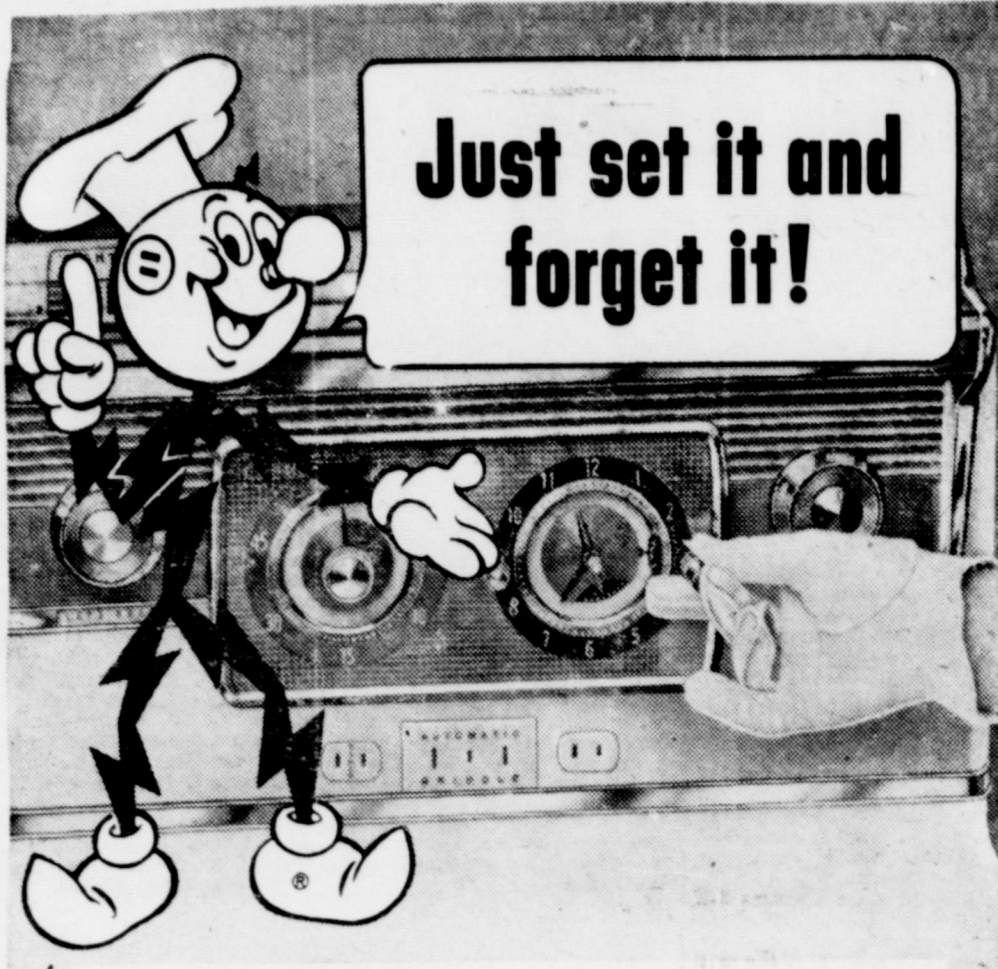

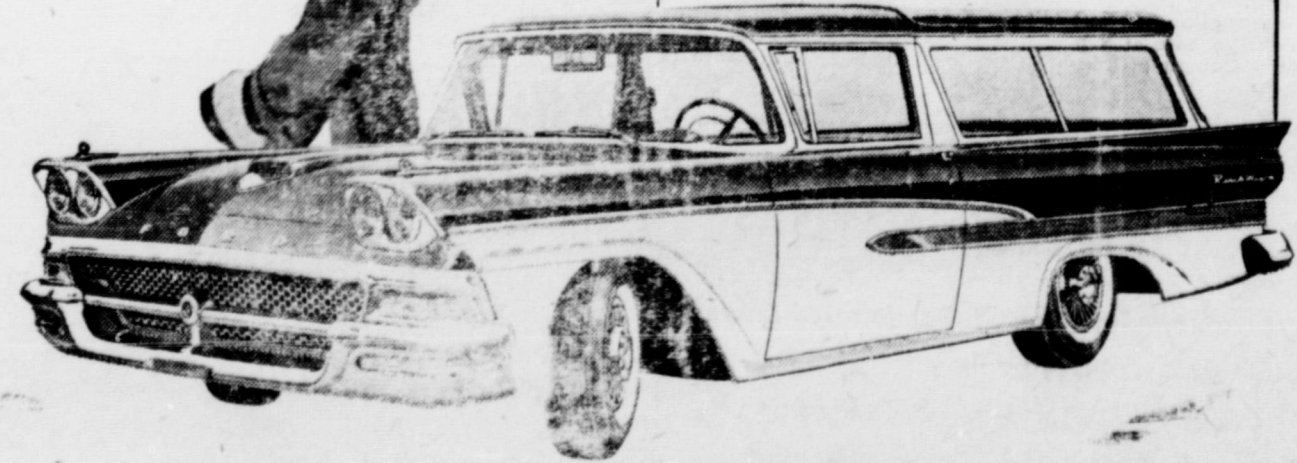

Purple Heart Veteran Deported as Wetback

SAN ANTONIO—Immigration authorities sent a 21 year-old Purple Heart veteran of Korea back to Mexico as a "wetback" recently.

The veteran, Cpl. Alberto Gonzales of Monterrey, Mexico, was sent in an immigration bus to Laredo, Tex., to be put off in Mexico. Immigration Officer W. L. Meuhlhause said he had entered the United States on a dead man's birth certificate before he joined the American army three years ago. Wetbacks—named for those who swim the Rio Grande—are illegal entrants.

The G.I. Forum, which works on the problems of Latins in San Antonio, assigned an attorney, Richard Casillas, to the case with instructions to "go all the way to the state department if necessary" to allow Mr. Gonzales to live in the United States.

The immigration office said he was being allowed to leave the country "voluntarily" and predicted he could get a permanent visa from the American consul in Mexico that would allow him to come back in time for the wedding.

Mr. Gonzales was discharged from the army at Fort Sam Houston.

He joined the Army Sept. 17, 1948, and enlisted for another three years on the same date last year. Velia Sanchez, 20, his fiance, said he had spent a year in Korea, with headquarters of the Eighth army.

"He was wounded in the hip and got a broken ear drum," she said. "He has the Purple Heart, five campaign stars, the United Nations ribbon, the Korean service ribbon and a unit citation."

Spare Parts for Body Are Available to Man

