Highlight of the gala affair was the crowning of the queen, Miss Barbara Blake, by Mayor W. Harry Steele. Queen Oceania, the 42nd was crowned at the reviewing stand, which was situated between Glenwood and Magnolia ave.

This also provided the most humorous comment of the day by Mickey Shaughnessy, who served as MC for the entire parade. As the mayor kissed Miss Blake after crowning her, the crown slipped from her head which prompted Shaughnessy to remark, "There's one girl who flips her lid when the mayor kisses her." The mayor went through the proceedings again without mishap.

U. S. Airmen Crash British Air Show

FARNBOROUGH, Eng.—The U. S. air force recently confessed that American Sabre jet fighters gate-crashed a supposedly all-British air show of fancy flying and displayed some fancy flying themselves, although endangering all the other participants in the show by their unscheduled antics.

Ten F-86 Sabres, used in Britain only by United States and Canadian fliers, stunted over the show thrilling spectators but spreading consternation among British authorities.

United States Air Force headquarters at South Ruislip admitted Americans were guilty of the prank and said disciplinary action was being taken.

Fresh Berries Give Glamor to Desserts

Strawberries are the first of the lovely berries to arrive, bringing with them a colorful magic to your table. Use them whole and sugared for simple desserts, combine with other fruits for salad, or mold them into delicious pastries for supremely luscious desserts.

Here's a modern version of an old-fashioned strawberry cream pie made with fresh strawberries, coconut and packaged vanilla pudding.

Strawberry Cream Pie
 1 package vanilla pudding and pie filling mix
 2 cups milk
 1 baked 8 or 9-inch pastry shell
 1 cup fresh, sliced strawberries
 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped

Place pie filling in saucpan. Add milk gradually, blending well. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil and is thickened. Cool slightly, stirring once or twice. Turn one-half of the pie filling mixture into pastry shell. Top with a layer of strawberries. Cover with remaining filling. Chill. Spread with whipped cream and garnish with coconut and whole berries. Quick-frozen, sliced strawberries thawed, may be used in place of the fresh berries, if desired.



Yule Tree Business Figured in Millions

CHRISTMAS TREES are a multi-million dollar business. Throughout the nation, some 15 million trees are supplied to the holiday demand. Prices range from \$1 to \$5, and that adds up to real money.
 A Christmas tree, in the lake states, is usually a balsam or a spruce. The same is true in New England and the Appalachian section. Elsewhere in the country, virtually all kinds of evergreens are used.
 The lodgepole pine and Douglas fir are frequently used in Colorado. On the Pacific coast, it is principally Douglas fir.
 In Maryland, Virginia and Washington, D. C., a scrub pine takes a trimming.
 In other localities, white pine, southern pine, hemlock, red and white cedar and redwood are used.
 The business of harvesting this annual crop begins in the fall, when cutters go into the woods after trees. It continues as truckers bring huge loads to metropolitan markets.
 Many land owners manage their swamps to make them yield a crop of trees year after year. Thinning operations are another source of Yule trees.
 Farmers have discovered that they can get a cash crop from eroded acres by harvesting Christmas trees 10 or 15 years after they are planted.

 Add 1/4 cup well-drained, crushed Hawaiian pineapple to 3 ounces of cream cheese. Blend well. Use pretzels to scoop mixture.

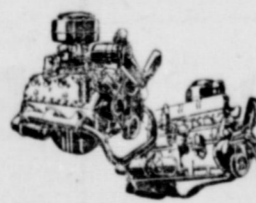

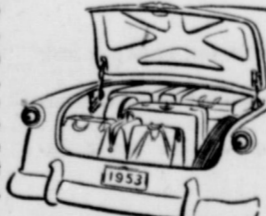

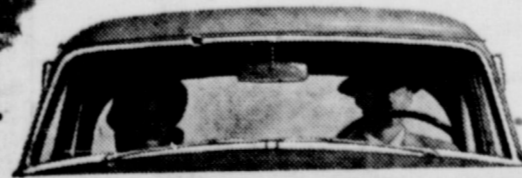
