Good Rain Hits East Area

Spotted showers last Wednesday afternoon gave a very good rain to an estimated 80 sections east and southeast of town and extending westward from O'Donnell. The town registered .65 inches in the brief shower. The Ragan, Schooler Harris and Pirtle farms and vicinity got from 1.5 inches and a total of 3 inches. Draw got only a shower. Rain water was running over the Draw highway 3 hours after the rain and several fields were flooded. Wells got an inch but Mrs. Taylor at New Moore reported only a shower. Some 20 percent of area remains too dry for planting.

Corn Is Growing

Young grain is growing off nicely and farmers are looking to August for a decision on the crop. A number of O'Donnell and eastern men have left over the past three months to work. An estimated 30 to 40 rent houses are vacant in town.

To date O'Donnell has registered 3.32 inches of rain in July of a hit and run nature and a total of LESS than 7 inches for the year. Most of winter and spring rains in too small amounts to be effective.

Few farmers believe the long drought is broken but most believe the drought end is near.

School Opens Sept. 7th

Although it is expected there will be some decrease in the number of students for the 1953-54 school year, the School Board and Administration are looking forward to one of the best years for O'Donnell Schools in many respects.

Repairs and maintenance of the school buildings and grounds has been kept up in very good shape. The big improvement has been seeding to grass of the elementary school grounds. The grass has grown nicely and it is believed will stand up under use this coming year. The grass should be a big protection for the building from blowing sand and give the children a good place for their playground activities. Refinishing of floors, painting of walls and many other necessary items of maintenance are completed or are underway.

Faculty Prospects Good

Faculty prospects for next year look very good. Most of the teachers are coming back and as things stand at the moment all positions are tentatively filled. There may be some resignations within the next two weeks so a roster of teachers will not be published until the 2nd week in August. The community can well be proud of their teachers in that nearly all of them have attended school this summer or have traveled extensively. This is a mark of interest so far as the teacher is concerned and should definitely mean a better educational program for your children.

Election To Be Set

A petition calling for a bond assumption and tax rate election has been signed and will be presented to the School Board Thursday night. The need for this election comes as a result of the consolidation of the O'Donnell and New Moore districts. Whenever there is a consolidation an election must be held for bond assumption and tax rate levy. Since New Moore had no bonds it will simply be assumption of O'Donnell bonds in existence. This is NOT AN ELECTION FOR NEW BONDS OF ANY DESCRIPTION. Supt. John Morris said. It will be necessary to keep the present tax rate of \$1.50 in order to finance the school properly. Notice of date of election will be made in next issue.

Parents are reminded to have their children given a pre-school check up particularly in regard to eyes, also for younger children to have smallpox vaccination and diptheria shots.

School will open the first Monday in September, Sept. 7th. Further information in connection with opening of school will be given at a later date.

Supt. Morris said that he wished to thank all the patrons and taxpayers for their interest in their school system. Good schools are a cheap investment; poor schools are a costly investment.

Water Survey Set

A farm to farm, ranch to ranch survey of Texas water resources is now underway in an effort to gauge drought effect on public health.

The State Department of Health conducted a similar survey earlier this year on incorporated cities and towns but it failed to show the status of privately owned water sources such as farm and ranch tanks and private wells. Information is being sought by questionnaires sent from the State Health Department to all county judges. When complete a compilation sheet will be made showing:

Towns with ample water supplies; towns with impending shortages; number of wells and tanks and the amount of water available from them; how much water is being hauled and from where; steps rural organizations are taking to relieve their shortages; to what extent is land being irrigated; and what outside help is necessary to relieve shortages in individual communities.

National attention has been directed.

ROAD REPAIR MAPS TO BE ISSUED

Every two weeks a highway road condition bulletin will be issued as a special service to the motoring public. D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, announced today in Austin.

"We are spending a large amount of money for maintenance and reconstruction this year and feel that motorists should be provided with information on the location of these projects for driving convenience, economy, and safety," he said. Greer explained that these road conditions will be reflected on a small map showing the principal highways with symbols indicating the location and type of construction that would be encountered on various routes. These road condition bulletins, he continued, will assist motorists in steering clear of construction work and as a result keep traffic at a minimum thru construction areas. This will enable highway maintenance workers to complete a job in a minimum time with a maximum of safety.

Road condition bulletins are available free in the Highway District offices and Travel Information Bureaus or they can be obtained direct by writing the Traffic Services Division of the Highway Department in Austin.

Service Is FREE

Plans have been completed for the free Tuberculosis Mass Chest X-Ray Survey to be held in Tahoka for all of Lynn County on Saturday, August 1 and Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, August 4, 5, and 6th. A. M. Bray was recently named chairman for the survey by the general committee and the test will be made in the air conditioned Bray Chevrolet showrooms. All people of the county are urged to participate in this free X ray program whether they have had tuberculosis or have had a recent X ray or not.