NEW YORK—Spare parts for the human body still can't be ordered from a mail-order catalog. Nevertheless, the advance of medicine during the past few years has made available an imposing array of replacements for damaged or ineffective organs.

Following the development of the blood bank, first of the spare-part repositories, ingenious surgeons have found ways to maintain banks for eyes, bone, cartilage, arteries and veins. There are now methods for transplanting whole organs from one individual to another, and for constructing replacement organs from tissues taken from the patient's own body.

Some man-made spare parts, such as the artificial kidney, are already coming into clinical use, while others, among them the mechanical heart and plastic heart valves, are well along in the experimental stage.

CAN MAKE YOU MONEY WITH HIGHER QUALITY COTTON IN 1958

Production practices govern quality and yield. Do your best to see that your land preparation is adequate. Check your soil fertility needs now so that maximum production of quality cotton will not be hampered by lack of nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium or organic matter. Sub soil moisture may be adequate — but check to be sure.

Planting time is almost here. Optimum planting dates on the High Plains are May 5-20. Later planting usually results in lower quality. Before planting be sure the minimum soil temperature averages 60 degrees for 10 days at an 8-inch depth from the top of the bed. Use delinted, treated seed and check for germination. A uniform stand of approximately four stalks per foot in 40-inch rows is recommended. The method of harvest to be used should help determine the variety planted.

