BAIRD-Two Baird firemen attended Texas A&M Firemen's Training School in College Station, Texas, last week. This was the 67th Annual Municipal Texas Firemen's Training School sponsored by the State Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Association of Texas and conducted by the Fire Protection Training Division of TEEEX (Texas Engineering Extension Service).

Billy and Lesa Harris, members of the Baird Volunteer Fire Department, completed week long training session that included class room and live fire-fighting education. Lesa was registered in Fire Fighter 1 and Billy took a Fire Fighter 3 training course. The week started with rising at 5 a.m. Monday, eating breakfast at an A&M cafeteria and starting classes at 8 a.m.. The end of the first day came when classes let out at 7 p.m. eating supper and falling into a bed to rest for the next day. The day that Lesa was involved in her live fire projects the temperature was 103 degrees and the heat index was 125 degrees and that was in the shade away from any fires. The week ended Friday at noon and the trip back home.

This was Lesa's first year at A&M and Billy's second. She was sponsored by a

Texas Farm Bureau scholarship from the State Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Association of Texas. Normal cost to attend this school is \$450 per fireman plus travel expenses, the scholarships saved the Fire Department from that expense. Both Baird firefighters took vacation time from their jobs to participate in this years training session.

The Harris' were joined by 2,371 other firemen participating in this years Municipal School representing 775 cities and 25 states, countries, and territories all over the world. There were over 600 instructors presenting the training programs.

By these firefighters taking time to attend this training the City of Baird's fire insurance Key Rate (the Key Rate is the standard by which the Texas Department of insurance sets insurance rates for an area) will be credited 3%. Yearly attendance by a city's fire department keeps this lower rate in effect.

Members of Baird, Eula, Clyde, and Cross Plains Fire Departments were among the 38 Departments attending the meeting. Fourteen fire trucks that had been acquired through the Texas Forest Service, and used by area rural fire departments, were on display outside the Round Building at the West Texas Fair Grounds. A total of 9 area counties were represented by their fire departments, county commissioners, and county judges.

