## Child Dies from Eating Poison Tablet

The death by accidental poisoning of little Dayton Lewis, the eighteen months old son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Dinsmore, Wednesday evening shocked the community as has nothing else in many a day.

Mr. and Mrs. Dinsmore live on a farm six miles east of town and at about 6:30 the child was heard by its mother to scream and say, "mouth burns" and upon investigation found part of a bichloride of mercury tablet which the child had had in its mouth. She immediately called her husband and they rushed the child to a physician, but the forty minutes that elapsed before antidotes could be given, the child was beyond all human aid, dying in a few minutes after arriving here.

The child had opened a suit case in which it found the tablets and it is supposed that it had only swallowed about one-half of one before the burning sensation caused it to spit it out.

Little Dayton Lewis was eighteen months and four days old and was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Dinsmore and their grief over the tragic death of their little darling is deep. All assistance possible was given by the many friends of the family and the little body stilled in death was taken back to the home that night, where only a few hours before he made his parents happy by his living presence.

The funeral was held Thursday afternoon at the Plainview cemetery, a large concourse of sympathizing friends attending the last sad rites.

Mr. and Mrs. Dinsmore have the heart-felt sympathy of the entire community in which the Index joins.

Among the insects, the fly is man's deadliest enemy. It is also his filthiest enemy for it is born in filth, lives in filth and naturally carries filth with it wherever it goes. It never takes a bath before inviting itself into our homes for dinner.

Thousands of people die every year from disease germs carried by the fly. The fly's digestive organs are so simple that many disease germs pass through it alive and are deposited on our food and in every place where the fly leaves a speck.

The swill barrel fly carries 6,600,000 bacteria, the pig pen fly 943,000 bacteria, the house fly 880,000 bacteria, and the cow stable fly 420,000 bacteria. The war on the fly should begin in the early spring. A female fly that lives through the winter will deposit 120 eggs about the first of May; if half of these contain females and all live and deposit the usual number of eggs during the summer, by September 1, the number of flies coming from one female fly that lived through the winter will be 5,000,000. If these flies were placed end to end they would form a line long enough to reach around the earth 880 times.

Under normal conditions the fly egg hatches in twenty-four hours into a magot which lives as such five days and then develops into the pupa stage. Five days later there emerges a seemingly full grown fly. Fourteen days later the fly is ready to deposit eggs. Thus it only takes about twenty-five days for the fly to develop from the egg to a breeding insect. During this twenty-five days, why should not the fly have been destroyed?

Since flies breed in filth, why not destroy all filth about our premises and thus improve the

# O'Donnell Schools Given 6½ Additional Units of Credit

That the O'Donnell High School was given six and one half units of credit during the past term is something worthy of notice. The school was at a very low ebb when J. A. Rickard was appointed superintendent last fall and the fact that he has secured affiliation and the above amount of credits in one year, shows that the school board appreciated his efforts by reelecting him.

Following is a copy of the report of the chief supervisor of public schools of the State Department of Education upon the exhibits at the close of the last term:

**English**—Because of the immaturity of the O'Donnell English, not more than two units can be granted at this time. Suggestions: Stress in all grades the minimal composition essentials; require the pupils to correct on the back of the preceding page all errors indicated by the teacher; have pupils outline every

theme more than one paragraph in length.

**Ancient History**—More care should be taken in marking papers. Mistakes are often passed unnoticed. Maps are weak.

**Modern History**—Very good work.

**American History**—Papers graded too leniently. One test when 4 were required only three were written and graded on basis of 4. Pupils did not do sufficient work.

**Algebra**—Work submitted was slovenly and so crowded that it was difficult to examine it. The questions do not satisfactorily cover all phases of the work in the second year. Pupils in the first year's work are exceedingly careless in the use of the signs Plus and Minus.

**Plane Geometry**—Final examination is very easy, four of ten being numerical problems, and others but one being easy. Errors are frequently unmarked

and unpenalized. Grading is quite too high.

**Solid Geometry**—Only one test in December 1924 and final examination Jan. 1925. Pupils do not always reason logically and often omit the reason for a conclusion. They should be taught to reason more closely and to be neater in their work. The final examination questions were far too easy and did not cover the entire book.

**Spanish**—Credit is refused for the following reasons: (1) The work is not sufficiently advanced nor do the pupils show sufficient acquaintance with the language to warrant credit being granted. (2) Pronouns, a very vital part of Spanish grammar, are lightly touched; the subjunctive mood is not sufficiently emphasized. (3) Papers submitted indicate that the instructor was so crowded with other work that there was not sufficient time to accurately grade tests submitted. Many errors were passed over without comment. Six recitations per day is too heavy for thorough work.

**General Science**—The course has been made very practical and comprehensive. A little more care should be given the note books.