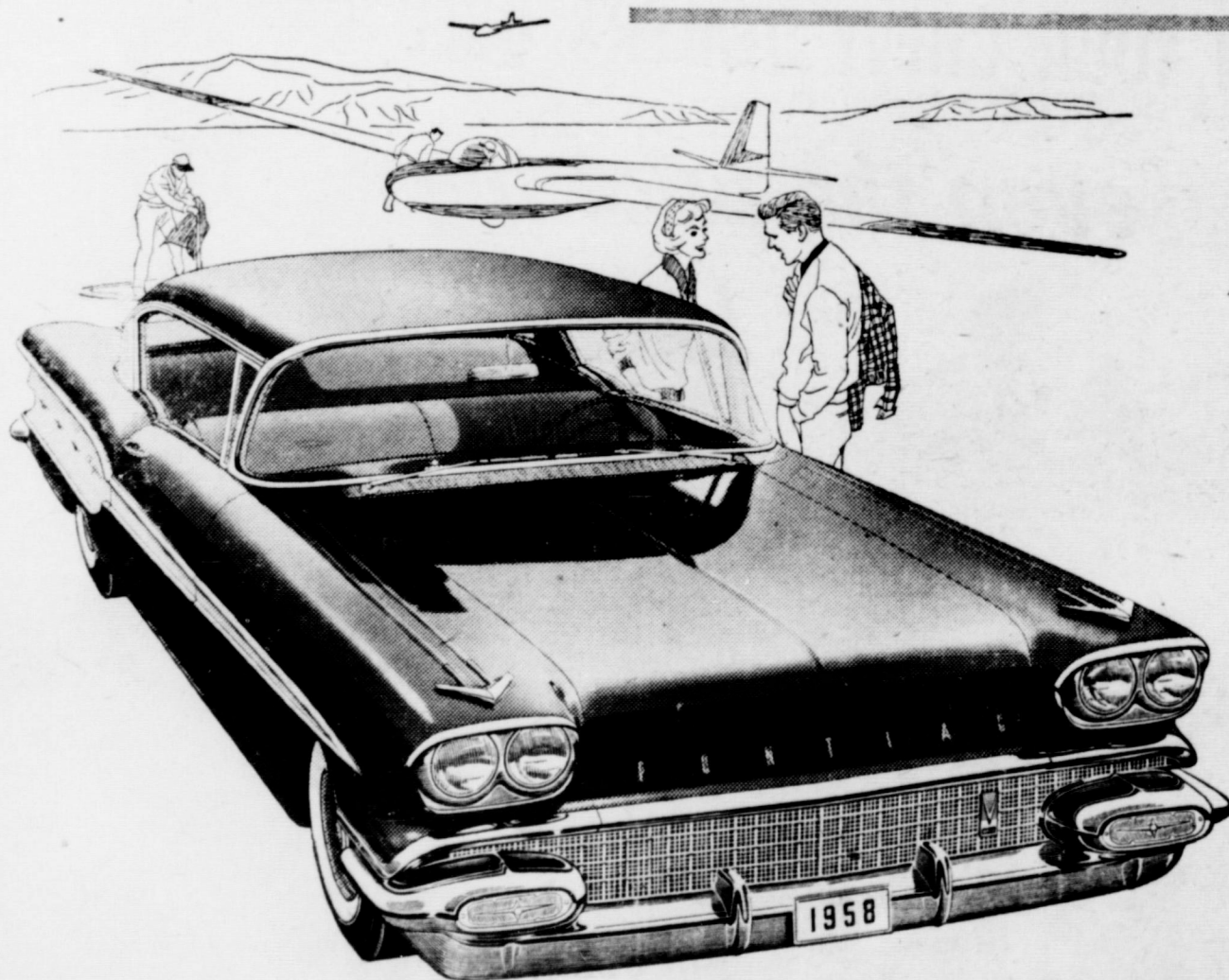

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Community Soaked As Indians Perform Ancient Rain Dance

ANADARKO, Okla.—The American Indian Exposition here was rained out 12 hours after the Jemez Apache Indians completed a rain dance under a clear sky. Chief Juan Gachupin and his 14-year-old daughter, Leonora, performed the rhythmic, stamping dance while two braves chanted and beat a tom-tom, before 100 delegates from 35 tribes and 100 palefaced.