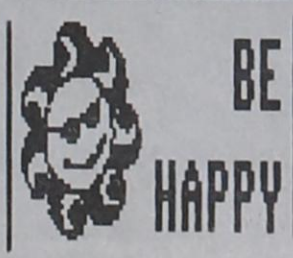

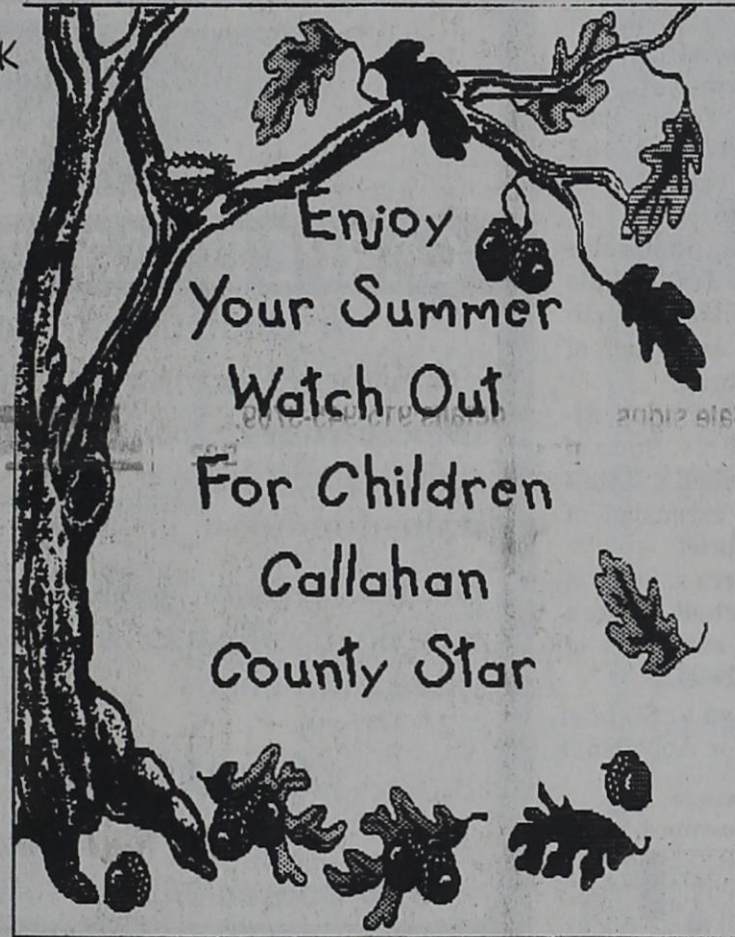

Research shows that many Americans have a cholesterol level that is too high for good long-term health. Many experts feel that the risk of heart attack and other complications of arteriosclerosis may begin to rise when cholesterol levels in most adults are over 200 mg/dl. The level may vary for individuals, according to variables including age, family history, other blood chemistry, medical history, etc. The good news is that the latest findings suggest that when you lower your total cholesterol and low density cholesterol in particular, you risk of heart attack,

stroke, some cancers and other health problems goes down. Some of these benefits can be obtained by many people just by making some changes in their diets, by cutting down on the amounts of total fat, especially saturated, animal fat, and cholesterol in the foods you consume. Cholesterol is carried through the body in chemical packages of fat and protein called lipoproteins. Have your doctor measure your total cholesterol ratios. Also measure your LDL, or low-density lipoprotein, the so called "bad" cholesterol, the artery clogging factor. High levels of LDL raise the risk of heart attack and other health problems. HDL, or high density

lipoprotein is the "good" cholesterol. High levels of HDL seem to protect against heart attack by helping to sweep LDL from the blood stream; Triglycerides are another fatty substance in the bloodstream that you should monitor. Some are burned for energy, while the rest are stored as body fat. High triglyceride levels may damage the heart and blood vessels, pancreas, insulin levels and cause other diseases. Ask your doctor what your levels of dietary fats you should consume based on your own health and risk factors.

In general, most doctors suggest that most adults consume in their diets no more than 20% to 30% of total calories

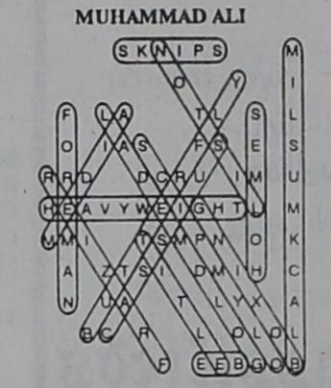

Mrs. Allbaugh said she was resigning to avoid any appearance of influence-peddling, the *Dallas Morning News* reported.

Her announcement came after Bush said he was troubled by the appearance of a conflict of interest. Bush also said he may initiate a policy to deal with such situations.

Joe Allbaugh said his wife's work did not conflict with his responsibilities in the governor's office, and Ray Sullivan, a spokesman for Bush, said the governor did not ask Diane Allbaugh to resign.

In a letter to Bush's general counsel, Mrs. Allbaugh wrote: "I regret that my effort to resume my professional life has caused such distractions, and trust that this action on my part will address fully any possible concerns."

Mrs. Allbaugh recently registered with the Texas Ethics Commission and Texas Utilities as a lobbyist, as required by law. AT&T was to pay her \$50,000 to \$100,000 a year, and Texas Utilities was to pay her \$25,000 to \$50,000 a year, the *Austin American-Statesman* reported.

Mr. Allbaugh's annual salary is \$125,000.

Sharp to Push for Tax Relief

Texas Comptroller John Sharp said last week he is confident Gov. Bush will address property tax relief during the 1997 legislative session.

If, however, Bush decides not to go forward with a plan, Sharp said he "would sure look at it then" because he's convinced that the tax burden shouldered by property owners is a problem — and besides, it's his job to help Bush find a way to fix it.

"I don't need public opinion polls or a set of hearings to tell me that the public is severely upset about what they see as trends in property taxes," Sharp said.

A special committee appointed by Bush and headed by Texas Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer is conducting hearings around Texas to gauge support of an alternative to local school property taxes —

about \$10 billion a year.