In addition to tuberculosis, the X-ray may possibly locate evidence of cancer, bone diseases and maladjustments, etc.

Each X ray picture is studied by experts and a report is made to the physician of the individual's choice.

State Health authorities have given the following basic facts concerning tuberculosis and the X ray program:

- 1. Tuberculosis is communicable. It can be spread generally by direct contact. No one is born with tuberculosis; it is spread from one active case to another person.
- 2. It is possible to feel well and not know that you have tuberculosis, as in early cancer.
- 3. Tuberculosis can be cured if found early enough.

Knowing whether or not you have T. B. you can protect others and get early treatment for yourself. You can find whether or not you have tuberculosis simply by getting a chest X ray at least once a year.

All persons 15 years of age or over can get an X ray on any of the dates mentioned above in Tahoka.

This X ray survey is free. Several years ago the same service was given in O'Donnell.

A. No. National Service Life Insurance policies do not participate in dividends during the period when such premium waiver is in effect.

Q. Will my service at the U. S. Military Academy at West Point count toward my entitlement for Korean GI Bill training?

A. No. The time you spent as a cadet at West Point does not count toward your entitlement for training under the Korean GI Bill. The same rule applies to those who attend the U. S. Naval Academy and the Coast Guard Academy.

Q. I am a disabled World War 2 veteran and I've just finished Public Law 16 training. Will VA now find me a job?

Yep, Your Ed. Has It

You don't have to be a Mickey Mantle or a Babe Zahariis to be eligible for athlete's foot. You are qualified just by being human.

This ringworm foot infection can come to either sex at any age at any time, although it is more prevalent during summer months when feet are more apt to perspire.

You'll know you've got it when your feet begin itching and blistering and when you see the soggy dead skin between the toes or on the soles. Take action then, and you can usually get rid of it in a hurry. But neglect it and you are in trouble.

Here are some suggestions which will prevent athlete's foot or help you get rid of it if you have it now. Dry carefully and thoroughly between your toes after bathing and as often as practical during the day. The disease is caused by a fungus which thrives on damp, perspiring feet. Massage your feet with a mild rubbing alcohol. This will help prevent spreading the infection from one spot to another.

Dust a good fungicide powder or even an unscented talcum powder or powdered boric acid between the toes, in stockings and shoes. If at all practical, change stockings once during the day.

Swab all cracks or soggy areas between the toes with one part iodine diluted with 10 parts of alcohol. Wear absorbent socks and put a piece of cotton on areas between the toes where cracks or soreness are evident.

Don't use remedies which have been sold for eczema. Consult your physician if the cracks and blisters and soreness do not yield to these measures.

Draft Law Explained

Any young married man registered with a draft board had better be on the alert about any expected additions to his family. If his wife is expecting their first child, it is to his interest to tell the board about it immediately.

If he does not take this highly necessary step and the draft board sends him an order to report for induction, then the draft board has no authority to defer him on the basis of the unborn child. Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director, points out.

Afterward, the law requires a man to report birth of children into his family, just as it requires him to provide the local board at all times with his latest change of address.

As long as he has only a wife to support, he's as eligible for a hitch in the Army as a single man. When he has a child in his family, or one has been conceived and not as yet born, the law provides for his deferment, provided he tells the board about it before he is ordered for induction. Draft regulations require that a man with an unborn child be deferred if he files with

