## Cross Plains To Receive Extended Calling Beginning October 17

GTE Telephone Operations will extend local calling for all customers in the Cross Plains telephone service area, beginning Oct. 17. Under the plan, all calls to Baird, Brownwood, Coleman, Cisco, Clyde, Eastland and Putnam will be local calls. Calls from these communities to Cross Plains will also be local calls.

These calls are equivalent to local calls, and all customers in the towns having the new Expanded Local Calling (ELC) must now dial all seven digits, both for local calls and ELC calls.

The implementation of this seven-digit service may require modification to some telecommunications equipment such as fax machines, speed calling, PABXs, key system, automatic dialers and other equipment that may restrict or automatically dial long-distance numbers.

Customers are not required to take any action to take advantage of the new service offering. Once extended calling is operational, it will no

longer be necessary for customers to dial "1+" before the number when placing calls between these communities, but you must dial all seven digits for local and ELC calls.

This is a result of balloting which took place in the Cross Plains telephone service area. Under those guidelines,

certain communities were allowed to petition for extended toll-free local calling to nearby communities.

A per-line increase in the total monthly bill of \$3.50 for residential customers and \$7.00 for business customers will be assessed to customers in Cross Plains for the added service.

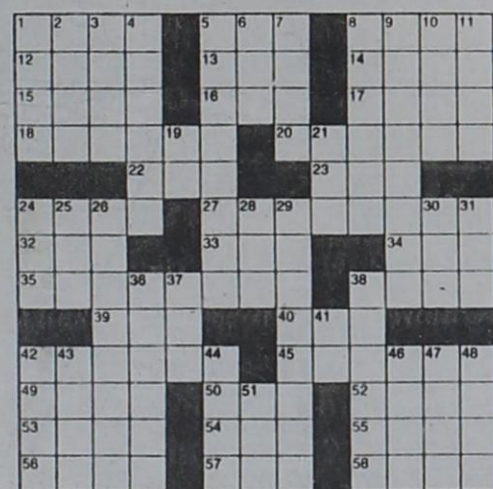

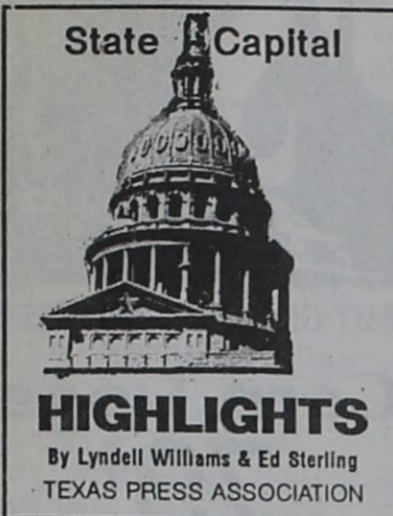
Among them, the legendary Biltmore Hotel serves as the setting for Buddy Love's special din-

### forward to the committee's report. Sports Park Tax Discussed

The House Business and Industry Committee discussed a proposal that would allow a city, county or group of counties to put a resolution before local voters to acquire, build or renovate a sports venue with specific taxes.

The state comptroller would review such resolutions to ensure they would not cost the state money.

Committee chairman Kim Brimer, R-Arlington, worked to defeat a similar bill in the 1995 legislative session that would have allowed tax dollars to be used for professional sports facilities.

"Since I killed it, I thought I ought to come back and try to clean it up and see if I can do something with it," Brimer told the Associated Press.

Brimer called the 1995 bill "corporate welfare" and said sports facilities are regional projects and should be financed regionally, the AP reported.

The new proposal includes local taxing options that would raise sales and use taxes 0.5 percent, car rental taxes up to 5 percent, admission taxes up to \$2 per person, parking tax up to \$1 per vehicle and hotel occupancy tax up to 2 percent of the room price.

Brimer said the sports facility proposal is opposed by car rental companies and the Texas Hotel & Motel Association.

### Welfare Plan Raises Questions

Mike McKinney, Texas Health and Human Services Commissioner, last week recommended that top state officials accept money from the federal government now to fund welfare programs.

Every day the state waits after Oct. 1, it stands to lose money — about \$270,000 a day — because the welfare rolls are shrinking, McKinney said.

But Gov. Bush, Lt. Gov. Bullock and House Speaker Pete Laney aren't ready to accept the money until they are sure that doing so won't hurt Texas' budget. Losing money by waiting must be balanced against other costly measures that

will be triggered once the law goes into effect, they said.

