## CLYDE SCHOOL DISTRICT BEGINS PRE-SCHOOL CENSUS

CLYDE — School officials of Clyde School District have begun a census count of all pre-school age children in the district. The count is necessary to make plans for the public kindergarten program to begin with the 1973-74 school year.

House Bill 240 of the 61st Legislature provides that all children five years and seven months of age be offered the opportunity of attending public kindergarten beginning with the 1973-74 school year.

The bill further provides that all educationally handicapped

children and all children from families with less than \$3,000 annual income who are at least five years old on or before Sept. 1 shall be eligible to attend public kindergarten.

All parents of preschool age children in the Clyde School District are urged to contact Mr. Don Allen to register their children in the census count. It is very important that all children are counted, particularly those who will be five years old Sept. 1st. Blanks for registration are being distributed through the children who are in school,



## Boll Weevil Research Nears Pay Dirt

Sixty-nine years ago, the Texas legislature offered a \$50,000 reward to anyone who could come up with a remedy for the boll weevil.

So far, there haven't been any takers, but—if the offer still holds—the pay-off could come within the next five years or so.

The year the Texas solons made their offer, the boll weevil had cost cotton growers in that state some \$50 million in crop losses. Now, it's estimated that nationwide cotton producers lose between \$175 million and \$250 million annually because of the boll weevil.

Suppression treatments cost an additional \$75 million each year, and account for nearly one-third of all insecticides applied to crops in the United States.

A two-year pilot boll weevil eradication experiment now nearing completion on 28,000 acres of cotton in southern Mississippi and adjacent areas of Alabama and Louisiana gives every indication of marking the beginning of the end for America's No. 1 cotton pest.

Already, plans are in the making for a Cotton Belt-wide eradication program based on knowledge learned from the experimental proj-



ect. J. Ritchie Smith, director of the National Cotton Council's technical service, says it is hoped the eradication effort can start in 1974—or 1975 at the latest—and be completed in five years.

While the cost of such a program may not exceed that now involved in one year's losses and control expenses, the director said it could possibly run twice that amount.

"Even so, eradication would be a bargain from a cost standpoint—not to mention benefits to the environment," Smith added. "It provides one of our great opportunities for cost reduction from Texas east, and would

keep the weevil from gaining a foothold in the West." A campaign to wipe out the boll weevil was initiated by the Council in 1959, when it secured federal funds to study needs and establish a boll weevil research laboratory. It also joined the U.S. Department of Agriculture and state agencies in developing mass rearing methods, diapause control, and chemosterilants. By 1968, boll weevil eradication was believed feasible through a mix of methods.

The following year, a Council-established special committee spearheaded arrangements for the pilot experiment. Cotton producers

themselves invested more than a million dollars in the experiment through their \$1-per-bale self-assessment program, and other funds came from federal and state governments.

A combination of biological and chemical suppression techniques is used in the experiment. The plan is built around the idea of drastically reducing boll weevil populations in successive stages, and then releasing sterile males to stop the natural reproduction of all remaining weevils.

First step in the program involves late season insecticide treatments, using a non-persistent phosphate pesticide, to kill a maximum number of weevils before they go into diapause for winter hibernation. This is followed up by cultural practices that include destroying cotton stalks after harvest to eliminate food and shelter for any surviving weevils.

Bright yellow traps baited with boll weevil sex attractant are then set up around the cottonfields to lure weevils as they come out of hibernation. The final blow comes with the release of sexually sterile male weevils.
