NOTICE OF WATER CONTRACT ELECTION
 THE STATE OF TEXAS
 COUNTY OF O'DONNELL
 COUNTY OF LYNN

TO ALL QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID CITY, AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION: ...
 TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of O'Donnell, Texas, on the 13th day of March, 1956, in obedience to a resolution and order duly entered by the City Council on the 9th day of February, 1956, which is as follows:
"RESOLUTION AND ORDER calling an election on the 13th day of March, 1956, in the City of O'Donnell, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the City who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the question of whether the City Council, on behalf of the City, shall be authorized to enter into a water supply contract with the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority; and enacting other provisions relating to the subject and purpose of this resolution."
 WHEREAS, the City of O'Donnell is in need of a water supply which may be obtained by contract with the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority; and
 WHEREAS, the City Council has received from the Board of Directors of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority notice to call a water supply contract election in accordance with the provisions of Article 8286 - 154 R. C. S. of Texas 1925, as amended, such election to be held under the provisions of Article 1109 e, R. C. S. of Texas and other applicable laws; and
 WHEREAS, the City Council deems it advisable and to the best interest of the City and its inhabitants to call and conduct an election as hereinafter provided for on the proposition hereinafter stated therefore
BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:
SECTION 1: That an election be held within and throughout the

limits of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, on the 13th day of March, 1956, at which time there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the City who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the following proposition:

"SHALL the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, be authorized to contract with the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority for a water supply for said city as authorized by Article 1109e R. C. S. of Texas, 1925, and other applicable laws?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws of this State applicable thereto, particularly the provisions of Article 1109e, R. C. S. of Texas, 1925, and only qualified electors of said City who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be permitted to vote.

SECTION 3: That said election shall be held at the City Hall (City Tax Office) in the City of O'Donnell, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct, with the election officers thereof as follows:

 Mrs. Clyde Winans, Clerk

SECTION 4: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. S. Election Code, adopted by the 52nd Legislature in 1951, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:
"FOR THE WATER CONTRACT"
"AGAINST THE WATER CONTRACT"

AS TO THE FOREGOING, each voter may mark out with black ink or pencil one of such expressions, thus leaving the other blank; or, in the alternative, each voter may vote on the proposition by placing an "X" in the square appearing on the ballot beside the expression of his choice.

SECTION 5: In the event the results of the aforesaid election are favorable to the proposition for the water contract, the City Council shall pass an ordinance prescribing the form and substance of the contract and directing its execution. A form of said proposed contract is on file in the office of the City Secretary and is there available for public inspection. The contract thus to be authorized will be substantially in such form.

SECTION 6: A substantial copy of this resolution and order signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order, the words "NOTICE OF WATER CONTRACT ELECTION" said notice shall be posted at the City Hall and at two other public places in the City, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in the O'Donnell Index - Press which is a newspaper of general circulation, published in the City of O'Donnell, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election. The City Secretary shall cause said notice to be prepared, posted and published as aforesaid, and make due returns thereof to the City Council.

SECTION 7: Immediately after said election, the officers shall make due returns of the results thereof to the City Secretary for canvassing by the City Council.

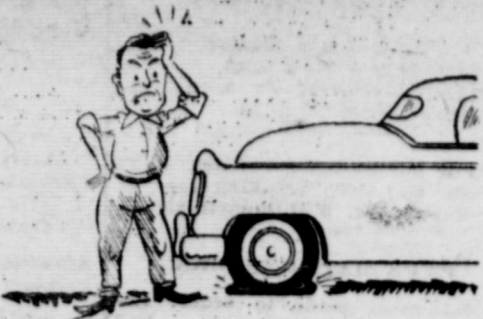

Presence of Molecules Explains Expansion

SCHENECTADY, N. Y. — Why does heat make things expand? Matter is made of molecules which are in constant motion, and the higher the temperature, the faster they move. If you have a volume of gas in a rubber balloon, the pressure of these molecules against the rubber is balanced by its pull. Warming the gas makes the molecules move faster, so they push harder against the rubber. It yields a little, and the gas expands. With cooling, their motion is slowed, they exert less pressure, and the volume of gas gets smaller. Something similar occurs in a liquid, and also in a solid, although the molecules are held more tightly together. The amount which a solid expands for the same rise in temperature is considerably less than with a gas or liquid.