"Remember 60 years of welfare as we know it has been changed very quickly in a 700-page bill. That has far-reaching consequences for the states and for the federal government too," Bullock told the *American-Statesman*.

The Health and Human Services Commission will have a public hearing on the issue Sept. 24.

### Regulators Taking Action

Nursing home regulators adopted a plan that would improve the handling of public complaints.

The action came after pressure from state leaders, following the publication of an *American-Statesman* report that showed the Texas Board of Nursing Facility Administrators had not disciplined anyone in three years, despite hundreds of complaints.

Gov. Bush's spokesman, Ray Sullivan, said the governor considers the plan "a step in the right direction."

The board voted to:

- Prioritize complaints and ensure swift and appropriate action is taken.
- Call for an October vote on a proposed code of ethics for administrators.
- Conduct more frequent meetings.
- Share information and cooperate on hearings and investigations with the Texas Department of Human Services, which regulates nursing homes.
- Add more members or consultants to the board's complaints committee.

Health Commissioner to Tech

Texas Health Commissioner David Smith resigned last week to accept an appointment as president of the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center in Lubbock.

The appointment was announced by Texas Tech Chancellor John Montford, who retired last month from a 14-year career in the state Senate.

Smith, who served as health commissioner since 1992, will head Tech's medical school, which has branches in Amarillo, Odessa and El Paso.

## Rep. John Cook Is Appointed To Southern States Energy Board

Austin—Texas House Speaker Pete Laney has named Representative

John Cook, D-Breckenridge, to the Southern States Energy Board.

The Southern States Energy Board can determine a regional position on energy-related and environmental concerns, collect energy information, conduct training programs for state and local personnel and perform various other functions related to energy and environmental concerns. Representative Cook will be one of three appointees from Texas to serve on the board. He fills a vacancy on the board and will serve at the pleasure of the speaker.

Other member states include Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Puerto Rico, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and West Virginia.

"I appreciate Representative Cook's willingness to take on this new responsibility," Speaker Laney said.

Representative Cook represents Texas House District 60, which includes Callahan, Eastland, Hood, Palo Pinto, Runnels, Shackelford and Stephens counties and part of Taylor County. He has been a House member since 1991. He is a member of the House Appropriations Committee and is vice-chair of the Juvenile Justice and Family Issues Committee. He served two terms on the House Energy Resources Committee.

AUSTIN — Texas homeowners who have cried for tax relief may see their school property taxes cut next year if the state Legislature puts more of the burden on the business sector.

Speaking to reporters following a Rotary Club meeting, Sen. Bill Ratliff, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, suggested that a "hybrid" tax could spread the burden evenly among businesses.

Ratliff said a sales tax increase would not be a good option, but the combination of a gross receipts tax on business and a value-added tax on goods might fare better in the Legislature.

"We have to fashion a system that doesn't have a disproportionate impact on any one business sector," he said, and predicted, "You will see a plan from the governor's office, if no where else, that will have a significant reduction of property taxes."

Ratliff and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock both expressed doubt regarding legislators' willingness to fight the battles that must be fought to shift the tax burden. The school property tax raised \$10 billion last year.

Meanwhile, last week, the Citizens Committee on Property Tax Relief had its final meeting. The panel, appointed by Gov. George W. Bush, traveled the state seeking public input on relief from school property taxes.

Bush spokesman Ray Sullivan told the *Austin American-Statesman* the governor is looking

Texas Essential Knowledge And Skills Extended

The review period for the second draft of the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) has been extended through October 31, 1996. The TEKS will replace the Texas Essential Elements that teachers were required to incorporate into their lesson plans in each course taught in public schools. The new format focuses on what the student learns rather than what the teacher must teach.

The extension means that teachers and other educators, parents, and members of the community will

have more time to review and provide substantive recommendations for the TEKS. Also the writing teams will have more time to prepare the third draft in response to these suggestions.

Draft 2 is available to school staff, parent, and other community members at least through October 31. Education Service Centers will also have at least 15 free copies of the TEKS available for check out for at least 72 hours. Responses received by October 31 will be forwarded to the writing teams for their

actions. The draft is also available on the internet at the following address: <http://www.tea.state.tx.us:700/teks/index.htm>

Regional education service centers will be holding a public hearing in each region to allow additional opportunity for input.

