Rites Read For O. E. Roberson

Otto Ewell Roberson, 55, died at 2 a. m. at his home two miles west of O'Donnell from an illness of 13 years duration. He had been confined to his bed since January, and had been bedridden off and on previously.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 3 p. m. in O'Donnell Church of Christ, with Minister Virgil Colium officiating. Burial followed in O'Donnell Cemetery under direction of Stanley Funeral Home.

He had been a resident of the O'Donnell area practically all his life.

Born in Dickens county on Jan. 7, 1900, he came with his late parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Roberson, to Lynn county in 1902, a year before the county was organized. He was married at O'Donnell on June 1, 1921, to Miss Willene Thompson. Until overcome by illness, he engaged in farming. He was a member of the Church of Christ.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Robbie Jerrell of O'Donnell; one daughter, Mrs. LaQuita Schaffner of Lockney, formerly clerk in the sheriff's office in Tahoka, two granddaughters, LaMelba Rhea and Nita Gay Schaffner of Lockney; two sisters, Mrs. Howard Simpson and Mrs. Hamp Thompson, both of O'Donnell; and three brothers, Bill McMillan of O'Donnell, Curtis McMillan of Eunice, N. M. and Sam Barber of San Bruno, Calif.

The family plans to move to their new home Wednesday. Mrs. Robertson was a first grade teacher here and during her teaching career here was rated as one of the best of teachers.

He always demanded the best from them but at the same time he was fair and as he leaves his "children" their feelings for him is the proof of the pudding - as sports has but one aim - to make MEN and WOMEN of our boys and our girls.
