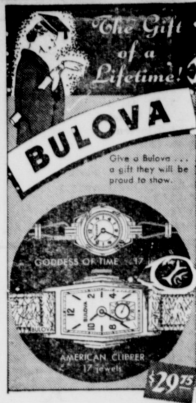

visited. Making a special check on this area, he found there were remnants of 35 historic tribes still extant there, including the Creek, Cherokee, Chickasaw, Chickasaw, Seminole, Seneca, Quapaw, Mo'c. Ot-tawa, Eastern Shawnee, Peoria, Miami, Wyandott, Osage, Pawnee, Pon-ca, Potawatomi, Kickapoo, Sauk and Fox, Comanche, Caddo, Kiowa-A-pache, Fort Hill, Apache, Wichita, Ojibwa, Kaw, Tonkawa, Delaware, Tawakoni, Waco and Hainai.

Some of these still remain powerful groups, speaking a common language and maintaining tribal unity.

The greatest conglomeration of "tribes" is to be found in California.

It would be impossible today, Dr. Krieger says, to make up any statistical total of tribes which would be generally acceptable to ethnologists. The classification depends too much on the point of view of individuals.

Even when the Indians had the North American continent to themselves, he points out, it would have been rather difficult to have made a strict tribal classification because of the borderline cases. In the final analysis, it probably would have depended on the opinion of the Indians themselves.

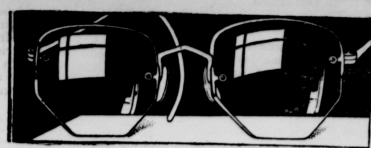

IN U. S. TO 116 TRIBES

NOTION—There are still 116 tribes in the United States, according to Dr. Herbert H. Krieger, anthropologist, who prepared this figure for a Congressional inquiry, and that a great deal de-

pends on the definition one wishes to give to the word "tribe." Among the North American Indians," he says, "a tribe is a socially, politically and religiously-organized body of persons bound together by ties of kinship, dwelling together, occupying a definite territorial area and speaking a common dialect."

Following this strict definition, however, the total would be considerably reduced, for some of the historical tribes have only a few individuals left and others have so merged with nearly related bands that they have lost their identity.

This is particularly true, he says, of the Indians of Oklahoma who now are more or less tribally dis-

COCONUT DROP COOKIES

HERE are two recipes for coconut drop cookies that will add just the right finishing touch when tall frosty glasses of chilled fruit drinks are offered, or bowls filled with luscious strawberries and cream. The daintier of these two cookies is made with freshly grated coconut and the coconut milk for liquid. With a light confectioners' sugar icing and coconut on top—they are as delightful a cookie as you'll find anywhere.

However, if you cannot obtain the fresh coconut you can substitute a moist canned coconut and plain milk, or you can use the second recipe which calls for desiccated or marsh shredded coconut and sour milk or butter milk. These cookies are also filled with luscious bits of chopped raisins and crunchy chunks of walnut meats. You'll find them as delicious eating as any cookies you have ever made.

FRESH COCONUT DROP COOKIES
 1/2 cup shortening
 2 cups sugar
 2 eggs
 3/4 cups SIFTED all-purpose flour
 1 tsp. baking powder
 1 cup coconut milk (or plain milk)
 1/2 cup chopped citron
 1 1/2 cups grated fresh coconut (or most canned coconut)

Cream the shortening, add the sugar gradually and cream until fluffy. Blend in the well beaten eggs. Sift the flour and baking powder together and stir into the creamed mixture alternately with the coconut milk (or plain milk). Blend in the citron and the coconut. Drop from a teaspoon onto a greased cookie sheet. Bake in a moderately hot oven (400° F.) for 10 minutes, or until delicately brown around the edges. This recipe makes about 4 dozen small cookies.

When the cookies come from the oven, drop a little confectioners' sugar and milk icing on each one and sprinkle with coconut.

If you do not have time to grate the fresh coconut, you'll find that it will be very good just put through the medium knife of your food chopper.

CONFECTIONERS' SUGAR AND MILK ICING

Add a few tablespoons of milk to confectioners' sugar until it will spread easily. Spread a thin coating of this over each cookie while the cookies are still warm. Sprinkle with coconut before the icing hardens.

COCONUT DROP COOKIES
 1/2 cup shortening
 1 cup sugar
 1 egg
 1 1/2 cups SIFTED all-purpose flour
 1/4 tsp. salt
 1/2 tsp. soda
 1/2 cup sour milk or buttermilk
 1 tsp. vanilla
 1 cup desiccated or canned shredded coconut

Cream the shortening, add the sugar gradually and cream until fluffy. Blend in the well beaten egg. Sift the flour, salt and soda together and stir into the creamed mixture alternately with the sour milk (or buttermilk). Blend in the vanilla, coconut, raisins and nuts. Drop from a teaspoon on to a greased cookie sheet. Bake 7 minutes in a hot oven (450° F.). This will make about 3 dozen small cookies.

"The size and shape of the foot govern the choice of a shoe", stated Miss Maurine McNatt, home demonstration agent, at the Newmoore 4-H meeting Thursday, May 2, at the school building.

"If a person's foot is broad and the ankle large, then anything which will seemingly increase the size should be avoided. For example, wide instep straps or broad buckles should not be considered by the girl who wishes her ankles to appear small.
