VA Quiz

Q - Previously VA had been deducting my GI insurance premium payments from my monthly disability compensation. My compensation has just been reduced to the point where it no longer is large enough to cover my premiums. What happens now?

A - Since your compensation payments no longer are large enough to cover your GI insurance premiums, the automatic deduction plan will stop. You will have to start paying premiums yourself.

Q - I am drawing a VA pension. My wife has just gone to work part-time to supplement our income. Am I supposed to count her salary in figuring whether my annual income falls below the legal "ceiling"?

A - No. In computing your annual income, you need not include the separate income of your wife.

Q - I applied for disability compensation at VA a year and a half ago, and was turned down. I had planned to appeal, but kept putting it off. Is it too late now?

A - Yes. Any decision of a VA rating board unappealed within one year is final. But you may submit a new claim for compensation and include any additional information that you may have.

Q - I am taking a trade school course under the GI Bill. It will last for two years. I know that get 30 days of authorized absence a year. If I'm not absent the first year, can I carry those 30 days over to the second year?

A - No. Carry-overs of unused absences from one year to the next are not allowed.

Know Your Law

John Brown and Bill Smith desire to operate a business together. Should this be done as partners or as a corporation? The answer to this problem involves many legal questions.

Perhaps the most important factor is that the business or personal acts of either John or Bill may be binding upon the partnership. The corporation, however, can act only through its officers and agents, and then only within the limitations granted by the articles of incorporation.

As members of a partnership both John and Bill are liable for all of the debts of the business, in case they have business losses, the creditors of the partnership could take all of the assets of the partnership, either John or Bill or both (except a few exempt by law), in order to satisfy the partnership debts.

On the other hand, if they form a corporation the creditors may go only against the assets of the corporation so that the most that either John or Bill can lose is the amount they have invested in the business. The creditors could not touch the personal property of either John or Bill.

Upon the death of John or Bill, it is necessary to liquidate the partnership, but in case of a corporation the operation of the business is not effected by the death of either. The firm continues as the business with the heirs of the one who dies substituted as the owner of the stock.

Of primary interest to John and Bill is the amount of income taxes they have to pay. As a partnership, each includes on his individual income tax return his proportionate share of the income as shown on the partnership return. This is because the partnership is not recognized as a taxable entity.

The corporation is recognized as a taxable entity, so it pays a tax on the amount of its net income, after deducting the salaries of John and Bill and other expenses.

11 Days For Taxes

11 working days remain for Lynn County residents to pay their city taxes, school taxes and county and state 1954 taxes with penalty, officials here said Tuesday. Deadline for payment of taxes and the all-important poll tax is Jan. 31st. County tax collector J. E. Brown will be here Thursday and Friday at Clayton Insurance office to collect county and state taxes and issue poll taxes. "Overs" do not need exemption certificates in Lynn county. Locally the importance of having a poll tax this year is the elections of school and tax officials and possible vote on vital Canadian River proposal.

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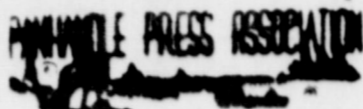

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VA Quiz

Q - I forgot to pay my GI insurance premium on time, and mailed it to VA toward the end of the 31-day grace period. What does VA go by in determining whether the premium was mailed in time-- the date on my check or the date the premium reaches VA?

A - Neither. The postmark on the envelope is considered as the date on which the premium was paid.

Q - If the widow of a serviceman killed on active duty remarries, may she still receive the \$52.90 monthly insurance or indemnity payments?

A - The legal widow at the time of the serviceman's death has entitlement to the indemnity; her remarriage, under the law, does not bar her continued entitlement.

Q - What is the largest amount of money a veteran can borrow to buy a home under the GI loan program?

A - There is no limit on the amount of money a veteran may borrow. It all depends on what the maximum applies only to the lender is willing to lend him. The amount of VA's guarantee that can be issued upon the loan.

Q - In figuring out my annual income for VA pension purposes, am I supposed to count only my take-home pay or my gross salary?

A - You must include your total salary and not just your take-home pay. Your total salary includes

money withheld for retirement plans and income taxes.