The adoption schedule for the TEKS as approved by the Texas State Board of Education 09/13/96, follows.

### FINANCIAL STAKES YOU SHOULD AVOID (PART 1)

We all make mistakes in managing our finances, but some mistakes are worse than others. Here are four of the biggest mistakes to avoid.

**Buying investments over the phone.** Make it a rule to never buy an investment over the phone. Thousands of people have lost money in investment scams promoted by fast-talking telephone salesmen. And even if the product is legitimate, remember that the person who called is only interested in making a sale, not in finding the right solution for your investment needs. If you're too polite to hang up, ask for a prospectus that you can study at your leisure. That at least will sort out the crooks from the legitimate salespeople.

**Putting tax-exempt investments inside your 401 (k) or IRA.** The big advantage of these retirement vehicles is that the earnings grow tax-deferred. So it's a waste to invest the funds in tax-exempt instruments such as municipal bonds. If you do, you're giving up a higher return for a tax advantage you can't use. Instead, invest in higher-yielding taxable investments, since the earnings inside your plan are tax-deferred anyway.

**Chasing tax shelters.** An obsession with minimizing taxes can often lead to poor investment decisions. Tax-exempt investments may have a place in your portfolio, but often it makes financial sense to choose a taxable investment and pay tax on the earnings. Never buy an investment just because it's tax-exempt.

**Taking premature distributions from your IRA.** Taking money from your IRA before age 59 1/2 should be the last thing you do. If you do, you'll generally pay a 10% penalty tax plus the normal tax on the amount you withdraw. Make sure you've exhausted every other possibility before you tap into your IRA savings.

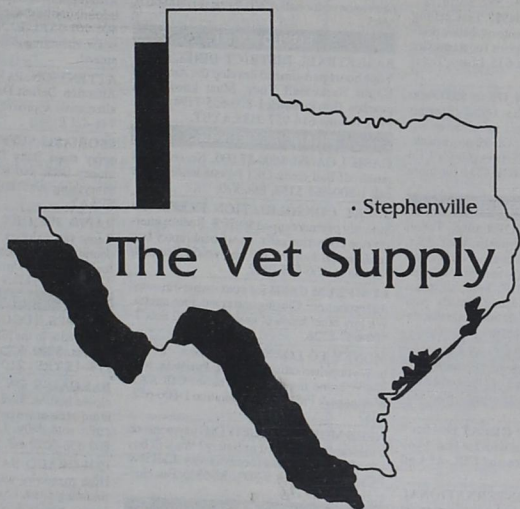

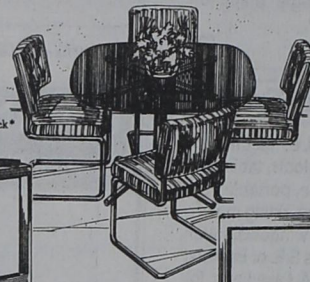

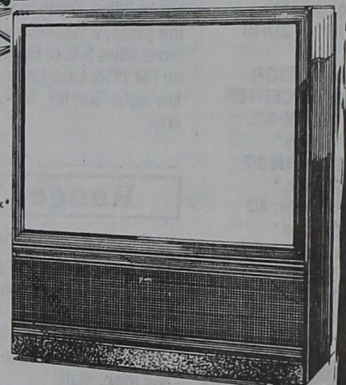

This benefit is \$8,246 annually for a single Veteran and \$10,801 for a Veteran with one dependent. As with all pension, ALL OTHER INCOME counts against the pension. Credit is given for unreimbursed medical expenses, including Medicare insurance cost, and these credits can increase the amount of pension received.

## Callahan County Veterinary Clinic Report

Dog with heartworms are being diagnosed on a regular basis in our area. 13 cases have been diagnosed since the first of the year and more cases are sure to be found before the end of the year. Many of these cases would not have been found until clinical signs of heart disease were evident, but increased awareness of the problem has increased the testing for heartworms. Our area was once thought to be a low incidence area, but with the rapid increase in the numbers of heartworm cases we must take a more aggressive approach to the

problem. Heartworms are on the increase: Mild winters increased rainfall resulting in more mosquitoes and year around exposure; Owners traveling with their dogs either to or from areas with severe heartworm problems; Owners more aware of the problem which result in more testing of infected dogs. Heartworm checks and preventatives must be initiated to decrease the incidence of the disease. This is such a deadly disease that it is well worth reminding owners of certain facts.