**Physics**—Recommend that the student be required to make a definite written statement or conclusion at the end of the experiment, indicating clearly what has been learned from the experiment.

**Public Speaking**—The text book work is very good. The exhibit does not meet the requirements of the bulletin in the following respects: No analyses of selections for declamation submitted; speech criticisms are inadequate and they should be made on speeches actually heard by the pupil. Schools holding one unit of affiliation give a thorough course in speech composi-

tion and oral reading as well as in debating. The original work seems superficial and elementary.

## New Record Made By Ford Motor Company

A new June sales record was established by the Ford Motor Company during the month just passed, when approximately 6,000 more Ford cars and trucks were delivered to retail customers in the United States than during the same month a year ago, which held the previous high mark for June.

Reports indicate a continued large volume of business through the summer months with a higher buying level than is usual during this season of the year; outlook is for another record breaking month for July. Urgent requests for additional shipments have made necessary increasing the company's July production schedule, which now calls for several thousand more cars and trucks than were produced in June.

Sales figures just given out by the company show that the total sales for June were 195,300 Ford cars and trucks. Of this number, 176,256 represent domestic sales, as compares with 170,547 cars and trucks sold in June a year ago.

Buying conditions also continue good in the high priced car market. Evidence of this appears in the sales of Lincoln cars during June, with deliveries to domestic customers totaling 892, an increase of 95 over June a year ago.

# Votes For Waterworks and Street Improvements Means O'Donnell's Advancement

With the broad acres of fertile farm lands in our trade territory it is hard to estimate the possibilities of development in our little city. If we would control all the business covering to the half-way point between us and the surrounding cities, it would at this time support a city of over two thousand people. With the rapid development of our farm lands now going on, we should easily have a population of 5,000 within a few years.

But this trade and city development will not come to us without strenuous effort. We must, to attain this, have a concerted co operative action of all our citizens. Our development so far, on which we are inclined to pride ourselves, did not come to us through any strong efforts on our part but was rather forced on us through development of the fertile lands adjacent to our city.

But now fellow townsmen, if we are to keep this progress going, every citizen of our city will have to show his metal. Our sister cities on either side, being awakened by the development of the rich farm land in our territory, are putting forth every effort to draw this trade from us. We now come to a point where we must awaken to the

situation or we will find that instead of continued progression we will be losing ground. Since our sister cities have recently taken such forward steps in city improvements, this is surely a critical time in the history of O'Donnell.

We are soon to vote on water works and street improvements, one of the most vital steps we could possibly make toward city building, and personally I feel that it is almost a question of life or death to our city as to whether we put this over, having in mind the fight that will be put up against us within the next few years.

Reports from outside points are now going that thru contamination from our flood waters, we have from 20 to 30 cases of typhoid in our city, and these reports are surely not conducive to investments here.

Among the many advantages of city water works is that the water will be kept pure and free from typhoid germs. Loan companies, who are very essential in city building, will not operate or put their money in a city that has no water works, a number of our citizens can attest to this from recent experiences in applying for loans. In fact, the

writer does not know of any city that has advanced beyond our stage without city improvements. I do not own as much property in this city as lots of others, but what little I have I want it to continue to be a good investment.

With conditions as they now stand, should it be necessary either to invest 25 per cent of everything we own in the city for city improvements or go for several years further without the improvements, I feel sure this would not be a bad investment from a financial standpoint. Not that these improvements would be worth so much to us for our individual use, but without some improvements in this line our trade would be attracted to the more progressive cities, and with a consequent decline in the value of our city property. The 25 per cent invested now would surely not be lost.

But these improvements will not be nearly so expensive as mentioned above. In fact, it would not bring a very noticeable advance in our taxes and the consequent advancement of values in our city would many times over cover the cost.

Some of our citizens think it would have been better to have included a sewerage system in our election and the writer would be strong for this too, but some of our people would be afraid of this on account of increased taxation and that this might cause us to lose water works and street improvement vote. If the water works and street improvement bonds carry, then I feel sure that it will not be long until our people will want to add a sewerage system.

health of our town? Dead fowls should be burned or buried. We should avoid having slops and decaying foods near our back doors. Our out-door toilets should be screened and lime or some disinfectants should be used daily. Waste paper should not be thrown into the vault but placed in a box or sack and burned every few days.

If one family has dysentery the flies will, if permitted, carry the germ to every neighboring home and thus infect the whole town and community. The same thing is true of cholera, typhoid, tuberculosis and other deadly diseases.

O'Donnell has been hard bit by

intestinal diseases and is threatened with an epidemic of typhoid. Some people may find it convenient to go away for a time and avoid the danger of infection, but the majority of us must stay here. Let us each one do our part and improve the health of the community.