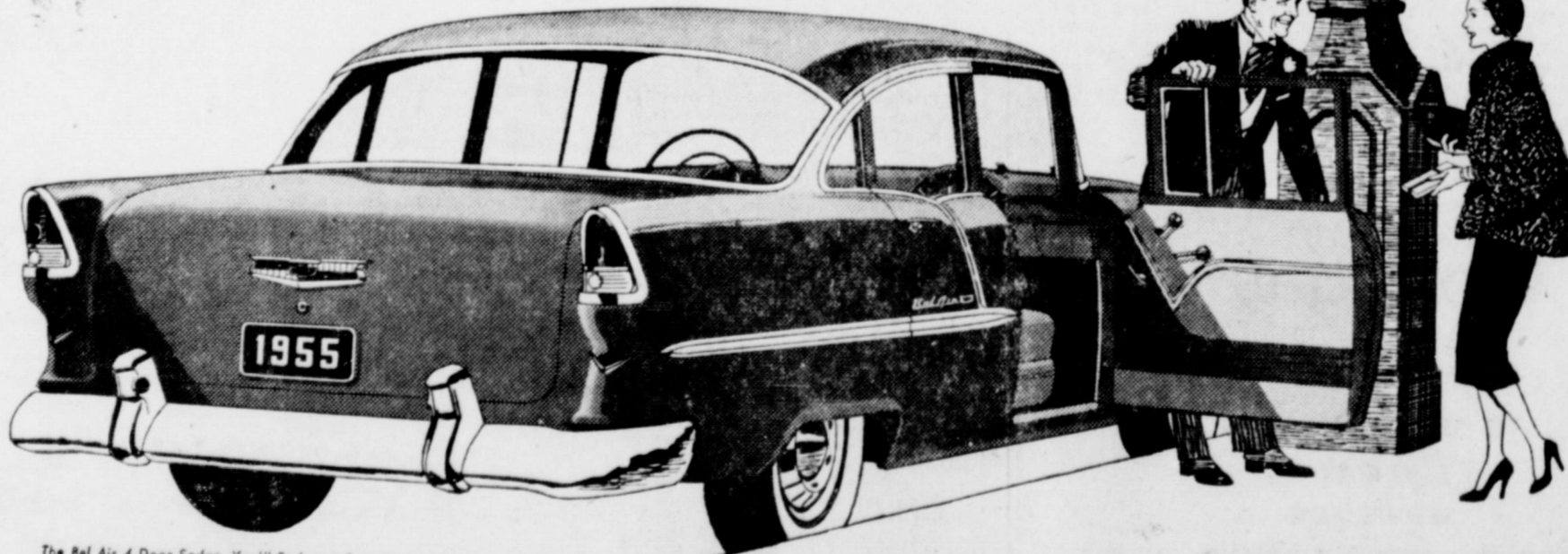

T. B. IS STILL A MAJOR ILLNESS

Tuberculosis, many years ago the nation's leading cause of death, is losing out because of man's fight for better health. Once the leading death in Texas, too, tuberculosis now ranks ninth in Texas as a cause of death, says Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer. Last year all forms of tuberculosis killed 1,970 Texans while twenty years ago with a population of only two-thirds of our present population there were 4,020 deaths.

Tuberculosis usually attacks the lungs. The disease is spread from person to person, through germladen droplets or sputum discharged by an infected person. It can be spread through kissing, breathing air containing tuberculosis germs, and through handling objects used in common with tuberculosis persons. Children are easily susceptible to tuberculosis infection as they are to other disease germs.

Tuberculosis victims have a good chance to recover, if the disease is found in its early stages, and a physician's instructions for treatment are carefully followed. The outlook is becoming more encouraging as time goes on, but we cannot rest while the disease is taking so many lives.

Often, tuberculosis does not show any noticeable symptoms until its victim has become extremely sick.

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Some Moles Dangerous Philly Doctor Warns

CHICAGO—Although more than 99.9 per cent of all moles are harmless, some may turn into the worst kinds of cancer—highly malignant, very invasive and promptly fatal—Dr. Albert P. Seltzer, of Philadelphia, warned.

"Many people feel that just because a mole or other growth has been present since birth, it will never cause trouble," Dr. Seltzer says. "This is wishful thinking. We are all born with teeth, with tonsils, with an appendix. Yet frequently these organs become diseased and must be removed. The same is true of the common mole."

"Should every mole be removed? The answer is no. Most moles need no treatment except for cosmetic reasons. But certain kinds of moles are dangerous. A mole that increases in size, a mole that bleeds readily, a mole that becomes irritated or inflamed may already have become cancerous and certainly should come out at once." Dr. Seltzer pointed out that black moles, particularly blue-black, green-black or slate colored ones, are prone to become malignant. Moles on the foot are quite dangerous and should be removed, as should moles in places exposed to constant irritation or chafing, such as along the collar line, in the shave area of the face, on the lips of a pipe smoker, along the belt line or in the armpit.

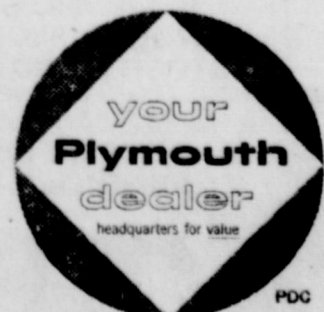