Another performance was scheduled. The rain threatened to reduce attendance and slow down athletic contests.

Two years ago, the Kiowa Indians performed a "forbidden" pagan sun dance over the opposition of tribal leaders. It was followed by rains so heavy that they nearly washed out the exposition.

Farmers near Anadarko rejoiced after the rain. A summer drought had almost destroyed their cotton, peanut and feed crops. Chief Gachupin refused to take credit.

Asked through an interpreter whether he thought his dancing had anything to do with the rain, he grunted, "I couldn't say."

The Jemez tribe, descended from the pueblos, has claimed for centuries that the dance does bring rain.

Exposition officials said that the opposition to the sun dance in 1956 came from the fact that it was considered pagan.

Curves Eliminated Between N. C. Towns

OLD FORT, N.C.—The relocation of a road between here and Ridgecrest is taking the hair out of a mountain trail, but the job itself is a hair-raising one.

With an army of bulldozers, tractors, trucks and other earthmoving machines, construction crews are making war against a mountain. In jeeps that scamper over ravines, like mountain goats, engineers direct the operation by radio-telephone.

The road-building project is based on the "leveling off" principle, which means filling in the valleys, as well as cutting through the hills. And in making the necessary "fills" and "cuts," workers must cope with the movement of millions of cubic yards of dirt and soil, frequently working at angles that defy the law of gravity.

In the words of one engineer: "The project would be next to impossible were it not for the jeeps which we use for operating in advanced positions, and for many trips we must make to the field office." The radio-telephone system of communications was also rated as "vital and essential."

When completed this fall, the new road will replace an eight-mile section of U.S. 70, which has a dangerous curves and a bad accident record. The new highway will have two 22-foot lanes, no hazardous bends, only 19 curves of easy-to-take variety, and it will reduce the overall traveling distance by a good two miles under the old route.

The construction firm of W. E. Graham & Sons, Cleveland, N.C., called the road re-location project the biggest ever undertaken on the side of the Mississippi. Pointed out too, was the fact that the new road will have 10-foot shoulders and a drainage system utilizing heavy-duty culverts up to 54 inches.

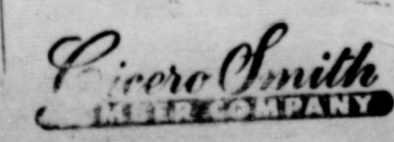

 mez Apache Indians completed
 a rain dance under a clear sky.

Chief Juan Gachupin and his 14-
 year-old daughter, Leonora, per-
 formed the rhythmic, stamping
 dance while two braves chanted
 and beat a tom-tom, before 10,000
 delegates from 35 tribes and 8,000
 palefaces.

Another performance was sched-
 uled. The rain threatened to reduce
 attendance and slow down athletic
 contests.

Two years ago, the Kiowa Indi-
 ans performed a "forbidden"
 pagan sun dance over the angry
 opposition of tribal leaders. It was
 followed by rains so heavy that
 they nearly washed out the expo-
 sition.

Farmers near Anadarko rejoiced
 after the rain. A summer drought
 had almost destroyed their cotton,
 peanut and feed crops. Chief Gach-
 upin refused to take credit.

Asked through an interpreter
 whether he thought his dancing
 had anything to do with the rain,
 he grunted, "I couldn't say."

The Jemez tribe, descended from
 the pueblos, has claimed for cen-
 turies that the dance does bring
 rain.

Exposition officials said that the
 opposition to the sun dance in 1950
 came from the fact that it was
 considered pagan.