Bush and lawmakers are to decide what to do after Bomer's panel concludes its work in the fall.

Cancer Society Lauds Demos

The American Cancer Society praised the Texas Democratic Party for its decision last month to no longer accept contributions from tobacco companies.

"It's not easy to turn away money. They are very courageous, and we'd love to see lots of other states follow," American Cancer Society spokeswoman Jerie Jordan told the Associated Press last week. California Democrats banned the acceptance of tobacco money over two years ago.

Lester Van Pelt III of the Republican Party of Texas said the state GOP plans no ban on tobacco donations, the AP reported.

The \$50,000 the Texas Democratic Party received from Philip Morris last year made up about one-fourth of the state party's corporate account donations, according to reports filed with the Texas Ethics Commission.

Last spring, Attorney General Morales, a Democrat, filed a \$4 billion federal lawsuit against the tobacco industry seeking reimbursement of Medicaid money spent on treating tobacco-related illnesses.

Other Capital Highlights

■ U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, has been named chairwoman of the Subcommittee on Surface Transportation and Merchant Marine. She moved into the post after Majority Leader Sen. Trent Lott, R-Miss., relinquished chairmanship. The post is her first subcommittee chairmanship since she came to Congress in 1993.

■ For the first time in two decades, the number of state government jobs in Texas has declined, the *Wall Street Journal* reported last week. The decrease is 1.1 percent, or 2,919 positions for the first six months of the fiscal year, reducing the total payroll to 258,536 as of Feb. 29. Comptroller John Sharp estimated the reduction has saved taxpayers \$40 million.

AUSTIN — A legislative panel is expected to recommend that the responsibility for child-support collections be taken away from Texas Attorney General Dan Morales and given to a newly created "free-standing state entity."

The Senate Interim Committee on Juvenile Justice and Child Support has been reviewing the collections program for a year.

"The mothers and children of Texas cannot afford to keep this thing going," committee chairman Sen. Chris Harris, R-Arlington, told the *Dallas Morning News*.

A similar House panel, headed by Rep. Toby Goodman, R-Arlington, is studying the issue. Goodman said there is some sentiment among Democrats and Republicans on his committee for moving child support collections to another agency.

Morales, a Democrat, defended his handling of the child support collections program and said, "It wouldn't surprise me if maybe some politics are involved here. If that's the case, I think it's a shame because the children of Texas should never be used as political pawns."

Wife Resigns As Lobbyist

Diane Allbaugh, the wife of Gov. George W. Bush's executive assistant, Joe Allbaugh, announced her resignation last week as a lobbyist for AT&T and Texas Utilities — corporations that have issues to be considered in the 1997

bipartisan welfare reform bill, I voted against the Majority's bill because of my opposition to the federal government dictating to the states a "one-size-fits-all" approach for mandating work requirements.

Under my welfare reform bill, welfare as a federal entitlement would be eliminated and the program would have been turned over to the states with tough work requirements and time limits on benefits.

As a conferee, I look forward to addressing the issue of unfunded mandates being placed on our state and local governments, along with my concerns about the impact of the Majority's bill on poor children.

I am encouraged by a July 23 vote in which House Republicans accepted a motion to instruct conferees regarding elimination of unfunded man-

dates on state and local governments, maximizing protections for children, preventing the creation of a larger uninsured population, and guaranteeing welfare savings are devoted to deficit reduction.

Earlier this year, I helped Texas secure a waiver from federal requirements for the welfare reform bill passed by the Texas Legislature and signed by Governor Bush.

Texas is in the process of implementing an important overhaul of the state's welfare system, but the Texas plan does not meet the requirements of the Majority's bill.

I just don't believe the federal government should be able to tell Texans what works best. Texas can best determine how we look after our needy children and elderly, and how we put able-bodied people to work.

Rural Health Legislation Introduced
This week the Rural Health Improvement Act of 1996, bipartisan legislation I helped to write to ensure affordability and access to quality health care in rural areas, re-

ceived the endorsement of several major rural health organizations.

