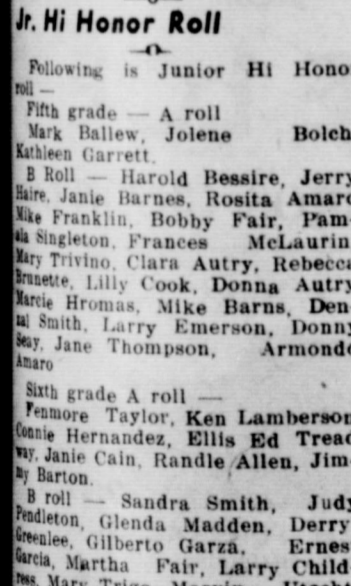

## Little Boy Killed Monday Car Jumps Curb

A four year old boy was crushed to death between a car that jumped the curb and a building downtown here Monday. Instantly killed was Jimmy Dan Simpson, age 4, son of Mr and Mrs. Holland Simpson.

The heartbreaking mishap occurred at about 9:45 a. m. The child was playing on the outside of the York Laundry when Mrs. June Allen, 19, daughter of Mr and Mrs. Oscar Veach, drove up to park. The brakes on the old model Ford failed and the car jumped the curb. Jimmy was pinned to the building and when she backed up the child slumped down. He only gasped twice. A Negro employee of Clark's Farm Store witnessed the accident. Mrs. Simpson was washing in the laundry and she ran out, picked up her baby and carried him across the street to the hospital here. Dr. Rumbo worked to try to restore life but the tiny spark was gone.

No charges were filed.

Survivors include the parents, a brother, Charles, of Texas Tech and a grandfather, E. Eason, of Morton. The father is a long time employee of the local school.

Funeral services were Tuesday at 3 p. m. in the First Methodist Church here. Willie Fox, of Amarillo, Primitive Baptist Pastor, officiated assisted by Rev. Howard Marcom. Burial was in the local cemetery.

Wash day was one of high adventure to Jimmy. He had on his two toy pistols and his cowboy rope and was playing on the sidewalk. Only minutes before he had a soda pop with his dad and Jones Pierce across the street. The witness said Jimmy tried to dodge the car but couldn't quite make it.

He was such a beautiful child with lovely features as to belong to a girl. He was a favorite to all of us who have played with him since a baby.

This was the first fatal traffic mishap in about 12 years here when a little girl died at hands of an unlicensed hit and run driver.

Words cannot begin to express the heartbreak of everyone to the loved ones on so tragic a mishap.

### V. A. Quiz

Q — Before I can get a Certificate of Eligibility for a GI home loan I understand I will need to show my discharge from the Army which I can't seem to find. Will a certified true copy I had made do just as well?

A — Yes. A certified true copy of your discharge is acceptable to VA as evidence of your military service. Send or bring it with your application to the Regional office in the area where the house you are planning to buy is located.

Q — How soon after I start to school under the Korean GI Bill will I get my first VA school allowance?

A — The waiting period is about two months.

Q — I am a disabled veteran of the Korea fighting taking Vocational Rehabilitation Training and I have a dental condition that has been bothering me lately. My disability is service connected but I do not know whether my dental condition is or not. Can I get out patient dental treatment from VA?

A — You could be eligible for out patient dental treatment in the circumstances you describe.

Q — I want to change the beneficiaries of my GI insurance policy. Must I inform the present beneficiary of my decision?

A — No. You have the right to change beneficiaries at any time without their consent or knowledge.

### S S News

An important notice is enclosed with the social security checks delivered this month to the 200,000 disabled workers who are receiving monthly disability insurance benefits. This notice tells them about a provision in the 1958 Amendments to the social security law under which supplementary dependent's benefits may be paid to certain members of his family.

Disability insurance benefits have been payable to severely disabled workers 50 to 65 years of age since July of 1957. These disability payments are equal in amount to the monthly old age insurance benefits the worker would receive if he were already 65 years of age but the dependents of these workers have not until now been eligible for payments.

Under the new amendments the disabled person's dependents will be paid the same benefits they would receive if he were 65 and drawing benefits as a retired worker. Benefits can be paid to any of his children who are under age 18 (or who have been totally disabled since before their 18th birthdays), and to his wife regardless of her age, if she has in her care children who are eligible for these dependent benefits. If there is no child in the family eligible for benefits, the wife of a disabled person can qualify when she reaches 62.

It is estimated that about 180,000 dependents of disabled workers could start collecting benefits beginning with a payment for the month of September 1958. Before payment can be made an application must be filed.

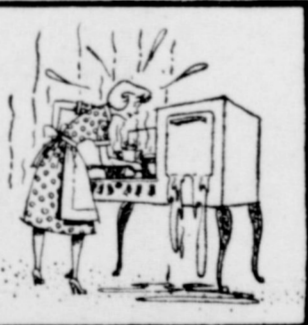
**RADIO HAMS FORM CLUB**