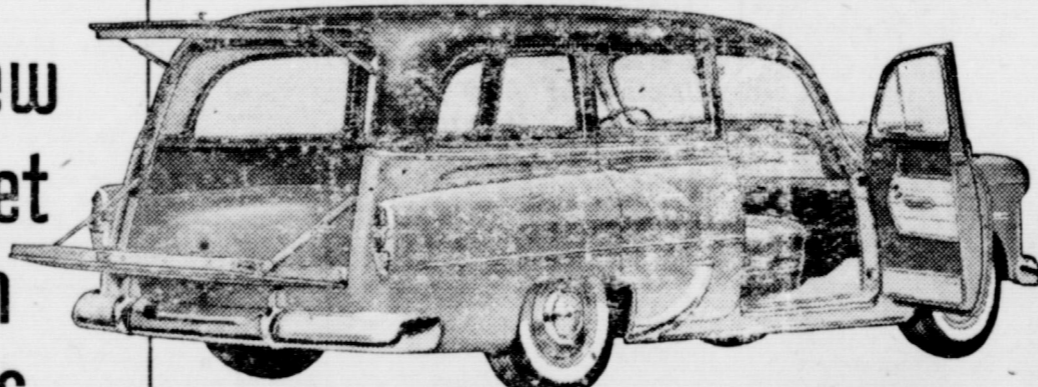
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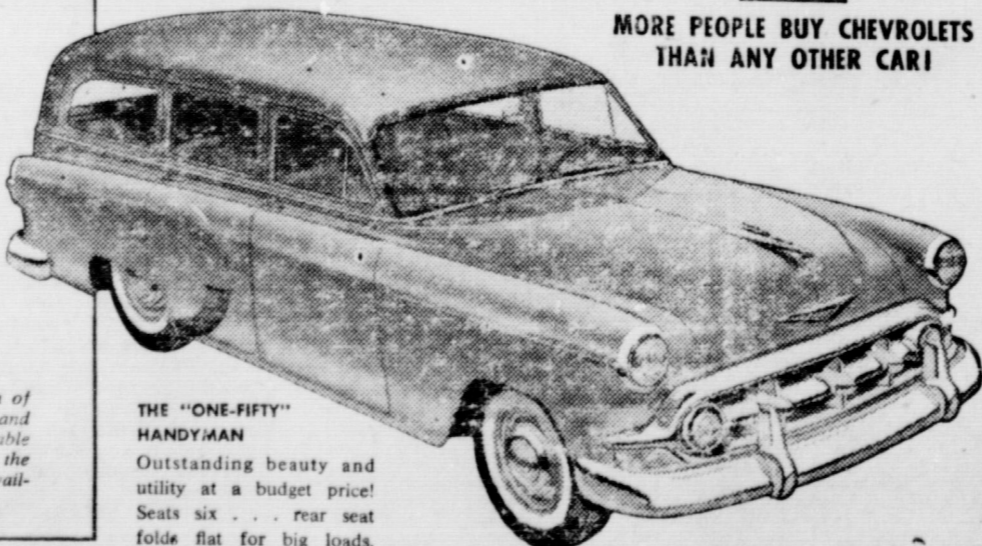
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DROUGHT FEEDING LIVESTOCK

Producers of livestock are faced with many problems when feeding livestock under drought conditions. Feeding to keep livestock in good condition is one thing and feeding to keep them producing is another. Presently some producers face the former problem and all should be deeply concerned with the latter.

Obviously, cattle weighing 1,000 pounds or sheep weighing 100 pounds require more feed for maintenance than after they have dropped to 700 and 70 pounds respectively. Livestock in the drought areas have lost weight and in some instances have lost about all they stand. Therefore producers should be free to mix rations best suited to the class of livestock and to the purpose for which they may be fed.

Under the drought emergency feed program, feeds high in protein and energy are available to livestock producers. Proteins, such as cottonseed meal is an essential in using low grade fibrous roughages. Any grass or browse left in a drought region will be classified as very low in protein. If there is enough browse left on the range to provide enough bulk for filler to livestock then they may be maintained for a period of time on a cottonseed meal or pellets. However under this procedure, producers should be on the lookout for vitamin A and calcium deficiencies; two important items in maintenance and reproduction. Other common roughages that are low in protein, Vitamin A and minerals are cottonseed hulls and grass wheat, cottonseed meal or pellets is much the cheapest source of protein and furnishes energy at a little higher cost than corn. Obviously, cottonseed meal or pellets is a good buy if there is anything at all left in the way of old grass or browse.

Of the feeds available thru the relief feed program, cottonseed meal or pellets, corn, oats and hay or cereal straw. If the range is dry and barren and there is no green browse available to livestock, then they should be provided with adequate roughage with at least one fifth of the daily allowance being legume hay to provide adequate supply of vitamin A. VA Quiz

Q. I understand that with credit controls lifted it is possible to get a 30 year GI loan with no down payment. Is this true?

A. No. Although such terms are permissible, it is still up to the lender to make his own decision as to the terms of the loan.

Q. I have been separated from service. I haven't yet applied for a GI loan. How long will I be covered by the free indemnity that protected me while I was in uniform?

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A. The free indemnity protects you for 120 days after your separation from service. If you want the GI term insurance, you must apply to VA for it and pay your first premium within that 120 day period.

May I request the readers of this paper to join me in prayer this week?