EIGHT AMENDMENTS TO APPEAR ON NOV. GENERAL ELECTION

Eight proposed constitutional amendments will appear on the ballot at the general election next Nov. 8th in this order, the secretary of state's office announced:

1. Compensation to prisoners found innocent.
2. Reallocation of the county general fund within the maximum tax rate of 80 cents per \$100 valuation.
3. Revising the state college building program and allowing investment of the permanent university fund, shared in by the University of Texas and Texas A. and M. College, in stocks and bonds.
4. Broadening scope of the teacher retirement system.
5. Double the veterans land fund from \$100 million to \$200 million.
6. Revising the form of the constitutional oath of office for elective and appointive officials of the state.
7. Providing waiver of jury trial in lunacy cases.
8. Providing a judge may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two previous felonies.

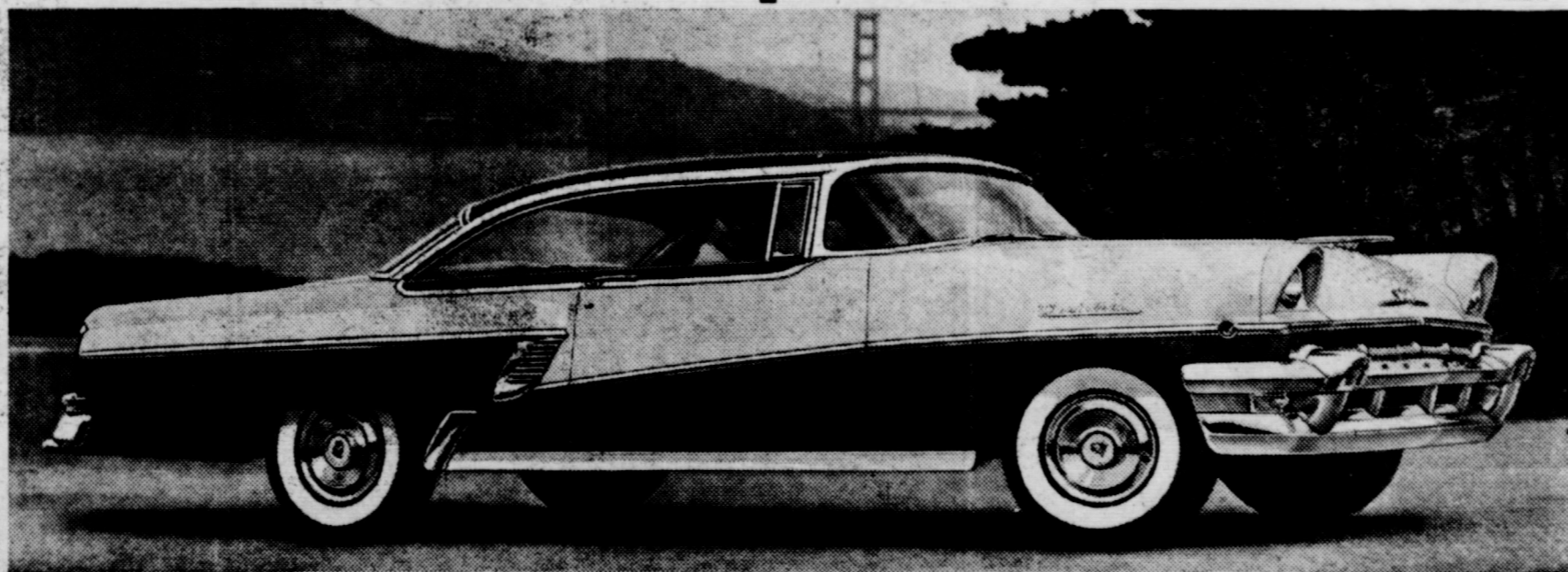

Coffee 'Sneak' Becomes 'Break' in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES—The first municipal recognition of man's inalienable right to drink a cup of coffee during working hours on the bosses' time is working out fine for both the City of Los Angeles and its 15,000 employees, according to Samuel Leask, Jr., administrative officer.

Los Angeles became the first U.S. city to legalize coffee breaks for municipal workers when it passed an ordinance authorizing employees to take 15 minutes each morning and afternoon at no loss of pay or time to themselves. Previously, city workers had been permitted to take such breaks but the time was deducted from their lunch periods when—and if—employees reported it.