--The net result of heartworm disease is the serious mechanical damage it causes to a dog's heart, lungs, liver and kidneys. But while it is stopping up kidneys and blood flow, there are few outward signs of all of the internal damage being caused until the disease is very far along. --Mosquitoes are key carriers of heartworm disease. When an infected dog is bitten by a mosquito, blood is carried away which may include tiny, immature forms of heartworms called microfilaria. --It takes about 3 months for these larvae to travel through the tissues of the body to enter

the heart. Dozens of these larvae (some of which can actually become up to .14 inches long) become adults within another three months. By that time, much of the mechanical damage just mentioned has become fact.

Thanks to research and modern preventative medicine, there is a lot you can do to avoid heartworms in the first place or see that it is successfully treated if it hasn't progressed too far:

--A blood test is the only way to detect heartworm disease in its early stages.

--Since it's possible for an infected dog to have adult heartworms without microfilaria, an X-Ray examination and other lab tests may be needed to confirm heartworm infection.

--After the disease has progressed, symptoms can include frequent coughing, sluggishness, rapid tiring and finally, labored breathing.

--If caught in time, a series of injections of an organic arsenical drug can be used to kill heartworms. Then another drug can be used to get rid of the microfilaria.

--No vaccine is available for heartworm disease, but we can give you regular doses of a drug which can prevent infective larvae from developing into adult heartworms. This can be in the form of a daily tablet or a month tablet.

# Learning Serenity In Today's World 12-Steppin' STILL ON STEP 1

Psalm 31:9, 10  
(My eye wastes away with grief,

Yes my soul and my body! For my life is spent with grief, And my years with sighing; My strength fails because of my iniquity, And my bones waste away.)

David laments, "My life is spent with grief." For those of us who have contended with crippling dependencies, such lamentation is necessary if we are to fully surrender our broken lives to God.

Although we may associate brokenness, or or powerlessness, with defeat, in reality this admission is the first building block toward lasting victory over all of our addictions and dependencies. A paradox of our recovery is that we must give up to in order to win.

Usually the admission of powerlessness cannot be achieved unless we have first assessed the magnitude and gravity of our addiction has cost us. We may want to compile a list of the losses that have resulted from the practice of our dependencies. These losses may include such things as diminished vocational achievement, impaired intimacy in our most important relationships, and even a ruptured spiritual relationship with God.

Only as we appreciate the full grief of those losses can we approach the surrender required in Step 1. Grieving a David grieves cleanses our wounds so that the healing can begin.

Go Baird! Remember To Stop At School Crosswalks

Psalm 38:1-9  
David is called "the man after God's own heart" (see 1 Sam. 13:14, Acts 13:22). We would think that such a person would have a life of peace and serenity. Yet Psalm 38 shows us that David experienced periods in his life when he had to go back to Square One. In this psalm, he mourns over how unmanageable his life has become. He has strayed from allowing God to control his life; and because of this, he admits he has become foolish (v.5) and crushed by his own behavior (v.4). David realizes his behavior has caused him great physical and emotional pain. He declares in verse 8, "I am feeble and severely broken." Nevertheless, surrender to God does not come easily, for he still experiences groaning "because of the turmoil of [his] heart" (v.8).

An ironic aspect of addiction is that letting go of the things that cause us misery is extremely difficult. But with David we can say to God, "My sighing is not hidden from You" (v.9). God knows our struggles and will give us the power to look to Him for help.

### Views On Dental Health

#### TEETH ARE TOUGH...BUT...

Teeth are tough! Did you know that the outside layer of teeth (the enamel) is the second hardest naturally occurring substance. Only diamond is harder. That's one reason why more human teeth are found as prehistoric relics than any other part of the body.

It seems paradoxical that such a fabulously hard substance should be such easy prey to decay. It's amazing how teeth can decay in short order from contact with sugar and its eventual change into enamel-eating acid.

Another thing to be careful of is eating extremely hot and cold foods together. For example, drinking hot coffee while eating ice cream is liable to make teeth crack, because tooth

enamel and the dentin underneath it expand and contract at different rates as they react to temperature changes. Tooth enamel is not damaged by hot liquids, but if something cold is consumed immediately afterward, the enamel contracts and could crack. Hot drinks are usually about 140 degrees Fahrenheit, ice cream is about 35 degrees. That much sudden change can be harmful to teeth.
