



## Repair Work on IH 20 Almost Complete in Callahan County

Completion of the repair work on IH 20 through Callahan County and a portion of Taylor County is almost completed. Remaining work to be performed by the contractors consist of placement of guard fence, building up of the shoulder, and replacement of delineator posts, for safety purposes according to Jake Roberts, District Engineer District 8.

To strengthen the pavement approximately six and one-half inches of hot-mix, representing

483,488 tons, was placed over the existing two inches of pavement, which began to come apart during last winter's extreme weather. The pavement was not originally placed at full design strength due to a lack of federal funds at the time of construction. The overlay projects were accomplished by five separate contractors and was placed in a record time even with the material shortages that plagued the undertaking.

Cost of the freeze damage in the Abilene district on IH 20 in Taylor and Callahan Counties amounted to \$5,350,353. Special funds were used to finance the extensive projects. Freeze damage throughout the state last winter amounted to approximately \$28.4 million, according to highway calculations.

## Congress Reinstates Special Milk Program

CLYDE — School officials have been notified that the Special Milk Program has been reinstated by the Federal Congress. This program will allow school cafeterias to provide extra milk to students at a reduced price.

Beginning Monday, December 3rd, Clyde School Lunchroom will begin selling extra milk to students at 7c per half pint. One half pint will continue to be included with the meal at the regular price. Extra milk served to children will be reduced from the present 10c per half pint to 7c.

The price of milk to adults will be increased at this time to compensate for increased cost of milk. Adults will pay 15c per half pint for any milk consumed instead of the present 10c.

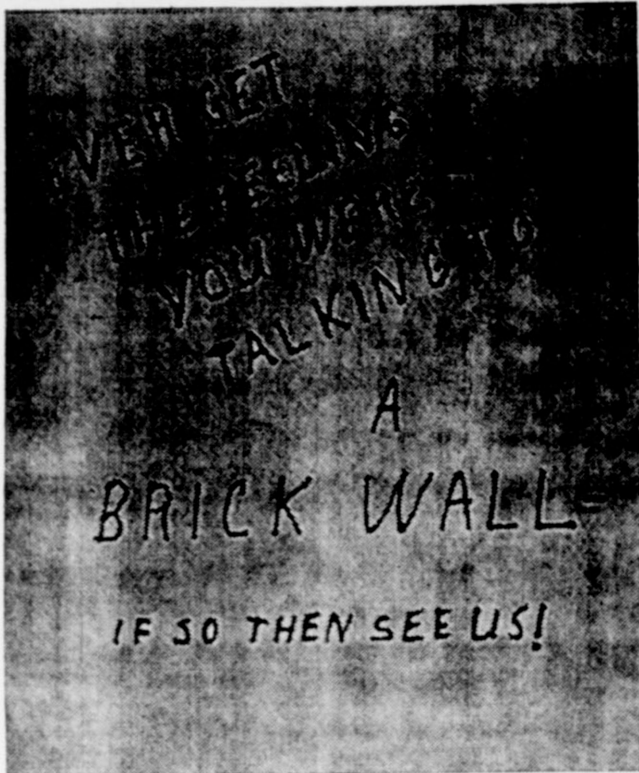