According to Leask, replacement of the coffee "sneak" with the regulated coffee break has been a decided "plus" operation for the city.

"The purpose of making the coffee breaks legal and regulated was to increase work output and thus promote efficiency and economy in the conduct of city business," he said. "After several months of observation, it certainly seems to be working out that way."

"Just like the coffee break in offices and factories, our city rest periods have ended time-wasting 'sneak outs' and other abuses which were costly to taxpayers."

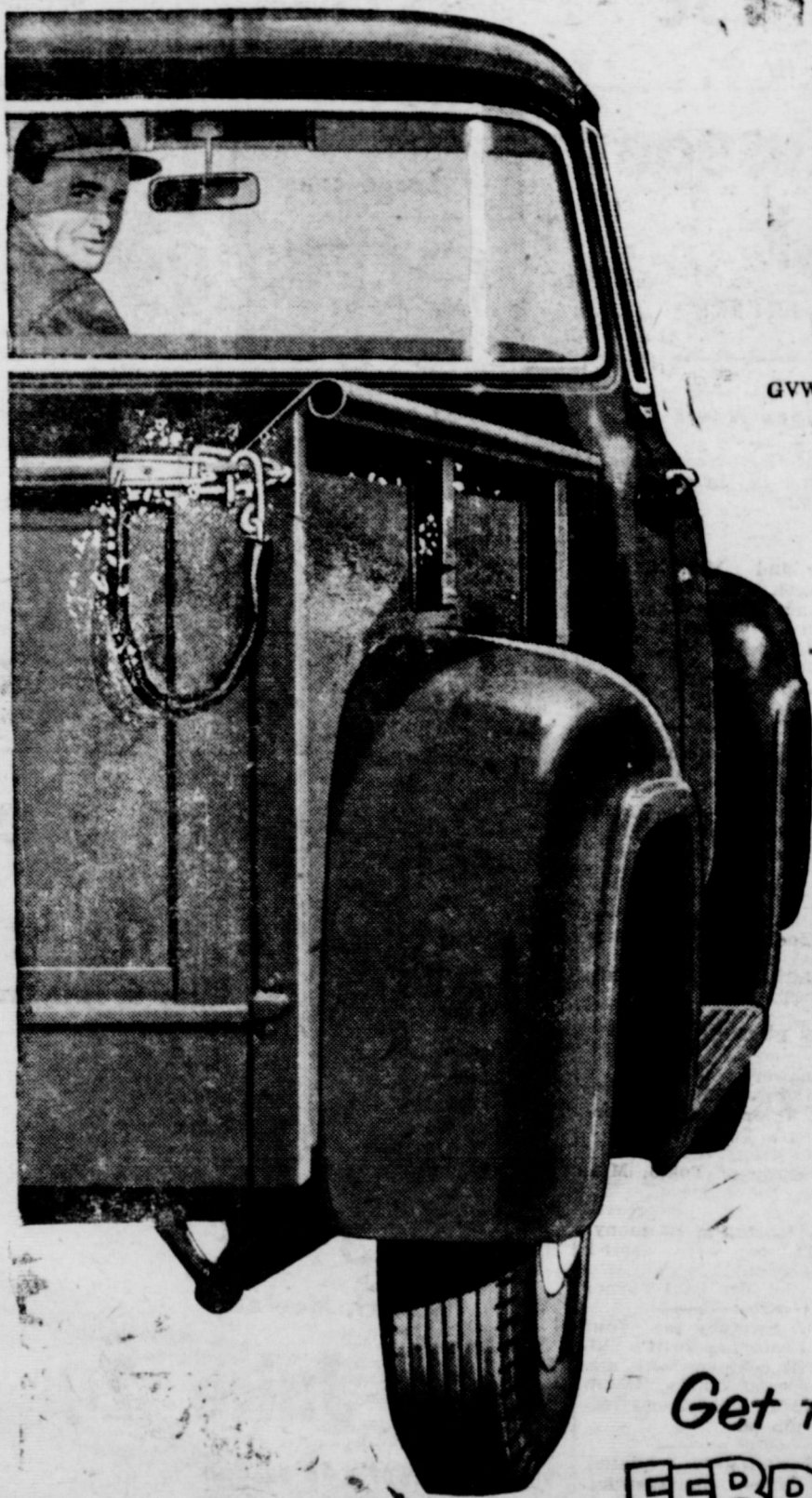