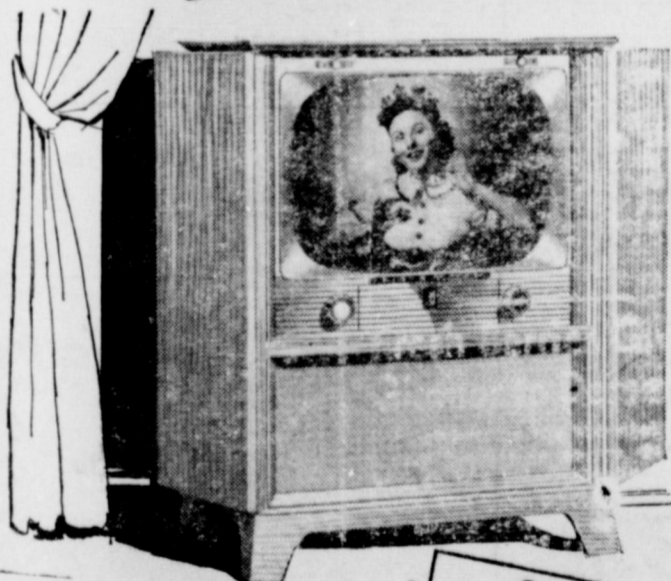

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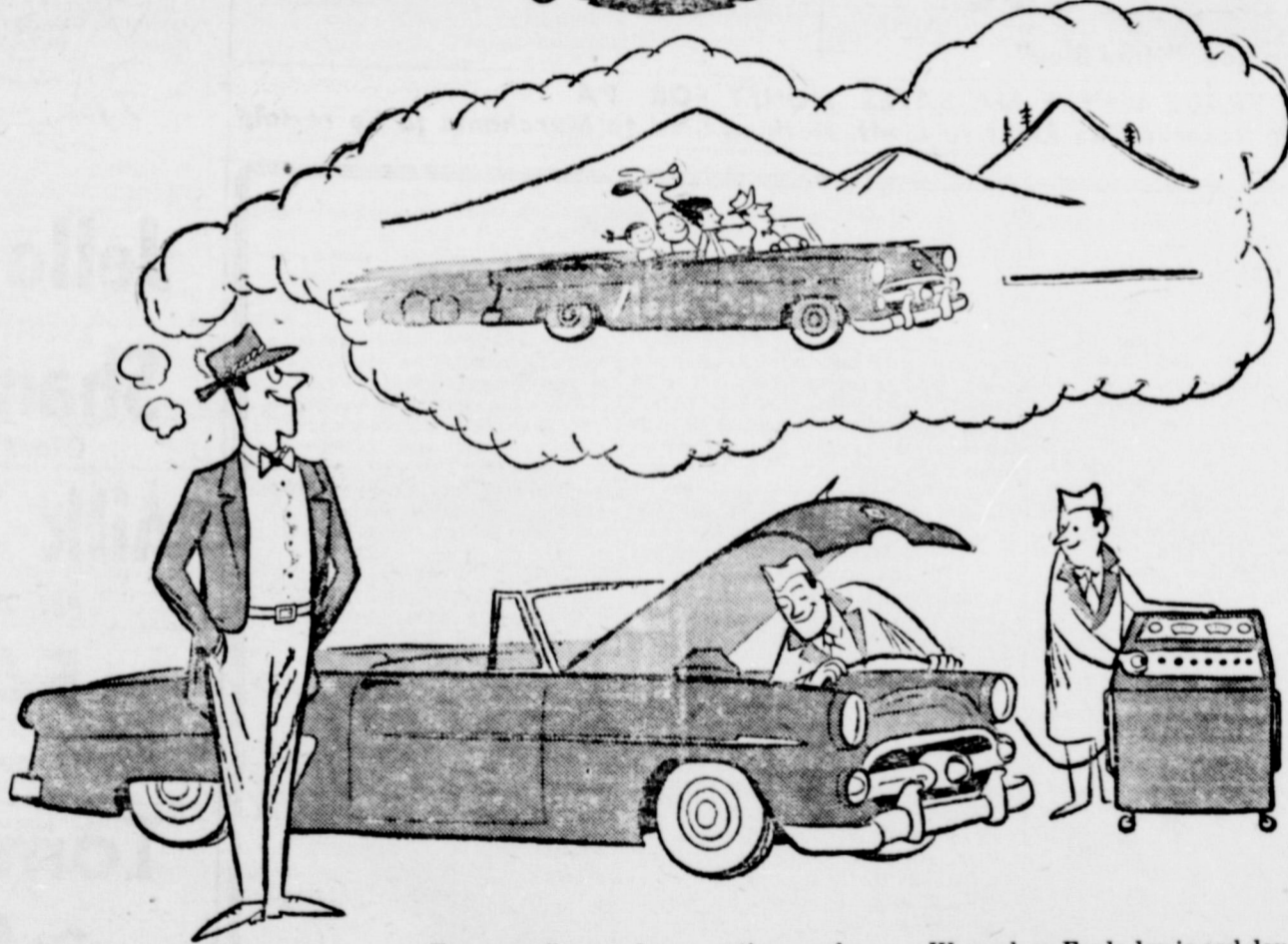

When a drought becomes as widespread and as prolonged as this one, it affects every factor of state operation, including the public's health. He said sanitation is the most serious threat posed by drought conditions.

"There's some typhoid in Texas now," he indicated. "Did contaminated water cause it? We're in the process of finding out."
