WHATE WEST BESTERIO

Missoula, Mont., Has Third Largest Cave

MISSOULA, Mont.—This small town offers a large attraction to tourists—a huge cave exceeded in size only by New Mexico's Carlsbad Caverns and Kentucky's Mammoth Cave. Missoula's cave is the Lewis and Clark Cavern.

From the parking area, the entrance is half a mile away along the side of a slanting limestone cliff called Cave Mountain. A narrow-gauge jeep railway takes cave crawlers along a roadbed hewn out of rock to a point below the entry. Here they transfer to a cliff-side tramway, adapted from an electric mining hoist, which whisks them several hundred feet up to the cave door.

In addition to giving passengers a superb view of the snow-crested Tobacco, Root, Bridger and Gallatin peaks to the south, all this hauling and hoisting makes the cave trip easier. The route through the cave is ingeniously laid out so that the tour begins at the top. Virtually all of the stairways inside lead down.

The developed trail leads through small passages that connect huge stalagmite and stalactite studded rooms. The largest of these is the Cathedral Room, with dimensions of 450 by 600 feet and a 100-foot ceiling. Here there is a switchboard contrived to give six separate sets of lighting effects. Along the caveway are formations resembling waterfalls, the Empire State Building, animals, battlefields and fallen idols, to mention a few. One room looks as if it had been papered with strips of bacon. When tapped with a hammer, a row of stalactites in another room gives off graduated musical tones.