Additionally, the chairman of the Rural Health Care Coalition indicated that he has received assurances from the House leadership that rural health care reform will be considered this year.

The bill reduces the wide variation in Medicare payment rates that exists between providers in rural areas and those in larger cities, who generally receive a much higher rate.

House Passes Law Enforcement Funding

On July 24, I voted in support of the 1997 Commerce, Justice, State and Judiciary Appropriations bill. This bill provides \$571 million for Local Law Enforcement Block Grants to help reduce crime, improve public safety, hire new police officers, establish crime prevention programs and drug courts.

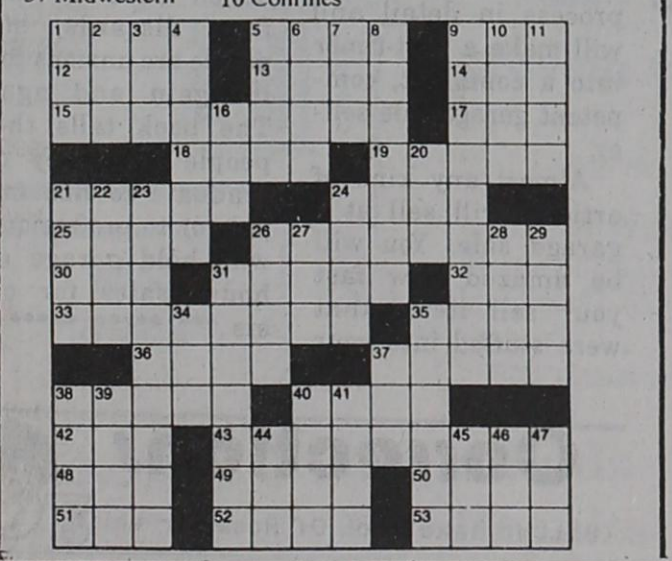

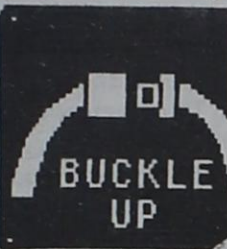

FEDERAL FUNDING TO HELP FIGHT TX WILD FIRE

Federal funds have been authorized by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to help Texas battle the uncontrolled Lacey fire located in Trinity County.

FEMA Director James Lee Witt said the action was taken July 17 immediately after receiving the state's request for federal fire suppression assistance. At the time of the request, the state reported that the fire had burned some 130 acres of land and was posing a threat to residents in the community of Lacey and the town of Groveton.

Under the authorization, FEMA will pay 70% of the state's eligible fire fighting costs. a total of 52 fire suppression grants was previously approved by FEMA to help fight the rash of wildfires that plagued the state earlier this year.

Federal fire suppression aid is provided through the President's Disaster Relief Fund and made available by FEMA to assist in fighting fires when they threaten to cause a major disaster. Eligible state fire fighting costs covered by the aid can include expenses for field camps; equipment use, repair and replacement; tools, materials and supplies; and mobilization and demobilization activities.

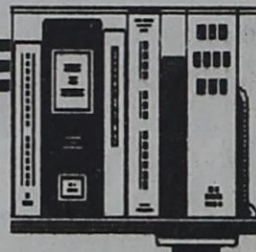

First, we have a very nice healthy locality, and an energetic little town of about 100 inhabitants, there are four dry goods and grocery stores, one drug store, one blacksmith and wood shop, one liquor and grocery store, one hotel, one restaurant and one private boarding house. We have a school with about forty pupils in attendance."

