreed remain in full ears. The tests are to be continued, but college officials believe that early results give promise of a new strain that will withstand long dry and hot spells in any part of the United States. James Moore, K.M.A. station, reports that work in Guatemala has proven entirely successful and he believes that the new corn soon will be grown on many farms in the United States.

**DANIEL IN THE DEN OF LIONS**

THE sixth chapter must be read to have an adequate background for this study. Daniel had been chosen as the first of three presidents to rule over 129 princes who should govern the kingdom. The other two presidents and the princes could find no fault in this Hebrew, save that he believed and observed the law of his God. So, they conspired against him by persuading the king to issue a decree that no person in the kingdom was to make a petition to any God or man for 30 days, save to the king, on the penalty of being cast into the den of lions. This decree was issued by Darius, and Daniel's enemies reported to Darius that Daniel was opening his window three times a day, praying to his God. Darius was greatly troubled, but had to stand by his decree, and Daniel was cast into the den of lions. Darius spent a sleepless night, and hurried to the den at dawn to know about Daniel. Daniel replied, "O king, live for ever. My God hath sent the lions' mouths, that they have not hurt me."

**DARIUS REWARDS DANIEL**

CONVINCED that Daniel's convictions had been miraculously rewarded by God, Darius ordered the other two presidents and the princes, together with their wives and children, thrown into the lions' dens. They were all destroyed by the lions.

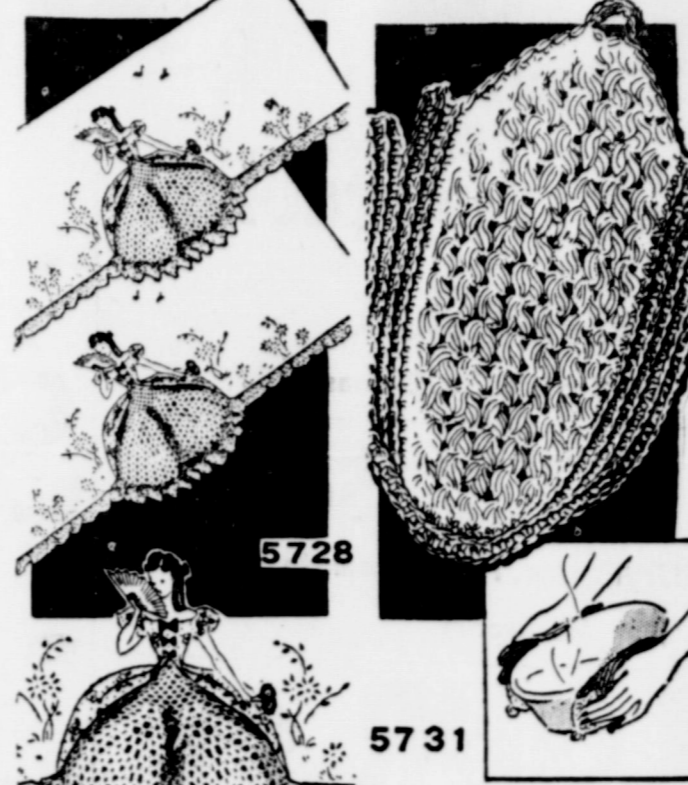
Then went forth the decree, "There is no other God that can deliver after this sort." Thus we have the golden text for Sunday's lesson:

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**FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE**

QUESTION: My hot-water tank is not a year old and I have rusty water coming out of my hot-water faucets. Can you give me any suggestions on the subject?

ANSWER: One reason may be that you the heating the water too much. A temperature of 130 to 140 degrees is hot enough for domestic hot water. When water is heated more than that, sediment is stirred up that is carried along in the water supply. You could prevent overheating by installing an automatic control. Also, your water supply may contain a great deal of sediment, which could be controlled by a water filter.

QUESTION: We are planning to put up a frame cottage of five rooms next summer. Regarding cement blocks for foundation, people have cautioned me against buying blocks that are made during the winter. Is there any reason for this?

ANSWER: It is true that cement work should not be allowed to freeze during the process of manufacture or construction. Reputable cement block manufacturers do not allow this to happen, however, even during the winter.

### Way to Socialism

When President Charles Seymour of Yale University declared recently that his university wants no part of federal grants for educational purposes, it seemed to me high time that educators in general should wake up to the dangers inherent in federal aid to education. The public, too, seems entirely too complacent regarding this "let-Washington-do-it" attitude, an attitude far too many educators have been fooled into accepting.

It was President Seymour's idea that direct federal grants to his institution would "imperil the independence of the university." Indeed, sooner or later they would. Public school educators could tear a leaf out of President Seymour's notebook. If federal aid would bring interference and control at Yale, so also would federal grants to public education bring control by Washington over local educational functions.

**Pocketbook Power**  
As far as I know, nobody has ever argued that control over the finances of an undertaking fails to bring with it full control of that project. Surely where the pocketbook it, there goes the authority. None of those arguing for federal aid will admit they would welcome federal control of education. Everybody wants to avoid federal control (except the Communists).

Yet, it amazes me that folks would accept measures that lead to control, as surely as dawn precedes day. We work hard and spend tax money, to promote decentralization, local responsibility, and local self-government in Germany. We still believe that Hitler and his Nazis built a dictatorship by concentrating power into hands that no one dared oppose.

**Local Rights**  
Why then, should America ever take a step in the same direction? Federal aid to public education is socialized education. All the dangers attendant to the centralized government would be magnified under any plan that would permit federal control of the education of children. Must America go in the same direction that Czechoslovakia has gone? Freedom of the local community in educational affairs must be maintained.

No sane educator or good citizen would argue against more and better education. Everybody agrees on the necessity for improving our schools constantly. Not only the children, but the nation as a whole suffers when we neglect to provide funds for school buildings and equipment. Our public school teachers need better pay and better training. Although we have already