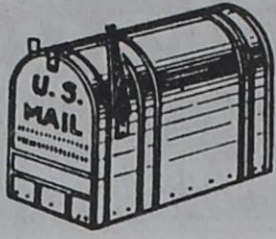

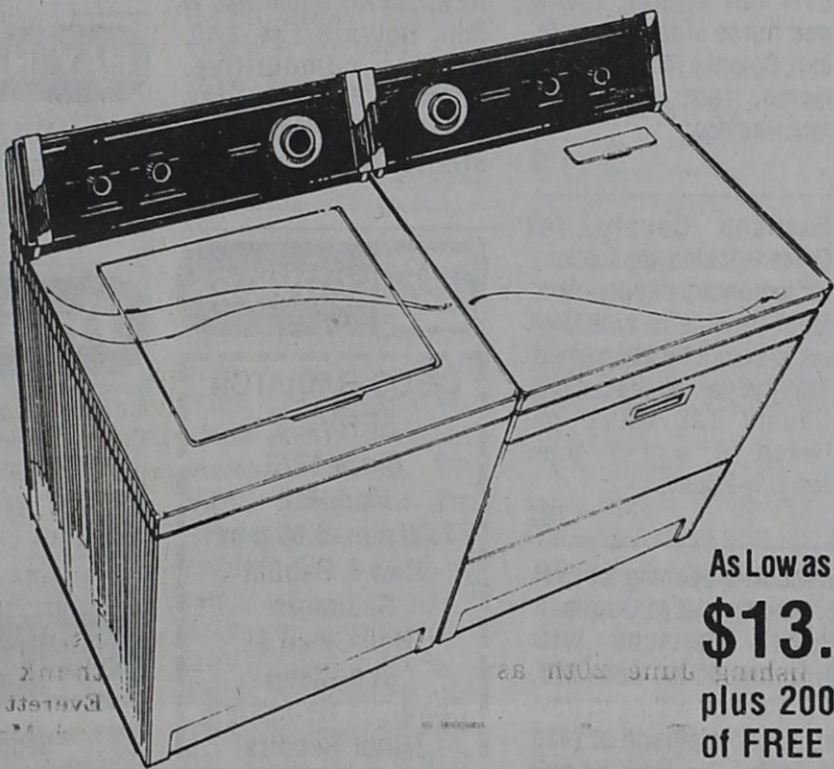

Ligaments are bands of fibrous tissue that connect bones and tissue and help to control joints such as the ankle. Few people think about their ligaments unless they suffer a sprain. This happens when a ligament's fibers are stretched or torn, usually because of a sudden, awkward movement that creates excessive stress. Sprains vary in the intensity of their effects -- swelling, pain, discoloration and loss of joint mobility. Cold compresses applied immediately can help relieve swelling. The process of healing depends on how much the ligament bands were stretched or if they were torn. In most cases the podiatrist treats sprains, even some involving tears, with moderate means. For some torn ligaments, surgery is the solution. Protecting ligaments is one reason that stretching exercises are in order prior to starting a jog, tennis game or other sports. 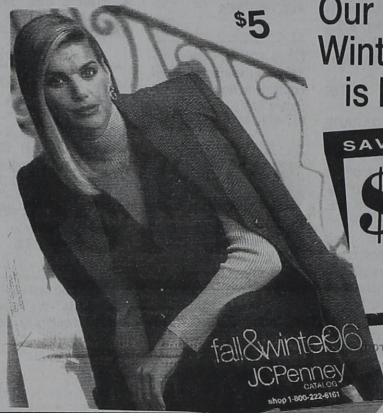

Legislation To Provide Planting Flexibility

Washington, D.C.—Congressman Charles Stenholm announced House passage of legislation that will allow farmers to plant blackeyed peas and other crops following the failure of crops on contract acres, without forfeiting their transition payments.

Stenholm cosponsored this legislation because of an interpretation of the 1996 farm bill by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) prohibiting the planting of most fruit and vegetable crops on contract acreage.

According to the USDA, producers in Texas, even in counties designated as "double cropping regions," cannot plant blackeyed peas following a failed cotton crop, without for-

feiting their transition payments.

Under the 1996 farm bill, program crop producers who met the USDA's criteria for having suffered crop failures on paid acres were permitted to plant a fruit or vegetable crop on those failed acres without the loss of deficiency payments.

"I do not believe the authors of the 1996 farm bill intended to prohibit or restrict planting options relative to the past, and I feel certain that their aim was, at a bare minimum, to maintain the producer's freedom to farm his land at 1990 levels," said Stenholm.

In Texas, blackeyed peas have been historically grown on "failed" cotton acreage because of



Q: I heard that state speed limits supercede lower city speed limits; you have to pay the fine on local tickets, but they won't go on your record. Can it be true that city speed limits don't really mean anything more than a fine?

A: State Speed limits don't supercede lower city speed limits. Cities have the authority to post and enforce speed limits. Speeding tickets are issued in cities and counties can end up on your driving record. Speeding tickets do mean more than a fine. The speed limit designates the safe speed for that particular roadway in good weather. When you speed, you can increase your chances of being involved in an accident. In addition to thinking about your safety and the safety of other motorists, you should think about the civil liabilities if it's proven your speeding resulted in an accident.

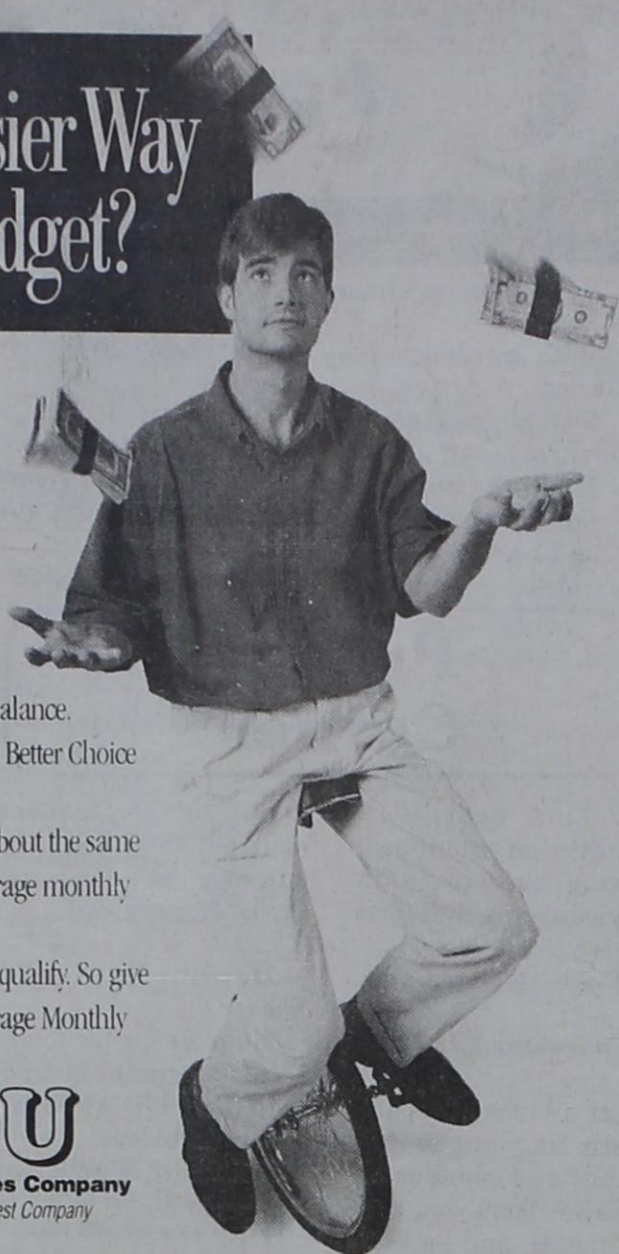

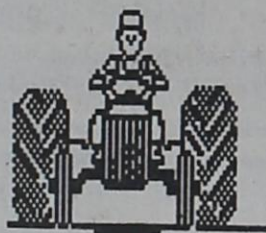

Rabies, a disease that invariably kills its victims, is occurring in Coleman and Callahan Counties. In 1996, there have been 6 confirmed cases of the disease affecting four skunks, a goat and a dog in these two counties. Local officials state that there have been many more reports of foxes and skunks showing the signs of rabies, but the animals were not submitted for lab confirmation.

The rabid dog, which lived in the Comanche Shores addition, exposed at least 17 other animals before it died. Some of these animals have been destroyed, while others are undergoing post-exposure treatment.

Since rabies can be transmitted from wildlife to pets and humans, people living in areas where rabies occurs need to be aware of

the disease. They also need to know how to protect themselves and their families, according to Dr. James Wright, Regional Veterinarian for the Texas Department of Health. Some of Dr. Wright's recommendations are:

1. Vaccinate your pets. If a dog or cat fights a rabid animal without your knowledge, it could bring rabies into your home. Note: Many people are bitten by an animal that is "not theirs," though it hangs around the house and they feed it.

2. Teach your children not to play with stray or wild animals. "If you don't know the animal's name, stay away from it."

3. If you are bitten: -Immediately wash the wound

-Do not let the animal get away. It must be quarantined 10 days or submitted to the lab for testing. Do not shoot in the head.

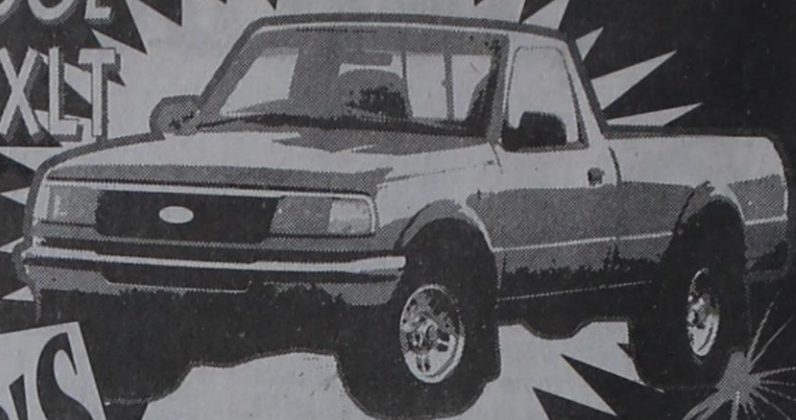
-Talk to your doctor about the need for post-exposure treatment.

4. If your pet is exposed to an animal that might be rabid, see your veterinarian. It will need post-exposure treatment to protect it and your family.

Rabies is not rampant in the Big Country, but like rattlesnakes, it does exist here.

Therefore, we need to know what to do to minimize the risks to ourselves and our families.

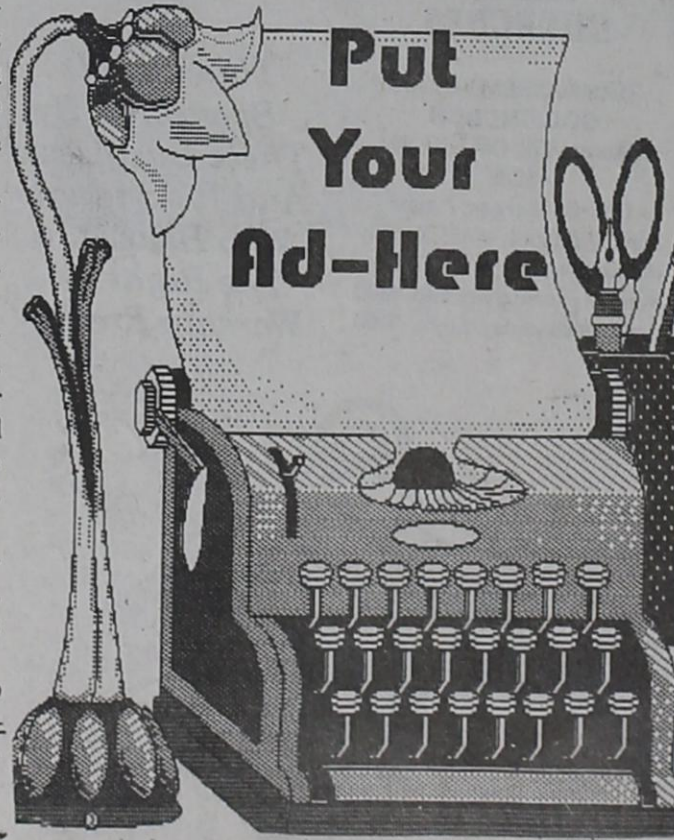
